Fewer Stop Lights Soon

Council Plans Change In Lights, Signs

The City of Colorado City within the near future will eliminate three and possibly five of the red lights downtown and undergo a complete replacement program of traffic and street signs in the city.

The lights and signs were just two of many items discussed at Monday night's City Council meeting.

purchase of a new fire truck, the lighting of school tennis courts, a request for a taxi service, an increase in Lone Star Gas Co. rates and other discussions.

several year old proposals to install lights at the school tennis courts at Locust and 14th and pay for the cost of electricity to run the lights.

The firetruck will cost \$6,143 for the cab and chassis from Hutchins Ford Sales and \$12,730 for the equipment from Boardman Co., Oklahoma City.

Also on the agenda was the

City Manager J.A. Sadler Jr. told the council that a state highway official had surveyed traffic lights in the downtown area and found that there is not enough traffic for any of the lights with the exception of the light at 2nd and Hickory.

The school will maintain the lights and pay for a water fountain at the courts. The fountain will be installed by the city.

The truck is to be picked up in Oklahoma City and delivered within 200 days. The bid was only slightly more than had been budgeted and some \$10,000 less than one fire equipment company representative told the council the truck would cost.

School Election 2 Positions Open

The Colorado Independent School District Monday night called an election for Saturday, April 7 for its annual election to fill two positions on the school board.

McCarley also indicated he will not seek re-election, saying that he believes six years on the board is long enough for any one board member.

However, city councilmen said they believed that several lights including stop lights at 2nd and Elm and 2nd and Walnut are needed for the convenience of pedestrian traffic.

The council also approved a request to ask for bids for two new police cars. Bids for intermediate priced cars also have been requested. The Council set a special council session for Feb. 26 to study the budget for the upcoming fiscal year.

The council also in March is expected to hear results of a study by Sadler on the need for a city-county supported taxi service, as requested by the retired teachers association.

The two positions to be filled for three-year terms, are now held by Ed Thrift, a one-term member of the board, and A. K. McCarley Jr., a two-term member of the board.

Candidates for election to the board can file applications at the school tax office, 256 Walnut. Deadline for filing is March 7.

Also under consideration are lights at 2nd and Chestnut and 3rd and Walnut. Apparently lights at 2nd and Oak, 3rd and Oak, and 3rd and Elm will be eliminated.

The council also accepted the low bid for a new fire truck.

The Lone Star Gas Co. informed the council of a gas rate adjustment as allowed in their contract with the city. The adjustment will cost the average gas user about 60¢ per year.

Brownfield Downs Wolves

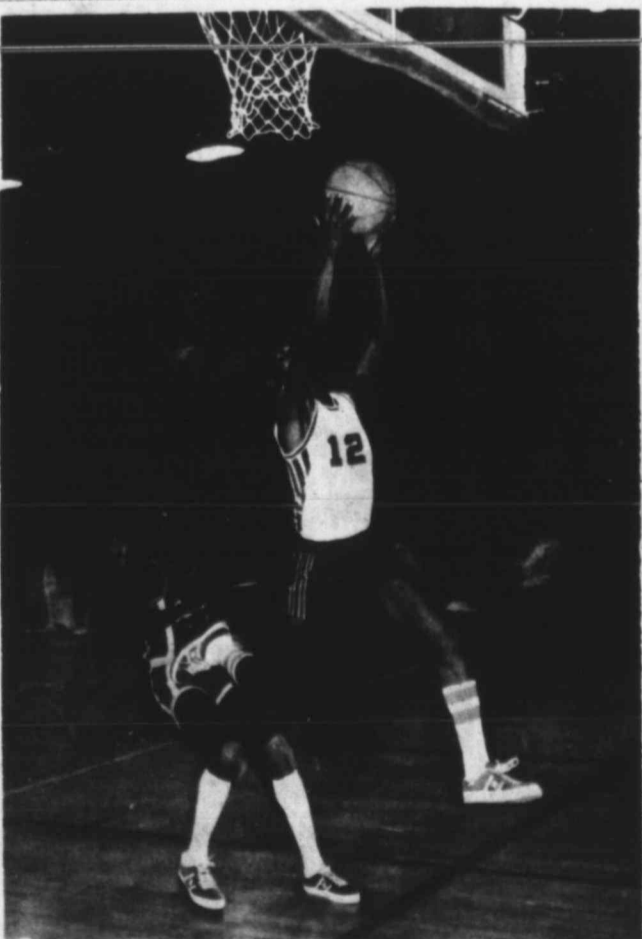
The Colorado City Wolves ended the 1972-1973 basketball season with a District 3-AAA loss to Brownfield Tuesday night, in games played here.

