

May Day Demonstrates Split Between Red, Non-Red World

Mayday 1949—60th anniversary of a day proclaimed to demonstrate unity among the world's workers—showed instead the split between the Communist and non-Communist world.

The Soviet Union, which has adopted the international observance as its great national holiday, yesterday put on a spectacular display of military might in Moscow's Red Square.

Prime Minister Joseph Stalin, with members of the politburo, took the salute. Cheering thousands passed in review while military aircraft including a strong display of speedy jet planes flashed overhead.

Defense Minister Alexander Vasilevsky trumpeted more charges of "American war plans" and continued Soviet denunciations of the Atlantic Pact.

All Communist-dominated lands flexed their muscles in similar but smaller demonstrations. They were cheered by claims from their Communist brethren in China of vast new victories in the Shang-

hai-Nanking-Hangchow area.

Parades and mass rallies filled the streets of Warsaw, Prague, Bucharest, Budapest, and Sofia—capitals of the satellite countries. Speakers pledged of support for Russia and denounced "national Deviationists" such as Marshall Tito of Yugoslavia.

But Yugoslavia hit back. At Mayday celebrations in Belgrade that country's Communist Party attacked not only western "imperialists," but the "monstrous, slanderous attacks" by the eastern Communist bloc.

Outside the Iron Curtain the divisions were much more obvious. New York Saturday had rival "loyalty day" and left-wing parades four blocks apart. "Loyalty" marchers outnumbered the others five to one. On Sunday Vice-President Alben W. Barkley told 30,000 at a Roman Catholic sponsored rally that the American "way of life is the best ever found by the children of man."

The system of two parades was followed in many cities.

In Berlin and Rome the Communists got the crowds. Nearly 300,000 Germans marched under Red-flags in the Soviet sector of the city. Western section rallies were small and quiet.

About 70,000 jammed the Communist demonstration in Rome. Only 15,000 attended an anti-Communist labor demonstration.

The Pope gave Mayday blessings to the "entire world of workers." The Pontiff told a large group of workers from the Naples cannery:

"The church loves the person of the worker, blesses the contract of labor, defends the just salary, blesses the family and the healthy house for the worker, possibly built upon his own piece of land, and blesses all the world of the workers."

About 150,000 Irishmen turned out in Dublin for an anti-Communist meeting protesting the imprisonment of Josef Cardinal Mindszenty and Archbishop Alojzije Stepinac of Yugoslavia.

Social Democratic demonstrations in Oslo, Stockholm, Copenhagen, Brussels and Vienna swamped the Communists.

London had fist fights in Trafalgar Square when a dozen persons carrying Red flags tried to violate a government ban on political parades.

Communist Chief Harry Pollitt tried to speak but was heckled—although not as much as last week when he was driven from Devonshire by citizens infuriated by the shelling of British ships in China.

Prime Minister Clement Attlee addressed a labor meeting in Norwich.

Both Jews and Arabs marched in Tel Aviv, Israel. Most of them belonged to the Socialist parties.

In Calcutta a bomb was thrown at police who broke up a Communist attempt to parade.

President Juan D. Peron of Argentina led government-approved celebrations in Buenos Aires. Lima, Peru and Caracas, Venezuela, under military rule, had no demonstrations. In Chile labor unions held mass meetings to denounce the "suppression" of labor in some other South American countries.

Big Narcotics Ring Broken In Dallas Area

DALLAS, May 2. (AP)—A tipster supplied officers with details they needed to seize \$22,400 worth of marijuana here and break up a narcotics ring operating in Dallas and San Antonio.

Two Dallas men were arrested here yesterday and San Antonio police arrested a third man last Friday.

Federal narcotics agents and Dallas police seized the drug at a bus station here when a man tried to claim a suitcase containing the marijuana. The tipster had told officers a man would try to claim the bag. He even supplied the claim check number.

Warren Heddens, head of the Narcotic Bureau's Dallas office, said the San Antonio man bought 16 pounds of high grade marijuana in Brownsville last Monday.

"He loaded the stuff into a suitcase and put it aboard a bus for Dallas," Heddens said. "Then he contacted a Dallas tavern operator."

The tavern keeper, in a verbal statement to Heddens, said he rode a train to Brownsville Wednesday where he met the buyer and picked up the claim check.

Coming back to Dallas, the tavern man turned the check over to a mechanic who was arrested when he tried to claim the bag.

Heddens said the men "were evidently engaged in a major operation" from the amount of marijuana involved.

Big Fire Loss In Marshall Blaze

MARSHALL, May 2. (AP)—Loss in the fire which destroyed two business houses at Avinger in Cass County was estimated at between \$50,000 and \$60,000.

The buildings destroyed Saturday night were those occupied by the Stewart Grocery Co. and the White Variety Store.

Emmett Starrett, of Avinger, suffered a severe leg cut from falling glass while battling the blaze.

