Candidates Announce For County Offices

Ten Candidates Place Their Names On List

In this first edition of the new year ten candidates are placing their names in the political column of the Courier, for City County, Precinct and District office, with many more stating their desire to announce before the month is over.

In the race for the Mayor's office, W. B. McWhorter, has announced his candidacy, as has the present Mayor, W. L. Marr.

E. C. (Clyde) Adams, has placed his name on the list as a candidate for a City Commissioner's job.

Louis B. Reed has announced for reelection for the office of District Judge, of 106th Judicial District. W. W. Price of Brownfield is also making his formal announcement for the same office.

Jim Gary who resides in the northern part of Dawson, is a candidate for the office of sheriff. Other candidates asking for reelection are: R. W. (Buster) Herndon, for tax assessor-collector; W. M. Yates, county judge; Pauline Bulsterbaum, county superintendent; Mrs. Annie Crow, county treasurer and W. W. Beeman, for commissioner of Precinct 4.

\$11,903.77 Interest Collected From School Land

According to county tax records, \$11,903.77 in interests have been collected from Dawson County School lands during the year just passed. With 3700 pupils in Dawson county this gives an average of approximately \$3.22 per pupil.

These payments which far exceed any made in several years represent part delinquent and part 1937 payments.

CAR THIEVES CAUGHT IN LAMESA SAT.

Two automobile thieves who stole a car in Big Spring Saturday night, met their nemesis, in the persons of Jack Aldridge and his deputy, W. R. Weatherford, and are now reposing in the Big Spring jail.

The two thieves, Avery Anson, 31, and Robert Benny Moore, a youth of 17 led Constable Jack Aldridge and his deputy, W. R. Weatherford a chase of two miles or more, over country roads, at break-neck speed before they were finally caught and returned to the Lamesa house-gow, later they were turned over to the Big Spring sheriff, who placed them in jail there, where they will stand trial.

Moore who had his pockets full of keys stated to Aldridge that the only reason he did not get a car for himself was that he could not find one his keys would fit.

It is believed that Anson has a police record, and will be questioned regarding several other auto thefts.

Both men stated they had no homes.

DIVIDENDS TO BE PAID LOCAL SHAREHOLDERS

Little Rock, Ark., Jan. 3.—Dividends through December 31, in excess of two million dollars will be received by the 43,479 shareholders in the 112 insured savings and loan associations in Texas according to figures just compiled by the Federal Home Loan Bank. The current year has been a very satisfactory one for the Texas associations which have been quite active in the home financing field. In the past five months they have made 3,777 home loans aggregating \$7,019,456. Of these 1,750 loans, aggregating \$3,515,000 were for new construction and repairs of Tex. as homes. Since July 1, the Texas associations have made 1,011 loans totaling \$1,942,000 to assist owners in the purchase of their homes.

The aggregate loans in November for the five states of Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi and New Mexico comprising the Ninth Federal Home Loan Bank District, were \$2,910,000, being \$370,000 less than the total for the month of October. This decrease is in keeping with the expected seasonal decline in building activities.

The Lamesa Federal Savings & Loan Association has enjoyed a very fine business for the year 1937 and has increased assets of thirty thousand dollars over 1936.

On December 31, 1937, dividends were distributed to its shareholders making the third annual dividend of 5 per cent paid since its organization November 24, 1934.

The Lamesa Federal Savings & Loan Association is taking its place along with the other financial institutions of Lamesa, in helping to build homes for its citizens and providing a safe investment for those who care to save a part of their income.

The Lamesa Federal Savings and Loan Association, whose shares are insured, had a substantial gain in assets during the year, the bank stated, and their figures are included in the report.

Officials of the bank said the current newspaper advertising campaign has resulted in better informing the public of the additional protection afforded savers through insurance up to \$5,000

for each account by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation. They said this added safety doubtless has been responsible for much of the increased value of investments received which since July 1, in the entire district amounted to \$9,399,810.

TAX PAYMENTS NOW COMING IN SLOWLY

According to reports from R. W. Herndon, county tax assessor-collector county and state taxes are slowly being paid at his office, and the public is asked to keep in mind that January 31, is the last day these payments can be made without penalty and interest added.

Only 467 poll taxes have been paid up to January 1, this being an election year at least 3600 poll taxes are expected to be issued before the time limit is up.

Mr. Herndon also states that up to January 1, 5115 automobile registrations have been issued at this office, this being 2017 more than the 1936 year report, which was only 2996 for the entire year. The car registration year ends on March 31.