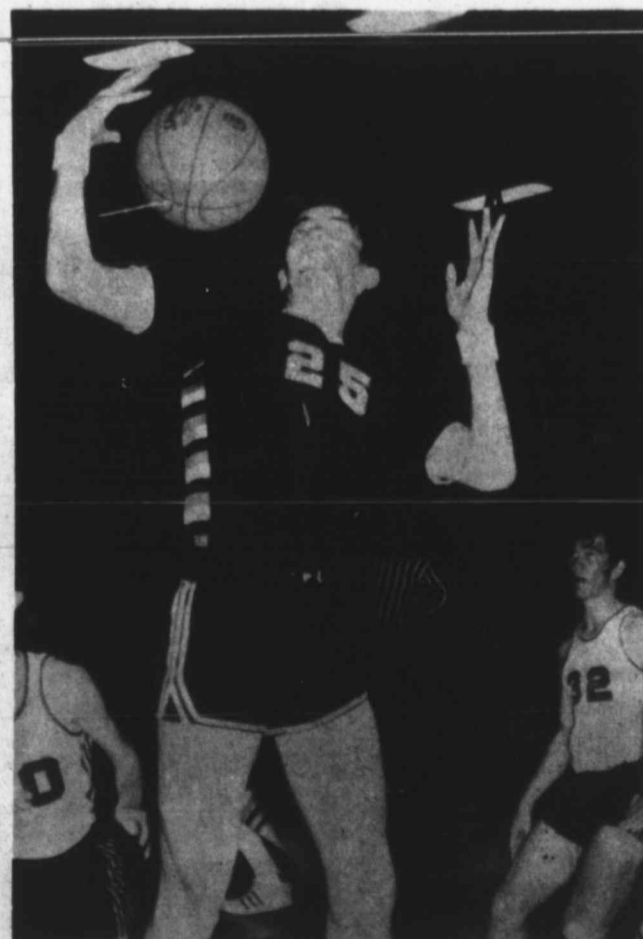

In varsity games, the Colorado City team won 15-13 and 15-13 with Darlene Taylor high scorer with nine points.



