Bulldogs Prove No Match For Powerful Brownwood Lions As Football Season Nears End

BROWNWOOD, Texas — The Brownwood Lions proved to be unsympathetic hosts here Friday night, as they blasted the visiting Burkburnett Bulldogs, 26-0, in 4-AAA Conference action.

The Lions opened fast and kept up the pace throughout the contest, ripping the Bulldog defense on draw plays and quarterback keepers. Led by a bevy of backs, including Billy Seely, James Harris, Lee Roy Deanda, Bob Simmons, and Jimmy Thomason, the Lions displayed pure power and break-away speed.

The Bulldog defense contained the Lions on their first series of downs, forcing a punt. The bogging Burk offense failed to click and they returned the ball via a punt. Then the Lions began the wrecking job.

Thomason notched the first score for Brownwood as he went over from two yards out on a quarterback sneak. Jimmy Freeland booted the extra point.

The Lions hit again in the second quarter as the fast stepping Seely paced off the final yard of another scoring drive. Once again, Freeland split the uprights for the extra point. The score at the half stood at 14-0.

The second half saw the Bulldogs moving the ball better, but not up to par. The inevitable happened as Brownwood scored again that quarter.

Sophomore quarterback Billy Branum hit James Harris from three yards out. Freeland's kick went wide on this try.

The Lions tacked on their final score of the night with five seconds left to play, as Seely scored from one yard out. The run for the extra point failed.

The Bulldog offense, led by John Nyby and Henry Bauch, who combined for all but seven of Burk's ground yards, was highly inept against the Lion defense. Sad to say, the Bulldogs failed to produce a serious threat all night.

If the Bulldogs had any outstanding performers, it would have to be on defense. Big Pete Glover was a monster on the line, making 15 tackles, four unassisted, and recovering a fumble.

A Digest Of Texas Motor Vehicle Laws Published By Texas Department Of Public Safety

RAILROAD CROSSING REGULATIONS

- 1.—Require a vehicle to stop at least 15 feet and not more than 50 feet from the tracks if a mechanical signal or red lights are operating; or stop sign is present; or flagman signals; or gate is lowered; or an approaching engine within 1,500 feet of crossing emits a signal and such engine by speed or nearness is an immediate hazard; or an approaching train is plainly visible and is close enough to crossing to be a hazard.
- 2.—Permits vehicles that have stopped under provisions of Section 1, above to proceed after stop if crossing of tracks can be made safely.
- 3.—Prohibit a vehicle from driving on left side of roadway within 100 feet of crossing. (If you drive to the left of the center of a roadway to overtake a vehicle stopped at a crossing, you are in violation of this law.)
- 4.—Requires school bus to stop at all railroad crossings unless officer or signal directs traffic to proceed.

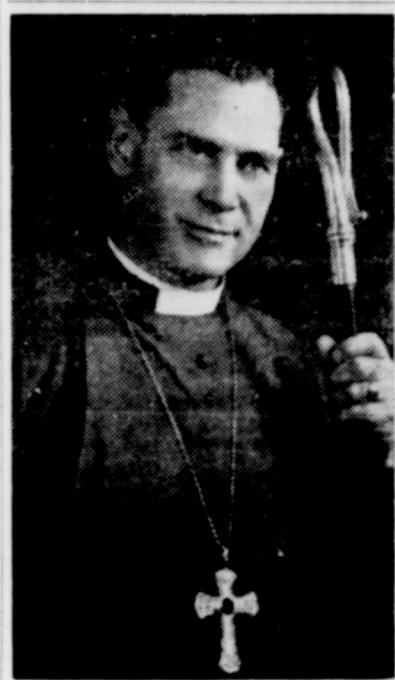
Do You Have A Weight Problem?

"Discover God" Theme of Training Mission of Area Episcopal Churches

"Discover God" is the theme for a teaching mission sponsored by the Wichita Falls area Episcopal Churches, to be held nightly at 7:30, November 17 through November 22 at All Saints Episcopal Church, 2606 Farm-to-Market Road 369, Wichita Falls. The missioner, the Right Reverend Michael Coleman, retired Bishop of Qu'Appelle, Saskatchewan, British Columbia, Canada, is a preacher, teacher and author of wide-spread experience.

Having served ten years as bishop of a 90,000 square mile diocese, Bishop Coleman has recently been devoting his efforts and special talents as a preacher, to missionary work in British Columbia and to preaching missions throughout Canada and the United States. At present he has taken missions in 44 of the 50 United States.

Born and reared in England, Bishop Coleman was ordained a priest in the Church of England in 1928, after serving five years with the British Railways. His first parish was in a mining village in Nottinghamshire. In 1935 he became commissioner in Western Canada to To-H, an Anglican laymen's organization. He later returned to England to be in charge of All Hallows-by-the-Tower in London until shortly before the end of World War II.

Bishop Coleman was in London throughout the Blitz, where he worked with rescue crews removing the dead and wounded from bombed ruins. This experience resulted in his first book "Faith Under Fire."

