WITH STATEMENT

Councilmen Back Bonds

The following is a statement issued Saturday by Colorado City Mayor Trevor Crawford and the members of the city council in support of a \$35,000 bond issue scheduled to be voted on Tuesday at City Hall.

"Your City Council in keeping with your City Charter has provided the opportunity granted you in that charter to vote bonds for erecting an adequate city police building.

"We must be realistic in our thinking when considering how we should vote on these bonds and, to be realistic, we must acquaint ourselves with the facts which are often concealed by gossip and hearsay.

"Our first conclusion has been that our present facilities are inadequate and our second conclusion has been that we should give you the opportunity to provide adequate facilities. Bear in mind that we are not voting bonds for anything over adequate, there are no fancy frills attached.

"The provision is that facilities be provided to bring us out of the horse and buggy days that we may operate as a modern and efficient police department which, in effect, provides us with a tool to enforce our laws and provide better protection, which we must admit has been the need of citizens since the emergence of our modern civilization.

"Contrary to rumor the new facilities will not require additional personnel for operation of the cell section as all meals will be provided from outside sources and, we might add, that at the present time board for city prisoners is paid for by the City in a like manner.

"Consideration was given to

the fact that in financing the new facilities there would be no rise in tax rate or valuation required in fact our present financial condition is such that our bonds are attractive to potential investors with our present tax setup.

"There has been some question that the present action of our County Commissioners Court in re-evaluating county property has been mistaken as an action of our City Council for the same purpose. That is not the case and your City Council has made no move of any kind to collect from you more taxes than you are presently paying.

"It is true that you will not get a new police building without it being paid for and this will be done within the present tax rate as have all other improvements in all city departments in recent years.

"Can we deny our present police personnel a decent place to conduct business and yet expect to have the most efficient police department in West Texas?

"Can we deny our city court the dignity of a decent place to conduct court and yet expect to have a court to be respected by all alike?

"Can we deny the citizens of our city and out-of-town persons a decent place to conduct business? All business conducted at the police station is not of a criminal nature. A large percentage of business is people making inquiries, obtaining information about our town, locating persons, etc.

"Can we deny those who, for reason of public safety and law enforcement, are brought to the police station a decent place to receive that which is just under the law. Not all persons involved with law enforcement or crimes are of the lowest type.

"We cannot forget the dignity of man, good or bad, in our consideration of providing adequate police facilities.

"Every qualified tax payer and property owner in Colorado City has a right and obligation to vote in the coming bond election either yes or nay. Let's, all vote Next Tuesday. This is a decision for you to make. Your City Council has provided a means under your charter for you to express your desires. You are urged to do just that.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS INDICATE INTEREST

Five Absentee ballots were cast at City Hall Thursday and Friday in the \$35,000 bond issue for a new Colorado City police and court building.

Regular voting on the bonds will be held Tuesday.

City officials said that the absentee ballots, which will remain sealed until counted Tuesday night by the election judges, indicate that interest is running above normal in the bond issue.

Although declining to make any estimate on the number of votes expected to be cast Tuesday, officials expressed hope that enough citizens will vote to give a good representation of the wishes of the majority of local residents.

Interest Grows as Opposition Forms

Interest in a \$35,000 bond issue was running high here Saturday evening as local property owners prepared to cast their ballots in a Tuesday City Hall election to decide the issue.

The bonds for construction of a new city police and municipal court building for Colorado City is the first proposed by the city since 1950.

Passage would mean that the Colorado City Police Department would have new quarters in the proposed building, which would adjoin the City Hall on the east side.

Rejection of the bond would mean that the police would be forced to remain in their present one-room station in the basement of City Hall.

Public interest in the bond began to build here late this week and was expected to reach a high point by voting time.

Mayor Trevor Crawford and the City Council Saturday issued a statement in strong support of the \$35,000 bond.

An anti-bond group headed by R. A. (Bob) May, local oil and real estate man, voiced a number of objections to passage of the police bond.

Cosden Names Ex-City Man Refinery Head

Cosden Petroleum Corporation Saturday announced the appointment of O. O. Craig, a former Colorado City man, as superintendent of the Howley Refinery near Abilene.

Craig's appointment was effective Oct. 1.

May's group maintained that the County Jail is sufficient for all prisoners arrested by city police and claimed that there is little or no need for a municipal court room since few cases are actually contested.

City officials, however, said that the building was not planned and would not be used primarily as a jail, but would allow adequate space for all police department functions.

The proposed building includes four small retaining cells at the rear including one for women. Besides the cells, space will be provided for a municipal court room, a reception room, an office for Police Chief Leon Yeager, interrogation rooms, radio dispatcher's room, locker room and storage space.

City Manager R. K. Sneath pointed out that a great deal of valuable business is carried on at the local police station.

This includes payment of water bills by local citizens and many types of inquiries and requests for information from out-of-town persons, he said.

Sneath said that one of the main objectives of the new police station would be to separate the legitimate business from the illegitimate, providing an adequate level of service.

Balloting on the bond issue is scheduled to begin at 8 a. m. Tuesday, when the polls open at City Hall.

Polls will close at 7 p. m. Election officials chosen by the city council at its September meeting include Mrs. Roy Porter, presiding judge; Mrs. J. W. Patterson, judge; and Mrs. J. A. Soder, clerk. Mrs. Kathryn Hodge, clerk.

Absentee voting on the bond issue was held Thursday and Friday at City Hall for persons in good standing.

