Teaching Days Increased

Salary Increases for Teachers Begin In 1970-71 School Year

Local Teachers Are Paid \$800 Above Minimum

Asked how the salary raises affect teachers in the Aransas County Independent School District, Supt. of Schools J. D. Gray said the pay here is about \$800 above the minimum scale. "The economic index as determined by the state requires that a school district pay about 35 per cent of the salary increase and the state pays the remaining 65 per cent," Gray said. He added that the same legislation makes kindergartens mandatory in all schools. These kindergarten programs will be phased in gradually when, in the school year of 1977-78, any child five years old will be eligible for kindergarten. The local school system will have one kindergarten this year for educationally deprived children, Gray said, and probably two next year.

Auditor Reports County Expenses

A report of County Auditor R. D. Mosier shows expenses in Aransas County for the first six months of the year were \$77,870 above budget allocations. "This does not mean the county is operating in the 'red' by any means," County Judge John D. Wendell said. "What the report reflects is that we have completed work in the first half of the year where the funds were allocated to spend during the 12 month period."

One point in question is the county airport that reflects an overexpenditure of \$43,409 for the first six months. Wendell said all permanent improvements planned for the year have been completed and that \$30,000 of the apparent deficit was caused by transferring \$30,000 from the active fund to purchase interest-bearing certificates of indebtedness.

The same is true of the permanent improvement fund where \$29,700 was budgeted for construction of a new county barn. The barn has been constructed, using all the funds in the first half of the year that were budgeted for the 12-month period.

Cash balances in the county's operating fund was \$503,762 at the end of June, an increase of \$32,007 over the same date last year.

Rockport Elem. News

Parents of children who attended Rockport Elementary School last year and have moved into the attendance zone of one of the other elementary schools should notify the Rockport Elementary principal's office so that the records may be transferred before the start of school. This will enable the school to place the children in rooms and will cut down on the confusion and lost time the first day of school.

High School Registration Requirements Set

All new students who are planning on attending Rockport-Fulton High School, grades nine through 12, should register in the principal's office of the high school from Aug. 3 through Aug. 14.

The office will be open from 8 a.m. to 12 and from 1 to 4:30 p.m. New students are those students who did NOT attend any of the Aransas County Public Schools; such as Rockport-Fulton Junior High or Rockport-Fulton High School.

Those students who satisfied requirements for promotion by completing work in summer school should register at the time specified for new students if they have not already done so.

Students who attended Rockport-Fulton High School last year and did not receive their report cards because of non-payment of fees should pay these fees on the dates listed above in order to be properly registered.

New students should bring their report cards, book card, and health record showing proof of having immunization for smallpox, tetanus, and diphtheria.

Male students are reminded of the school district's policy concerning the proper length and style of hair. The hair is considered to be proper length and style when:

1. The hair remains above the eyebrows when combed or styled.
2. The hair remains out of the eyes when combed forward.
3. The hair does not cover the ears.
4. The back of the hair is shingled and does not touch the collar.
5. The sideburns do not go past the bottom of the ear cavity.

Beards and mustaches are not acceptable. Female students are reminded of the school district's policy concerning proper dress and hem length of the dress or skirt. The suggested hem length of the dress and skirt should not be more than three inches above the center of the kneecap when the student stands erectly. Short skirts or skirts shorter than the accepted local style for fashion at the present time is not acceptable school wear.

Student schedules will be ready for distribution to all students on Tuesday, Aug. 25. They may be picked up in the high school principal's office. All new students should be enrolled before Aug. 31, 1970. (Continued on page 8)

Houston FBI Head To Address Lions

Thomas J. Jordan, special agent in charge of the Houston office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, will be the principal speaker at a luncheon meeting of the Rockport Lions Club Thursday noon, Aug. 6 at Duck Inn.

Jordan will speak on "Current Law Enforcement Problems."

The 49-year-old FBI agent received his bachelor of arts degree from St. Mary's University in Baltimore, Md. Following his academic years, Jordan was affiliated with a number of private businesses in New Haven, Conn., and also served two years in the Navy.

He joined the FBI in 1947 as a special agent. Upon completion of training school, his first assignment was in the Atlanta office of the FBI.

He later served in Buffalo and in 1952 was transferred to FBI Headquarters in Washington, D.C. After five years in a supervisory capacity there, he assumed the duties of assistant special agent in charge of the Butte office in 1957.

He has served in the same capacity in San Diego and in Mobile, Ala. He was returned to FBI Headquarters in 1966 to serve in the inspection division, where he remained until 1967 when he was named special agent in charge of the Norfolk office.

In 1968 Jordan was transferred in the same position to the Albuquerque office, and in February of 1970 was designated special agent in charge of the Houston office. Mr. and Mrs. Jordan are the parents of five children.