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Outlaws In WashingtonWhen we turn on the gas in the morning to heat the
coffee, we are not likely to be thinking of the intrusion
of Washington bureaucracy into our lives.But the truth is that the Federal Power Commission,
which controls the natural gas industry and the service
it is allowed to provide its 35 million customers, is busily
grabbing for power far beyond the limits of authority
given it by Congress, even to denying companies under its
jurisdiction rights given them by law.

So how does this affect me, you ask?

By imposing harsh regulations on the industry, the
FPC can make it virtually impossible for natural gas pro-
ducers, pipelines and the local gas company to maintain
in the years to come the unfailing service and assured
future supplies of gas you have come to expect and should
enjoy.And policies that threaten the welfare and security
of the natural gas customer likewise injure the many com-
panies who furnish materials and supplies to the gas in-
dustry and those who work for such organizations.The authority exercised by any Federal commission
or board comes to it only through laws enacted by Con-
gress. But the FPC is attempting, through its own rules
and regulations to make laws itself. It has, for example,
in every ruling on tax incentives as applied to regulated
natural gas companies, deprived the companies of tax
benefits which Congress provided by legislation.This cavalier attitude prompted the establishment
last July 1st of a new Senate Commerce sub-committee
under the chairmanship of Senator Gale McGee, of Wy-
oming. And while the scope of its activities has not been
disclosed, we can hope that its labors will consider the
public interest in this situation and lead to correction.The plight of the nation's railroads—unfairly weak-
ened by unrealistic regulation and their ability to provide
a public service undermined—stands as a grim warning.If the natural gas industry is to continue as a pros-
perous and growing segment of the economy—and the
welfare of its customers be protected—it must not be forced
to contend with almost daily changes in FPC rulings
to which the Commission seeks to give the effect of law.As one of the Federal Power Commissioners himself
has said, regulation beyond the restraints of law consti-

SENATE REPORT FAULTS AGED AID PROGRAMby Senator Pat McNamara, Chairman,
Senate Subcommittee on Health of the Elderly
Senate Special Committee on AgingThe threat of serious illness
casts a constant shadow of fear
over the lives of millions of our
older people. And, the lack of
adequate, timely care—when
illness strikes—often turns the
threat into unnecessary pain and
suffering.The fear and unnecessary
suffering results from this sim-
ple fact: Their incomes are low
and the likelihood of being ill
is much greater than when they
were younger.Thus, they know and fear—
when they are well—that they
may not have the money to pay
the cost of proper treatment.
And, when they get sick, they
often refuse to accept charity
until the pain overcomes their
pride.Three years ago when Con-
gress approved the medical as-
sistance for the aged program
as part of the so-called Kerr-
Mills law, it was hoped that
many of the most needy older
people would get medical care.
The Federal Government and
the individual States would put
up the money to provide the
care.Unfortunately, a three-month
study just completed by the
Senate Subcommittee on Health
of the Elderly shows the pro-
gram is not working well.The opening sentence of the
report sums up the findings
this way:"After three years of oper-
ation, the Kerr-Mills medi-
cal assistance for the aged
(MAA) program has proved
to be at best an ineffective
and piecemeal approach to
the health problems of the
Nation's 18 million older
citizens."The printed report of the
study findings points out these
failings of the MAA program:—It is still not a national pro-
gram after three years and
there is no reason to expect it
will become one in the foresee-
able future. This is best shown
by the fact that 22 States still
do not have the program in
operation and the older people
in these States get no help from
MAA.—In most of the 28 States
where MAA is in operation, the
most States. In one State, for
example, administrative costs
total 59% of the amount paid
out in medical care, while in
four other States they exceed
25%.—Most of the money put up by
the Federal Government to pro-
vide the care has gone to a few
large industrial States—States
best able to finance their share
of the costs of the care. Five
States, California, New York,
Massachusetts, Michigan and
Pennsylvania, for example, re-
ceived 88% of all the Federal
funds distributed for the first
two years of MAA. Yet, these
five States had only 32% of the
country's older people.—The requirement of most
States for cumbersome investi-
gations to establish eligibility
for the care and the require-
ment in most States that re-
sources of an older person must
be nearly depleted before he can
get help, have further reduced
participation in the programs.Thus, the study leaves little
doubt that some better Federal
program to provide medical
care to our older people must
be established.The answer in my judgment,
is a health insurance program,
administered and financed
through the time-tested Social
Security system.Your Congressman wants
to know how you stand on
the bill to provide hospital
insurance for older Ameri-
cans through Social Secu-
rity. Write to him. Also,
for further information,
write the National Council
of Senior Citizens, 1627 K
St., N.W., Washington, D.C.
20006.The duration, levels and types
of benefits vary widely from
State to State. Only four of the
28 States have comprehensive
care programs. In the other
States, the programs are nom-

