## 30th Annual Christmas Program Set

The Annual presentation of a Christmas program by the combined choirs of the local churches will be this Sunday at 7:30 p.m. in the First Baptist Church. Dr. Charles Ray is the pastor.

The first annual Christmas cantata by the Community Choir was presented in 1952 at the United Methodist Church with Gwen Patterson directing. The idea originated with the pastors of the United Methodist Church, Rev. Jim Sharp, and of the First Baptist Church, Rev. Lee Ramsour. The two churches have alternated since then in furnishing the place and providing the director.

Opening the program this year will be the Joy Ringers, a ladies handbell choir from the United Methodist Church. They will play "Introit and Processional," as they proceed down the aisle, followed by "Come On, Ring Those Bells," "Stille Nacht, and "O Holy Night." The last number will be with piano accompaniment by Diana Hawthorne.

Ringers are Nancy Montgomery, Margaret Carter, Beth Huffaker, Shirley Holloway, Chloe Jan Wells, Ann Hamilton, Betty Owens, Beckey Davis, Alth Thomas, Mackey Turner, Judy Holden and Nell Cotter. Betty Green is the director.

The community choir will present the cantata, "Christmas Rhapsody" by Don Wyrzten. It is described as an exciting and charming choral collection of individual Christmas songs - both new and traditional.

Mrs. Hawthorne will be the pianist. Hazel Bennett will be the organist and Clint Walker will serve as narrator. Soloists include Mrs. Cotter, Beth Askew, Vivian McAfee, Debbi Webb, and Mrs. Carter. Mark McAfee will play "Silent Night" on the guitar. Mrs. Green, Director of Music at the United Methodist Church, will conduct.

The public is invited to attend the annual musical program.

## Barns In County Are Burglarized

Burglars struck five barns or farm shops in the southeast part of the county last Friday night, but in only one of the reports was anything listed as missing. Some of the barns contained only cottonseed, according to the Lynn County sheriff's office.

One shop from which about \$250 worth of items were taken was that of Chan Thomas, about 8 miles southeast of Tahoka. Missing was a Lincoln electric welder and two welding helmets.

Also on Friday night, six pipe wrenches and some socket wrenches were stolen from a tractor owned by Mack Forbes of O'Donnell.

Crime Line has offered rewards for information leading to the clearing of either of the above cases. Crime Line phone number is 998-5145, day or night.

A 28-year-old Tahoka man working to clean out an elevator shaft at Bartley-Weaver Grain was bitten on the finger by a white cat he was trying to get out of the shaft Nov. 29. He took the cat home and it died five days later after having convulsions. The animal's head was sent to Austin for determination of whether it had rabies.

County law requires a 10-day observation period for animals involved in biting incidents, Sheriff Stanley Krause reminded citizens this week. The animal may remain in the custody of the owner with the consent of the victim or be kept by a veterinarian or animal shelter. Fees are charged for impounding.

In jail during the last week were two persons for aggravated assault, two for public intoxication, and one each for disorderly conduct, driving while intoxicated and assault.

On Friday night, Tahoka police received a call from a Tahoka man saying that he was going to shoot or kill anyone who came around his house. Officer Kenneth Cogburn went to the man's residence and was told by him that he had taken an overdose of pills and was feeling groggy. Officer Cogburn then took him to Lynn County Hospital to be examined. While at the hospital, the man became hostile, vulgar to the officer and also to hospital employees. He had his stomach pumped out and then was arrested for drunkenness. He was fined \$78.50.

Police investigated an accident at the intersection of 1900 N. 3rd and Ave. M that involved a 1980 Buick driven by Zuma McWhirter of Tahoka and a 1975 Mercury driven by Kelly Gordon Draper of Tahoka. There were no injuries.

On Monday at the intersection of S. 3rd and Ave N, a 1969 Chevrolet pickup driven by Roberto Ceniseros of Tahoka and a 1966 Ford pickup driven by James Wayne Dorman of Tahoka were in an accident. No injuries were reported.

One ticket was issued for failure to yield right of way during the past week.

## WOODWORK

A REPRESENTATIVE OF THE Texas Rehabilitation Commission came into the office recently and handed us a release designed to acquaint people with what this organization is and what it tries to do. We get a lot of that sort of thing in the newspaper business, so the man looked a little startled when I told him with probably more enthusiasm than he usually encounters that I certainly would use it sometime and that I have a very good feeling toward this particular group.