City Employs New Officer

The Colorado City Police Department Saturday announced the acquisition of a fifth police officer to bolster its ranks after resignations had cut the local force to only three men during the middle of the summer.

The new officer is J. L. Latham, a veteran of 37 years of law enforcement experience in Commerce, Hunt County and Collin County.

Resignations by Patrolman Arle Moore and Assistant Chief Lawrence Powell cut the strength of the department to three officers in July.

Officer Dave Shackelford was hired two months ago to fill one existing vacancy.

Latham moved here with his wife and one child Wednesday.

His wife is a fourth grade school teacher.

Latham will handle regular patrol work here.

Residents' Brother Dies at Lamesa

FIVE WELLS COMPLETED

Mitchell Lists New Producers As Basin Oil Slump Continues

As drilling continued to slump sharply in the Permian Basin and in Texas, Mitchell County's oil activity this week took a sudden jump after falling off to near nothing last week.

Magnolia Petroleum Corp. completed a small well in the Iatan East Howard field in the western portion of Mitchell County and four other producing wells were listed in the county during the week.

The new Iatan East Howard completion is Magnolia No. 33 Mary Foster, which pumped 121.73 barrels of oil and 10 per cent water after fracture treatment with 11,000 gallons.

Gravity of the oil is 30.3 degrees.

The producer is located 4,310 feet from south and east lines of section 17, block 39, T-1-S, T-8-P Survey and is about five miles southwest of Iatan.

Total depth is 2,920 feet, but

MAILMEN GET AWARDS FOR SAFE DRIVING

Two Colorado City rural mail carriers this week received post office awards for a total of nine years of accident-free driving on county roads.

The Colorado City party will leave by chartered bus between 7 and 7:30 a. m. Tuesday according to Elmer Matting, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce agriculture committee.

Does Colorado City actually need a new jail?

Does Colorado City actually have a need for a jail, or does it need a cell or two to hold prisoners over night?

The County has a practically new jail just one block from City Hall, and the tax payers of the City of Colorado City are no doubt paying over one-half of its cost and upkeep. If we build a new jail for city prisoners—then the taxpayers of Colorado City will not only be paying our part on the County jail—but will have to pay for the City jail also.

Why can't the City continue to place its prisoners in the County Jail—we are a part of the County, aren't we? Again, the prisoners of the City are only in jail on misdemeanor charges such as drunkenness, fighting, abusive language and any such charge that does not carry a jail sentence—so why do we need a jail?

All such misdemeanors that carry a jail sentence are usually County Court cases and the City has no jurisdiction—naturally they would be placed in the County Jail—and not the City Hall.

There is room in the present City Hall to take care of our needs—if the offices of the Colorado Independent School District were moved out and those two rooms put to use. Also, there is a large room upstairs where the Council meets and where a billiard table is located. Couldn't this be put to some use for the Police Department or City Court?

Also there are the present facilities in the basement of the City Hall that are now being used by the Department. Why not put a couple of cells in the basement, move the Police Department to the offices now occupied by the School District—and when there is a trial to be had, it could put the billiard room upstairs to use. This would mean about \$35,000 savings to the taxpayers of the city, at least.

How many cities the size of Colorado City have city jails? If there is a dire need for such jail, then what are our City policemen doing to deter crime in our fair city?

Again, why should the City furnish the School District an office, heat, water and lights at around \$50.00 per month when this same space could be used for our Police Dispatcher and Police Chief's office? Seems to the writer that the City Council should have weighed this very carefully before falling for a new jail.

Still further, the city prisoners are usually in custody for a few hours—and to build a \$35,000 "Stout House" for those people is very, very unwise.

As for actually holding court on contested cases—how many have been fought in said court in the past

20 years? The records are there to speak for themselves—look at them—ask the officials—not over 5 or perhaps 10 contested cases in the past 20 years.

Please don't misunderstand, that every morning the police judge (and he is tops) hears pleas of guilty on parking violations, speeding, drunkenness, fighting, etc. As a rule the batting average is 100%—so why spend \$35,000.00 to build a court room when so few cases are contested.

Would it not be possible to run the prisoners, or parties charged with violations, in front of the judge—either in one of the rooms now occupied by the School Board—or upstairs in the billiard room. Oh, you say, they can't climb the stairs—well they are going down stairs to the basement to enter their pleas, and they have to climb the stairs to get back.

Again, in addition to the \$35,000.00 bond issue, there will be interest, insurance, lights, upkeep, and someone is going to have to feed these prisoners, which in all will amount to several thousand dollars per year in addition to repayment of the bond.

What does it cost per month based on the past 12 months, to keep these prisoners in the County Jail? In other words, if we are needing a City Jail so badly, why don't the officials give the tax payers the following information?

1. Cost of prisoners kept at County Jail.
2. Amount received in fines from these particular prisoners kept in County Jail.
3. Why can't said prisoners still be kept in County Jail?
4. Is one block too far to transport these "dangerous" prisoners?
5. Cost of upkeep of new jail.
6. Cost of meals and keeper of new jail.

If there was a real need for such jail, we should have it—but if there are differences between the County officers and the City officers, same should be worked out.

Mr. and Mrs. Voter consider this bond issue seriously—there has not been much publicity as to the needs, etc.—and the election is set Tuesday at City Hall. It's hard enough to pay taxes now, and although it is indicated that same can be built without additional taxes, then why don't we spend a little, fix up our present facilities, and let the City Council reduce our taxes? **GET OUT AND VOTE AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF SAID BOND!**

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