HOUSE PROBE ORDERED

Charge Army, Navy Competition Unfair

WASHINGTON, May 2. (AP)—The House Armed Services Committee wants to know why soldiers and sailors can buy girls' nighties, expensive jewelry and television sets tax-free and at almost wholesale prices.

It ordered the start of an investigation today. Plans are to make a top-to-bottom study of the more than half a billion dollar business of Army post exchanges and Navy ship stores.

Public hearings will begin in two weeks before a subcommittee headed by Rep. Philbin (D-Mass.).

Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) ordered the probe after civilian retailers, and some business associations, complained that the military services are competing unfairly with them. The services do not pay federal excise taxes on luxury items, and some of their stores' expenses are met from government funds appropriated by Congress.

There are three classes of items sold, with limits on some of them. The first is the mandatory list which all post exchanges and ship's stores are required to carry. This includes candy, soft drinks and beer, tobacco, such toilet goods as shaving soap and hair oil, lipstick and hairnets, and stationery.

Second is the optional list. Items on this may be carried at the option of the officer in charge.

This group includes expensive cosmetics, watches costing up to \$75, toys up to \$15, athletic equipment up to \$100, ladies' handbags up to \$35, groceries and meats electrical appliances up to \$50, radios up to \$100, civilian clothing baby clothes, chinaware, bedding, and an item listed as "intimate apparel, female" up to \$15.

The third group is the special order list. Items on this are ordered through the Army and Navy stores. Committee staff members said the stores regularly order television sets, refrigerators, washing machines, and expensive table ware.

All military personnel are entitled to trade at those stores. In addition, some civilians employed by the services have trading privileges.

The stores do not pay rent for

the quarters they occupy, some of their utilities are paid by the government, and most of them are managed by Army or Navy officers. Profits of the stores pay for some of the utilities, and the salaries of all employees.

Some of the stores are limited as to the profit they can make, and in some cases profits are turned over to service recreation and welfare funds. Other stores are non-profit.

The committee said complaints have come from the American Retail Federation, the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, the American Drygoods Assn., and the Treasury Department. The last named claims the stores should pay luxury taxes.

Hoover To Receive Additional Honors

SAN FRANCISCO, May 2. (AP)—Herbert Hoover will get new recognition of his humanitarian efforts Wednesday.

Variety Clubs International announced the former President would be awarded in absentia \$1,000, a scroll and a silver plaque honoring him as the 1948 winner of the organization's humanitarian award.

Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, president emeritus of Stanford University, will accept the award on Hoover's behalf. The presentation will be made by Secretary of the Treasury John Snyder. Hoover was selected unanimously for the award by a jury of 50 editors and publishers.

Wallace Says Sen. Vandenberg Is Responsible For 'Pact For War'

DETROIT, May 2. (AP)—Henry A. Wallace says Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg (R-Mich.) is the author of "a pact for war."

The Progressive Party head told a May Day rally here yesterday that Vandenberg "more than any other single man" is responsible for the North Atlantic Pact.

Wallace, on a nation-wide "peace tour," termed the pact "merely another line-up of nations under the cover of anti-Communism for another holy war on Russia; just like Hitler's."

In Washington, Vandenberg declared comment.

"It was his (Vandenberg's) resolution last June that was the signal for the pact," Wallace said.

He declared that the \$1,130,000,000 sought to implement the re-

cently signed treaty "is only a down payment on a war policy."

Ultimately, he said, "a hundred times" that may be required.

Instead of the pact, Wallace recommended "building a stronger United Nations," and "returning to one world built on co-operation and unity."

