HIGH FINANCE!
General Motors Has Made Investors A Large Return

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Mar. 9 (P)—Any investors who bought General Motors when the company was launched and who held the stock are now comparable in good fortune to those who invested with Henry Ford before the name became familiar to everybody.

Fourteen years ago, 100 shares of General Motors common cost \$6,000 assuming that the stock was purchased at the average price obtaining in 1914. Rapid expansion, both in the price of individual shares, and through numerous stock dividends, have raised the present value of this original investment to \$666,000, an increase of 9,333 per cent in 14 years.

Worth Of Stock Sky-Rockets
The 100 shares which could have been purchased in 1914 at around \$60 each, now are represented by 4,240 shares, worth at current prices more than \$150 each. On this stock at the regular \$5 rate, annual dividends amount to \$21,200, or more than three times the original investment in the issue.

The annual report of the corporation just issued reveals that its assets now aggregate more than \$1,000,000,000, making it one of the few companies in the world to attain that high level.

The condition of little Jimmy King, 18 months old, who was badly burned Wednesday when hot water was spilled on him, was much improved today according to his mother.

It was reported yesterday that Mrs. King spilled turpentine on the child, which was the case, she said today. A quantity of hot water, prepared for a bath, was setting beside the child's bed and upon awakening, he upset it upon himself sustaining the burns, according to the mother's statement today.

MONEY POURS IN TO SCOUTS

CASH ON HAND \$2,777 AND PLEDGES MAKE TOTAL \$4,378.25

With cash amounting to \$2,777 on hand, the campaign fund of the Boy Scouts climbed to \$4,378.25 today, the report of the various workers made to headquarters showed today at noon.

Work in the drive will be temporarily halted today until a check-up can be made on the various subscribers and non-subscribers in the campaign, officials in charge said. Tuesday a group of workers will again take to the streets in an effort to reach the \$7,000 goal set for the campaign.

A committee of workers, canvassing the Tech campus this morning, reported in with a total of \$223 in subscriptions, all cash.

New features have already been purchased for "The South Plains Farmer" and will make their appearance in its initial issues. A new staff is also being organized to care for the publication.

GUY HULSE, OF ST. LOUIS, WILL DELIVER TALK

CREDIT ASSOCIATION'S EXECUTIVE TALKS AT NOON GATHERING

With a large number of out-of-town merchants already arriving in the city this afternoon, indications are that several hundred business men from over the South Plains will hear Guy H. Hulse, of St. Louis, secretary of the National Retail Credit association, in his talk tonight in the district court room following the annual meeting of the association. "Six Vital Points of Retail Merchandising" will be his subject for the evening.

Arriving in Lubbock this morning, Mr. Hulse was entertained at noon by directors of the association in a luncheon at the Lubbock hotel. Talking with a group later, he said that Lubbock had the most progressive and prosperous atmosphere about it of any small town that he had visited since being in Texas. His tour includes twenty cities.

"I was told before I arrived here that I would find a neat little city," Mr. Hulse said, "and I am not disappointed."

Prior to Mr. Hulse's talk tonight, the annual meeting of the association will be held in which President W. W. Rix will give the annual report and five new directors elected.

School Trustees To Be Elected April 7

Elections of trustees for the various schools in Lubbock county, as required by law, will be held on Saturday, April 7. W. M. Pevehouse, county school superintendent, announced today. A number of new trustees are to be selected in the county, several having served their term.

Immediately following the elections the several schools will start their selection of next year's teaching staff. Mr. Pevehouse said. About 20 vacancies will be made in the county schools, he reported. A number of applications have already been made for the positions, he said.

Every new teacher selected for the county schools this year must have the equivalent of a first grade certificate by the old law or one year of college work by the new law, he said.

\$100,000 Lost As Juarez Bars Burn

EL PASO, Mar. 9 (P)—Half a block of cafes and bars in Juarez was in ruins today. Fire caused loss in the main part of the town estimated at more than one hundred thousand dollars. Much whiskey was destroyed, but considerable equipment, including slot machines, furniture and safes was saved. COURTS GRANT DEATH CALLS CHILD'S NAME R. WANAMAKER

MOYER LAD MAY LOSE HIS PART OF ADDING MACHINE MILLIONS

(By Associated Press)
DETROIT, Mar. 9.—Four year old Dode Alfred Boyer today not only had a legal name and a legal mother, but also a legal home. His heritage of fortune, however, remained in doubt.

The erstwhile "millionaire grandson" of Joseph A. Boyer, chairman of the board of the Burroughs Adding Machine company, became a legal resident of the United States when Mrs. Myron L. Boyer, estranged wife of the son of Joseph A. Boyer, obtained a visa from the American consul at Windsor, Ont., permitting his legal entry into this country.

Child's Mother Canadian
This action followed adoption of the child yesterday by Mrs. Boyer, who had falsely represented him to her husband as their son, and changing of his name from "Joseph A. Boyer, Jr." to Dode Alfred Boyer. The child's real mother is a Canadian girl. He was obtained from her in infancy by Mrs. Boyer.