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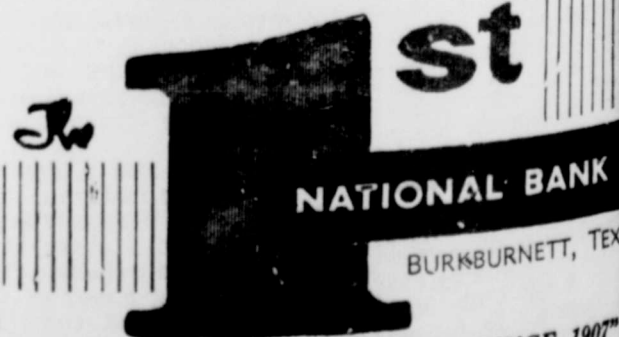
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In fact, 50 to 60,000,000 of the next door neighbors in all of the 50 states are either fishermen or hunters.

They spend well over \$116,000,000 a year just for hunting and fishing licenses alone. And the license they buy is the smallest part of the whole expense.

In most cases the hunting and/or fishing license can be had by residents for the price of a box of good shotgun shells and considerably less than the price of a box of high-powered rifle cartridges.

So any time you feel you are

only a small cog in this great outdoors, just remember that you represent perhaps a third or more of the total population of the United States. Your own voice or your own purchasing power may be small, but combined with the voices of others it is a loud voice.

That voice must continue to speak up. First it must speak up against any and every move by so-called do-gooders to do away with your right to own a gun or for that matter as many guns as you can afford.

Every time you hear of some piece of legislation that would rob you of this right, join with all the other millions to let the world know you intend to preserve this right.

There are many other rights and privileges which you also share. Actually the game belongs to you. But game is produced for the most part, on private property.

As a good sportsman it is up to you to recognize the right of property owners. But at the same time the land owners should recognize some of your

rights to harvest the game he has produced. In that way everyone enjoys the benefits of the great outdoors.

You have a right to fish in the lakes and streams, but often these waters are on private property. Even when they are not, they represent not only a monetary investment, but something which must not be desecrated.

If everyone of the 60,000,000 or so persons who buy hunting and fishing licenses will recognize the rights of others and work together, it will be possible to continue with hunting and fishing for a long, long time.

What happened during the last half-century is somewhat paradoxical. At the beginning of this century, wild life was well on its way out. Market hunters and game hogs were killing off game faster than it could produce. Then came the first laws to prevent the kill off.

But with these laws came another dangerous program. Soon game habitat was being pushed back as towns develop-

ed. Then cities came, with great industrial plants and thousands of miles of highways. All this did away with much of the domain of wildlife.

Eventually science came in to the picture, along with reason. Many new land practices were put into use. There were experts in the field of wildlife. It didn't take long for them to realize that the hunter will not destroy all wildlife if there is a place for it to live.

Then engineers came along and built dams to impound water for more fish. Today we have more fish by far than the Indians ever had.

Also today we have a different outlook on wildlife. Once we harvested wildlife for food alone. When we needed meat we killed a buck or a turkey, regardless of the time of the year.

Now we harvest wildlife not only for food, but as a part of our sporting blood. We call ourselves sportsmen, but we must play the part.

And who are these hunters and fishermen? They are you, and you and you.

Cotton Harvest At Steady Pace Says U. S. Dept. of Agri.

Cotton harvest continued at a steady pace for the week ending November 8. More than 14,000 samples were received by the Altus classing office, according to C. E. Cox, U. S. Department of Agriculture Cotton Division.

Total classing for the season reached above 95,000 bales, which compares with 47,000 to the same date last year, and 153,000 two years ago.

According to sales reported to the Agricultural Marketing Service, marketing of the new crop cotton continued active, with average prices on qualities showing heaviest trading appearing largely unchanged to slightly higher than the previous week.

Middling Light Spotted was the predominant grade during the week, accounting for 35 per cent of the total, with Middling in second place at 23 per cent. Percentage of cotton called in the White color group again

showed an increase, standing at 44 per cent.

Average staple length for week was 31.32 inch. Predominant staple length was 31.32 inch, estimated at 38 per cent of the total.

Micronaire readings, statistical averages, only two per cent "mike" low 3.5. Predominant range 4.0 to 4.9, accounting for 40 per cent.

Cotton moving into channels in the Altus territory brought an average of five to thirty points above commodity Credit Corporation rates. Farmers received average of 29.50 cents per pound for Middling Light Spotted 32 inch; 29.95 cents for Middling Light Spotted 31.5 inch; 28.60 cents for Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 29.5 inch; and 29.05 cents per pound for Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 15.16 inch.

