With the opening of the Tornado Club Annual Rodeo only three weeks away, feverish activity on the part of various committees has been shown this week.

At a meeting of the directors of the club this week, it was decided to ask all businessmen, employees and citizens of Lamesa and Dawson County, to cooperate with the publicity committee in adding interest, by wearing some sort of Rodeo or Cowboy paraphernalia.

R. E. Simpson Dies Today In Hospital At Cleburne; To Be Buried In Lamesa

Word was received in Lamesa Thursday just after noon that R. E. Simpson Sr., had passed away in a Cleburne hospital, of pneumonia and heart trouble.

About two weeks ago Mr. and Mrs. Simpson took their son R. E. Jr., to Glen Rose for treatment and Mrs. Simpson decided to have a general checkup. He had suffered from a heart ailment, but his condition had not been of a serious nature. He was stricken the latter part of last week and it was decided to take him to Temple for treatment. However, his condition became so bad that they were compelled to stop at Cleburne, where he was placed in a hospital. Doctors from Temple and other points were summoned to assist the Cleburne physicians. Wednesday afternoon of this week his trouble was diagnosed as pneumonia and very little hopes were held for his recovery.

Mrs. Dixie Kilgore, a sister, and her husband, Mrs. Lon Huddleston, another sister, and Bube, Ross and Guy Simpson, brothers, were with him when he died, together with his immediate family.

Mr. Simpson was born in Coryell County sixty-four years ago. He lived there with his parents until 1893 when he came to Borden County, living there until 1900. He accepted a position with Slaughter Cattle Company where he worked until 1906, when he moved to Lamesa.

Upon moving to Lamesa he became the city's second postmaster, which position he held for eight years. During his term as postmaster he was assisted by his father.

Fall Amounts To As Much As Six Inches In Places

Plenty of Moisture Great Aid to Crops

General rains ranging from 96 inches to 6.21 inches, fell over Dawson County this week and covered every part of the territory with sufficient moisture to take care of growing crops and enable those who have not already done so, to plant crops.

The rain began falling Monday afternoon and continued intermittently throughout the night and until about noon Tuesday. A high wind preceded the fall Monday, and some damage to crops is reported, however not of too serious nature. Some hail was reported in the Hancock community, but the Courier has not been able to learn the amount of territory covered or the damage done.

O'Donnell suffered the worst flood in its history, when between ten and twelve inches of rain fell there Monday night within a few hours. The town was practically under water and several homes and business establishments suffered damage due to the water backing into buildings. Crops in that vicinity were heavily damaged.

Heaviest rainfall in Dawson County came from the Orson station east of Lamesa where a total of 6.21 inches fell. The lightest fall reported was the McWherter station in the Punkin Center section.

Ernest Conley Is Killed When Car Overturns On Big Spring Road Friday

The entire section was saddened Friday morning when the news broke of the tragic death of Ernest Conley, manager of the Lamesa J. C. Penney Store, in an automobile accident early that morning. Mr. Conley was instantly killed when his car overturned, supposedly following a blowout, at about midnight Thursday night, on the Big Spring highway fourteen miles southeast of Lamesa.

He had been visiting with a brother in Big Spring and was returning home alone when the accident occurred. Mrs. Conley and the two younger boys were in Lubbock, while the two older boys were on a Boy Scout camping trip in New Mexico. Complete details of the accident are not known as he was alone and no one witnessed the accident.

A passing motorist discovered his body, which was thrown some forty or fifty feet from where the car stopped. His car was practically demolished, and it is believed that death came to him instantaneous. From tracks along the highway, it is believed a tire blew out causing him to lose control of the machine.

Mr. Conley came to Lamesa four years ago to assume the management of the local Penney store. His family arrived a short time later and they have been an integral part of the community since that time.

His former home was in Lubbock. He was a member of Allen Brothers American Legion Post of Lubbock, Veteran of Foreign Wars, the Masonic Lodge and Lions Club. He was a civic leader in this community.