The status of the child, thrown into a legal tangle recently when it became known he was not the son of Myron L. Boyer, now has been cleared up except for his inheritance of a fortune. A suit disclaiming and disavowing him, filed by Myron L. Boyer, is pending.

Mrs. Boyer, however, says her son's inheritance "doesn't matter." "I shall keep him," she said.

Terracing Will Be Exhibited Monday

In the interest of recovering wasted land in the county, D. F. Eaton, county agent, will hold a terracing demonstration Monday, March 19, on the Pat Nix farm, about four miles east of Lubbock. It was learned in his office this morning. Included in the demonstration of terracing methods will be the working of various machines and equipment.

More than 100 farmers have been improved this year by terracing, Mr. Eaton reports. Included in the list is a number of lakes where from ten to fifteen acres have been recovered by running circular contours around them.

Louisiana Hangs Two For Slaying

DERIDDER, La., Mar. 9 (P)—Joe Genna and Mollie Brasseur, convicted slayers of J. J. Breville, Deridder taxi driver, were hanged today. Genna, mounted the scaffold at 12:34 and was pronounced dead five minutes later. Brasseur immediately followed Genna to the scaffold and was dead seven minutes later.

COUNTY AGENT SEES YEAR OF PROFIT AHEAD

COUNTY IS ENTERING NEW ERA; PROSPECTS ARE BRIGHT, SAID

That Lubbock county is entering a greater production era is practically established according to County Agent D. F. Eaton who said today that the "outlook was mighty bright" for a great agricultural year, when approached regarding the coming crop season.

"The farmers are ahead of the season," Mr. Eaton said. "There is sufficient moisture for breeding now and a majority of the land has been through the process. Even so, breaking is being done fairly well."

More Farms Than Ever
Lubbock county will have more farms in operation this year than ever before, Mr. Eaton said. With the 1925 farm census of the United States department of agriculture giving the county 2,800 farms, there are at least 2,500 now, Mr. Eaton estimated. More land will be in cultivation than ever before, he said, due to the fact that there is much new land going under the plow.

Practically the entire eastern part of the county, with the exception of the canyon, is now in cultivation, the large pastures being cut down this year.

Cotton acreage will be increased 25 per cent in the county, he said. This increase will only be in the new land, however, no increase being made in the old land. Between 175,000 and 200,000 acres will be in cotton this year, Mr. Eaton estimated.

10,000 Acres to Wheat
Ten thousand acres will fall to wheat this year according to his estimations and observations while the usual acreage of feed will be planted.

While the land in cultivation has increased, the number of hogs, sheep, dairy cattle, poultry and other livestock has also increased, assuring the farmers of diversified profits this season, Mr. Eaton added.

Poultry Club Heads Are Meeting Today

Working on further details in the plan of the Lubbock County Poultry Growers association, a meeting of the directors and committee heads of the association is being held in the office of County Agent D. F. Eaton this afternoon. About fifteen poultry growers are present.

Included in the discussion will be the presentation of the plan for the poultry survey of the county which will be conducted shortly through the members.

Juryman Dismissed By Judge Mullican

Juries in the 90th district court were dismissed this morning for the remainder of the week by Judge Clark M. Mullican and ordered to report back Monday morning. Next week seven criminal cases are scheduled for the docket.

Beginning Monday, civil cases will be heard before Judge Homer Pharr in the 72nd district court to close the term.

SCHOOL TEACHER SHOT BY BANDIT AS HAND-TO-HAND FIGHT FOLLOWS HOLD-UP ON DOWNTOWN STREET IN DALLAS

DALLAS, Mar. 9.—Mrs. Elsie Milner, 35, school teacher at Pine Hill, Texas, and the wife of R. T. Milner, superintendent of schools at Henderson, was in a hospital here today with a pistol bullet wound in the abdomen, which she said was the result of a hand to hand battle with a holdup man on a downtown street here last night.

Mrs. Milner, who condition was not serious, was found wounded, after a patrolman had heard two pistol shots. He said he found a piece of paper nearby which Mrs. Milner said was a parcel she was carrying had been wrapped. She said the holdup man was attempting to rob her of valuable diamonds and money in her purse.

The robber, she said, stepped out of a darkened doorway and told her to raise her hands, pointing a pistol at her. She raised her hands, struck the arm of the man, and the pistol was discharged. They scuffled for possession of the pistol and another shot was fired, the bullet lodging in her abdomen.

WILCOX SLAPS AT POLLARD OPINION ON PARTY PLEDGE

(By Associated Press)
GEORGETOWN, Mar. 9.—His opinion as to the legality of the pledge presented by the State Democratic Executive committee has not been changed as a result of Attorney General Claude Pollard's ruling yesterday that the pledge is illegal.

D. W. Wilcox, Georgetown, chairman of the Executive committee, said here today in a statement. He further said he would continue to enforce the pledge to support party nominees as long as the committee favored the pledge.

"I know of no law that authorizes the Attorney General to act as a legal adviser either for the state or County Democratic Executive committees or chairmen," Mr. Wilcox said.