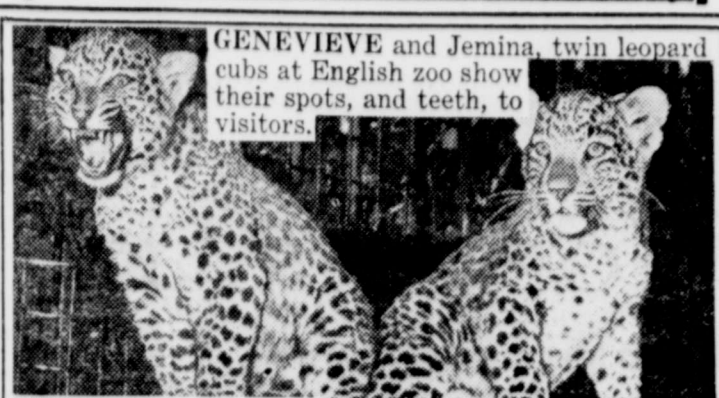

"11. Much of the reported increase in primary lung cancer — which accounts for slightly over one percent of all deaths yearly in the U.S. — is doubtless due to survival of people to older ages, to better diagnoses, and other medical advances.

Mr. Allen said that "research on smoking must continue, but so must research along all other possible avenues. We cannot afford to ignore any clue. We must avoid the easy acceptance of a simple answer no matter how often it is repeated."

Shelter Not Enough, We Want Comfort

In case you've wondered, comfort is good for you.

Psychologists have found that physical comfort helps students to learn and workers to earn. It helps prevent accidents and illness and it can turn a disgruntled parent into a lamb and a screaming infant into a cherub.

What is comfort? It might be defined as the absence of discomfort.

Ask a handful of people what comes to mind when they think of comfort and you'll get an assortment of replies—"easy shoes," "a light in your room at night," "a soft bed," "a nice, neat, warm home," are examples.

The more people you ask, the more often you'll hear the word "warm." Sometimes it means the psychological warmth of friendship and security, but it's more apt to refer to physical warmth—a warm bed, warm clothes, a warm house.

'Ahhh,' Not 'Ugh'

Starting with the day in the dim past when Fred Flintstone the First stumbled out of the cold wind into a cave and found himself saying "ahhh" instead of "ugh," man has been trying to provide more comfort for himself and his family—often at any cost.

Man has built fires, pitched tents, constructed open shelters, invented windows and storm windows, doors and storm doors. He has hung tapestries on cold castle walls, built walk-in fireplaces, and warmed his beds with hot stones, warming pans, and electric blankets. When Benjamin Franklin invented a heat-conserving stove, people snapped them up and bricked up the fireplaces from which untold billions of British thermal units had escaped up the chimneys.

Today we're unbricking them, but we're not, by gosh, letting much heat escape from our homes.

Suffering Over

After centuries of suffering from the discomfort of cold walls and drafts that swept icily across floors to freeze innocent feet, Nineteenth Century Man finally did something about it. He invented insulation. But it was only about 30 years ago that the American home owner really woke up to the fact that wrapping his house in mineral wool insulation would not only make him comfortable but would also save fuel. Now almost everybody's doing it.

Instead of buying bigger, more expensive furnaces and burning more and more fuel, the contemporary home owner makes sure his new house is insulated to recommended standards with batts or blankets of mineral wool in floors, ceilings and walls. Then he buys a smaller heating unit and burns less fuel. He saves enough money on fuel in a few years to pay for the insulation.

He also buys a smaller air conditioning unit, if he's installing one, and pays less for it and less to run it, too.

Then he and his family learn what living comfort really is—as long as they live in that house they're warm in winter and cool in summer, secure and satisfied in their cozy, comfortable home.

Wheelless Vehicles May Ease Traffic in Cities

New York (HK)—A host of dramatic proposals to break the national bottleneck is expected to emerge when Congress enacts the mass transit bill to help free the country's cities from creeping paralysis.

Steelways, official publication

of American Iron and Steel Institute, said they include such proposals as—

... wheelless vehicles that slide on a film of air a fraction of an inch above a special rail, ... a rented motorized contraption that can travel automatically over private trackage and converts to driver propulsion along city streets.

... the hydrofoil, a boat that resembles a bus, skims along the surface and carries a score or more of passengers.

The magazine said these proposals have been stimulated by studies which show that by 1980, 120 million automobiles would be on the nation's highways against 66 million today. The studies also show that 190 million of the some 250 million people expected by 1980 will live on approximately 2 percent of the land. An estimated 140 million of the 190 million people will reside within 40 urban complexes which will have to cope with 32 million more commuters than exist now.

COMFORT, SAFETY, SPEED

Steelways said the specialists employed to untie traffic knots and get people in and out of town with comfort, safety and speed regard rapid transit as a major part of the answer. Such a solution promises expansion of steel's markets, especially for the stainless and high-strength, low alloy steels widely used in commuter trains.

"Wherever possible," Steelways added, "transit authorities would make the trains so strong an inducement that suburbanites will decide to drive their cars to the train and ride into the city by rail. In that way a strong start will be made toward easing intracity vehicular congestion."

Readin' an' Writin' Will Improve with Typewritin'



Use of the manual portable typewriter by elementary school children can help improve work habits, develop skills in English, and improve ability in composition.