J. P. Rogers Named Corp. Court Judge

The City Council has named Justice of the Peace J. Paul Rogers as the new City Corporation Court Judge, succeeding G. D. Johnson, who resigned, but only after some verbal fireworks set off by Alderman N. F. Jackson.

Alderman Charlie Garret, Mrs. J. W. "Tony" Harden and Joe "Pepe" Zambrano, at Monday's Council meeting, voted to appoint Rogers Corporation Court Judge.

Jackson voted against the appointment, explaining that he "had nothing against Rogers" but that he objected to the way the matter was handled. Here's the chronology of the matter:

- 1) On July 8 Johnson sent a letter to Mayor Delmar R. Hiller and the City Council submitting his resignation and giving as his reason "that I have not been able to get any cooperation from the City Police Department, and without cooperation and communication I can not fairly and honestly try the cases that come before me."
- 2) At a special meeting of the City Council on July 20, Mayor Hiller and Aldermen Garret, Harden and Zambrano arrived on time for the start of the session.

After several matters were considered and acted on, Johnson resigned. (Continued on page 8)

Shrimp Landings Show Increase

Landings of headless shrimp at Texas ports in June amounted to 4.0 million pounds valued at \$3.3 million, compared with 2.3 million pounds valued at \$2.2 million in June in 1969.

Current landings brought the 1970 January-June landings to 14.2 million pounds compared with 11.8 million pounds during the corresponding 1969 period. An increase of 1.2 million pounds of brown shrimp and 0.5 million pounds of white shrimp accounted for the 1970 increase.

SIX INJURED IN AUTO CRASH

Six persons were injured Tuesday night in an auto accident at Live Oak and Concho Streets involving cars driven by Eugene Havelka, 35 of Corpus Christi and Dr. Homer F. Elliot.

Five of the injured persons, all passengers in Havelka's car, were taken to a Corpus Christi hospital. They were Jo Laine Zimmerler, 32, James Freeman, 14, Terry Freeman, 12, Larry Freeman, 10, and Teddy Freeman, 7, all of Aransas Pass. Dr. Elliot sustained a neck injury and bruises but was not hospitalized, police said.

Chief of Police Everett D. Taylor said Havelka was charged with running a stop sign. Havelka was traveling west on Concho, failed to stop at the stop sign, and crashed into the car driven by Dr. Elliot, according to the police report.

Patrolman Daniel Vargas, who investigated the accident estimated damage to Dr. Elliot's car to be approximately \$1,000 and to Havelka's car, \$1,200.

Junior High School Registration

Student who will be in the seventh or eighth grade during the 1970-1971 school year and did not complete the 1969-1970 school year in Aransas County Schools are asked to come to the Junior High School office in order to be registered for classes which begin Aug. 31 at 8:10 a.m. Office hours are 8-12, 1-4.

New students should bring any information such as report cards, immunization record, etc. from the last school attended. Students who did attend the Rockport-Fulton Junior School, Fulton Elementary School or Rockport Elementary School have already been registered and need not come to the Junior High School until the opening day of school.

Male students are reminded of the school district's policy concerning the proper length and style of hair. The hair is considered to be proper length and style when:

Treatment Plant Expansion Planned

New Water System to Be Ready Aug. 15

The engineering firm of Lockwood, Andrews and Newnam reports that work on the new water system which will serve the Rockport area is expected to be finished by Aug. 15.

Aransas County Conservation and Reclamation District is constructing the system which will be operated by the City of Rockport. ACCRD a 26-year contract to buy water from the San Patricio Municipal Water District.

Harold Picton, president of ACCRD, said some customers in Fulton and Rockport began using the water — treated Nueces River Water—July 9. Burtex Constructors of Corpus Christi are reported to be 99 per cent complete with laying supply and distribution lines. Installation of some service meters and cleanup work remains to be done. The contract for the line was \$1,299,546.

The State Health Department had conducted bacterial tests on all lines and have certified the water. A 1½-million gallon storage tank, west of Peninsula subdivision has been chlorinated and is ready for service, and a 400,000 gallon overhead storage tank in Fulton has been completed. All that remains to be done is hydrostatic testing, Chicago Bridge and Iron Company built the storage for \$185,850.

The pump station at the ground storage tank is 85 per cent complete. Work had been stalled by delay in arrival of automatic controls for the plant. The controls have now arrived and are being installed by R. S. Black Engineers and Contractors of Corpus Christi. Cost of the pump station and equipment is \$185,600.

Under the contract between the city and ACCRD, the city will begin taking all of its water from the new System Sept. 1. The water furnished by the new system should assure an ample supply for the Rockport area for many years, Picton points out.