He had formerly been associated with his father in the mercantile business in Lubbock, and upon the death of the elder Conley, he and his brother operated the store until 1930. He accepted a position with the Penney Company a short time later and served as assistant manager.

She did not know who her mother was, until recently, when her father informed her that her mother was living and told her where she might find her.

Mrs. Gandy took a bus to Houston to spend Mother's Day with her mother, Mrs. Golan, who has since married again, recognized her daughter without introduction, even though the last time she had seen her, she was only three years old, and seventeen years had elapsed in the meantime. A picture of the reunion between mother and daughter was carried in a Houston paper.

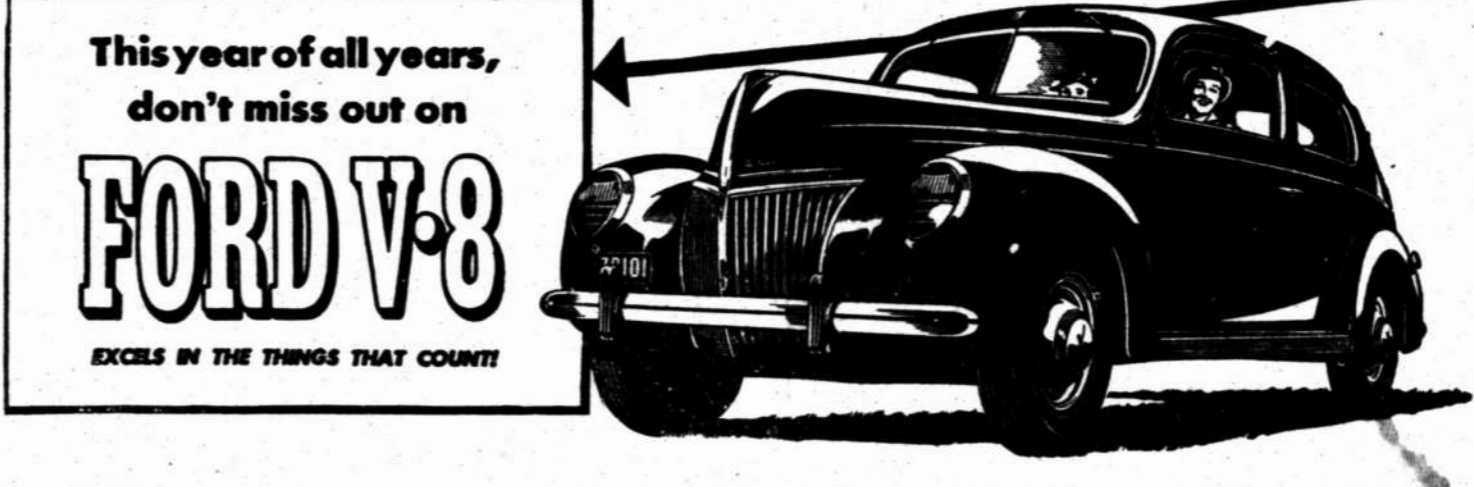

Dead Oil Struck At 4657 Feet In Magnolia Wildcat

Rumored That Co. Intends Going Deeper

The Magnolia Petroleum - J. B. Fry, test well, located about ten miles south of Lamesa, continues drilling this week, despite a sulphur odor encountered the latter part of last week.

Wednesday morning a deal oil deposit was struck at 4657 feet, in the same hard lime formation in which they have been drilling for the past several hundred feet. The lime was encountered at 3670 feet. It is not known how deep this test will go, but it is rumored that unless oil or strong sulphur water is encountered it may go to six thousand feet or even more. However this rumor is strictly rumor and could not be verified by the Courier. The large rotary rig which is being used, is said to have a depth capacity of more than eight thousand feet, but whether the company intends going to any such depth, could not be learned. Drilling was going steadily ahead Thursday.

