Formal Opening Of Slaton's Creamery Set For Saturday

(Special To The Avalanche) SLATON, April 25.—Slaton's new creamery will hold its formal opening Saturday. W. M. Randall, manager, has announced. He expects 2,000 to 3,000 visitors that day. Demonstrations in pasteurizing, churning, wrapping and packing butter will be given. The plant is said to be one of the finest in West Texas, representing a large investment, partially financed by Slaton farmers and business men through purchase of stock. The Red River Creameries, Inc., will operate the plant. The creamery has a refrigeration unit accommodating one and one-half carloads of butter. A weekly output of a carload of butter is anticipated. Cream stations in numerous points over the South Plains will help furnish the cream supply, supplementing local production.

Federal Reserve Man Is Speaker At Kiwanis Club

J. Floyd Clouse of Dallas, Tells Of Citizenship Of Section; Club Boys Are Presented Gifts. The type of citizenship peopling the Plains country of northwest Texas, as well as the very rapid development of this section, were subjects of comment by J. Floyd Clouse, representative of the Federal Reserve bank, of Dallas, in the feature talk before the Lubbock Kiwanis club, at its regular weekly luncheon yesterday at Hotel Lubbock. Clouse, who has spent the past 11 years with the Federal Reserve bank in the southwest section of the United States, told the Kiwanians that economic conditions in the South Plains country was better than at any other part of Texas, and that this area was only at the threshold of agricultural, commercial and industrial development. Other features of the club's gathering included a speech by County Agricultural Agent D. F. Eaton, announcement of the club's presentation to eight 4-H Farm club boys of eight bred gilts to provide these youths with essentials for carrying on their pig club project for this year, and several piano numbers by Mrs. Will Tucker. The program for the day was in charge of A. C. Jackson, boyhood friend of Clouse, the meeting being presided over by President A. H. Leidigh. In introducing the farm boys to the Kiwanians, S. J. Meyers, chairman of the agricultural committee of the organization, announced that these boys are considered as Lubbock county's farm leaders of tomorrow and that they were selected because of their outstanding rank among the 300 club boys of the county. Mr. Eaton told the Kiwanians that Lubbock is strategically situated as the "Hub" of this great farming area and that this sort of work in encouraging the raising of pure-bred livestock, would do much to make this county the center and leader in this agricultural. Announcement was made of the Kiwanians' plan to send a large delegation to Childress next Monday night, for the Charter Meeting of the new Kiwanis organization there, sponsored by the Lubbock club.

Travel Long Way Two Letters Go Around Globe

PORT ARTHUR, April 25. (AP)—After travelling around the globe two letters mailed in Barcelona, Spain, March 1, have been delivered to Fernando Pro, Spanish vice consul here. The letters were addressed "Fernando Pro, Vice Consul, Port Arthur," and contained invitations to fruit growers of the Sabine district to enter fruit exhibits in an exposition at Barcelona. The letters went from Spain to Port Arthur, Siberia, where they received a few Russian postmarks before being sent to Yokohama, Japan. 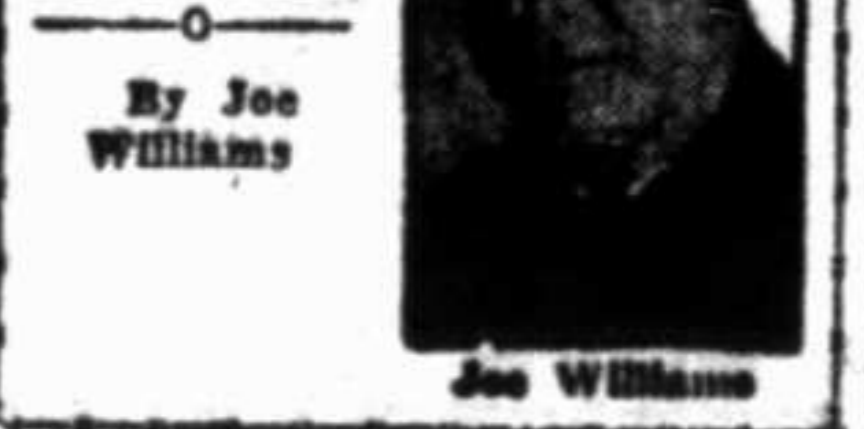

