



City Council Says

Telephone Increase Can Be Rescinded

The City Council of Colorado City Tuesday night expressed concern over what was described as lack

of service from Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., for local telephone users. It was noted by Council-

man J. Lee Jones Jr., and City Manager James Campbell that the rate increase granted Southwestern Bell

Telephone March 9 can be rescinded should the telephone company fail to live up to promises made in requesting the rate increase.

When the rate increase was granted Campbell requested that the telephone company send a letter setting out their promises to be placed in City Council minutes. That letter has not yet been received, Campbell pointed out.

A number of council members told of a number of complaints they have received from local residents about problems with telephone service. Most of the complaints followed last week's rains that apparently caused most of the telephone problems.

Several council members said some residents have been without telephone service for almost a week.

Members of the council told Campbell to contact the telephone company to request that District Manager Bill Gilliland, District Service Supervisor Danny Storch and local maintenance supervisor Ray Medley be present at the next council meeting to make some explanations to the council.

The Record attempted Wednesday to contact Gilliland but he was attending a school in Abilene and could not be reached.

The council session was called Tuesday for the council to approve a number of matters relating to the sale of bonds to finance city improvements and to discuss the city's group life and health insurance for employees.

The council also heard a request from Robert L. Ramage to put three mobile

homes at 13th and Walnut. The council granted a permit to place only one mobile home on the three lots owned at that location by Ramage due to zoning restrictions.

The Mayor, Dr. Elton Berkman, recommended to the council that the permanent cemetery committee be made up of council representative Rick Perkin, the mayor pro-tem and B. B. Hardee, Nelda Garrett, G. D. Foster and Rev. Bob Ford.

Dr. Berkman also report-

ed that some 500 people are expected to turn out May 22 for the clean-up at the cemetery. On May 1, Dr. Berkman reported, a fund will be started to keep the cemetery in good condition and that about \$30,000 will be needed.

Dr. Berkman also reported that he has been notified that Lone Star Gas Co. is seeking a gate rate increase from the Railroad Commission and the council agreed that the city should do everything possible to oppose such an increase.

Tornado's Path Misses Spade

A tornado in southwestern Mitchell County Friday night cut a swath about a quarter-mile wide through about 30 miles of ranching country, narrowly missing the Renderbrook-Spade Ranch headquarters.

J. E. (Shorty) Northcutt, who ranches in the southern part of the county, said he lost about 75 ewes both Thursday and Friday, "some from the cold rain Thursday because they had just been sheared, and some from the storm Friday."

Several sheep pens and shearing camps were destroyed by the tornado, one on the Renderbrook and one on Francis Winn's ranch. Windmills on both places were also destroyed.

The main destruction, however, was to fences because even fences adjacent to the direct path of the tornado were knocked over.

by high winds which accompanied it.

From all reports, the tornado started in Sterling County near the Kinnebrew Road northwest of Sterling City, and its path was from a southeasterly to northeasterly direction, playing out just before reaching the Colorado River just past Winn's place.

The path would have been right through the Renderbrook headquarters except it veered to the east about a mile and one-half to two miles from the buildings and missed destroying the historic ranch buildings.

A bonus of the storm was the rain it brought and the high winds cleaned off a lot of broomweed that had been a nuisance since last year.

The broomweed was laid into the fences in heavy, rain-drenched bunches which was another cause of the fences being knocked over.

Northcutt said it was "just one of the hazards of ranching in this country."

Commissioners Discuss Vacancy

Mitchell County commissioners last week, after postponing the regular Monday afternoon meeting to attend the funeral services for County Attorney Perry Barber, discussed the vacancy in the office but delayed making a decision until a later meeting.

County Judge Bill Carter said an appointment to fill the office would be temporary until the November general election as the name of a nominee to the office would have to come from the

County Democratic Committee.

Requirements for the office are that the nominee be a legal resident of the county with a law degree. Legal residence is at least six months in the county.

Barber's name is on the ballot for the May 1 primary election and ballots have already been printed and absentee voting is underway.

County auditor Dwayne Feaster also presented his audit for 1975 for the commissioners to review.

McKee Sets New Pole Vault Mark

Wayne McKee of Colorado City set a new record of 13 feet in the pole vault during the Lone Wolf Relays Saturday at Wolf Stadium.

Previous high mark was 12'8" set by Vernon's Arnold in 1974.

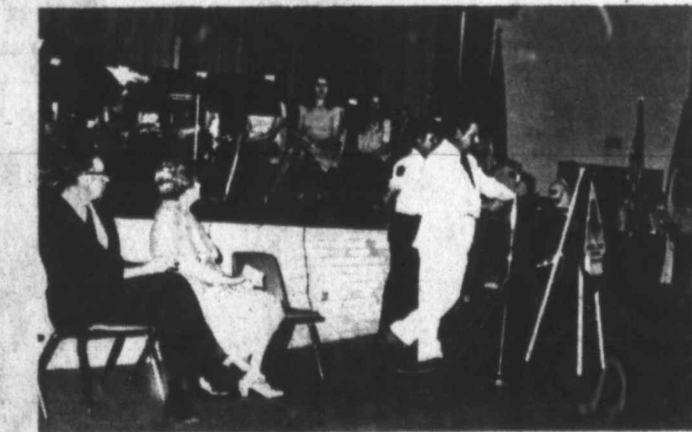
Motley Co.'s Pitts was only five-tenths of a second off the record in the 880 yd. dash as he was clocked at 2:02.2 and the record is 2:01.7 set by Campbell of CHS in 1967.

The Colorado City trackmen placed second in their own meet with 89 points behind Class AAA-Lake View with 167 points but

ahead of other Class AA contenders Sweetwater, 85; Ballinger, 31; Coahoma, 28 and Winters, 10. Class A Clyde had 59 points and Class B Motley Co., 24. The Colorado City junior varsity team scored only three points in the meet but saw a lot of action and gained experience from their entries.