He Cites Statutes
Citing article 4399 of the revised statutes of 1925, Mr. Wilcox said that article "prohibits the Attorney General from giving legal advice or written opinions to any other than the officers or persons named therein."

"It is very evident from this article that the fact that Mr. Pollard is attorney general gives no vitality to his opinion," Mr. Wilcox continued. His opinion is worth no more and has no more binding effect than the opinion of any other lawyer of equal ability.

Lawyers, as able as Mr. Pollard hold that the pledge "I am a democrat and agree to support the nominees of the party" is entirely legal. The pledge has been properly and legally adopted by the state democratic executive committee by a vote of 27 in favor thereof and 2 against same, and so far as the chairman is concerned he will use all the authority he has to enforce it."

MCADOO HEADS WALSH TICKET

CALIFORNIA IS SCENE OF OPENING GUN FOR MONTANA SENATOR

(By Associated Press)
SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 9.—The Walsh for President boom came to life in California today as a group of dry democrats headed by Wm. G. McAdoo put a ticket in the field in behalf of the Montana senator.

The movement assured a triangular democratic fight in the presidential primary which will be held May 1 to name delegations to the national conventions. Organizations supporting Governor Al Smith of New York and Senator Reed of Missouri previously had taken root in the California field.

The personnel of the Walsh ticket, as announced, contained the names of McAdoo, Kathleen Norris, the writer, and George Creel, author and head of the government's wartime information bureau.

The Walsh supporters prefaced their entry into the primary arena with a statement decrying dishonesty in government and suggesting that the Montana senator "possessed the rugged honesty, intelligence and devotion to public service that fits him for leadership in the fight ahead of us."

Texasan Forced Down In Endurance Flight

WACO, Mar. 9 (P)—Tip Schier, who began an endurance flight in a 90-horsepower plane at 9:30 o'clock last night, landed at 9:30 o'clock this morning, having remained aloft just twelve hours. He said that so far as he knew the longest any plane of the class he flew had remained up before was nine hours.

The landing became necessary because the plane's motor became overheated from a decreased water supply, Schier declared.

Burks Draws Year In Pro-Law Charge

CHARLES BURKS, charged with violation of the prohibition law, was given a year in the penitentiary by a jury in the 90th district court this morning shortly after 9 o'clock. The verdict came in after deliberation of 15 hours, the case going to them at 6:30 yesterday afternoon. Burks was indicted on the count during the last term of court.

Girl Is Suicide

ROCKWOOD, Tenn., Mar. 9 (P). Louise Stevens, 18, a junior in the Rockwood high school here, was found dead yesterday with a pistol wound in her heart. Near the house was the pistol of her father who was killed in a blast at the Bonnie Iron company mine in 1926. A note for her family also was found. Relatives said she had been despondent for some time.

OLTON COMMITTEE HAS FUNDS ASSURED AND WILL PROBABLY SIGN CONTRACT IN FEW DAYS

(Special to The Journal)
HALE CENTER, Mar. 9.—A contract, calling for the construction of a 66 mile railroad line, connecting this city and Parmerton, in Parmer county, and passing through Olton and Lamb county, was signed here last night by representative citizens and two officials of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railway company. According to the contract, which will be a 'temporary agreement' until permission to build the line is granted by the Interstate Commerce commission, Hale Center must furnish that part of the right-of-way which is in Hale county, amounting to approximately \$15,000 in land.

J. W. Stewart and J. T. Irving, of the Chicago offices of the Santa Fe, signed the agreement for the company at the conclusion of a meeting last night which was attended by approximately 50 interested business men. The meeting was called following earlier ones with business men of Lamb and Castro counties in Olton.

Operation In Two Years
According to statements made by the Santa Fe men, as soon as a contract is signed by Lamb county citizens an application for the construction of the road will be made to the Interstate Commerce commission at Washington. The Santa Fe expects to have the road in operation within a two year period of time.

Nelson Purdie, banker, is chairman of the Hale Center railroad committee, and Silas Maggard, a retired merchant, is secretary. The Santa Fe's representatives left here this morning on an inspection trip of the western part of the proposed line, which cuts through the southeast corner of Castro county and joins the Santa Fe's main line at Parmerton, in Parmer county.

LIGHTNING STRIKES 4 TANKS; WORKMEN NOT INJURED

MIDLAND, Mar. 9 (P)—Lightning struck and set fire to four 80,000 barrel crude oil tanks on the Magnolia Refining company's farm one mile east of Midland shortly after noon today. No one was hurt. Workmen immediately set about shooting holes in the tanks with 3-inch cannon to prevent the spread of the flames.

The bolt of lightning that struck the tanks followed a severe storm in which large hailstones fell.

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MUSSOLINI'S LITTLE BROTHER TALKS ON GROWING PROMINENCE OF AMERICA IN WORLD AFFAIRS; RAPS U. S. STAND

(By The Associated Press)
MILAN, Italy, Mar. 9.—The steady growing prominence of the United States in world affairs was analyzed by Arnaldo Mussolini, brother of the premier, last night in the course of a speech dealing with dominating forces in the world.