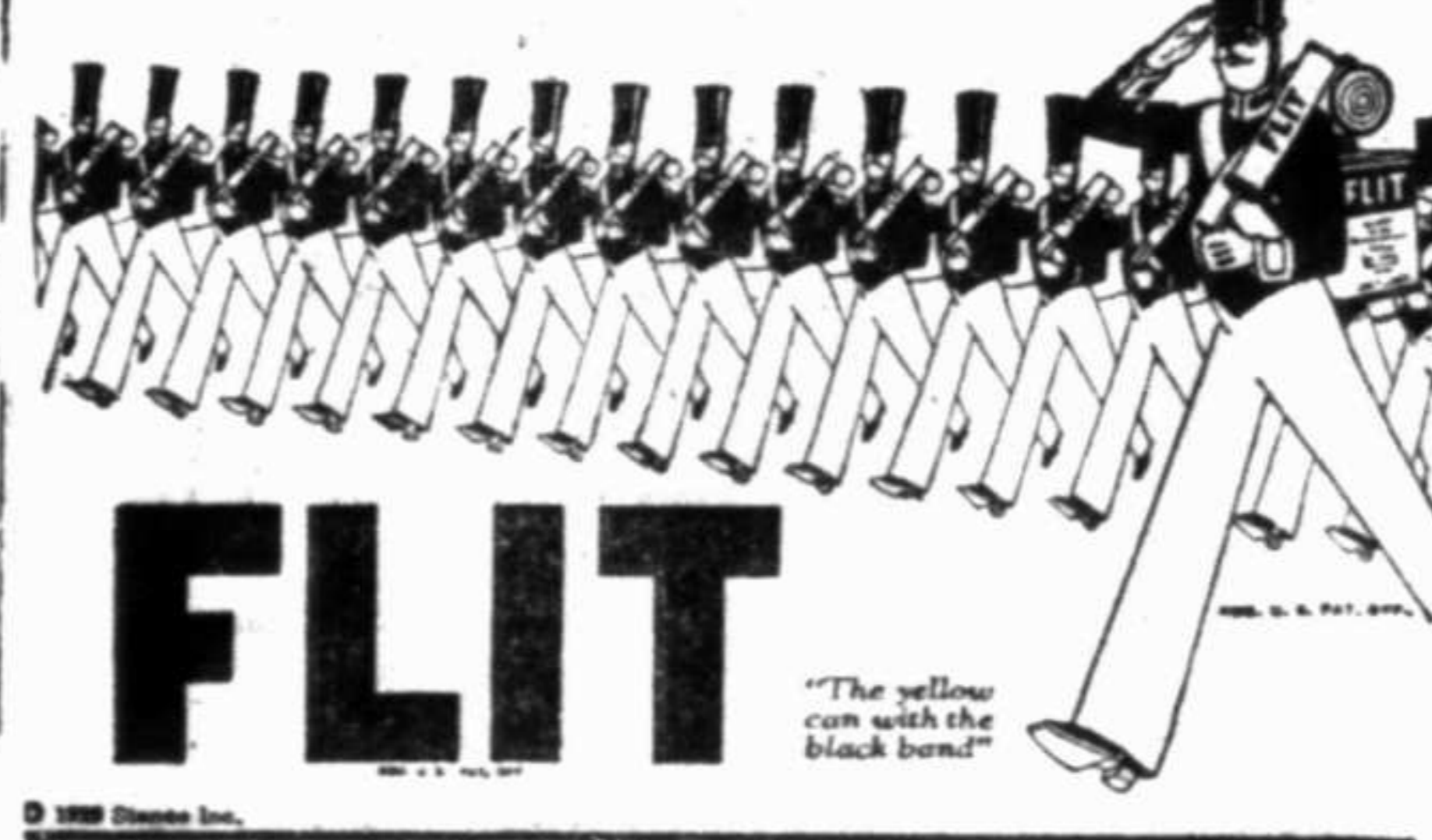

Cotton Prices Sag Nearly \$3 A Bale On Southern Mart

NEW ORLEANS, April 25. (AP)—Cotton prices sagged nearly \$3 a bale from an early advance today when traders sold freely on the circulation of large notices for May contracts and failure of the predicted unfavorable weather in the belt to materialize. In final trading July dropped to 18.84 and October 18.85, or 55 to 59 points down. Options closed 5 points above the lowest for net losses of 43 and 46 points respectively. The general market closed steady at a net decline of 36 to 46 points.