These are some of the conclusions indicated by a year-long research project carried out in three states, and involving over 900 fourth and fifth grade pupils.

The study was conducted by national specialists from Southern University, Columbia University Teachers College, and the University of Illinois, and a grant from Royal McBee Corporation, maker of Royal typewriters.

Interestingly, the use of the typewriter also stimulates the

children to prepare longer and better reports in both English and social studies, and appears to increase creativity in writing.

The researchers found that the pupils showed improvement in word skills and, from a mechanical standpoint, soon learned to operate the manual portable at speeds two to three times their normal handwriting speeds.

Surprisingly enough, it was found that students using the manual portable typewriter also showed an improvement in spelling and in the speed and quality of their normal handwriting; possibly, the experts surmise, because they tend to imitate the clarity of the typewritten material.

IT'S UP TO YOU

By Howard E. Kershner, L.H.D.

Dr. Elgin Groseclose is one of our country's most competent students on the subject of foreign aid. He has had extensive experience abroad especially in the Near and Middle East and speaks with the authority of personal knowledge. Following is one highlight of his testimony before the House Committee on Foreign Affairs, June 4, 1963:

"First, I want to make it clear that it is utterly impossible for the people of one country to raise the standards of culture or change the political mood of another people by foreign aid. Foreign aid is inadequate for the reason that it is based upon a government-to-government approach... there is no theory of sovereignty that allows a government to deal with the individual subjects of another sovereignty... the effort to do so leads to frictions and complications. Our government-to-government protocol makes our aid ineffective and unable to reach down to the level of the people and really assist them. It serves too often to feed and support governments rather than peoples, and to maintain in power governments that neither represent nor serve their peoples. Thus, it inevitably involves the United States in charges of foreign meddling and intensifies anti-American feeling.

"Foreign aid is contrary to our constitutional precepts of the functions of the federal government. The federal government is neither organized nor authorized to dispense aid beyond its frontiers.

"The basic economic problems of the so-called underdeveloped countries are not solved by transplants of capital, and only to a minor degree by transplants of techniques. The consequence of this effort has been to over-fertilize these lands with capital and to produce a lustrant urban growth and bloom of industrialization which has no roots within the culture and constantly must be sustained by additional injections of capital. It is for this reason that the so-called 'takeoff' period, the cliché of which policy planners are so fond, grows longer and longer, and the day of independent sustained growth is ever an increasingly dimmy hope of the future."