In the address, delivered before the cultural institute, he said America soon intended to pursue a "grandiose policy," and that because of economic necessity, the American market would launch out on world conquest.

The "military heroism" of the United States in the world war was "limited to a few actions on the

French front," Signor Mussolini said in discussing possible American desire for military glory.

He began his reference to the United States by saying America could declare herself satisfied with possessing the maximum riches among nations. "In that privileged position, she seeks influence with her foreign policy on the European continent," he continued.

"Gold is a formidable force, and when it is found at the disposal of a young race we must always expect surprises. Moreover we must not forget that in a short time the Americans intend to pursue a grandiose policy of their own."

The very problem of armaments

betrays a preoccupation, namely the necessity of adding to their forces of a rich nation, to their probity of business character, and their technical skill, great military glory as well.

The United States intervention in the European war had its weight by virtue of the means which it offered old Europe to defend herself. For the rest her military heroism was limited to a few actions on the French front.

Americans "superior"

"We have paid the highest price with corresponding interest for this intervention and since then there has not been a problem affecting old Europe which has not always been discussed with a certain attitude of superiority by American circles."

"In a period of economic necessity those who have the means always find a way of imposing themselves. This explains how Parker Gilbert, the international commissioner for reparations at Berlin, an American who does not know a word of German, knows how to evaluate in a perfect manner Germany's economics. Furthermore, it is superfluous to recall America's ambiguous policy in regard to the League of Nations."

Everybody's Hearing
ROME, Mar. 9 (AP).—The speech of Premier Mussolini's brother, Arnaldo, the editor of the premier's personal organ, *Piccolo d'Italia*, was broadcast from Milan last night and heard by radio fans all over Italy. It was prominently displayed in the papers of Rome and provincial Italy this morning.

NEW YORK COTTON
NEW YORK Mar. 9 (AP)—The cotton market opened steady at an ad-

vance of 1 to 6 points in response to relatively steady Liverpool cables, reports of an advance in the market for Egyptian cotton at Alexandria, an unfavorable view of the early weather map which showed no rain in West Texas, with considerable

rain in the eastern belt, and reports that cotton cloth production during February had exceeded the January output.
Trading was very quiet, however, and after selling up to 18.64 for May and 18.18 for October, prices eased back 3 or 4 points, with the market about 1 to 4 points net higher at the end of the first hour.
Business remained quiet later in the morning, with prices working off a few points under comparatively small offerings attributed chiefly to liquidation. The price of May sagged off to 18.57 or about 3 points net lower. October declined to 18.13, or within a point of yesterday's closing quotations. The market at midday was within a point or two of these figures.

NEW ORLEANS REPORT

NEW ORLEANS, Mar. 9 (AP)—The cotton market was quiet but steady in early trading today and prices advanced moderately under buying promoted by better Liverpool cables and the favorable report of the cotton reserve institute.

First trades showed gains of 2 to 3 points and May contracts traded up to 18.28, July 18.13 and October 17.81, 5 to 7 points above the previous close. The market quieted down towards the end of the first half hour, and the small gain was lost under realizing.
The decline carried the prices back to about level with the previous close and the market then turned inactive. Prices fluctuated narrowly within the early range and near the close.

At noon the market showed no signs of reviving interest.

One block of 10,000 radio changed hands at par, 13-4 and a block of 7,000 General Motors at 152, a new peak price. U. S. Steel common opened with a block of 2,400 at 144, up 25-8.
In view of the active speculation for the rise last week, Wall Street had expected a sizeable increase in

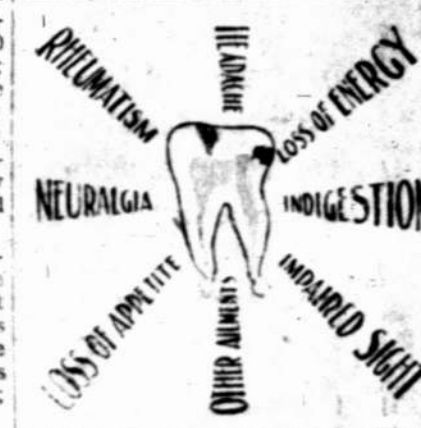
broker's loans, variously estimated at between \$25,000,000 and \$100,000,000. Bear raiders acting on the theory that the expected increase would have a bad psychological effect because of the current controversy over brokers' borrowings, sold stocks freely earlier in the week and rushed to cover when the market opened today. National Tea soared 6 points to 181, a new high record, and Dupont extended its early gain to 43-4 points, also a new peak. Among the many issues to advance 2 points or more were American Railway Express, American Lumber, American Power and Light, Vanadium Steel, Houston Oil, Hudson Motors, Greene Cananea Copper and Peoples Gas. U. S. Cast Iron Pipe was one of the few soft spots, reacting 2 points. Foreign exchanges opened irregular, sterling cables advancing slightly to \$1.87 15-16 and Spanish pesetas reacting 4 points to 167 5/8 cent.

The closing was strong. The rapid upward pace continued in the final hour. Baldwin sold at 273 1-4, a jump of 17 1-3 points; General Motors got above 157 and U. S. Steel reached 146. Advances of 4 to 5 points were made by numerous other shares. St. Louis and San Francisco rose to 116, a record price. Total sales 3,600,000, the fifth \$2,000,000-share day of the year.