In 1914 he gave up the postoffice to devote his entire time to the affairs of the bank. In 1916 he disposed of most of his bank stock, but continued to serve as vice-president of the organization until April of 1917, at which time he resigned.

In August of 1917 he again went to work for the Slaughter interests, having complete charge of their holdings in this territory until 1919. In 1920 he and his family moved to Uvalde where they made their home until 1922, at which time they returned to Lamesa to make their home.

In June, 1923 he took over the agency for the Texas Company in Lamesa and has operated it since that time.

Mr. Simpson served as Mayor of Lamesa from 1926 to 1928. He was a pioneer member of the Presbyterian Church in Lamesa and throughout all the years of his residence in Lamesa he has been a civic and religious leader.

Besides his widow he is survived by three children, R. E. W. F. Scarborough Dies Last Week

Funeral services for W. F. Scarborough, well known West Texas rancher, were held at the First Baptist Church in Midland last Thursday afternoon.

Mr. Scarborough, 72-year old Midland rancher, was well known to many people in this section, having ranched in adjoining counties for a number of years. He died in a Kermit hospital Tuesday June 20th.

He was born in Lexington, Texas January 3, 1867, resided in Jones County while a young man, having married to Miss Kara Wyman, on March 28, 1885. His wife preceded him in death August 1, 1937. After living for a while at Matador, they moved to Midland 39 years ago and their residence has been there since. Meanwhile he operated ranches

in various parts of the Midland territory and at the time of his death, owned 100 sections in Winkler, Andrews and Loving counties, and in Lea County, New Mexico. On these ranges he had well bred Hereford cattle, also a number of producing oil wells.

L. G. Hogle Moved From WPA Project

Mr. L. G. Hogle, resident engineer for the Lamesa School Improvement Project, has received orders to report to Austin where he will assume duties. Mr. Hogle has been present on the Lamesa, Union, Gall and Seminole and Seagraves projects since January.

He is assigned to Travis County and Austin where projects costing \$7,286,713 are under construction and where applications amounting to \$4,280,063 are pending.

F. E. Whitaker will succeed Mr. Hogle on the Lamesa project and will have headquarters on the projects in one of the offices in the new physical education building.

These gentlemen represent the Federal government when Federal funds are being used in aiding construction as engineers and in other capacities.

The major portion of the Lamesa project was completed in May. The work remaining consists of repairs and alterations to the old elementary and high school buildings and is expected to be completed some time by the last of July.

The total disbursements for Lamesa in which the Government has participated to the extent of 45 per cent grants amounts to \$148,000.

New Compliance Rules Are Given

Due to the large number of farms requiring a recheck after compliance each year, the County Committee of the Dawson County A. C. A. has determined a policy to be in effect for 1939, which will eliminate a part of this difficulty. Before a farm can be checked this year it will be necessary for the producer or operator to be present or have a representative present. This is for the purpose of identifying interest of the various crops on the farm and to see that the various plots on the farm are properly measured and located on the aerial photograph. After the farm has been measured by the compliance reporter, the aerial photographs will be turned in to the county office where the plots comprising the farm will be measured by a planimeter, and the acreage set down on a crops report sheet. The crop report sheet will then be mailed to the producer for his approval. If the producer determines that an error has been made in the measurements, a complaint will be entered in writing at the county office and a signed request made for a recheck. The producer will also be required to leave on deposit at the county office the amount of money necessary to recheck the farm. If the recheck determines that the producer was correct the amount of the deposit will be refunded, if the recheck determines that the reporter was correct in the original measurements, the amount of the deposit will be used as a regular receipt of the Dawson County A. C. A. office.

At the time of the approval by the producer of the crops on the farm in 1939, which shows to be in compliance the producer will be asked to sign his application for parity. Of special interest also to the farmers of the county is the change in the policy of the State Office permitting all farms in the county who have completed compliance before December 31, 1939, to make application for soil conservation payment before January 1, 1939. This procedure will enable the farmers of the county to receive both parity and soil conservation payments much sooner in 1939 than was possible in 1938.
