13 MILE CONSTRUCTION

Farm To Market Road Contract Let

A contract for 13 miles of construction on F. M. Roads 2835 and 2230 in Scurry, Mitchell, and Howard Counties has been awarded to a Abilene firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

E. M. Bailey Contractors & F. A. Seidel Co. submitted low bid of \$253,325.59 on the project. Grading, structures, base and surfacing on F. M. 2835 (from FM 1606 to Mitchell County line) and on F. M. 2835 from Scurry County line to F. M. 1808 and on F. M. 2230

from FM 846 north to U. S. 87 is expected to take 130 working days, according to J. C. Roberts, District Highway Engineer at Abilene.

Joe Smott, Resident Engineer at Big Spring will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

CIVIL DEFENSE

TEA Plans To Start Monitor Courses

On January 1, 1965, the Texas Education Agency, in cooperation with the State Office of Defense and Disaster Relief, will inaugurate a financial incentive program to encourage trained radiological monitor instructors to teach the 16-hour monitor course throughout the State.

Based upon the needs of the individual community for radiological monitors to enhance the civil defense capability, instructors may be called upon to instruct the 16-hour radiological monitor course. The instructor will be paid at a rate of \$5 per hour plus certain reimbursable expenses up to \$10 for incidentals.

Known as "RAMONT" Training, the program is new only in the sense that in-

structors are to be paid for services rendered. "Many radiological monitor instructors have been trained in Texas, yet only a few are willing to contribute their time and talents to train others at the local level," stated John W. Christian, State Training Specialist.

Beginning January 1, 1965, the Civil Defense Adult Education Program, under the auspices of the Texas Education Agency, will be expanded to include radiological monitor training. TEA will administer the program through the public school system in close coordination with the local Civil Defense Director.

Instructors will be paid out of local school funds and the

"REMEMBER THE ALAMO"

-- the cry that fanned Texas' defeat to victory!

On March 1, 1836, thirty men from Gonzales broke through the lines of Mexican Army Commander Santa Anna to increase the Alamo's defenses to 187. This little band of heroes held the Alamo against overwhelming odds for five more days in one of the most heroic struggles to be found in the annals of man.

On March 6 Santa Anna with over 4,000 troops stormed the Alamo, and the last of the heroic band of Texans died fighting. Names like William Barret Travis, James Bowie, Davy Crockett and James B. Bonham became immortal.

The massacre at the Alamo inspired General Sam Houston's men at the battle of San Jacinto. Crying "Remember the Alamo!", the Texans sprang upon Santa Anna's soldiers and in a swift bloody fight won Texas its freedom.

Rockets Can Miss Fire Like Tractor

Editor's note: The Shinery Flats Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Bone Hollow Creek explains how to read a newspaper, his letter this week indicates.

Dear Editor:

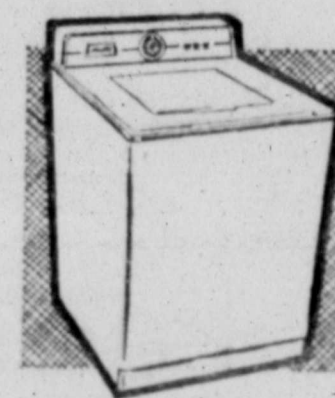

Garrison Appoints Executive Assistant

Colonel Laurence T. Ayres, U. S. Army retired, assumed duties on December 1, 1964, as Executive Assistant for resources planning in Texas.

The appointment was made jointly by Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., State Coordinator for Civil Defense and State Emergency Planning Director, and Major General James E. Taylor, Chairman of the Governor's Emergency Resources Planning Committee.

Colonel Ayres occupies offices in the Emergency Operating Center at the Texas Department of Public Safety in Austin. He will coordinate the scheduling, planning and administrative support of the Emergency Resources Planning Committee and sub-committee meetings and conferences.

The new State position filled through a contract between the State of Texas and the Federal government in which the State will provide the Federal Office of Emergency Resources Planning for Texas.

The State committee, consisting of various State department heads and key businessmen in fields pertinent to activities in which research will be conducted, will complete, test and submit a program of resource management that is National in scope.

To be completed before February, 1966, it will include plans for emergency use of resources in fields of manpower, health, transportation, service trades, production, pet-

roleum and gas, solid fuels, food, water, telecom, communications, construction and housing, electric power, and public information.

In writing the plan, close coordination will be maintained with the Office of Emergency Planning and those Federal agencies having routine resources responsibilities.

Colonel Ayres is a veteran of 25 years with the Infantry. He retired from the military on July 28, 1964, while stationed at Fort Sam Houston, in San Antonio. His last assignment was to the Deputy Chief of Staff of Personnel where he was Chief of the Personnel Services Division.

A native of Arkansas, Colonel Ayres entered the military service in January, 1942. He served in the interior of China during World War II, completed two assignments in Korea, and was on peace-time duty in the Panama Canal Zone. He has attended Infantry School, Command General Staff College, Special Warfare School, and Strategic Intelligence School.

His family has resided in

Austin for the last 3 1/2 years. In addition to his wife, Virginia, he has three daughters, Carol, who will graduate from the University of Texas next Spring; and Ann and Nancy, who are students at Stephen F. Austin High School.

school will be reimbursed the full amount by the Texas Education Agency, explained Ralph Mock, Civil Defense Coordinator for TEA.

Instructors to conduct this training will be selected from graduates of instructor courses given by the Engineering Extension Service, Texas A&M University; Office of Civil Defense Staff Schools; and instructor courses formerly conducted by the Texas State Department of Health.

Complete details on the program may be obtained from the local school superintendent or Civil Defense Director.

More instructors will be trained in a 30-hour course that will continue to be offered by the civil defense training staff of Texas A&M University under the University Contract Program of the Federal government.

In the event of a nuclear attack, trained monitors will be required to furnish information essential for the protection of the people. Monitoring services will be required from the period shortly after a nuclear attack until the radiation hazard from fallout diminishes to the point that normal activities may be resumed without significant danger of the population of a community.

"Operation Deathwatch" began at 12:01 A. M. Thursday, December 24th and continues until 11:59 P. M. Sunday, January 3rd," said Major, Leo Gossett, Commander of the 49 county West Texas Region of the Department of Public Safety today.

"During this period Patrolmen from the License and Weight and Motor Vehicle Inspection Services will be assigned traffic duties along with the Highway Patrol in an effort to reduce these traffic violations that contribute to traffic accidents," Gossett stated.

"May we urge all motorists to drive legally and safely during this 11 day holiday and accept their responsibility of safe motoring and prevent the 105 traffic deaths from occurring that have been estimated for this period. Past experience indicates many of these tragedies can be prevented if motorists will shoulder a personal responsibility of common sense and good judgment and remain alert and attentive to the job or driving at all times," Gossett stated.

"Texas is already experiencing its highest traffic accident loss in history, and if the holiday estimate is reached, our State will record over 3,000 deaths this year, an all time high for Texas, he reflected.

"Won't you do your part so that you and your family may return to experience a happy and prosperous 1965," Gossett asked.