HOWARD GOULD REPORTED ILL

AMERICAN FINANCIER IS
OPERATED ON; IS IN
NICE, FRANCE

(By The Associated Press)
NICE, France, March 9.—Howard Gould, American financier, today was reported seriously ill at the Montebon hospital near Nice. It was learned that an operation was performed on Mr. Gould yesterday by Lord Dawson of Penn. King George's personal physician who came to the Riviera for the purpose.

While saying that Mr. Gould was a patient, the hospital authorities refused to state the nature of his illness but said that he was "comfortable" this afternoon.

Howard Gould, is a son of the late Jay Gould and one of the executors of his father's \$200,000,000 estate which was the subject of years of litigation.

Howard Gould married Viola Katherine Clemmons, an actress, on October 12, 1898, but the marriage was annulled by litigation and in 1909 she obtained a \$36,000 annual settlement under the terms of a legal separation. At the time this was the highest alimony ever awarded in a court in this country.

"The Cantor!" they both exclaimed.

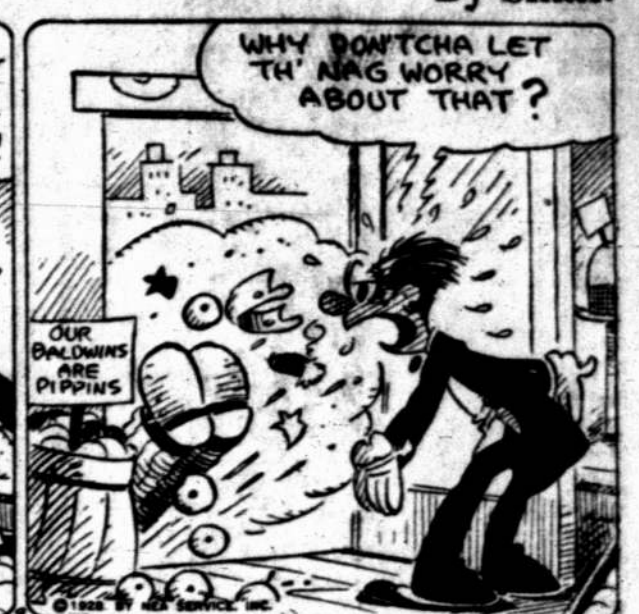

NICARAGUA IS TOLD TO ACT

LATINS MUST PUT LAW ON BOOKS IF U. S. IS TO HELP

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Mar. 9.—Nicaragua has been informed by the United States government that unless she enacts promptly the law providing for American supervision of her October elections it will be forced to take steps looking to the complete fulfillment of that country's obligations under the American-Nicaragua agreement.

This warning has gone forward from the state department through Minister Eberhardt at Managua. Department officials consider the situation brought about by failure of that country to carry out by law the remaining portions of the elections agreement as a very delicate one, although some hope still is held out that such a law will be enacted.

Dispatches Doubtful
Managua dispatches last night reported the passage by the Nicaraguan senate of a substitute for the McCoy bill authorizing American supervision of the elections. Stiff opposition is expected in the house, however, where radical changes are awaiting it.

That the state department is determined to see the elections supervised which both the Conservatives and Liberals in Nicaragua requested the United States to undertake, placed on that nation's statute books, was indicated today in the conference held at Managua between Brig. Gen. Frank C. McCoy and General Chamorro, whose influence is regarded as the greatest obstacle to the bill in the Nicaraguan house.

The two conferred at length yesterday, but announcement of the outcome was withheld.

Mismanagement Is Alleged In Court

NEW YORK, Mar. 9 (AP)—Allegations of gross mismanagement were made in a federal court petition filed today for an equity receivership for the Continental Bag and Paper Mills corporation, a Delaware corporation and a \$28,000,000 subsidiary of the International Paper company.

It was charged that the directorate of the two concerns are "practically identical" and that the Continental has for some time past been buying paper from the International at prices far in excess of their market value.

LAMESA, Mar. 9.—The Board of the Lamesa Independent School District reelected V. Z. Rogers as superintendent, F. T. McCollum, Jr. as high school principal and G. M. Roberts principal of the grammar school.

Rogers was elected for two years. This makes his third election, he having already served three years. McCollum has been principal of the local high school for the past four years. Roberts is now serving his first year in the position to which he is elected for another term.

The Lamesa schools have made considerable strides forward under the management of these men. They are now housed in a quarter million dollar plant. The high school has 25 and one-half credits of affiliation and is teaching all the required branches as well as ample options. The high school has, in round numbers, 275 students in attendance while there are some 1200 enrolled in the system.

Mother Slays Two Babies; Cuts Self

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Mar. 9 (AP)—A mother killed her two babies here today and then made an unsuccessful attempt on her own life. According to the police, the mother, Mrs. Catherine Ward, 25, stabbed Billy, aged three years, and then placed him in a bath tub, partly filled with water, after which she strangled Dorothy, May, age 8 months, with a rag. Then Mrs. Ward cut her wrists with a razor blade. She will recover, doctors said. A note written by Mrs. Ward said: "The kiddies are in the bath room. They are better off. Neighbors said the woman had been ill for some time."