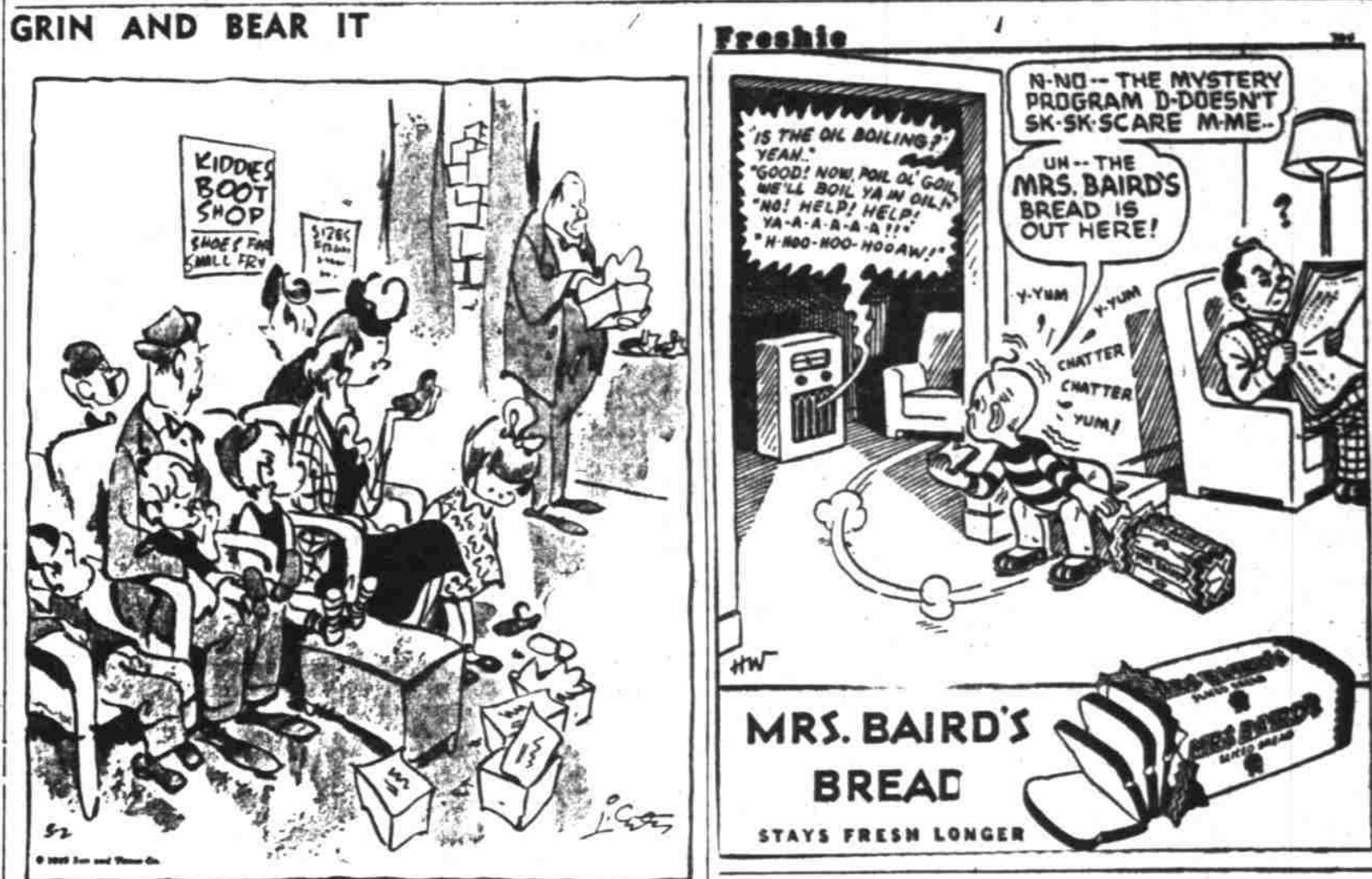

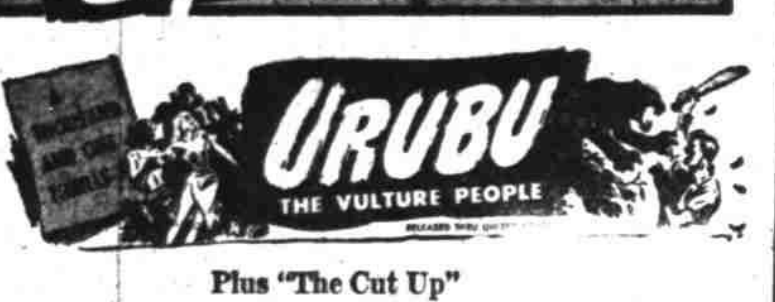

Transcontinental and Western Air lines, Dallas, alleged victim of a parachute that didn't open lived to complain lustily. Last week, it filed suit against the United States Government in federal court for \$6,340, plus interest.

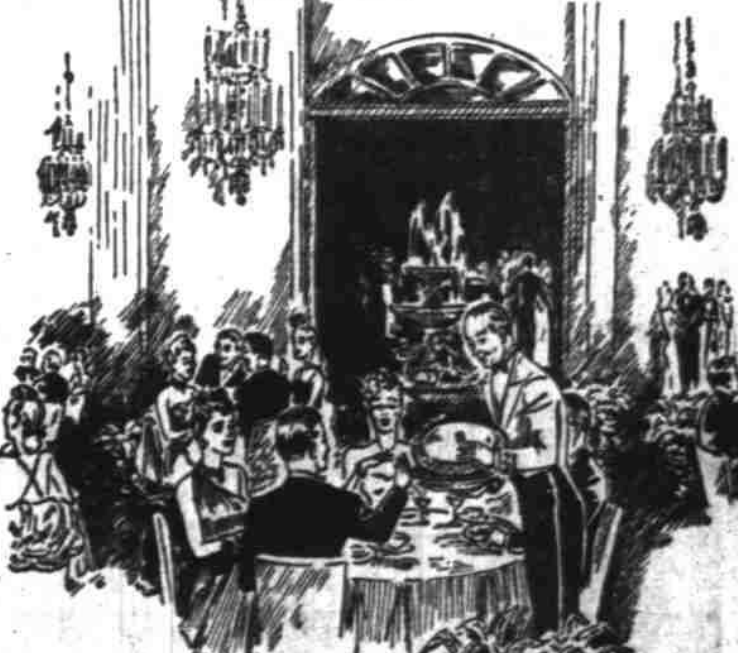
