Houston Convention—Its Objects

The call for a Republican State Convention which first appeared in our last issue, meets with general approbation among the Republicans. The call is the reflex of their sentiments; and as such is an indication that harmony is about to be inaugurated among the loyal men of Texas. The prospect now is that the work of reconstruction will be completed on a basis not only satisfactory to our people, but satisfactory to Congress, which has the power to pass on and approve or reject our action.

We do not propose to enter the final contest of reconstruction with scattered and disorganized forces, and by the election of men who are distasteful to Congress, run the risk of a postponement of that event. Flake's Bulletin is in favor of the Convention, but proposes no way to bring it about. On the contrary, it objects to all proposed methods. Were it possible to get the two wings to unite in a call through their respective heads, it would be the best and most effective manner of accomplishing the object. This course has been urged by this paper and by individual Republi-
cans all over the State, but apparently without effect, and in the absence of any prospect of bringing a Convention about in this manner, it has been deemed best by Republicans of all shades of opinion that the loyal press should join in the call, and ask the co-operation of both State Committees. It remains for the chairman of the latter to say whether it shall be a complete success, and result in the consolidation and harmonization of the Republican hosts in Texas.

We trust the Bulletin will reconsider its objections, and unite with us in honestly trying to bring this movement to a successful termination. It is within the power of the loyal press to do it, and we will prove recalcitrant to our duty if we fail to use all honorable means to attain that end. The Bulletin objects to Houston as the place for holding a convention, and prefers Waco. A much larger representation could be secured in Houston at the present time than at any other place in the State. Delegations were elected for the Houston Convention before it was called, and before we could change the place of meeting nearly every Senatorial District will have responded to the call.

In the selection of Delegates we trust our Republican friends will as far as practicable send new men. It will devolve upon the patriotic action of such men to heal our differences, who have not heretofore been identified with the bitter quarrel which has alienated our leaders and split our organization. A selfish or contentious man should not be sent to the Convention, but only those determined to bring about harmony at all hazards, even to the sacrifice of all personal predilections, should be chosen.—Houston Union.

TEXAS ITEMS.
The Bryan News Letter congratulates itself in the following style: "During the past week there has been no one robbed or murdered in the vicinity of Bryan. This is encouraging, and speaks well for the moral atmosphere of our city."

The News Letter thinks that:
Our friends seem to be sanguine of an election in July, though we can see no prospect of one being held. A new registration is necessary, and no primary step has been taken to open registration books. We have heard of no appointments or recommendations of Registrars. The system of reconstruction imposed upon us is dilatory in the extreme, and we must not be too precipitate in our anticipations. It will take a longer time than any of us expect to go through with the preparatory steps to an election.

The Navasota Ranger of Friday makes the following announcement:
Major General Clark, U. S. A. will speak at this place on tomorrow.

To which Flake says:
We were not aware that there was any such officer in Texas. The commander of this district is only a Brevet Major General. This must, therefore, be the ranking officer of the State.

The Bryan News Letter says:
We have had splendid weather for farming during the last few days, and our crop reports are cheering. We anticipate a heavy crop of corn and cotton. We fear our planters have not planted enough corn for home consumption. If we have as good a cotton year as we had last year, Texas will yield at least fifteen per cent. more of the staple the current year.

The Belton Journal says:
The wheat crop of this country is considered more promising than for many years past. It is much to be regretted that our farmers did not devote more of their land to this crop.

American News.
WASHINGTON, May 5.
Creswell appointed James Simms, colored, Postmaster at Savannah, Ga.
The announcement of Simms' appointment as postmaster at Savannah, is probably premature. His commission has not yet been ordered at the appointment office. Cuban Constitution for the Republic has been prepared in this city. The framers acted on the assumption that the Cubans will attain their independence, and, like Texas, desire annexation. The constitution provides for one or more States in the Island. A leading member of Congress is participating in the movement, but as far as known the federal executive has taken no interest in the matter, beyond tacitly authorizing the sale of useless or surplus war material to any applicant.

It has transpired that Boutwell appointed H. C. Whitley, of Boston, who was a prominent detective under Butler in New Orleans, chief treasury detective.
The London Times this morning has another leading article on the Alabama treaty, rejected by the U. S. Senate. The writer sharply criticizes the speech of Sumner, and concludes as follows: The question is one of law and not of footing; it remains to be shown that Great Britain can be held answerable for any infraction of law, or excess of one of the ordinary practice of both countries.
Gov. Wells, of Virginia, obtained nothing satisfactory from his visit to the President. The election will not be held until a thorough registration is completed, and until Canby, who is not yet thoroughly acquainted with the political situation, shall recommend a more convenient period for the election. The President seems in no hurry respecting any of the three States involved.

A dispatch from J. Ross Brynne, confirms English newspaper reports, that the Chinese are opposed to civilization, and will not willingly ratify Burlingame's treaty.
A new patent has been issued for extracting oil from cotton seed, and for a new cotton gin.
Col. Wood, chief detective of the Treasury department resigned on computation. Col Wood is notorious in connection with the old Capitol Prison. The name of his successor is withheld.
Gen. Ely, recently appointed marshal of the Eastern District of Pennsylvania, is dead.
The war department is advised that Captain B. H. Harkness, of the 35th Infantry, was killed while pursuing deserters, near Fort Bliss, Texas.
Boutwell has extended the hours of duty at the treasury, from 9 to 4.
Gov. Geary, heading a delegation of the Union League at Philadelphia, had a long interview with Grant.

News From Cuba.
WASHINGTON, May 5.
Commodore Hoff arrived at Havana on the 26th. He says he found upon arrival political matters exceedingly quiet.
An expedition, supposed to have sailed for Yucatan, consisting of a steamer and several sailing vessels, attempted to land men and arms for the Cubans, on the south side of the western department, near the place known as River de Rio, failed.
The Spanish Admiral left Havana in his flagship, accompanied by several others, who go in search of this party.
News has been received that the transport having on board political prisoners, that left a month since for Fernando Po, put into Porto Rico for repairs.
The Captain General of that Island is determined to send some to Canary, and the remainder to Cadiz.
Both Cubans and Spaniards seem exceedingly quiet. There has been no successes lately on either side.