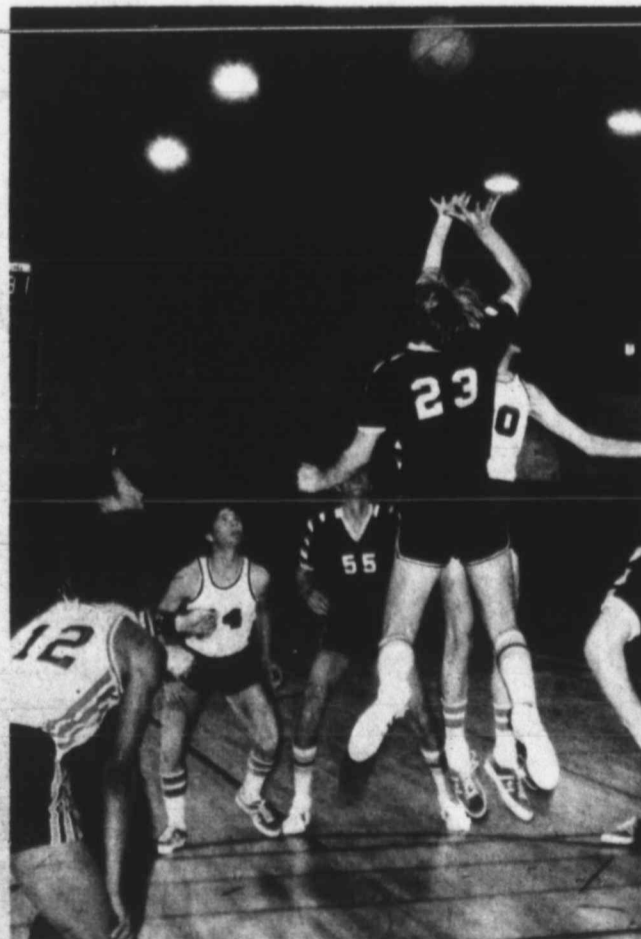

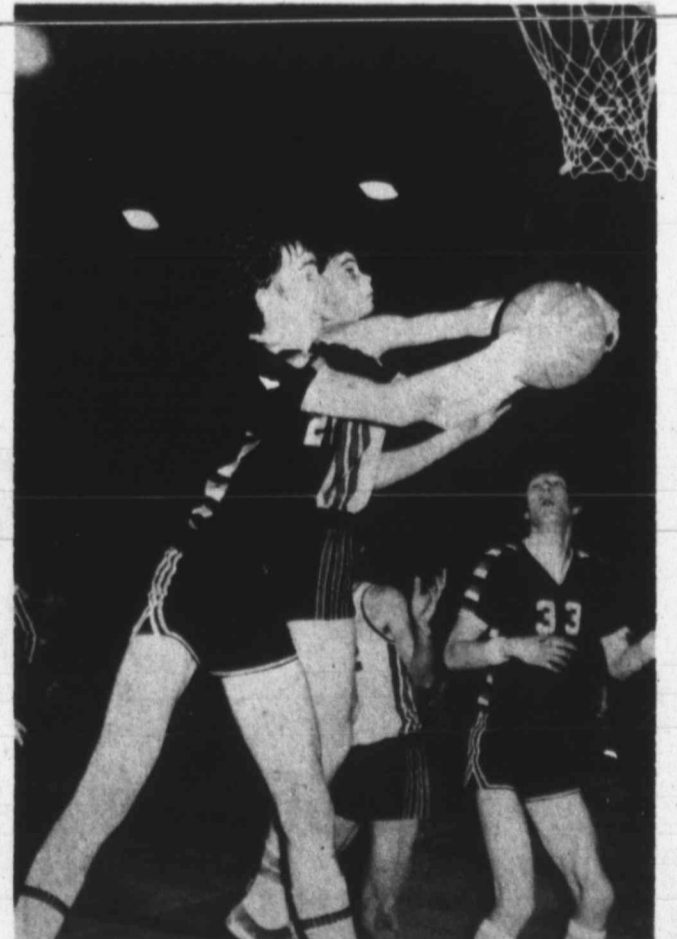
Look--No Hands

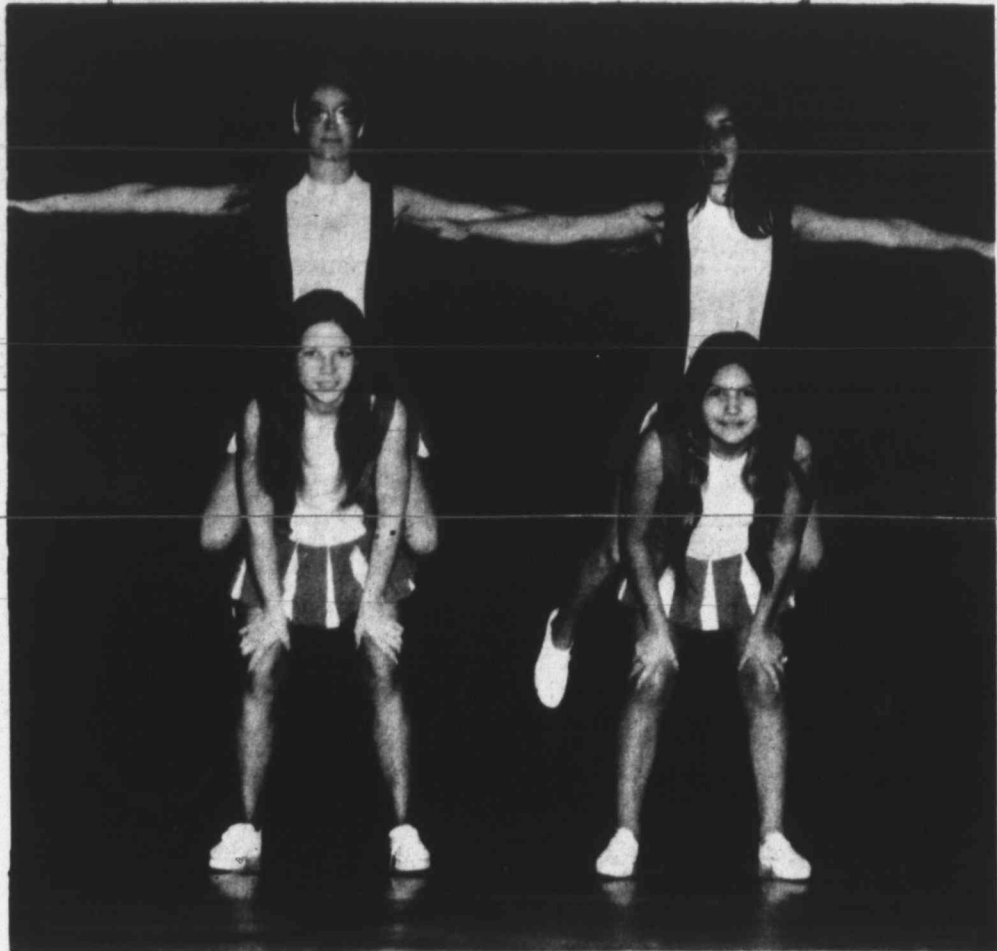

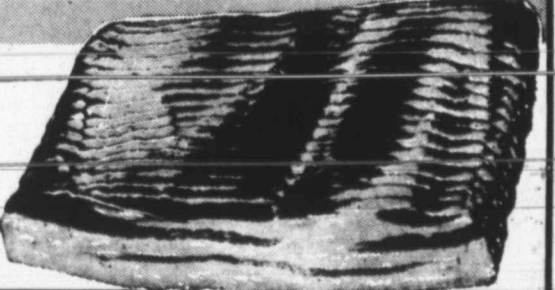

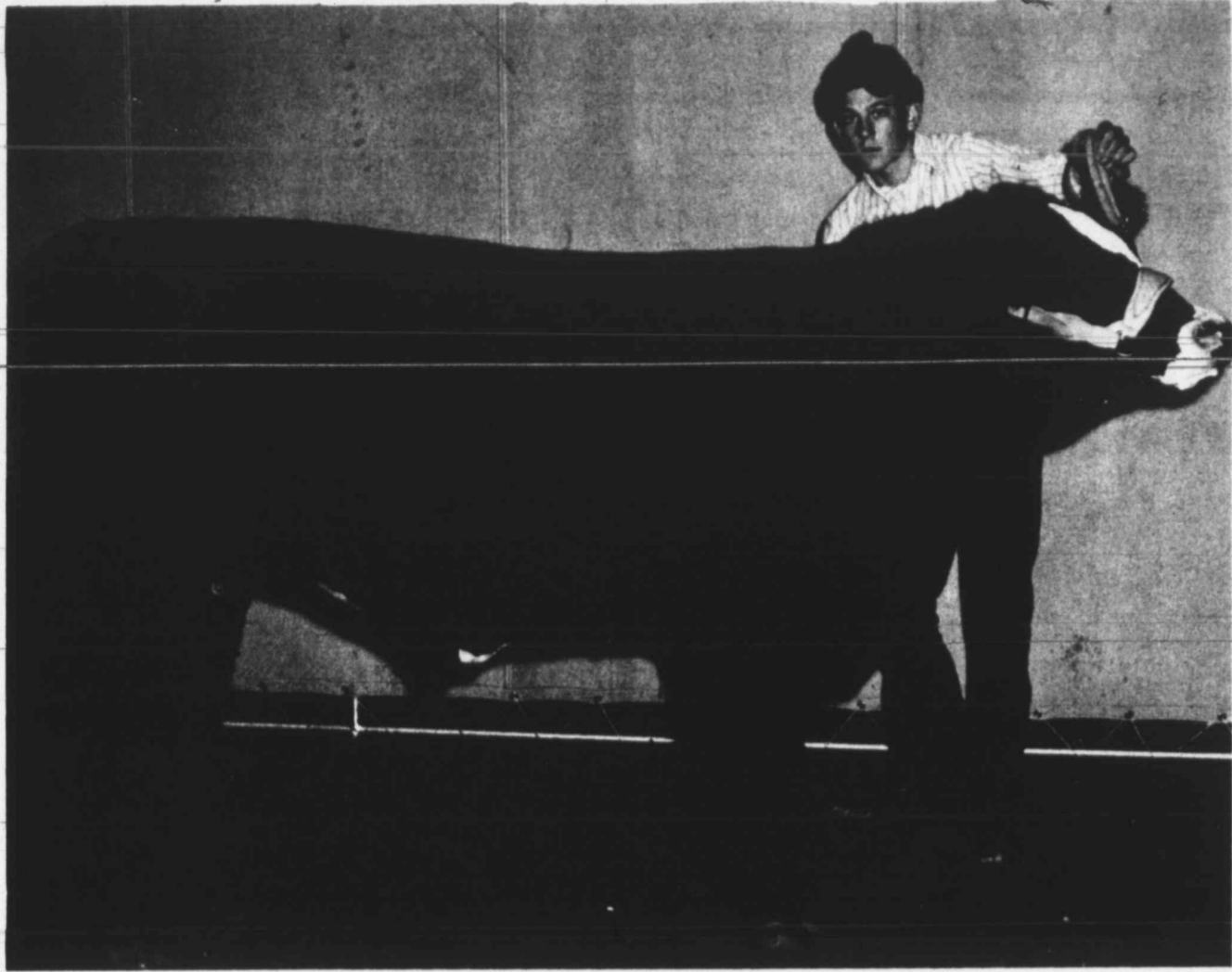

Jackson, 18, also is charged in the case but will be tried later as he is under conviction on a felony and cannot be tried without prejudice under law with the three other men.

Jury selection was made Monday and the trial got underway Tuesday. District Attorney Frank Ginzel called 16 witnesses to the stand.

Witnesses for the state were Stanley Shawn, Gena Goldwey, Mrs. Wayne Oliver, Lou Landeros, Dewitt Bender, Rudy Castillo, Jim Bob Holman, Marcello Alverly Jr., Bill McGuire, Jerry Matthews, L.E. Sublett, Kenneth Payne, Gene Gourley, Tommy Green, Fred Keith and Ben Sanclino.

The state rested its case Wednesday morning as did the defense represented by Attorney Dan Barber. The defense did not call any witnesses.