Liverpool cables were relatively steady but circulation of large notices here caused the market to open irregular. First trades were 2 points down to 2 points up but prices rallied moderately after the start probably in response to favorable cables. July advanced to 19.39, October 19.44 and December 19.54, or 7 to 9 points above the previous close.

Prices were on the downgrade for practically the remainder of the session, reaching the low points in final trading when May sold at 18.89, July 18.94, October 18.85 and December 18.94, or 46 to 60 points below the highs. December showed the maximum loss which represented a decline of exactly \$3 a bale from the early high point. The close was steady and 5 to 6 points above the lowest.

Sharp Declines Felt Thursday On New York Cotton

NEW YORK, April 25. (AP)—An early advance promoted by relatively steady cables, reports of rain in the central belt and the expected prompt stopping of May notices was followed by sharp declines in cotton today under renewed liquidation and more or less general selling. July broke from 19.33 to 18.91, with the general market closing barely steady. Net declines of 34 to 56 points.

Opening was steady at an advance of 12 points to a decline of 1 point. Active months were higher on covering or trade buying.

May sold up to 20.11 and December to 19.72 at the start. The demand for later deliveries soon tapered off, however, and the market turned easier with the selling becoming more active. Stop orders were uncovered on the decline which carried prices into new low ground for the movement with May selling off to 19.60 or 38 points net lower. December declined to 19.09 or 56 points net yesterday's closing quotations.

Some local brokers were inclined to attribute the decline to a trend toward increased estimates of the probable acreage. Exports today 2,831, making 7,245,000 so far this season. Port receipts 8,207. U. S. port crop 1,475,913.

PIE CRUST IS MADE IN DOUBLE-QUICK TIME WITH SNOWDRIFT

For this creamy shortening cuts into the flour in just about no time at all. Thoroughly mix together the cornstarch, salt and sugar, and add to the boiling water, stirring constantly. When thick, transfer to a double boiler and cook for at least ten minutes. 1/4 Teaspoonful Baking Powder - 1 Cupful Flour
3 Tablespoonfuls Boiling Water

Sift together the dry ingredients and cut in the Snowdrift with a knife, keeping the mixture soft. Then add the boiling water and cool the paste before rolling. Roll out on a floured board and bake on an inverted pie-plate for twelve minutes in a hot oven of 500 degrees F.

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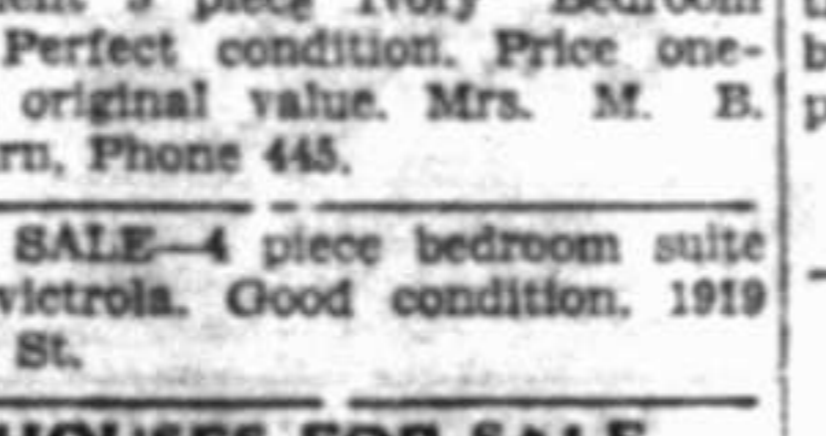