After he left I read the stuff and now I'm not so sure it's the same group that I thought it was, but apparently it has just changed its name from the old State Board of Vocational Rehabilitation. Because the man's card says he is named Wes Long and he represents the Vocational Rehabilitation Division of the Texas Rehabilitation Commission in this county.

They way they choose their people probably is to hire anyone who can say all that without stumbling.

What it means is that this group tries to help people with handicaps or disabilities to get jobs, or at least to get into a position where they can qualify for jobs.

When somebody becomes disabled to the extent that he or she can't continue in their jobs, or if they never have been qualified to hold a job in the first place, the Rehab people may help them in such ways as paying for special training or helping them to get an education, or helping them get surgery, therapy or mechanical devices or whatever is needed in their situation.

The reason I knew about the group is because had it not been

for them I might never have attended college myself. Since I had been a patient in Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for years as a child and had a leg all messed up with a bone disease and because the family really couldn't afford college for me, the Voc Rehab board paid my tuition, and I appreciated it.

(Our offspring probably will snicker at this and ask something smart like why didn't I go over to Abe Lincoln's log cabin and study with him?)

Anyway, the agency's release says a person must meet two requirements "to be eligible for Vocational Rehabilitation Division services: (1) he must have a physical or mental disability which results in a substantial handicap to employment, and (2) there must be a reasonable expectation that rehabilitation services will result in gainful employment."

I fooled them there. I did not choose to be gainfully employed. I chose to go into the newspaper business.

The release also praises people who hire handicapped workers and claims to be one of the few government programs actually returning money to the public coffers by getting people off welfare rolls and helping them to learn a trade or profession where they will pay taxes.

Combine caramels, sugar and water in saucepan. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until mixture is smooth and comes to a full boil; continue to stir constantly while mixture boils gently for 5 minutes.

Combine pop corn and peanuts in large baking pan. Pour caramel sauce over pop corn mixture and quickly toss, using two forks until pop corn and peanuts are

well coated. Spread mixture on cookie sheets. Let stand until cold, then break into clusters.

### SPICED PEANUTS

1 cup sugar  
1/2 cup water  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves  
1 pound roasted peanuts (blanched or red skins on)

Boil sugar, water and spices until syrup threads from spoon. Drop one pound of peanuts into syrup. Stir until nuts are dry looking. Pour out on waxed paper and let stand until cool and dry.

### CHOCOLATE COVERED PEANUTS

1 pkg. (6 oz.) semi-sweet chocolate bits  
2-1/2 cups roasted peanuts (with red skins on)

Melt chocolate pieces in top of double boiler over hot (not boiling) water. Add peanuts to melted chocolate and stir to coat. Turn out on waxed paper spreading so that peanuts are separated as much as possible. Allow to cool.

# Deregulation of your telephone ...how will it affect you

Deregulation: What does it mean to the nation's telephone industry — and the customers it serves? All of the hows, whys and maybes are not determined, but here are answers to some often-asked questions.

#### Q. What is deregulation?

A. Simply, it's the process of removing state and federal controls from many services provided by the telecommunications industry. It means customers can select equipment and services in a competitive market without regulation by a regulatory commission.

#### Q. When does it happen?

A. Deregulation isn't new. Federal Communications Commission rulings over the past three decades have allowed some competition in terminal equipment (telephones, multi-line systems, etc.) and in long-distance services. But deregulation surfaced as a major public issue when the FCC mandated total deregulation of new terminal equipment, effective January 1, 1983.

#### Q. Why does the FCC want the telephone industry to be deregulated?

A. The FCC believes competitive markets are most efficient. Deregulation — and competition — will encourage new services and open more options to customers.

Actually, the FCC is but one of the driving forces behind deregulation. Congress, the Justice Department and the Reagan Administration (like others before it) all are eager to deregulate the American telephone business.

#### Q. What is GTE's position regarding deregulation?

A. GTE feels that deregulation ultimately will benefit all concerned. Competition is the American way and GTE expects to compete aggressively.

