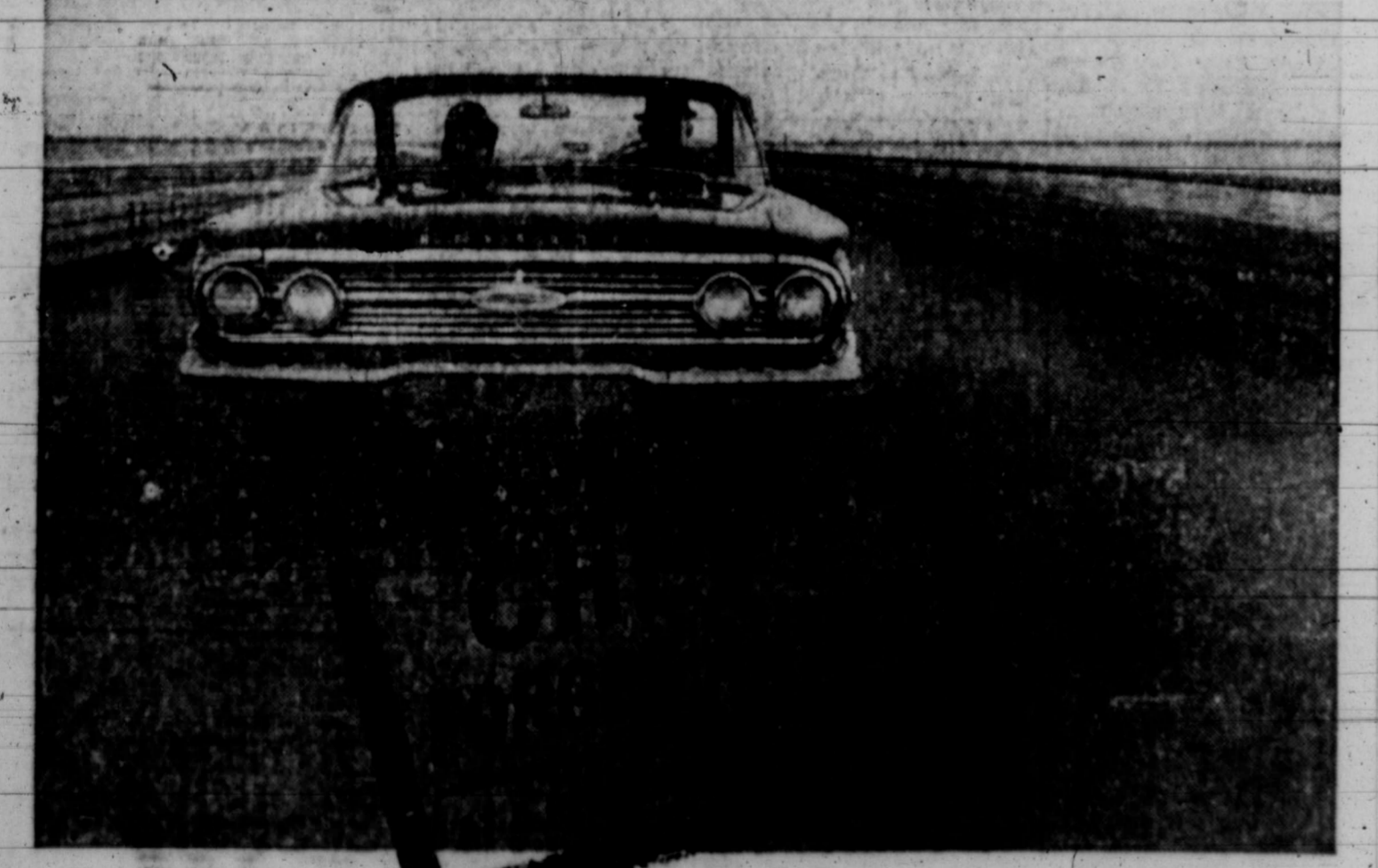

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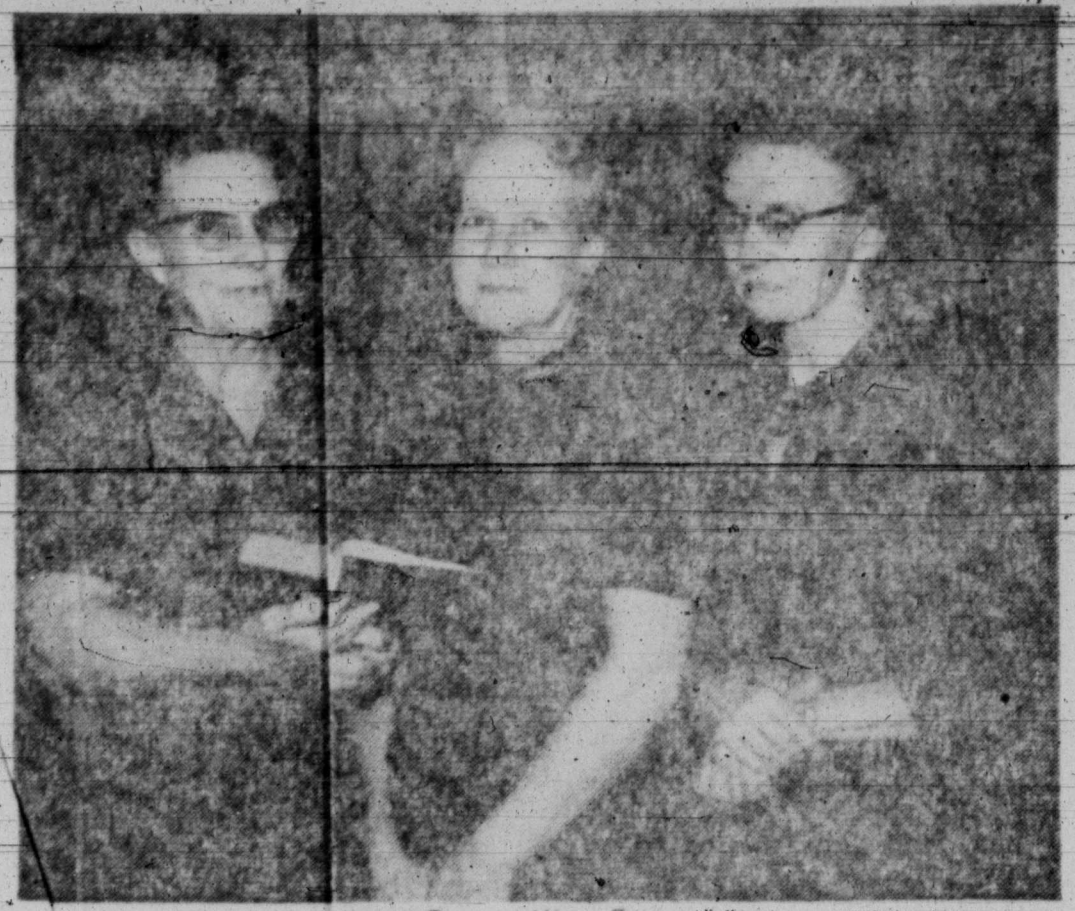

MRS. TAYLOR Use of Apples Told By Agent

Mrs. Cricket B. Taylor, county home demonstration agent, explains some of the advantages of the apple for modern food.

"The apple has been featured in fact and fiction down through the centuries," she stated.

She stressed that in addition to being one of our most versatile fruits, the apple has additional advantages.

"The pure pleasure of enjoying a juicy, crunchy apple is a good reason within itself for eating one," she explained.

She said that in recent years recognition has been given the apple for its roll in dental health — the apple contributes important bulk to the diet, gives exercise to the jaws and gums and is listed as one of the detergent foods for the teeth.

"Apples contain some vitamin A, a number of minerals and varying amounts of vitamin C and are medium sized apple contains less than 100 calories," she stressed.

Mrs. Taylor tells us a recipe for putting apples and sweet potatoes together.

Use 3 medium size sweet potatoes, 1 medium sized apple, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 3 tablespoons fat.

Cook the sweet potatoes in boiling water until tender; cool, and skin. Slice the sweet potatoes and apples and place in alternate layers in a greased baking dish. Sprinkle each layer with sugar and salt and dot with fat. Add a little water and bake for 15 to 20 minutes or until the apples are soft and the top layer is brown.