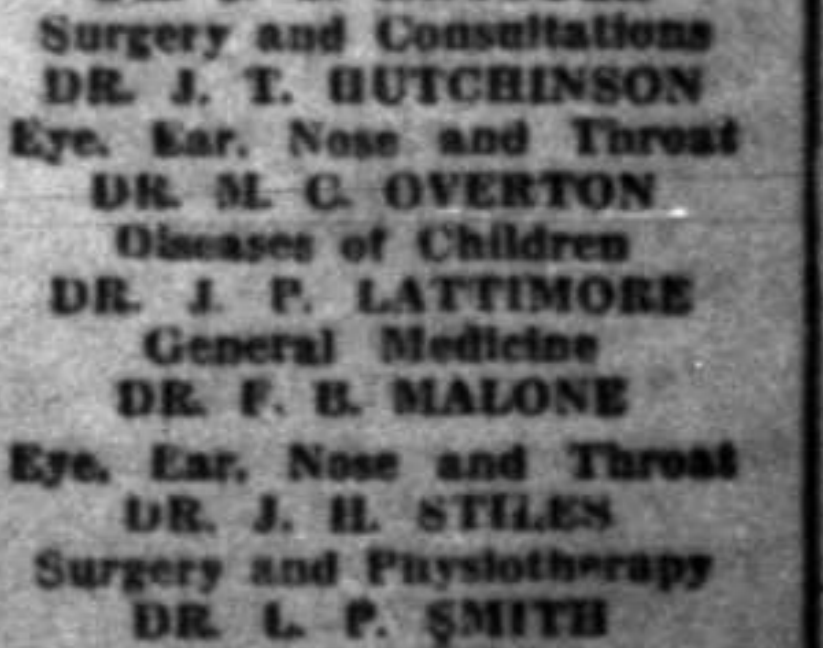

Mr. Shelton said that Whitaker, agriculturist of the W. T. C. C., was remaining in Terry county for several days and that President Bourland, in his speech Wednesday night, expressed himself as astounded at the development obtaining in the Brownfield section.

"Our crop prospects are the best yet experienced," Shelton declared. "We are facing the biggest fruit crop in our history, principally grapes, peaches, apples, plums, and cherries. Nearly everybody has small orchards and all trees are loaded."

Proceeds of the banquet will be used to send 4-H club boys from Terry county to A. & M. for this summer's short course, Shelton said.

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Still In Debt City's Overdraft Becoming Habit

TEXARKANA, April 25. (AP)—The city of Texarkana, Texas, still struggles along with a bank overdraft that has become a municipal tradition. Each administration has passed it along. Since 1923 the amount has ranged from \$61,179.47 to \$105,986.01 and no one knows exactly how long it has been since the city officers were on a strictly cash basis.

The maximum figures occur at the end of each tax year, just before the collections for the new year begin. As the collections progress the overdraft is whittled down and may even be wiped out altogether. Later in the year, however, it begins to pile up again.

The city usually has to borrow against its next year's collections to tide it over the closing months.

In 1928 \$4,298 interest was paid on the overdraft and in 1927 it was \$5,282.

designation by the President, of one of the six to be chairman for a period named by the Chief Executive.

Provide for employment of subordinates by the board and for annual reports to Congress, including legislative recommendations.

Authorize the board to establish an agricultural commodity advisory regional or market classification or type of any agricultural commodity, "or any two or more agricultural commodities," which in the judgment of the board can be better handled if treated as a separate commodity.

Establish committee to direct the board to invite cooperative associations handling that particular commodity to establish a committee of seven to represent the commodity before the board, and provide that not less than two of these shall be experienced handlers or processors of the commodity.

Charge the board with promotion of education in cooperative marketing and to encourage the organization, improvement in methods and development of cooperative associations.

Study Prices Direct the board to study and report prices, experiences, prospects, and demand at home and abroad, and to investigate over production and advise as to its prevention.

Instruct the board to make investigations and report and publish the results on a variety of subjects, including development of a land policy which would keep poor lands out of production, if economic need for further reclamation and irrigation, the development of a sound forestry program and advise as to the type of farming that should be undertaken in different sections.