At a hospital doctors discovered that Mrs. Ward had swallowed a powerful poison. Her condition was critical, they said.

CATTLE RANGE SATISFACTORY

STOCK IN GOOD SHAPE AND PROSPECTS ARE 'VERY BRIGHT'

(By The Associated Press)
AUSTIN, March 9.—Revived by recent rains, the cattle range in Texas improved three points in percentage during the month past, and spring prospects appear "very bright," H. H. Schultz, federal live stock and crop statistician reported here Thursday.

All classes of cattle, he said, have come through the winter in exceptionally good condition considering the shortness of the available range. The March condition is reported at 82 per cent as compared with 80 a month ago. In many instances feeding has been heavy but as a result of the improving range and milder weather, less is needed now. Generally, stock has been well taken care of and no unusual losses have occurred. Spring marketings of grass fat cattle are expected to be lighter and later than in 1927 as the supply is short and in only fair condition. Local sales and contracts have been numerous with prices advancing on all classes.

Kerrville Robbers Fail To Open Safes

SAN ANTONIO, Mar. 9 (AP)—Reports from Kerrville today that two unsuccessful attempts had been made to rob safes there last night led police here to believe that an intensive law enforcement campaign which they have carried on this week had driven a gang of crackers out of town.

Last night detective patrols swept the streets again and 50 persons were arrested as vagrants or for minor offenses. At Kerrville a filling station was tampered with, but the thieves were unable to open it. A gun store was ransacked and 20 guns and pistols taken.

Hearing Postponed In Galveston Court

GALVESTON, Mar. 9 (AP)—Hearing on a writ of habeas corpus, filed on behalf of William Curtis, charged with murder in the slaying of O. E. Evans, Texas City policeman, which was scheduled for today was postponed until March 19, by agreement of counsel.

Evans was shot to death in the rear of a Texas City drug store on the night of February 1, Curtis was arrested in New York City when the Tanker A. C. Bedford, on which he worked as an oiler, arrived, and was indicted by the grand jury. He contends companions can account for his movements on the night of the killing.

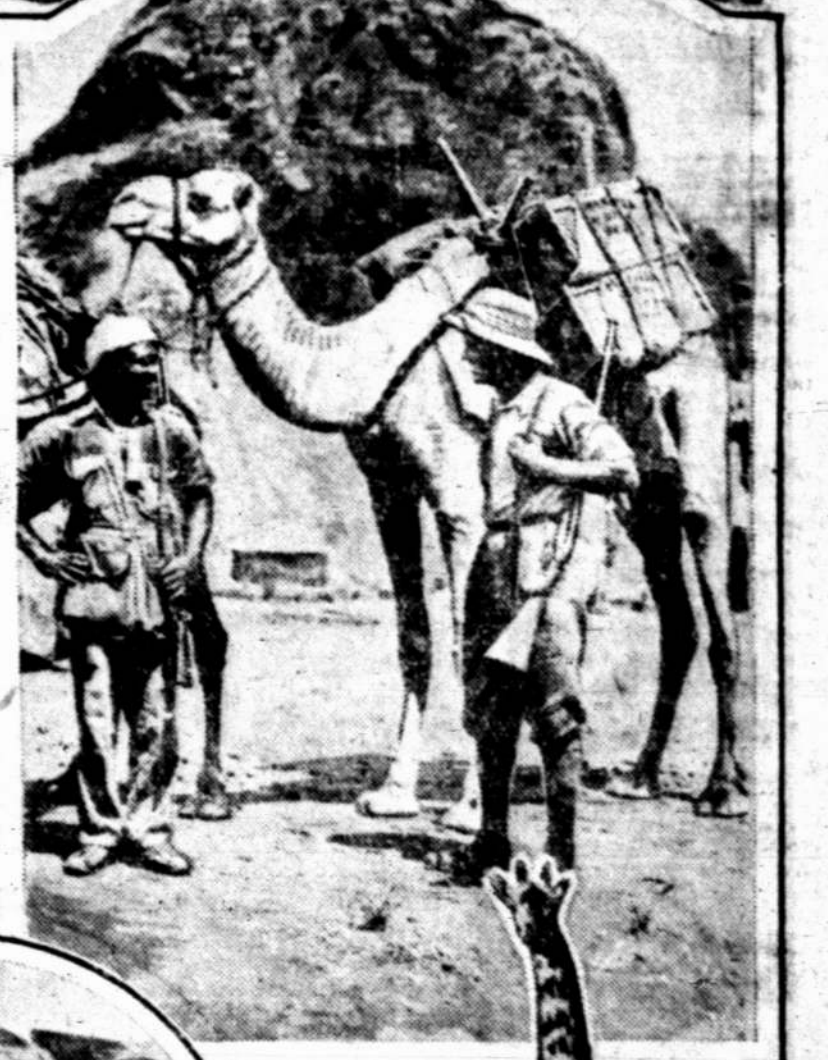

COMMISSION, MEETING THURSDAY, ATTENDS TO MANY AFFAIRS

Voting to call in approximately \$200,000 in old warrants and issue new bonds, the city commission rendered an approximate saving of \$12,000 in the city in their meeting yesterday.