#### Q. Just what services will continue under regulation?

A. After January 1, the basic local and long-distance switching networks will continue to be regulated. So will all in-place equipment on customer premises. New equipment will be excluded from regulation, as will "enhanced" services, which combine basic service with computer processing to provide additional, different or restructured information.

#### Q. How does this affect customers?

A. The big change is in lease and purchase arrangements for telephones, multi-line systems and other equipment in a customer's home or business.

After January 1, existing customers may continue to lease their phones from General Telephone. In addition, they have the option of purchasing phones — either from General Telephone or another supplier.

New customers also will be able to buy phones anywhere they choose (including General Telephone). Cost of equipment purchased by customers will be determined by the marketplace — not regulatory commissions. Lease options also will be available to new customers, but again will be determined by the marketplace — not the regulators.

There's another important point. By definition, anyone who alters existing service will be classified as a new customer. People who move from one residence to another — even though both are served by General Telephone — would be considered new customers under deregulation guidelines.

#### Q. Will all customers be affected by deregulation?

A. No. The FCC's order applies only to single-line service. Customers on multi-party lines may continue to lease phones from General Telephone with all the traditional services. For a period after deregulation begins, party line customers may have some options that will not be available after January 1, 1983 to single-line customers.

#### Q. Will it affect the cost of telephone service?

A. Deregulation will have an impact on virtually every aspect of the telephone industry — including cost. It should result in lower prices for some services and higher prices for others. The net effect of deregulation — and the competition it creates — is that each product or service provided by General Telephone must pay its own way, without subsidies from other segments of the business.

For example, revenues from various optional services have traditionally subsidized the cost of providing basic local service. That ensured basic telephone service was affordable to nearly everyone. But competition will force prices to more closely reflect the true cost of any service. Local rates probably will rise; others may decrease. Either way, customers will be asked to pay for the cost of the services they use.

#### Q. So what are the benefits to the consumer?

A. With deregulation comes competition. With competition comes the suppliers' desire to provide customers with what they want, when they want it, resulting in many options, introduction of new technology and keeping costs at the lowest possible level.

#### Q. Won't there be a lot of people who will be unable to afford a telephone?

A. GTE expects to help customers meet increases in telephone rates by phasing in certain options for flat rate pricing, including Usage Sensitive Service (USS) which is a measured service.

**PEANUT BUTTER BRITTLE**

2 cups sugar  
1/2 cup light corn syrup  
1/2 cup water

1/4 cup Skippy super chunk peanut butter  
1 teaspoon baking soda

Grease 2 large baking sheets. Place on wire racks. In heavy 1 1/2-quart saucepan stir together sugar, corn syrup and water. Stirring constantly, bring to boil over medium heat. Cook without stirring until temperature reaches 300 F on candy thermometer, or until syrup when dropped into cold water forms threads which are hard and brittle. Stir in peanut butter until well blended. Remove from heat. Quickly but gently stir in baking soda. Immediately pour onto baking sheets; do not spread. Cook 3 to 5 minutes or just until cool enough to handle; take the candy by the edges, and lifting it slightly, pull as thin as possible. Cool. Break into irregular pieces. Store in tightly covered container. Makes about 1 1/2 pounds.

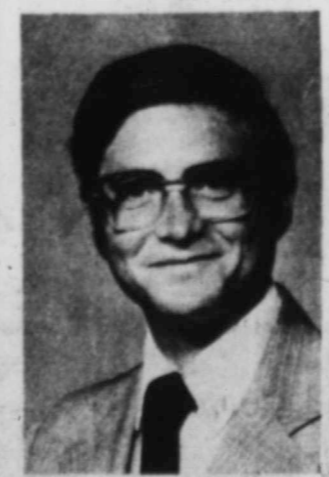

The business session covered the final two days of the meeting. Elected as the 1983 president is S.M. True Jr.

County leaders also attended several special conferences during the convention. Conference topics included livestock, transportation, field crops, natural resources, taxes and labor.

Officials of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, although wary of making predictions, "have a good feeling" about chances for getting significant changes in all-risk crop insurance coverage available from the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) and have suggested in person and by letter seven specific ways they believe the FCIC program can be improved.