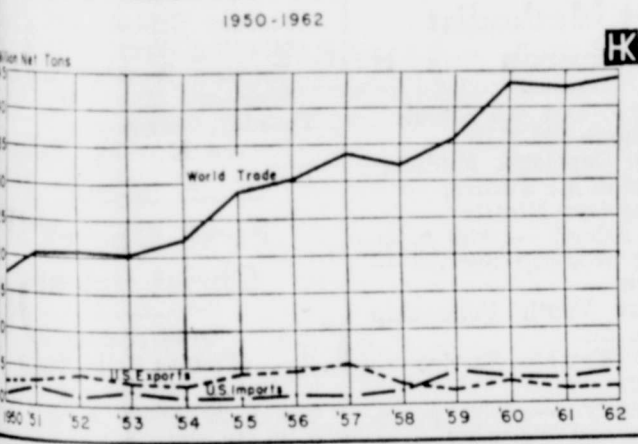

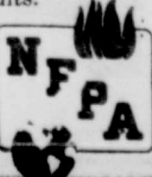

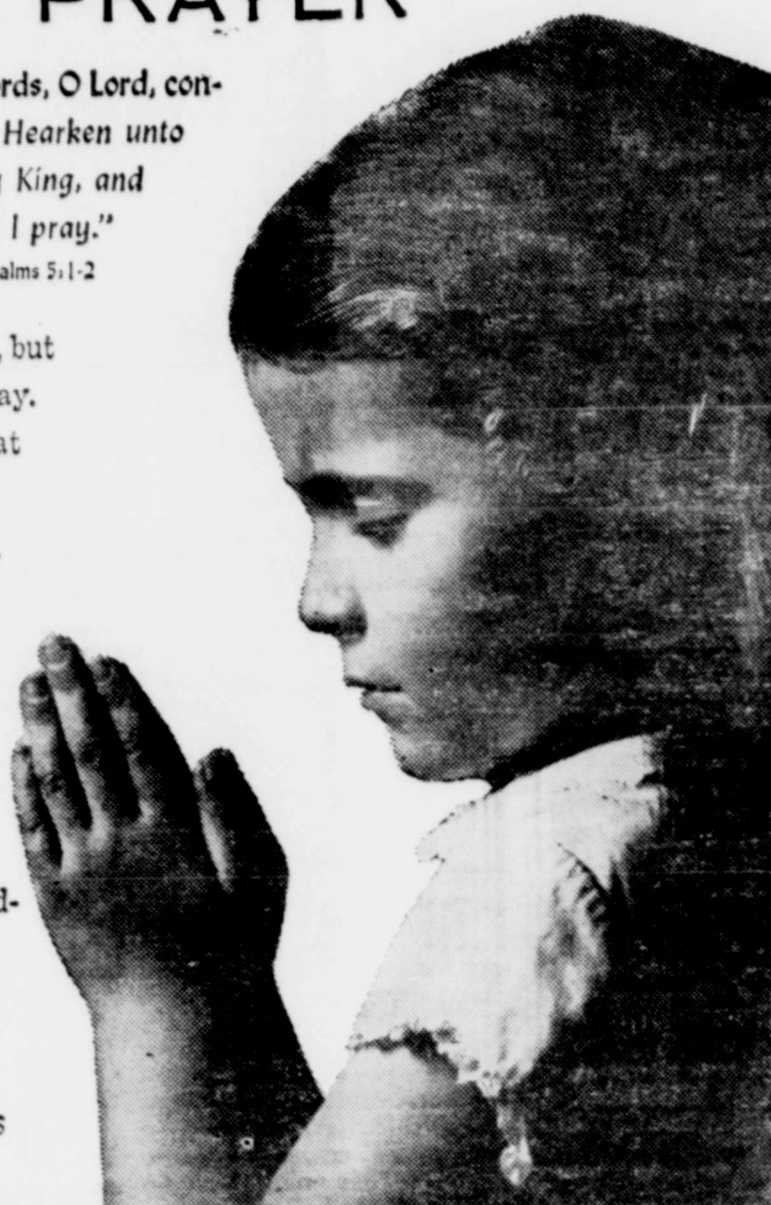

THE LAW IN TEXAS

CONFIDENCES PROTECTED
The law what you as a lawyer in confidence may tell no one else without your consent.
If a judge order him professional employees (secretaries) to reveal such confidences in court.
Give such a privilege? To do justice; it entitles clients to tell their lawyer what they have to know and to advise them about their family, business and private affairs, and fears and ambitions.
A lawyer may speak of certain facts even after a client dies. A client may well have a lawyer details which, if revealed, might harm those who wanted to protect.
In some very rare cases, a lawyer carry out the client's wish after death, a lawyer may reveal a confidence under certain safeguards and his client's purposes.
Confidential communications?
When a client tells his lawyer when he seeks advice in personal business, or in a confidential communication.

legal affairs — talks and letters, photographs, charts, and other documents and records.
Confidential communications protect you as the client, not your lawyer. If you break the confidence, a lawyer may also have to talk, for the communication is no longer confidential. You may break a confidence by testifying about it, or by having unauthorized persons hear or see what was communicated.
No lawyer may keep quiet about a crime or fraud a client has told him he plans to commit. But afterwards, an accused person may talk freely to his lawyer. Even if guilty, he has a right to have his side of the story presented to the court as it may affect his punishment. A person in trouble needs to talk to someone without fear that what he says will become public.
In some states certain other professional people, such as physicians and clergymen, may receive privileged communications. However, Texas law makes no provision for privileged communications with physicians and clergymen.

A Digest Of Texas Motor Vehicle Laws

Published By
Texas Department
Of Public Safety

- RIGHT-OF-WAY AT AN INTERSECTION WITH A STOP SIGN**
1—Belongs to those vehicles on the protected highway which are within the intersection or approaching so closely as to constitute an immediate hazard. However, vehicles not close enough to be dangerous should slow down and allow a driver waiting at a stop sign to proceed.
2—Requires a vehicle approaching an intersection and facing a stop sign to stop at such sign, or at a clearly marked stop line, before entering the intersection.
- RIGHT-OF-WAY AT AN INTERSECTION WITH A YIELD SIGN**
1—Requires a vehicle facing a yield sign to give way to vehicles on the protected highway and to pedestrians legally crossing the roadway. The vehicle is not required to stop unless it will interfere with vehicles so close on the protected highway that they are an immediate hazard, but after stopping, the vehicle may not proceed until the way is clear on the protected highway. A driver involved in a collision after passing a yield sign is presumed not to have yielded.

the right-of-way.
RIGHT-OF-WAY ON ENTERING A ROADWAY
2—Requires a vehicle entering a roadway or traffic lane from an angle or parallel parking zone or from a highway shoulder to yield to vehicle close enough to constitute an immediate hazard. (It is illegal to start, for any purpose, a vehicle that is stopped, standing or parked unless it can be started with safety.)
3—Requires a vehicle entering a roadway from a building, an alley, or a private driveway to stop before crossing the sidewalk.
3—Requires a vehicle entering a roadway from a private road or driveway to yield to vehicles on the roadway.