A number of other items were passed to a later date due to the fact that three new members will be on the commission after April 3.

CHINESE REDS HOOPER TAKES TORTURE, SLAY FORWARD STEP

HELPLESS WOMEN AND CHILDREN VICTIMS OF MASSACRE

(By The Associated Press)

HANKOW, Mar. 9 — Chinese sources in giving details of the recent massacre at Leyang today said communists and disbanded soldiers fired the houses of all the well-to-do citizens who were penned inside with women and children and burned to death.

Everybody who appeared to be prosperous was murdered in the southern Hunan city. Usually the victims were tortured first, their eyes being gouged, their ears cut off. Whole families were so treated, parents being compelled to watch their children being mutilated and children to watch the torturing of their parents.

Several foreign missionaries were in the Leyang area at the time and their fate was not known.

Anti-communist troops from Hankow have occupied Leyang since the massacre and the marauders have gone to Kwangtung where they are reported to be continuing their outrages.

The supposed phenomenon of red snow, seen many times at 6,000 feet above sea level on Mount Albert Edward, British Columbia, has been explained as being due to the presence of a minute plant known to botanists as protococcus nivalis.

CABINET MEMBER GOES OUT AFTER PRIMARY VOTES OF G. O. P.

(The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Mar. 9 — Herbert Hoover, for seven years secretary of commerce, today was definitely in the race in four states for 136 delegates to the Republican national convention at Kansas City.

This figure will be raised to 200 when plans are carried out to file his name in three other states having 73 delegates.

Further indications that friends of the war time relief and food administrator are not going to let any grass grow under their feet in their quest for his presidential nomination when they obtained his consent to enter the May 8 primary in Indiana, where he will back another favorite son, Senator Watson, for that state's 53 delegates.

Hoover already had filed in Ohio, where on April 24, he will fight it out with Senator Willis of that state for its block of 51 delegates; in Maryland, whose delegates number 19, and Michigan, which has 33. He also has definitely decided to enter California, his home state, with 29 delegates; New Jersey, with 31, and Oregon, with 13.

British Naval Fund For Year Announced

LONDON, March 9 (AP) — The net total of the British navy estimates for the coming year is \$7,200,000 pounds (roughly \$286,800,000).

The original estimate for the current year was \$8,000,000 pounds (\$320,000,000), but a supplementary estimate for 450,000 pounds (\$2,250,000) was issued today to complete the current financial year.

Therefore the net total for the coming year will be \$1,150,000 (\$45,750,000) less than the current figures as amended by the supplementary estimate.

In an explanatory statement, William C. Bridgeman, first Lord of the Admiralty, says that the provision included on account of new construction program is \$629,857 pounds (\$48,149,285) against \$9,983,446 pounds (\$49,917,230) in 1927.

EL PASO, Mar. 9.—Harry F. Sinclair, oil magnate, was a guest yesterday at the home of Albert B. Fall, former Secretary of the Interior, when a family dinner was held at the Fall residence in honor of his visit. The two friends, descendants in the Teapot Dome oil trial, greeted each other warmly and passed a pleasant evening together.

E. A. Wattles, of New York, who is in charge of the Sinclair company's Cuban operations and shipping, announced today that he would accompany Mr. Sinclair on an inspection trip through the West Texas oil fields and said that during his stay in El Paso Mr. Sinclair probably would go into Mexico to look over some prospective oil lands in that territory.

Sinclair said that he did not know how long he would be in El Paso but thought he would be here two or three days.

Mr. Fall will probably be physically unable to return to Washington for the opening trial scheduled for April 2, Dr. H. P. Safford, his physician indicated.

German Suspect Is Released By Mexico

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 9.—Max Holung, described as a German engineer and bomb expert who was arrested with a priest on the charge of plotting to kill President Calles and General Obregon was released today. He established his innocence and said that General Roberto Cruz, chief of police, had ordered the return of chemicals seized at his home by police as these were being used for experimental purposes.

All Hands Saved In Ship Accident

NEW ORLEANS, March 9.—The Munson liner, Hermis, sank in the Mississippi river 32 miles below New Orleans early today after a collision with the Norwegian steamer, Modemi, according to reports reaching the Munson line offices here.

The Munson officers reported all members of the crew of their ship were taken aboard the Modemi which, badly damaged, is being towed to New Orleans.

The collision occurred during a dense fog.

SNOW FORCES AIRMEN DOWN

STINSON-HALDEMAN, IN RECORD EFFORT, ARE WEATHER VICTIMS

(By Associated Press)
DETROIT, Mar. 9.—The Eddie Stinson-George Haldeaman attempt to establish a new endurance record ended far short of its objective a few minutes after 2 a. m. today when a sudden snow storm forced the big Stinson-Detroit monoplane to earth.