National Farm Loan Stockholders To Meet January 11

Plans are being completed for the 1938 annual stockholders' meeting of the Lamesa National Farm Loan Association, on January 11, 1938, according to J. E. Barron, secretary-treasurer of the association, who said that this meeting would be one of the most important in the history of the association.

Members of the association will review the progress of their own cooperative credit institution and hear the reports of its officers. According to Mr. Barron, the Lamesa National Farm Loan Association has made Federal Land Bank Commissioner loans amounting to approximately \$2,600,000 since its organization in 1918.

Directors of the Association will be elected at the meeting, Mr. Barron said. Two directors will be elected for terms of three years each, two for two year terms, and one for a one year term.

The Lamesa National Farm Loan Association makes available farm mortgage loans for a variety of purposes including refinancing of existing indebtedness, repairs and improvements to farm buildings, and the purchase of farm or ranch land. Loans may be made Mr. Barron said, to enable worthy experienced tenant farmers who can qualify, to acquire farms of their own.

Over Million Dollar Increase Shown Over 1936

An all-time high peak in bank resources for the two Lamesa banks was reached here at the close of the 1937 business, as shown by a check of the financial statements just issued by the banks.

Figures obtained from the Lamesa National Bank and the First National Bank, showed deposits of \$2,713,469.00 loans of \$228,861 and resources of \$2,921,617.

These figures compare with deposits of \$1,636,075, loans of \$289,145, and resources of \$1,812,964 for the same date of the previous year.

Deposits therefore show an increase of \$1,077,394; resources increased by \$1,108,653 and loans decreased by \$60,284.

General conditions in Lamesa and Dawson county are considered by informed sources to be the best in history. Farmers and business men alike have benefited greatly from the large crop harvested, even though the price of farm products was below normal.

