

Killer Shoots Victim 5 Times In Back

The killer of Major Bell was cruelly calculating and merciless — making certain his 56-year-old robbery victim could never identify him.

That is as exact as officers could be Wednesday as they probed meager clues for a trail to the murderer's identity.

There may have been one or more in the ill-fated robbery that traded about \$150 for the life of Bell, night attendant at J & J Gulf Service Station, located at Interstate 20 and State Highway 208 (to Snyder).

Examination Wednesday established definitely that Bell

was shot in the back while outside his station.

Five .22 caliber long bullets crashed through his body. One entering at his mid-back and leaving in the area of his stomach. Three more in a line upward on the left side of the chest toward the heart area. One more on the chest's right side.

There were no witnesses as the night employee at the station for 3 years was robbed and slain.

Nearest officers can pin point time of the slaying is between about 12:20 a.m. and 12:41 a.m. Wednesday.

Bell had just started to eat his midnight snack of milk and cornbread when death came to him.

He fell with his glasses on outside the station, at the northeast side, contributing to the theory that he may have been "marched" outside and away from the front to be killed.

Five persons asleep in a car and pickup on the station's opposite west side — on the side facing State 208 — never stirred from their slumber.

Police were alerted at 12:41 a.m. By then, the killer or killers had already disappeared.

Whether on foot or in a car, officers are not certain.

Ernest Galvan Castillo and Lynn Prescott, Colorado City youths, and Ray (Red) McGee of Snyder discovered the robbery-slaying and notified police.

Castillo was the first to drive into the station, according to Police Chief Jesse Browning. He wanted gas but did not see the attendant.

As he entered the building looking for Bell, Prescott and McGee drove up.

Castillo found a quarter on the floor of the station.

Outside Bell was on his back beside the station. Two nickels were under his body.

City Patrolman L. C. Devorce had visited with Bell about 20 minutes earlier. The policeman had stopped at the station to buy some Roloids and the attendant was all right then.

So, within the next 20 minutes, for approximately \$150 in currency and silver in the cash register, the killer or killers committed their crime and escaped.

Officers took into custody later a motorist on Interstate 20 who had made comments about the crime and who told

Chief Browning and Assistant Chief Jim Latham he was "looking for that pistol" when they stopped to talk to him.

But officers made it plain that they did not consider the man a suspect and were only seeking whatever information he may be able to offer.

Both Chief Browning and Sheriff Lewis Claxton emphasized Wednesday they had no suspects in mind.

In fact, officers Wednesday were pointing more to the possibility that the murder was committed by someone who had robbed before and who forced Bell outside the station to si-

lence him forever by shooting him.

"They may have just been riding down the highway," Chief Browning said.

When a highway cafe reported that 2 men with long hair — hippie type, police were told — entered the restaurant and left hurriedly in their auto — area police were alerted to watch for them.

At 2:25 a.m. a motorist reported a male walking near Hickory and 8th St. had tried to flag him down.

Another alert concerned a man wearing an army type cap,

white T-shirt and blue jeans who was walking. Foot prints leading away from the station also were carefully checked.

However, officers reported no real progress from any of the reports.

If the robbery and gun shots had awakened the sleepers in cars on west side of the station, police would have been helped immeasurably.

Two men in a car parked at the northwest corner of the station, said they vaguely remember a firecracker sound. See KILLER

Police Checking Foot Prints, Mystery Car

Hunt for suspects in the slaying of 56-year-old Major Bell may shift to the state's metropolitan areas.

Reason for interest in the big cities is the report of a mystery automobile in this area Tuesday night, near the time the Colorado City service station attendant was slain.

Police Chief Jesse Browning, Sheriff Lewis Claxton, Texas Rangers Sid Merchant and Gene Graves were busy Wednesday afternoon gathering information from the police communications teletype network and by long distance telephone.

As the data was gathered, they became more interested in a known criminal wanted for federal firearms violations and bond jumping. Police data forwarded to Colorado City described the man in his late 20's as "Extremely dangerous."

An automobile belonging to the man's wife was reported in Big Spring around midnight within an hour of the Colorado City murder.

If the report is correct, it may tie in with the appearance of several persons at a Colorado City Restaurant about the time of the killing.

Police were told there were two appearances at the cafe — one by a group and another by a single person looking for a group.

There may have been 5 in the entire group — 2 women and 3 men.

The car and the appearance of the group at the cafe could link up to foot prints which officers observed at the service station and have been carefully checked.