McKee's first place in the pole vault and the Mile Relay team's first place in that event were the only first place finishes posted by the host team. The Mile Relay, the last event, won second place for the Wolves. Their time was 3:32.4, close to the old record of 3:28.0 set by Pineda, Brown, Higginbotham and Campbell in 1967. Mile Relay team members are Frank Sanchez, Ray Torres, Monty Martin and Drex Grisham.

There was a special Fat Man's Relay for trackmen who do not participate in the running events. It was won by Colorado City's Cornell Ausbie, Jackie Ellis, Wayne McKee and Kevin Herm. 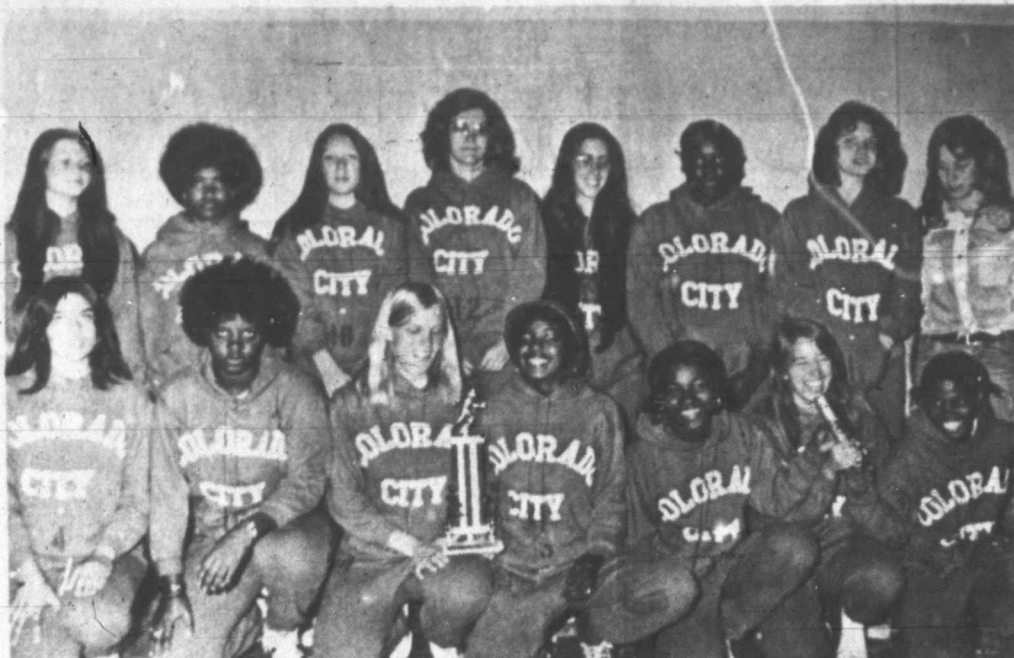

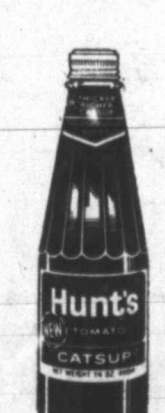

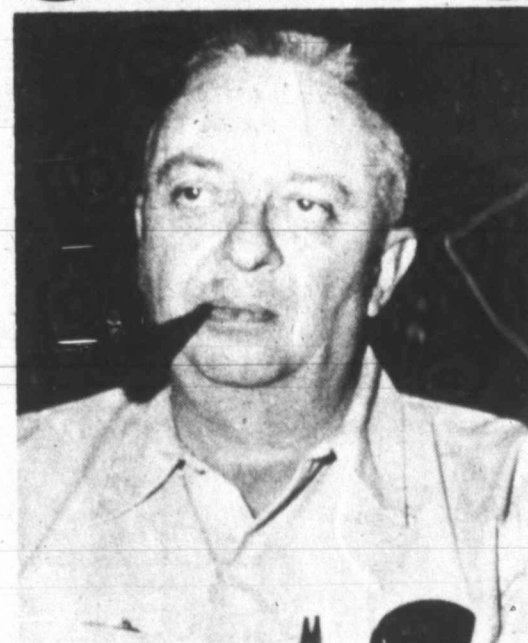

Tom Green led the Meats Team in scoring as the 10th high individual in judging classes and 9th in finishing scores.

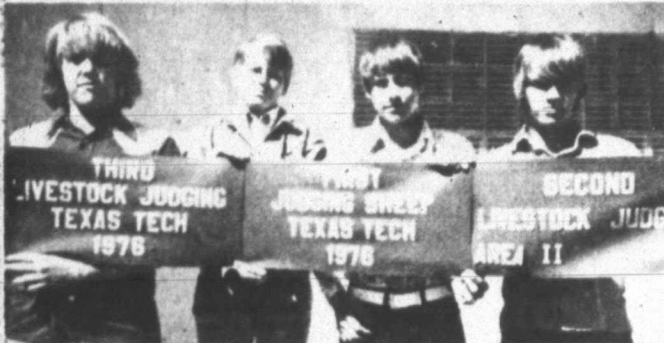
Ruben DeLoera led the Poultry competition and ended up, only eleven points out of the top ten person.

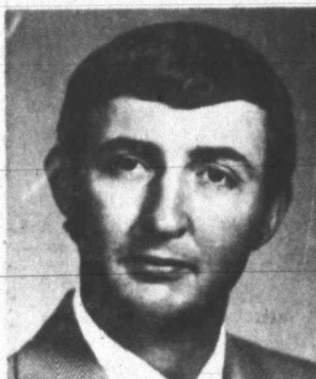