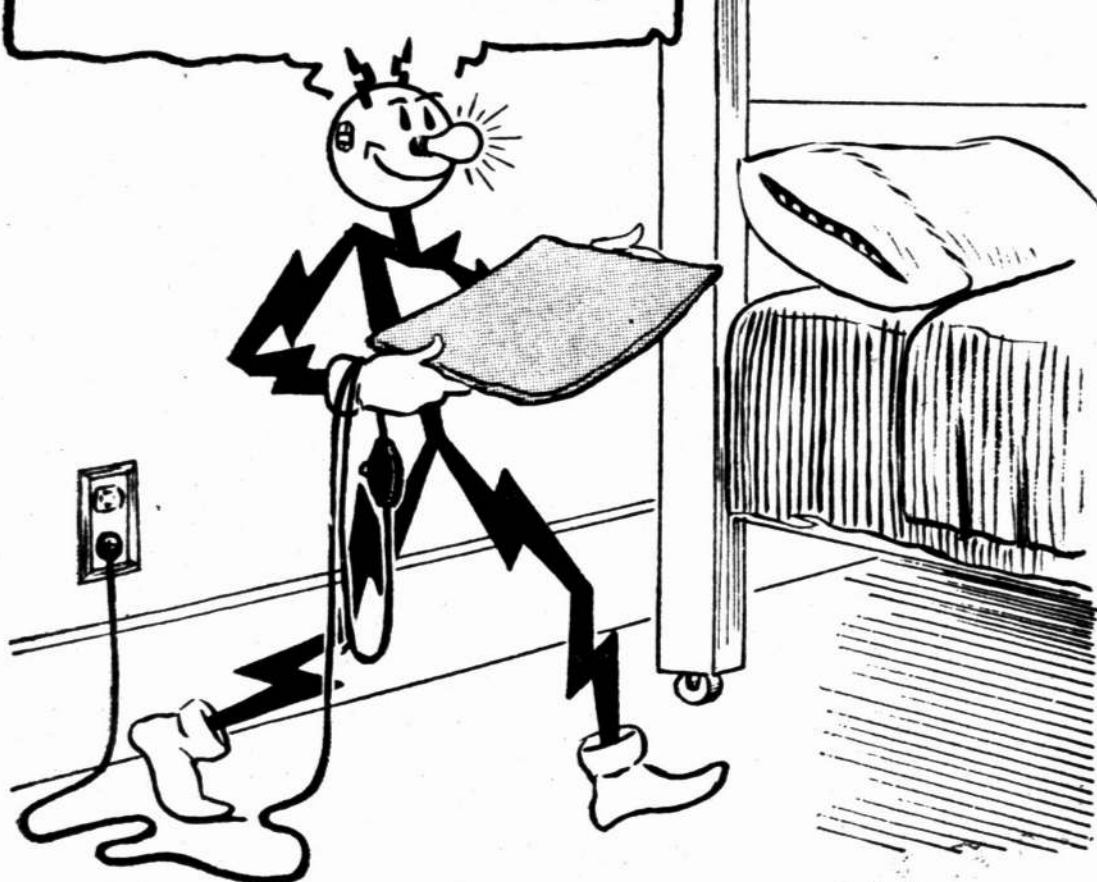

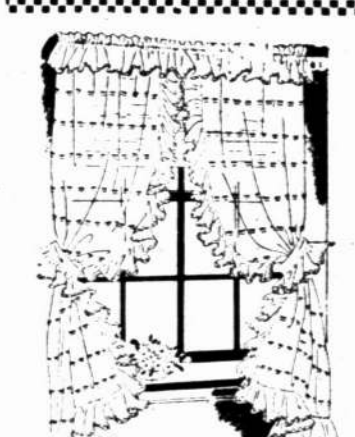

FAIRM NOTES

(By Joe C. Williams, County Agent)
TERRACING DEMONSTRATION

There will be a terrace building demonstration on the farm of F. L. Grissom near Shumake school from 10:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m. This demonstration is being given to try out a new type of terracing machine that pulls the dirt up from both sides of the terrace at one operation.

It is claimed by the dealer that the average farm tractor such as the John Deere and Farmall and other tractors with the horsepower of the same as the above mentioned tractors can develop sufficient power to pull the Murphy Terracer. This machine is something new in the way of terracing machinery. I have not seen the machine work but have seen some terraces that were built with the machine and they were well constructed and were holding the water on the land. These terraces were near San Angelo, where the terracer is manufactured.

All who are interested may see the machine in operation at the Grissom farm, Thursday, Jan. 13 during the above mentioned hours.

Contour lines were run on the W. O. Moer farm and the J. O. Peterson farm the last few days. There are some twenty five men on the waiting list now for terrace and contour line running at the present time. The agent is planning to get to all that is possible to do so as fast as time and weather will permit.

4-H Club Work
These boys are doing real good jobs in feeding their beef calves and any one who is interested in such work may see for themselves what is being done.

Harold Grissom, of Shumake, Weldon and Vernon Bratcher of Woody; Sam Dalmont, Jr., at the Weaver ranch; Ted Turner near Welch; and Stanley Applegate about ten miles down the Stanton road as well as Grady and Notie Ray King near Welch.

The boys are always glad to show visitors their calves. H. T. and L. A. Duff recently bought two more calves and have them started on feed. They sold their other two calves on the Fort Worth Market at eleven and thirteen cents and made nice profits from their feeding operations.

Adult Feeding Work
Walter Jones of Munger is feeding some two hundred head of calves at the present time. The calves are doing nicely being fed silage, made from Hegari and maize and cotton seed meal. L. A. Duff recently put twelve head of calves on feed. Mr. Duff has learned from experience of the two boys that he can market to a good advantage his surplus feed through livestock. Mr. F. L. Grissom recently shipped his steers to market that he had finished out on home grown feed.

Joe Clayton is feeding near four hundred head of mixed cattle at the Santa Fe loading pens near Lamesa. These are Borden county cattle brought into the county to be near feed available. They are being fed cotton seed meal and hulls.

The Cotton Situation
With at least two years of supply of cotton on hand at the present time the price outlook for cotton in the future looks any thing but encouraging. It appears that the man who has surplus feed may do well to plan to market the feed through livestock. It appears that the cotton farmer is going to be compelled to look for some other crop or practice for cash crops in the future.

Congress in the Senate and House have passed two bills that do not resemble each other and when the committee gets through with the compromise there is not any telling the kind of farm program bill that will result in final passage.