They traced the tracks, lead-

ing from where Bell's body fell outside the station's east side, until they lost the prints in rough country.

However, officers believe they found the same tracks leading to the cafe.

The new information concerning the car, the group showing at the restaurant and the tracks

adds to one theory that the gunman left a car, then walked to the station alone and then returned to the vehicle after committing his crime.

It is believed that the man reported on the run from federal firearms charges has connections in the Dallas-Fort Worth area and has been sought by police for months.

Wife Remained At Home • She Prepared For Vacation

Except for a vacation that now will never be, two persons may have been slain here Tuesday night instead of one.

Mrs. Major Bell has been in the habit of visiting with her husband nightly as he handled his duties at J & J Gulf Service Station.

But vacation was coming up within a few days and for 2 or

3 nights Mrs. Bell had remained at home to sew.

She stayed with sewing again Tuesday night and was not with him when a merciless killer entered his station and shot away his life.

If Mrs. Bell had been with her husband as usual, she probably would have been killed too.

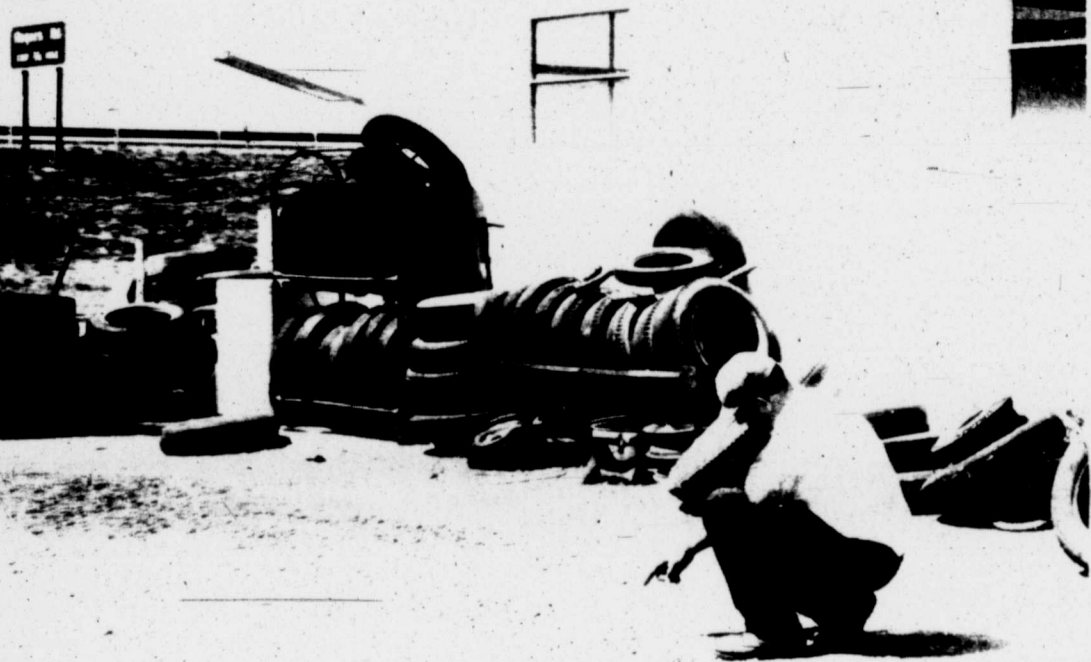
The Bell residence is at 201 West Fairmont and members of the Bell family live in four states.

Mr. Bell was born in Red River County Feb. 14, 1915, and had lived in the Colorado City area most of his life. He had resided in the Hyman community and married Mary Yancey in Sterling City April 7, 1944.

Survivors, in addition to his wife, are four daughters — Mrs. Betty Maness of Lubbock, Mrs. Ellen Rich of Colorado City, Mrs. Wanda Jordan and Miss Karen Bell of DeQueen, Ark.; three sons — Dewey Bell and Elgie Bell of Cuyahoga Falls, O., and Donal Bell of Stockton, Cal.

Also surviving are four sisters — Mrs. Lou Holmes of Brownfield, Mrs. Maurie O'Rear of Balmorrea, Mrs. Florence Ward and Mrs. Mary Bradley of Colorado City; five brothers — R. C. Bell of Cuthbert, Ollie Bell of Colorado City, Tom Bell of Odessa, Buck Bell of Winters and Charlie Bell of Hobbs, N. M., also 16 grandchildren and 1 great grandchild.

Services for Bell, a member of Pentecostal Holiness Church, were pending Wednesday at Kiker-Rains-Seale Funeral Home.