The plane had been in the air since 8:29 a. m. yesterday when it took off with a load of 3,845 pounds from ice of Lake St. Clair and began circling Selfridge field, over which the entire flight was made.

The plane had been circling a large beacon light at the field when the snow began falling so hard that Stinson was unable to see the light. Although the field was in total darkness and blanketed with snow, the plane was brought to a safe landing. Both Stinson and Haldeaman, the latter Ruth Elder's pilot in an attempt to fly across the Atlantic last year, said that because of the blinding snow it would have been foolhardy to have remained aloft longer.

All during yesterday and last night, they said, the motor functioned perfectly. Weather was the only concern of the airmen.

COLLISION WITH BIRD FATAL FOR MARINES IN NICARAGUA

MANAGUA, Nic., Mar. 9.—A buzzard, slow and clumsy in flight, today was credited with having brought to earth a fast moving American marine plane, killing its two occupants.

The plane, carrying Captain William C. Byrd of Orangeburg, South Carolina, pilot, and Sergeant Rudolph A. Frankforter of Quantico, Virginia, observer, was flying southward bound from Ocotal on a test flight.

Speeding along over the heavily wooded country it was believed to have struck a large buzzard, breaking a strut supporting the right wing. As the plane was about 40 feet from the field at Esteli, the wing collapsed.

The plane began to turn over and over. The aviators jumped from a height approximately 250 feet. At that altitude their parachutes failed to open. Both men were killed instantly.

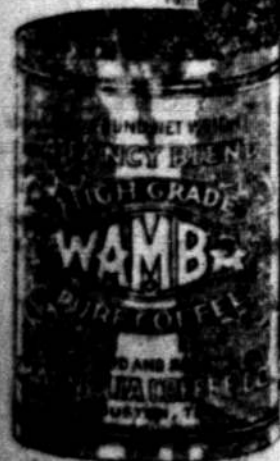

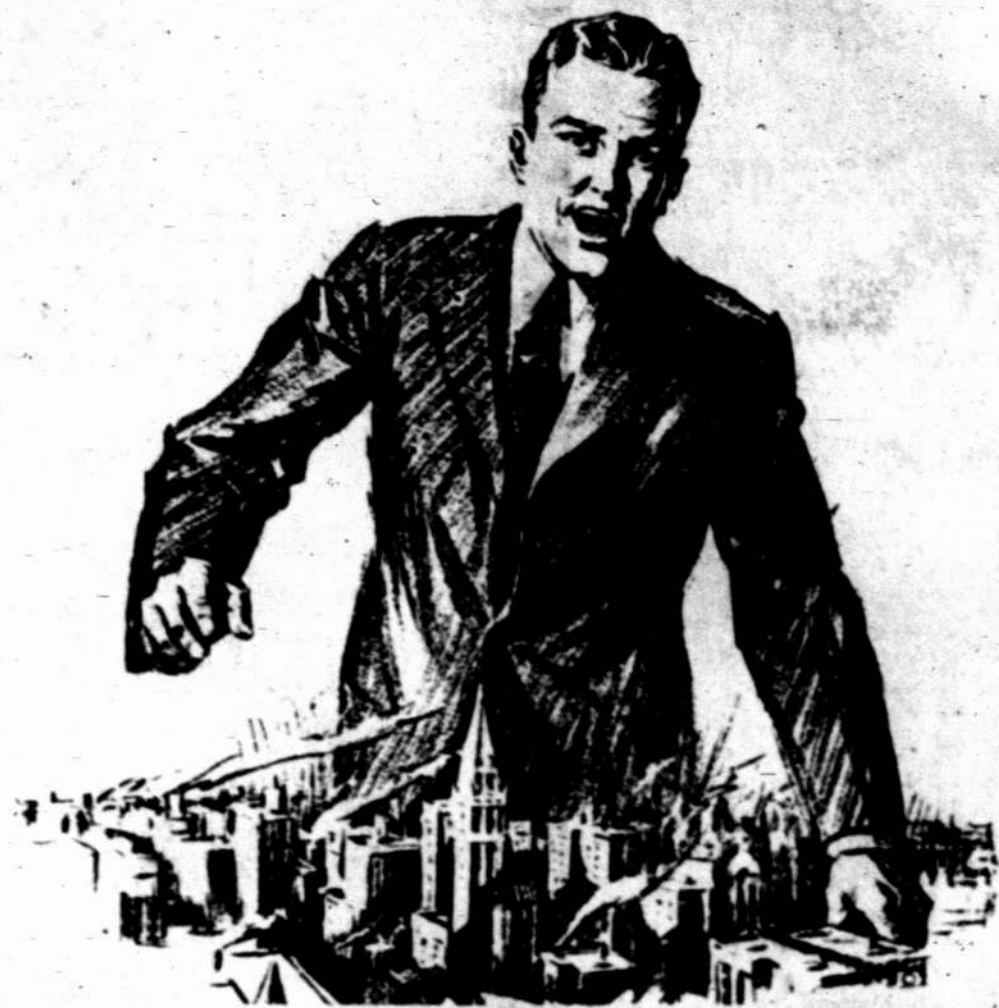