Shawn, son of City National Bank vice president and Mrs. Wayne Shawn, is a college student who was home for the weekend when the abduction occurred.

This is the story Shawn told from the witness stand:

He had gone to Safeway about 11 a.m. that Saturday, Oct. 28, to do some shopping for his mother. When he returned to his car, four men several with Afro-style haircuts, asked if he could give their car a start with booster cables.

Shawn said he did not have jumper cables and then got into his car. Then two of the men forced their way into his car at gunpoint and forced him to lay down in the back floor board.

The two men drove his 1972 Caprice to near Lorraine followed by the other two men in the other car. The men took all of Stan's money, about \$5, and then locked him in the trunk of the 1970 Duster they had been driving. The Duster had been stolen in Dallas.

Before locking him in the trunk, the men put a gun to his head, the gun had one shell in the chamber, they spun the chamber as in Russian roulette, and then pulled the trigger. Luckily for Shawn, the one bullet was not in the fired chamber.

The four men then left the scene in the Shawn car.

Shawn said he waited until he was sure the men were gone, then he tore out a rear seat speaker to get light. He found a pair of pliers and forced open the trunk.

Mrs. Wayne Oliver was driving by and stopped and gave Shawn a ride into Lorraine where he reported the abduction.

The long arm of the law caught up with the four men near Cisco when an officer, who heard a police radio description of the Shawn car, on his way to lunch, began chasing the four men in the Shawn car.

They abandoned the car about 2 p.m. Saturday and were arrested shortly before nightfall.

Shawn positively identified in his testimony Mallord and Marroy as two of the men who abducted and robbed him but he could not positively identify Sledge.

Ginzel expressed hopes that the jury would convict Sledge on what he termed strong circumstantial evidence in the case.