New Corp. Court Judge Is Lawyer, Former Educator

J. Paul Rogers, the new City Corporation Court Judge, is a lawyer and former school superintendent. He attended Howard Payne College at Brownwood and graduated from South Texas School of Law at Houston, passing the bar examination in 1938.

His career also includes coaching athletics and serving as principal and superintendent of several schools for 16 years. Also, he served as elective county school superintendent of Brazoria County for 28 years.

He has spent his entire life in the Coastal Bend area and started coming to the Rockport-Fulton area for vacations 30 years ago.

Rogers married the former Polly Fuller in 1928 and they have one married daughter now living in Dallas, but who with her husband, Alan Marsh-Neame, have bought a home in Fulton and will be living here in the future.

Mr. and Mrs. Rogers came to Fulton in 1963 with the intent of Rogers retiring but he has become very active. He was appointed Justice of the Peace, Precinct 3, in 1966 and has held that office since his appointment.

Rogers points out that there is no legal conflict in his continuing to serve as both Justice of the Peace and Corporation Court Judge.

Episcopal Bldgs. To Be Dedicated

Dedication of two new structures, a chapel and an activities building, at the Bishop Elliot Conference Center, Rockport, will be held at 7:30 p.m. Aug. 23, the Rt. Rev. Harold C. Gosnell, D.D., Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of West Texas, has announced.

Those who attend may bring their suppers for a picnic at 6 p.m. prior to the dedication. Coffee and soft drinks will be available at the center.

"Bring your picnic supper and join us," Bishop Gosnell said in inviting the public to the dedication.

The two buildings were constructed at a cost of \$58,000, which came from the Everett Holland Jones Episcopal Advancement Fund, conducted last year.

Country Club Plans Invitational Tourney

Live Oak Country Club is planning its first annual two-man invitational tournament to be held Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 12 and 13. Play will be partnership low ball, 18 holes each day. Players will be paired in foursomes according to handicaps attested by the tournament committee. A non-attested handicap will prevent the winning of prizes.

All college golf team members will play in the championship flight. The flight will be determined by the lowest team-member's handicap, with both days' best ball determining the winner in each flight.

Prizes will be awarded in each flight, as follows: first, \$100; second, \$60; and third, \$40. Hole-in-one prizes will be given and special prizes will be awarded each day. "Shotgun" starts will be used and tee off time will be 8 a.m. and 1 p.m.

In addition to the golf, a social program will be included each day: Sept. 12, free "happy hour," 6 to 7 p.m.; free fish fry for players and wives, 7 p.m.; and Calcutta, 8 p.m.

Social events scheduled for Sept. 13 include: free "happy hour," 6 to 7 p.m.; and free barbecue for players and wives, 7 p.m.

Any member and his family who wish to participate in only the fish fry and barbecue may do so for \$5 for both days, plus \$2.50 for each non-playing guest.

The tournament committee hopes that each member of the club will invite one or more two-man teams at the member's responsibility. This is an invitational tournament and not an open tournament. Play is limited to the first 60 team entries. The entry fee is \$20 per player.

There will be daily entertainment for the ladies, including swimming, bridge, bingo and canasta.

Registration For Live Oak School

Students who were not enrolled in Live Oak Elementary School during the 1969-70 school year and did not register before school closed this past year are to come to the principal's office from 8:30 a.m. until 3:30 p.m., starting Aug. 10, 1970 to register.

It is necessary to bring birth certificates and immunization records for students entering school for the first time. Students who have attended other schools and will be entering Live Oak Elementary this year, need their report card or transcript of school work and their immunization record from the school they attended last year.

Expansion of the sewage treatment plant is being considered by the City of Rockport.

At this week's City Council meeting, the aldermen authorized Urban Engineering to begin design work for possible enlargement of the plant which would be financed partly by the state and partly by the city.

Gene Urban, city engineer, recently gave the following report to Water Superintendent Tom Shults:

"In reviewing the flows to the sewage treatment plant, it indicates that the flows are reaching design capacities and at time exceeding design and permitted capacities.

"The plant was designed with a 500,000-gallon per day capacity in the aeration portion of the plant and 1,000,000 gallons per day capacity in the clarifier so that an additional 500,000-gallon per day capacity can be added by adding to the aeration."

Urban pointed out that the new construction to the sewer collection system and land development in the area will continue to increase the flow to the plant and therefore, "I feel that the City should start considering the addition of the additional 500,000-gallon per day capacity by adding to aeration."

With grant application, construction planning and construction, it will be approximately two years before the additional capacity can be brought into service, according to Urban.

Urban said Rockport's sewage treatment plant produces the best effluent in the state. "The city can be proud of the plant and Shults' operation of it."

