'Round-Up For Reagan-Bush' To Open In Hereford

Governor Bill Clements and former Governor John Connally will kick-off a 23 city "Texas Round-up for Reagan-Bush" tour Aug. 27, in the Texas Panhandle.

Reagan-Bush Chairman, John Armstrong, said the tour - aimed at stimulating voter registration, get out the vote efforts, volunteer recruitment and campaign leadership identification - will draw participants from 195 counties.

Clements and Connally will fly from Austin to Hereford for the first three panhandle rallies August 27 at 10 in the morning in the Bull Barn. They will hold a news conference immediately after the rally of Reagan-Bush supporters.

At 1 p.m. the campaign leaders will

make an agricultural tour in the Hereford area.

A second rally and news conference are scheduled at the Tradewinds Airport in Amarillo beginning at 2 p.m.

Clements and Connally will attend a barbecue and rally in Pampa from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the M.K. Brown Auditorium.

Wayne Thomas and Garth Thomas are chairmen of the event in Hereford. Wales Madden III and Nadine Gregg are in charge of the Amarillo rally. Jim Campbell and Bobbie Nesbit head Reagan-Bush Round-up activities in Pampa.

Mayor Jerry Hodge of Amarillo, Regional Chairman for the Reagan-Bush Campaign, will coordinate the panhandle activities.

Alcohol, Biomass Fuel

Seminar To Be In Lubbock

The public is invited to a hearing on a new federal program to assist in production of alcohol and other biomass fuels according to FmHA District Director Donald R. Perry.

The hearing will be held at the Holiday Inn on Avenue H Friday, August 29. The all-day-hearing will begin at 9:30 a.m. and the morning session will break at 11:30 a.m. The hearing will resume at 2 p.m. and runs till 5 p.m. The evening session will be held 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. Assistant Agriculture Secretary, Alex P. Mecure, will preside at the hearing.

Perry said everyone is invited to attend the entire meeting or any portion they wish. Anyone wishing to speak or present written testimony about the proposed regulations are invited to do so. Copies of the proposed regulations are available at the Farmers Home Administration, a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, will carry out part of the energy security act of 1980. That part is Section 2 of the bill designed to produce 920 million gallons of biomass fuel annually by end of next year. The proposed plan calls for Farmers Home Administration to provide direct loans on the farm production of biomass fuels of "alcohol, ethane, and methane" and provide guaranteed loans to medium scale commercial facilities. Reducing our dependence on foreign oil is a high national priority.

Farmers Home Administration has been designated to help farmers and others to get into production of alcohol and other biomass fuels. The public hearing is an important part of that effort.

Early Childhood Screening To Be Conducted At School

Early Childhood Screening is to be done in Hart Elementary School for pre-kindergarten age children. The screening program is conducted in order to locate those children who show characteristics that are considered typical for children who have learning problems.

"Yes" answers to at least 10 of the questions listed below, may indicate that a child will have learning problems, especially in the school setting. This does not mean that the child is unintelligent. Most children who suffer from learning disabilities have at least average and often above average intelligence.

Those who feel that their child will benefit from screening, should bring this check-list to the Hart Elementary Early Childhood room, Tuesday, Aug. 26, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, or 1 p.m. to 3 p.m.

Is your child extremely daring?

Is your child easily distracted?

Is your child a discipline problem?

Is your child always up and down from the table during meals?

Does your child seem to "tune-out" at times?

Does your child find it necessary to touch everything he/she sees?

Does your child frequently walk into things or trip?

Is there inconsistency in your child's performance? (i.e. one day he/she performs a task well, the next day he/she can't)

Does your child have a short attention span?

Does your child have frequent headaches?

Does your child frustrate easily?

Was your child a late walker?

Was your child a prolonged tip-toe walker?

Was your child's speech late or abnormal (difficult to understand)?

Did your child have trouble learning to skip?

Is your child's voice excessively loud or soft, or does he/she speak in a monotone?

Does your child have difficulty naming familiar objects, or consistently fails to understand directions?

Does your child consistently cry when left with a sitter, or has behavior which provokes unkind attitudes and expressions from others?