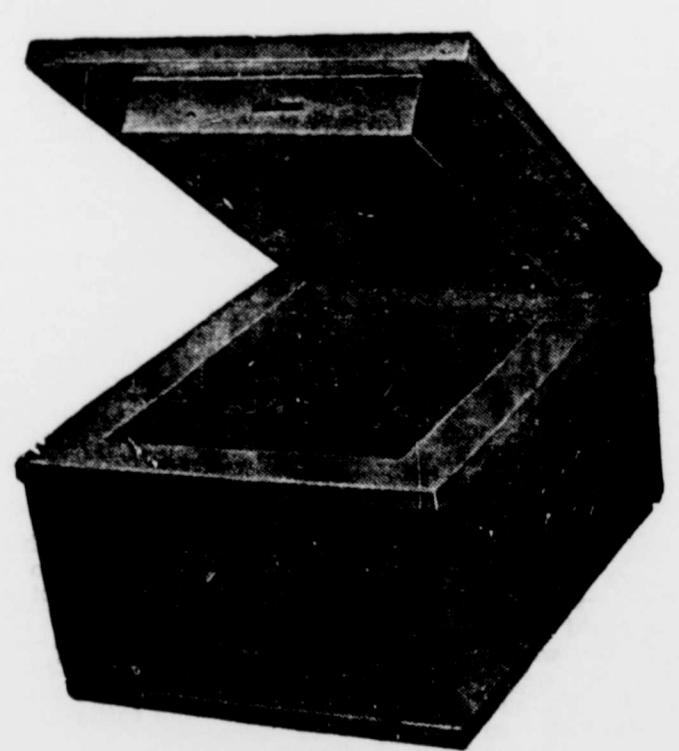

This is an article on whales, but I need the help of the United Nations to make whaling a "new" industry. Well, here is my story.

My Boyhood and Whales

When I was a boy, it seemed as if the ocean was full of whales. They apparently lived at the bottom of the sea where they would not be harpooned by whalers going out from Bedford, Mass., and other seaports which made a specialty of getting whales. Gradually, the number of whales we depleted. Finally an international agreement was arranged whereby the nations were given quotas, but these have never been honored.

Therefore, I have a definite proposition, namely, that the whaling industry be taken over by the United Nations, which would see that only the male whales are killed and that the female whales are allowed to reproduce. This would seem a legitimate work for the United Nations, and one which would bring the UN a definite income—I can imagine it making a good contribution toward paying up the United Nation's present deficit.

History of the Cattle Industry

When I was a boy there was virtually no cattle industry. My uncle went west to Nebraska where the cattle with great horns were roaming freely over the prairies. Gradually, wire fences were erected to allow the cattle to be branded and ultimately dehorned. That was done with cattle, and we have the great cattle industry of today. The same type of thing could be done with the whaling industry; but it must take place under water instead of on the open prairie.

Whales are mammals, not fish. They are kindly and intelligent; but have gradually been driven away from civilized ports and killed, irrespective of whether they are male or female, and even when they are pregnant. The whaling industry could be brought back and become almost as great as the cattle industry; but this can only be done if the industry is controlled by an organization like the United Nations.

Let Us Appeal to the United Nations

Therefore, I make an appeal to the United Nations that I seriously take up this problem before the whales all go to the Arctic or Antarctic waters, largely under the ice, for protection. Let us turn the tide before it is too late, and bring forth and protect a new industry for the world which will equal the cattle industry in importance, and provide wealth, employment, and prosperity for all who have a part therein.

This is a very practical matter and it could easily be accomplished. The waters of the oceans are the only natural monopoly the United Nations have. Certainly, before spending billions on "going to the moon," we might find out what is at the bottom of the seas, which make up four-fifths of the world area and which we now know almost nothing about. How Did the Oil Industry Start?

John D. Rockefeller personally told me that there was a break-through in Pennsylvania where the crust of the earth was thick, and a puddle of oil was seen on the surface. Later other "break-throughs" occurred in California, Texas and other states. This is the way the great oil industry started. What About the Bottom of the Ocean?

It is only common sense to believe there are many "break-throughs" on the crust of the floor of the ocean through which oil comes which the whales have been living on. Now, however, they have been driven north to the Arctic or

Letter Writing Will Help

By Maisie Turner Waters

The following is a quotation from a speech made to the Army and Navy Club in Washington, by John C. Satterfeld, past president of the American Bar Association: "Never in the history of nations governed by elected officials, has the head of any state demanded untrammeled power as is embodied in this (Civil Rights) Act, except when such state was upon the verge of becoming a dictatorship . . . when future generations look back through the eyes of history at this legislation, they will recognize 10 per cent 'Civil Rights' and 90 per cent extension of raw federal power . . ." In a summary of provisions in this measure, we find seven danger points, outlined by a recent survey:

1. Absolute control over every local, state and national election.
2. Regulation of private business throughout the country.
3. Complete desegregation of all schools and transportation of pupils outside their natural school boundaries to insure mixture of races.
4. Mediation agencies set up at taxpayers' expense to mediate in local affairs.
5. Extension of the Civil Rights Commission, with increased authority.
6. Power allocated to the President to withdraw aid from any community program not integrating the people according to government interpretation.
7. Employment Commission authority to dictate to employers whom they may employ.