PCG's cautious optimism, says Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, stems from a recent meeting in Lubbock with FCIC Manager Merritt Sprague. "Mr. Sprague gave every indication he is ready and willing to work with producers toward an insurance contract that will provide better coverage and, by reason of increased farmer participation, be more cost effective for FCIC," Johnson stated.

In PCG's most recent letter to FCIC the organization requests (1) that unit division guidelines used for the Individual Yield Coverage Program (IYC) be the same as those used for actuarial purposes;

(2) That an average of yields be used to determine IYC in instances where the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service has required that production from multiple units be combined for reporting purposes;

(3) That county ASCS committees be allowed to separate commingled dryland and irrigated production to prevent irrigated production from adversely affecting the dryland indemnity-premium ratio in counties where such a danger exists;

(4) That ASCS formulas be used for determining crop acres when crops are planted in any of the various skip-row patterns;

(5) That a positive cut-off date for abandoning an insured crop be established, i.e. 15 days after the date set by county ASCS offices for the crop to be planted initially, and that producers be given the option to replant to the insured crop or take adjusted-stage insurance;

(6) That a waiver of the planting requirement be provided on dryland crops, giving the producer protection against possible inability to plant because of inadequate moisture, and

(7) That the normal date for beginning harvest be changed from November 1 to something no earlier than December 1, since widespread harvesting of cotton on the High Plains seldom if ever gets underway by November 1.

Related to this latter suggestion, PCG also says the late payment charge of 1.5 percent per month is not now realistic and the interest charge should be tied either to the CCC interest rate at the time or to the cost of money to government.

"Acceptance of these suggestions," PCG believes, "would make the FCIC program less difficult for producers to understand, plus affording better crop loss protection."



**Sen. Huddleston To Address Cotton Meet:** Sen. Walter D. Huddleston (D-KY), ranking majority member of the Senate Agriculture Committee, will address the National Cotton Council's 45th annual meeting in Phoenix, Feb. 6-8.

Sen. Huddleston also is ranking minority member of the Agriculture subcommittee on production, marketing, and stabilization, and the subcommittee on export promotion and market development of the Small Business Committee. He also serves on the Appropriations Committee.

The Council annual meeting is expected to draw some 1,500 cotton industry leaders from across the Cotton Belt.

During the three-day session, delegates will review activities of the past year and adopt resolutions setting forth cotton policy positions and programs for 1983.

**Cotton Exports Rise:** Net new cotton export sales of 38,900 running bales for the week ended Nov. 25 pushed total commitments to 3,214,300 bales. The major buyers were Canada, 27,800 bales; Greece, 4,300; and Japan, 3,700. The week's export shipments totaled 75,400 bales, mainly to Asia.

**Rain, Snow Hampers Harvest**

High Plains cotton harvesting had not regained much momentum from the Thanksgiving snow and rain, according to Mack Bennett, Area Director from USDA's Marketing Services Office at Lubbock. Another cold front brought more moisture again Wednesday.

Back logs of seed cotton in trailers and modules allowed gins to maintain a steady but slower operating pace. Only a few caught up by mid-week and a couple had finished the season, Bennett said.

Growers took the opportunity to sell cotton. Equities of 1981 crop bought growers \$5 to \$25 per bale. Mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and higher, staples 30 - 32, mike 35 - 49 from the new-crop sold around 75 to 250 points above 1982 Commodity Credit loan rates.

Merchant demand increased slightly as shippers looked to fill December

and some January commitments. Suppliers from the two crops offered were heavy and merchants easily filled current needs.

USDA's Marketing Services Office at Lubbock classed 104,000 samples during the week ended Dec. 2 for a season's total of 315,000. This compares with 484,000 classed by the same date last year.

Predominant staples were staple 29 at 10 percent, staple 30 was 42 percent, staple 31 was 32 percent and staple 32 was nine percent for an average of 30.6 thirty-seconds of an inch.

Mike 35 - 49 was 81 percent, 33 - 34 was eight, 30 - 32 was eight and 27 - 29 was three percent for an average of 39.