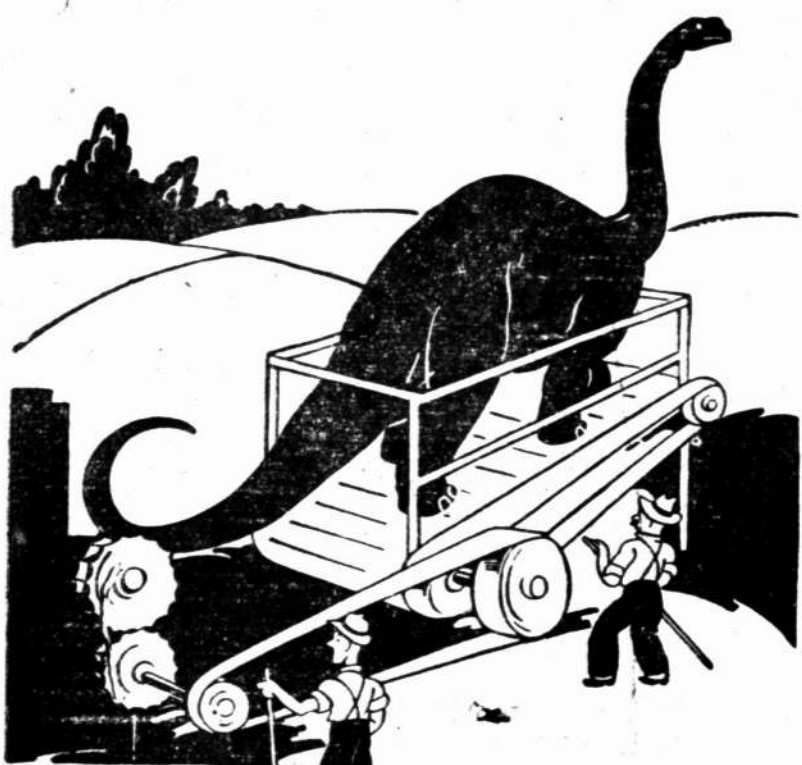

MAHON GIVES REPORT ON FARM BILLS

Congressman George Mahon last week, while at his home in Colorado, Texas made the following report as to the progress of farm legislation in Congress:

"During the special session of Congress the House passed a farm bill, and the Senate passed a farm bill differing somewhat from the House bill. Before the farm bill can become law, both houses of Congress must come to full agreement, and the President must approve. These combined bills are 206 pages in length, and a full analysis could not be made in a brief report.

Having talked with thousands of West Texas farmers before going to the special session, I believe I have a sufficient knowledge of their wishes, and the situation in general, to express the opinion that they will be disappointed with either the House or the Senate bills as now written. In the first place, over the opposition of all Southern members of Congress, both bills were amended so as to prohibit the grazing of diverted acres if products therefrom, such as livestock and produce, are to be sold. Northern dairy

interests sponsored this amendment. This amendment is a step backward and unless eliminated will cause much dissatisfaction. Secondly, I see nothing in the bills which will prevent a recurrence of five cent cotton, as parity price, or above, is in no way assured for any portion of the crop.

As to the compulsory features of the bills, compulsory marketing quotas would be established for each farm if two-thirds of the producers voting in a referendum favored the compulsory quotas.

The bills contemplate an appropriation of \$500,000,000.00 for soil conservation and domestic allotment payments for 1938. Acreage allotments to each farm in the county would be on the same percentage basis, thus placing all farms in the county on a basis of equality as to acreage allotments. This and several other features in the bill are a distinct improvement over the old program. Unfortunately, however, the uniform percentage basis for allotments would not apply to farms in cultivation less than five years. An amendment offered by me to fully remedy this was voted down but some modification was secured. An amendment to the House bill offered by me tending to discourage the undue displacement of tenants was adopted. It is not possible at this time to tel-

paign on "big shot" gamblers and the streets. These elements are talking it up that they want to elect what they call a "liberal" for Governor and perhaps two other offices. The truth of the matter is they don't want to elect a "liberal." They want to elect someone who will not molest them.

There are many "liberals" who do not believe in open saloons and in "big shot" gamblers, but all of us may depend upon it the fight for clean decent government is on in Texas.

We had better beware of soft talking, back slapping pretenders who are trying to play both sides of the fence. No man has the right to receive the support of the church people and the better citizenship in general and at the same time the quiet but enthusiastic vote and assistance of the underworld.

All over Texas we had better organize for the fray just as they are organizing in Dallas. Regardless of whom we expect to vote for, I appeal to all good citizens to pay their poll taxes early.

When the issues are clearer, when we know who is running and how they stand on these issues, we will be in better position to cast our ballots; but it is essential that all of us pay our poll taxes, or secure our exemption certificates so as to be ready to vote and offset the organized underworld.

