30 Per Cent Fail In School Work

During the spring thoughts of studying are replaced by daydreams. This is proven by the failing percentage of the entire school. During the Fifth Six Weeks 30 percent of the students in Crane High School failed one or more subjects.

The Freshmen Class had the best failing percentage with only 24% of their class failing one or more subjects. Next came the Senior Class right behind them with 25% failing one or more subjects. The juniors were next with 38% failing one or more subjects, and with 40% failing one or more subjects were the sophomores.

In the Senior Class ten students failed two subjects and three failed one. In the Junior Class ten failed one, nine failed two, one failed three, and one failed four. In the Sophomore Class 14 failed four. In the Freshmen Class 17 failed one, two failed two, and one is failing three.

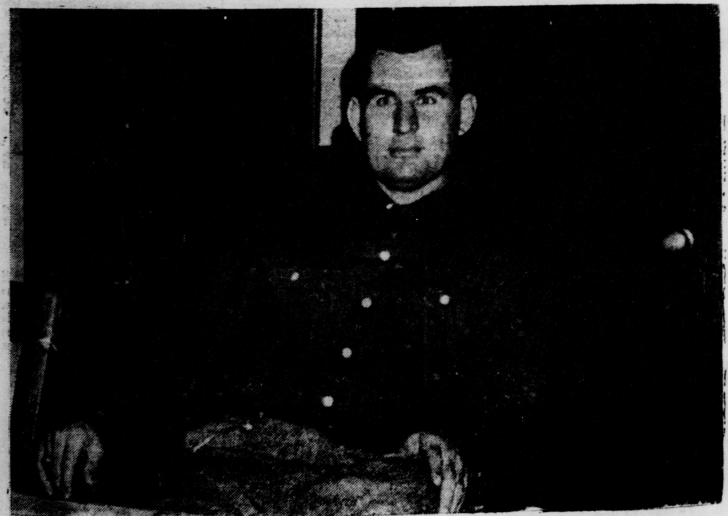
Then too, journalism students are always needing to leave school to gather news for the paper. Almost invariably someone is double parked behind them. By the time you get

The gentleman pictured above is none other than George Grounds, assistant high school principal and teacher. Mr. Grounds moved from McCamey to Crane when he was in the third grade.

While in Crane High School, he was very active in athletics. He participated in football, track, and basketball. Mr. Grounds was a member of the basketball team that went to state in 1941-42.

During the summer of 1943, Mr. Grounds went to the aid of his country. He served in the Infantry in the South Pacific, where he was wounded in action. Then he returned to Crane High School and graduated in 1946.

After graduation, he went to Texas Western College in El Paso and received his master's degree. He majored in physical education and minored in social studies.

While in college, Mr. Grounds played end on the

Texas Western football team and ran the Quarter-mile in track! One year his college football team went to Hawaii and played the Hawaiian football team. Incidentally, the Texas Western football team won the game.

Mr. Grounds taught school in El Paso for two years after his graduation from college. He then came to Crane as assistant football coach and served in that capacity and taught social studies for three years. In 1958-59 he was given the position of assistant principal.

As assistant principal, Mr. Grounds is always willing to help the students with their problems. Because of his pleasant personality, most students get along with him exceptionally well.

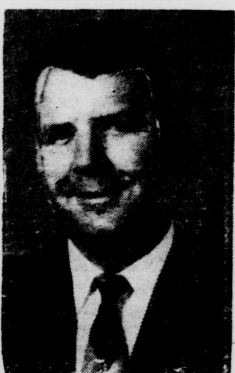
Her hobbies include playing the accordion, painting ceramics, and growing plants.