Appropriate Fund Authorize the appropriation of \$500,000,000 as a revolving fund for loans and advances to agricultural organizations, leaving it to the discretion of the board to allocate the fund among the different types of loans. Interest rates are left to be fixed by the board.

Provide for loans for cooperative marketing, either for cooperative purchasing, for the construction, purchase or lease of storage or other marketing facilities, or for the expansion of clearing houses or of expanding membership of cooperative associations through educational methods.

Limit Loans Limit such loans to the purposes defined in the policy section and to such associations as have their organization, management and business policies approved by the board, with a provision that the loans may be repaid over 30 years.

Look to the formation of producer-controlled clearing houses for agricultural commodities, with a view to aiding in the joint shipment of perishable products in mixed carload lots for their joint disposition on the terminal markets.

Aim at stabilization of perishable product prices by limiting the supply on the various markets to the demand.

Provides Insurance Provide for insurance arrangements through cooperative marketing associations may be secured against market declines in the basis of price of the commodity during the marketing period.

Enable cooperative associations to advance to members with safety a larger percentage of the current market price than otherwise could be advanced.

Limit the action of the board if private insurance companies offer similar insurance reasonably.

Prohibit the board to make a loan or an advance or enter into an insurance agreement if it believes the effect will be substantial to the production of a crop of which a surplus in excess of the annual requirements commonly is produced.

Confer On Board Power Confer on the board power to finance stabilization corporations at the request of the commodity committee, which corporations may be organized under the laws of any state.

Provide for only one such corporation for a commodity.

Give the stabilization corporation power to act as a marketing agent for its members or stockholders, but permit them to market in other ways if they desire.

Authorize the board to advance working capital to enable the corporation to produce, store, merchandise and otherwise dispose of the commodity," and allow the board to determine what terms, rates of interest and periods shall govern the loans.

Should Make Profit Declare that the stabilization corporation shall operate in the hope of making a profit, and not serve as a dumping organization, nor withhold commodities from the market if the action produces distress to the community.

Require the corporation to set up adequate reserves out of its profits before paying dividends, but not require it to repay the initial advances to the government until its operations have produced a profit.

Provide for cooperation between the various branches of government and the board to protect information acquired in confidence by any government department against violation of the confidence.

Authorize \$1,500,000 for expenses of the board.

Define Associations Define cooperative associations for the purposes of the act as those organized under the Capper-Volstead law, but permit the board where it finds an absence of sufficient cooperative associations to recognize farmer owned and farmer controlled associations.

Prohibit any member, officer or employee from speculating in any food commodity or the stock of any company engaged in handling the commodity, and provide heavy penalties.

Prohibit the disclosure of confidential information under heavy penalty.

According to Homer D. Wade, manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, President Hoover and Mr. Gil, of Mexico, will probably lend the official dignity of two nations to the annual convention of the association at El Paso.

Wade states that President Hoover has intimated to the organization that if the date for this year's meeting is delayed until after the present session of Congress adjourns, he will attend the meeting.

President Gil has given similar intimation. The convention was first scheduled to be held the middle of May, but was postponed because of the possibility of securing Hoover's attendance.

Should the two presidents not be able to attend, the convention is to be held some time in June, Wade stated.

Simpson Warns On Fire Hazards

City Fire Marshal L. H. Simpson announced yesterday that he has instituted a campaign against fire hazard very prevalent here, where in electric fuse plugs heavier than those prescribed in the city's electrical code are in use.

Simpson explains that about 90 per cent of the fuse plugs in use here are in excess of the 15 ampere type prescribed, most of them being 30 ampere. He states that where fuse plugs are used to connect on any single circuit, for lights or small appliances, the 15 amps are necessary, and that where heavier motors are in use on special circuits the larger plugs are needed.

"This practice of the more powerful plugs creates a distinct fire hazard," said Mr. Simpson, "besides affecting the insurance rate obtainable by the user, a penalty being stipulated where the 30 ampere type are used."

MEXIA, April 25. (AP)—J. W. Elliott, of Mexia, secretary-treasurer has announced the annual wolf hunt of the Texas Fox and Wolf Hunters association will be held on a ranch near Archer City.