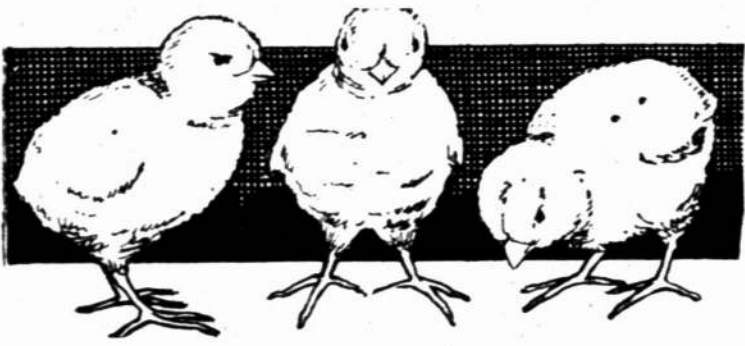

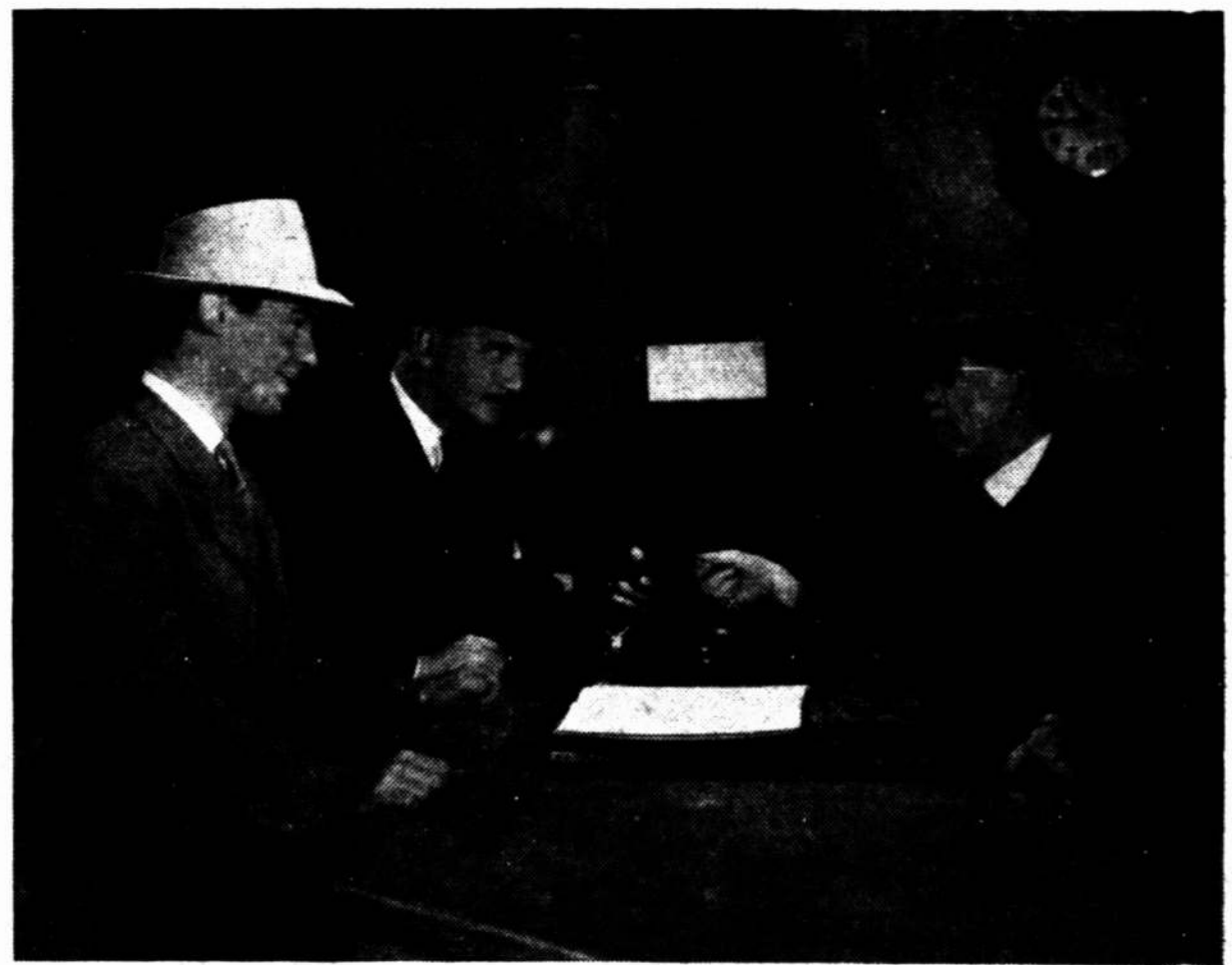

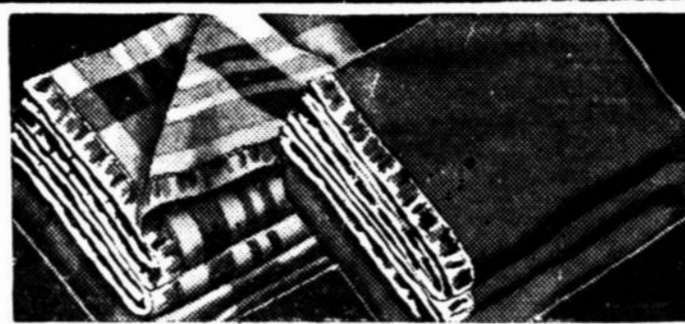