This bill will entail the abdication of Congressional powers completely in favor of the White House. Further dictation is embodied in directives from the Defense Department, enforcing a study called the Gesell Report, proposing to use the Armed Services personnel to pomote integration! This would allow commanding officers to interfere in the affairs of communities adjoining military bases. This usurpation of individual freedom has been challenged by the Honorable Carl Vinson, Chairman of the Armed Services Committee of the House of Representatives, in his H. R. 8460. Write to your Senators and Congressmen, and to Representative Vinson today.

Also write or wire Senator Richard Russell of the Senate Armed Services Committee to pass this bill and to defeat the so-called "Civil Rights" Bill when it comes up for decision. Senator James O. Eastland of the Senate Judiciary Committee should also be urged to defeat this measure. "Only a firm coalition of midwest Republicans and Southern Democrats in Congress can save America from becoming an absolute dictatorship."

south to the Antarctic, where it is too cold for them to be found and killed. The bottom of the ocean is today as brilliant a hunting ground as were the prairies of the Central West before the wire fences were built or the cattle branded or dehorned.

The first man of my acquaintance who had the foresight to study the bottom of the ocean was Mr. E. W. Scripps, who personally told me of its great undiscovered wealth and who left a sum of money to endow such a study. Let me add that I think he was a great-grandfather of the wife of William Loeb (commonly known as "Nackey"). Unfortunately, no United Nations existed in that day and Mr. Scripps was obliged to depend upon his newspaper syndicate to promote interest in the project.

DOING THE TWIST

Family FINANCIAL PROTECTION

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance 488 Madison Ave., N. Y. 22, N. Y.

Q. I have \$10,000 of group life insurance where I work. My employer deducts the premiums from my paycheck. If I leave my job, can I keep this insurance by paying the premiums directly to the life insurance company?

A. You can keep this insurance in force by converting it to an individual, permanent policy within a certain period of time (usually one month) after you leave your job. You would then pay premiums on the new policy directly to the life insurance company or one of its agencies.



You could convert your group insurance regardless of any health impairment or other condition that might exist when you leave your job. You would pay the same standard premium rate as for any ordinary policy issued by the life insurance company. The premiums would be based on your age at the time you converted the policy.

Incidentally, these premiums would be higher than what you are now paying for your group insurance—mainly because your new policy would be on a permanent basis, and because you would be paying premiums according to your age. You could keep it in force as long as you needed it, and it would build up cash value and other benefits not provided under most group policies. (Your group insurance is likely on a temporary basis and protects you only while you continue in your present job. Also, your employer may be paying part of the cost of your group insurance, while you would pay the entire cost of your new individual policy.)

Before converting your group policy, you might want to consult your life insurance agent. He can help you set up an individual insurance program suited to your family's needs and your own financial goals.

Allowing each child in a family to have a room of his or her own is a luxury that few families can afford. Teaching children how to share a room without conflict, therefore, is a project that must be faced in many homes.

Even in a shared room, though, it is possible to give children a measure of privacy, especially important as they grow up.

According to Charles H. Ringwalt, vice president and general manager of the Steelwagon Manufacturing Company of Philadelphia, "one of the most common sources of friction among youngsters is the noise that one makes when the other wants quiet for studying or reading."

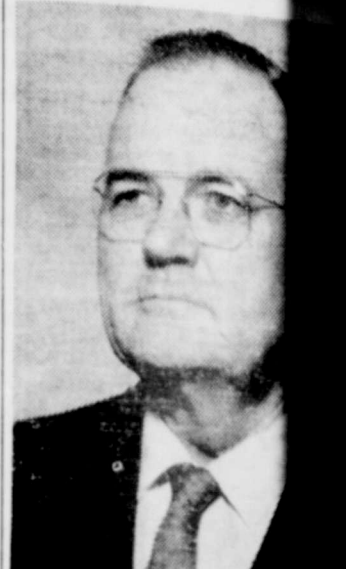


Acoustical tile can be a simple solution. In addition, the ceiling tile will diminish the amount of noise that gets out of a room when the phonograph or radio is blaring. The new ceiling tiles are decorative, also, helping to create a warm, friendly atmosphere.

Mr. Ringwalt also feels it is important that each child have a desk of his own, and sufficient storage space. "It is fairly simple for a do-it-yourselfer to build in extra space using gypsum wallboards. A good idea is to allow the children, especially if they are girls, to participate in the decorating of the room. If they are boys, provisions should be made for hanging up their holsters, within easy drawing distance, of course, and hooks should be supplied for clothes."

If space is tight, double bunks offer a convenient solution and are generally accepted by children. Each family will have its own way of deciding who gets the upper bunk, but, whatever method is used, both children should agree to the arrangement in order to avoid conflict.