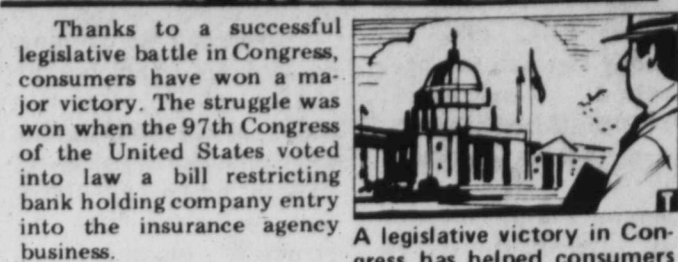

# CONSUMER CORNER



Thanks to a successful legislative battle in Congress, consumers have won a major victory. The struggle was won when the 97th Congress of the United States voted into law a bill restricting bank holding company entry into the insurance agency business.

How are consumers affected by this legislative victory? It means they will still be able to choose the best insurance terms and service free from the influence of credit. Spokesmen for the Independent Insurance Agents of America (IIAA) report that whether direct or implied, the results of credit tie-in are the same: chase insurance from banks simply to protect their source because insurance may be available elsewhere at lower prices or with better service. The result is that the rest of the market is fenced away by the insurmountable and unfair competitive barrier of banks' control of credit. Bank insurance sales actually choke off the benefits of competition, never giving it a chance to function.

As important as the bill is to the independent agent and the consumer he represents, enactment by the U.S. Congress represents a dramatic change in the Bank Holding Company Act. For years the IIAA repeatedly warned that in the absence of bank holding company prohibitory legislation, the present, widely acknowledged problem of credit tie-ins will simply be ignored, and the anti-competitive effects of tying will be permitted to take their course at considerable harm to both the consumer and the insurance agent.

This important victory by the HAA assures consumers what independent insurance agents have been offering for nearly a century—freedom of choice in the purchase of insurance.

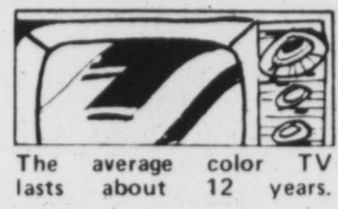

**Researchers evaluate use of methanol in automobile engines**

Research engineers at Texas A&M University are evaluating an alternative use of alcohol as an automotive fuel that involves storing methanol in the fuel tank and converting it to hydrogen to fuel the engine. Drs. Thomas Lalk, Richard Davison and William Harris, researchers with the Texas Engineering Experiment Station, are working under a Department of Energy grant to evaluate the use of methanol (wood alcohol) that has been chemically converted into a gas consisting of hydrogen and carbon dioxide or hydrogen and carbon monoxide. "There is a lot of interest in burning hydrogen in automobile engines," Lalk said. "It is possible that it will give higher efficiency and lower pollution

emissions than gasoline or methanol." The researchers' work is conducted in conjunction with the Lewis Research Center of National Aeronautics and Space Administration. Lalk is an associate professor of mechanical engineering and Davison and Harris are professors of chemical engineering at Texas A&M.

**Texas Highway Department To Cut Mowing Bill**

Texas highway roadsides may not be trimmed as closely next year but a new system should trim a \$30 million annual mowing bill. "The department spent \$30 million last year in mowing costs," DHT chief landscape architect

Craig Steffens said, "but we still got some irate calls when we let our rights of way get a little shaggy." He added that savings from that \$30 million will go to safeguard the state's multibillion investment in its highways. Steffens said, "We do plan to continue mowing to the right-of-way line adjacent to cultivated, developed and urban areas. But along

rangeland and untended property, we don't intend to mow except along the shoulder. "We hope Texans will understand that we are trying to save their tax dollars by establishing less costly priorities in our mowing operations," Steffens said. "We simply can't continue mowing from right-of-way line to right-of-way line on every highway."

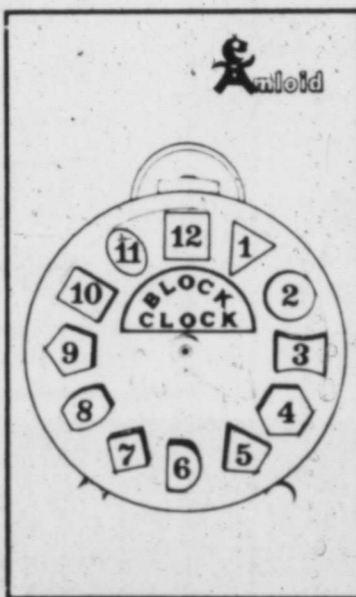