No Vaccine Now Horses Are Quarantined

There is no vaccine in Colorado City or this area of West Texas for the Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis that is spreading in South Texas.

And it will not be available until another 7 to 10 days, according to Dr. J. D. Williams, local veterinarian.

Williams conferred with state livestock commission officials by phone Wednesday as concern increased locally over the spread of the "sleeping sickness" that strikes horses and humans.

The vaccine is experimental and is being released first to the area where the outbreak is evident.

"They told me that they were making every effort to head it off," the doctor said, "and confine it to the present area."

"So all available vaccine now is going to the South Texas area."

First shipment of the vaccine released for this area probably will be in the latter part of next week or later.

"Best thing for horse owners to do now is to phone our office here and list the number of horses they'll need vaccine for," Williams said.

Definitely in effect now for all of the state — including Mitchell County, of course —

is a U. S. Department of Agriculture quarantine.

No horses, mules, donkeys can be transported from one county to another during the quarantine. Neither can these equine animals be shipped out of state.

Movement of a horse will not be allowed until the horse has been vaccinated for a period of at least 14 days.

The disease had spread to 9 South Texas counties Monday. These include Matagorda, Refugio, Calhoun, San Patricio, Aransas, Nueces, Cameron, Hidalgo and Starr. Unconfirmed cases were reported also in Harris County.

Wreck Is Fatal Maddox Son Rites Monday

A Colorado City youth who lay helpless beside his overturned pickup for hours died Monday in Abilene's Hendrick Memorial Hospital.

Funeral service for Jim Ty Maddox, 21, was Tuesday at 5:30 p.m. in First Presbyterian Church in Sweetwater.

Maddox was severely injured at about 11:30 p.m. Sunday when the 1971 model pickup he was driving overturned twice on Farm Road 2319 about 11 miles southwest of Roscoe.

The youth, who planned to enter McMurry College in the fall and play football, was en route to the Maddox family's ranch home southeast of Colorado City.

With his foot smashed and other injuries, the former Colorado High School athlete lay at the side of the highway until discovered by passersby Monday morning.

Jeanette Chamness, Colorado City Record employee and her family, were on an early morn-

ing trip to Six Flags at Arlington when they saw the injured youth.

He was in the middle of the highway, she said, and his head was almost on the white center line. Despite the all-night ordeal, the youth was conscious and rational.

While others went for assistance he talked of his concern for his mother and dad.

Phone Workers Honor Pickets

Pickets for striking Western Electric employees kept Southwestern Bell Telephone installing, maintenance and business office personnel from their job here Wednesday.

All seven of the workers respected the pickets and did not cross the line at 8 a.m.

Bill Gilliland, the phone company's manager for Colorado City-Snyder, and Monte Wood, supervisor for installers and maintenance workers, immediately manned switchboards and began performing other work to maintain phone service.

The Western Electric pickets took the Southwestern Bell employees off their work prematurely. Strike by the Communications Workers of America, which is the union for the phone company workers, was not scheduled until Friday.

However, Western Electric had workers here on maintenance for Western Electric equipment the Southwestern Bell office, so pickets were placed here when Western Electric strikers began leaving their job.

Gilliland, emphasized also that the strike now in progress is between Western Electric Company and the Communications Workers of America. At issue in the strike are terms of a new contract for employees of Western Electric.

"This strike does not involve either Southwestern Bell or its employees," he said. "Contract negotiations for Southwestern Bell employees represented by the CWA are scheduled for mid-year. Meanwhile, the contract between Southwestern Bell and CWA, which will not expire until July 17, remains in full effect."

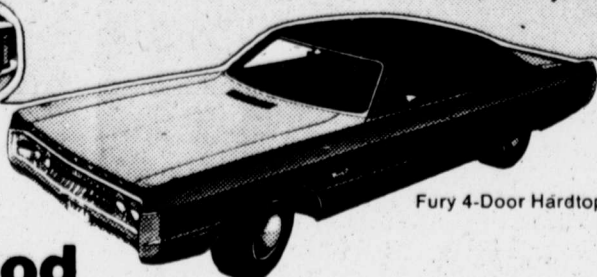

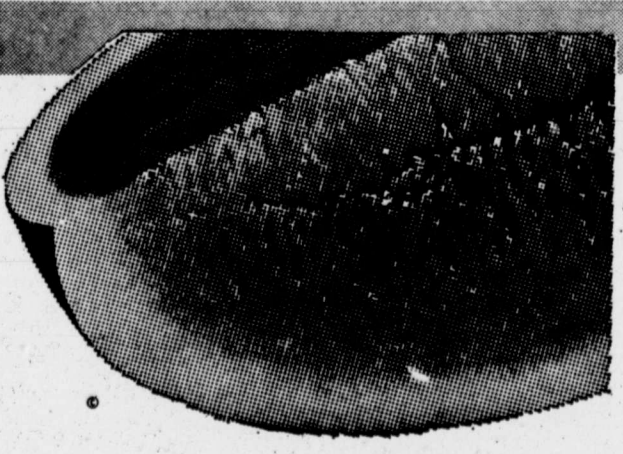

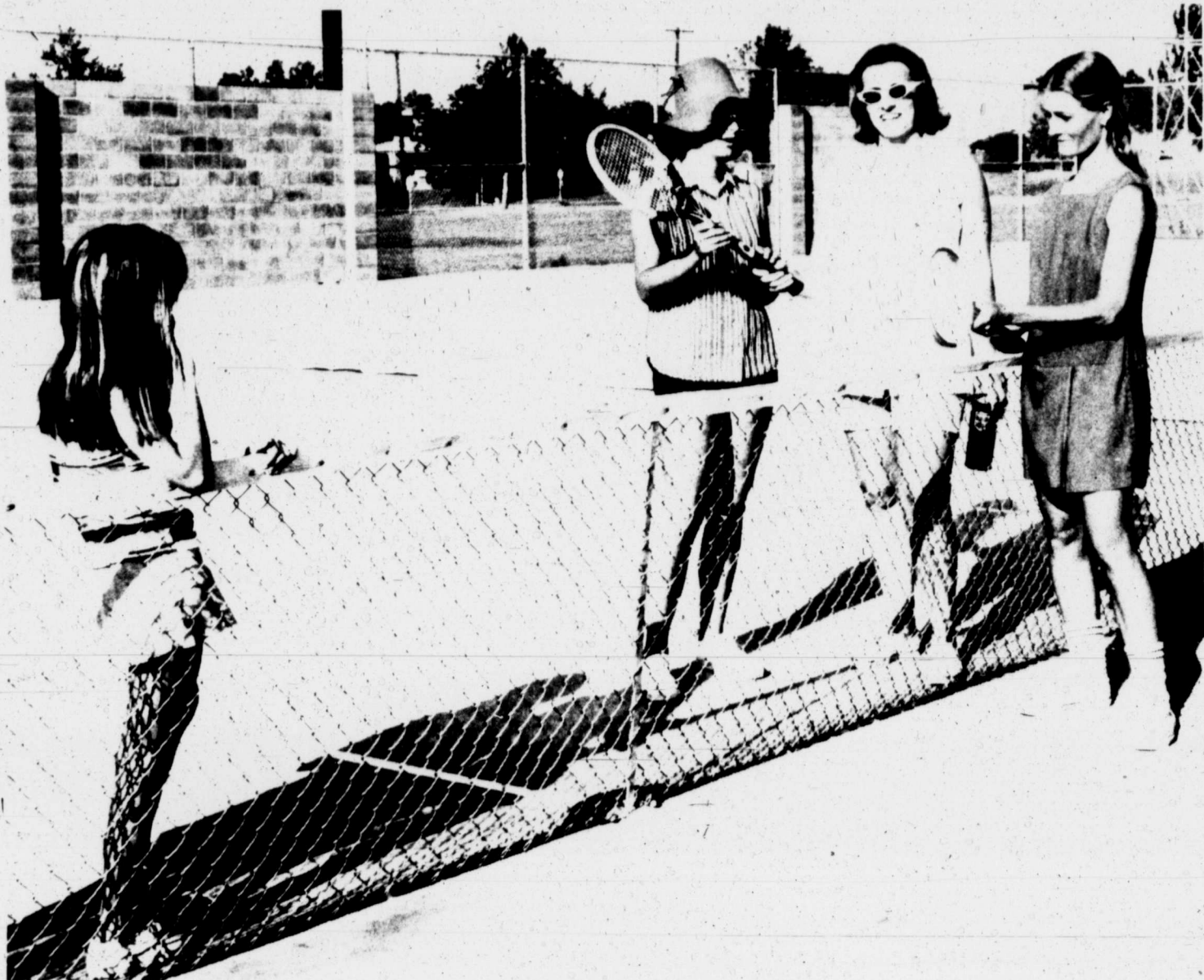