In other actions, the City Council: —Approved a request by Delo Caspary to open North Magnolia Street between Linden and Cherry.

—Agreed that city employees (not elected officials) do not have to live within the city limits. This matter was brought before the Council because Patrolman Daniel Vargas lives outside the city. (Continued on page 8)

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR15) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

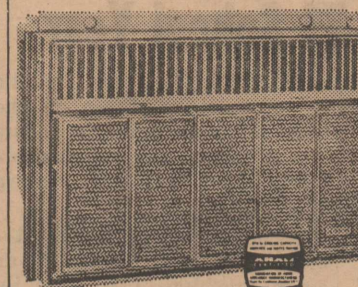

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature.

"B. Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligible for retirement benefits under the laws of this state providing for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired, and any person holding an office named in that paragraph who is not eligible for retirement benefits under such laws may be removed from office, for disability seriously interfering with the perform-

ance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

"(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to the misconduct or disability of particular persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) After such investigation as it deems necessary, the Commission may in its discretion issue a private reprimand, or if the Commission determines that the situation merits such action, it may order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal, or retirement of a person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefor, it shall issue an order of public censure or it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal, or retirement, as the case may be, of the person in question holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order public censure, retirement or removal, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the

recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary."

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not infeasible is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is cumulative to the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."

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ORDINANCE NO. 253 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE EXISTING PLUMBING ORDINANCE TO PERMIT USE IN CERTAIN APPLICATIONS OF PLASTIC PIPING AND PIPE FITTINGS AND PLUMBING MECHANISMS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCKPORT, TEXAS:

Sec. 1: PERMISSIVE USES; S.R.P.—Plastic Pipe and Fittings may be used for storm sewers, storm drain pipe, and fittings outside the building in one and two-family dwellings only. The following plumbing parts may be made of certain types of plastics as herein designated: Sewer line applications authorized in Table 5.05 pursuant to adoption by reference thereof in Sec. 2 hereof; clean-out plugs, sediment baskets, strainers, grates, shower diverter parts, faucet stems and other internal faucet parts, bowl cocks and flush mechanisms, trim and handles and dials on fixtures, gaskets and flanges and seals, shower heads, valve seats and flow regulators and parts thereof and similar items, shock arresters, and fixture outlets.

Sec. 2: DEFINITION OF TERM "PLASTIC": The term "Plastic(s)" hereinafter referred to shall be defined as meaning all or any of the Plastics listed in Table 505 and further defined in the Table to note 4, Section 501.3, said Tables contained in Southern Standard Plumbing Code promulgated by Southern Building Code Congress, as amended, and as embodied in Ordinance Number 9624, final revision, adopted by the City of Corpus Christi, Texas on January 29, 1970. Plastics used shall be selected from said Table in Section 501.3 of said Southern Standard Building Code and shall meet the physical property requirements listed in Table 505 thereof. Tests for physical properties and chemical resistance shall be made in accordance with current revisions of standard methods developed by the American Society For Testing and Materials (ASTM) as set forth in Table 1 to said section 501.3 entitled "Physical Property Requirements for Plastics." Each plastic part must bear the name (or type) of plastic used and the manufacturer's name or his trademark. Suitable plastic applications are those indicated as suitable for specific parts designated in Sections 502, 703, 704 and 909 of said Southern Standard Plumbing Code.

Sec. 3: ADMINISTRATION: The City's Plumbing Inspector (appointed by the City Commission as provided for in the City's Plumbing Code enacted May 13, 1952) shall cause a copy of the Southern Standard Plumbing Code, 1967 Edition, promulgated by the Southern Building Code Congress of Birmingham, Alabama, incorporating therein City of Corpus Christi Ordinance No. 9624 adopted by the City of Corpus Christi, Texas on January 29, 1970, available for inspection and examination at the offices of

the City of Rockport, City Hall, Rockport, Texas. Authorized materials and specifications thereof as contained therein will govern utilization of plastic materials in plumbing applications pursuant hereto. The City Plumbing Inspector will be empowered with enforcement hereof as though plastic materials utilization authorized hereunder were a part of the City of Rockport Plumbing Ordinance.

Sec. 4: NOTICE TO PUBLICATION: This Ordinance shall be published in full one time in the official newspaper of the City of Rockport and shall be in force and effect from and after its publication.

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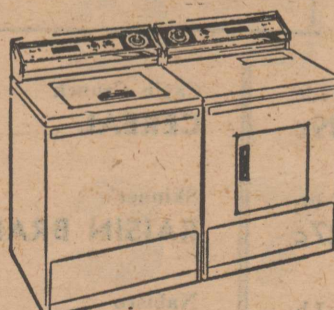
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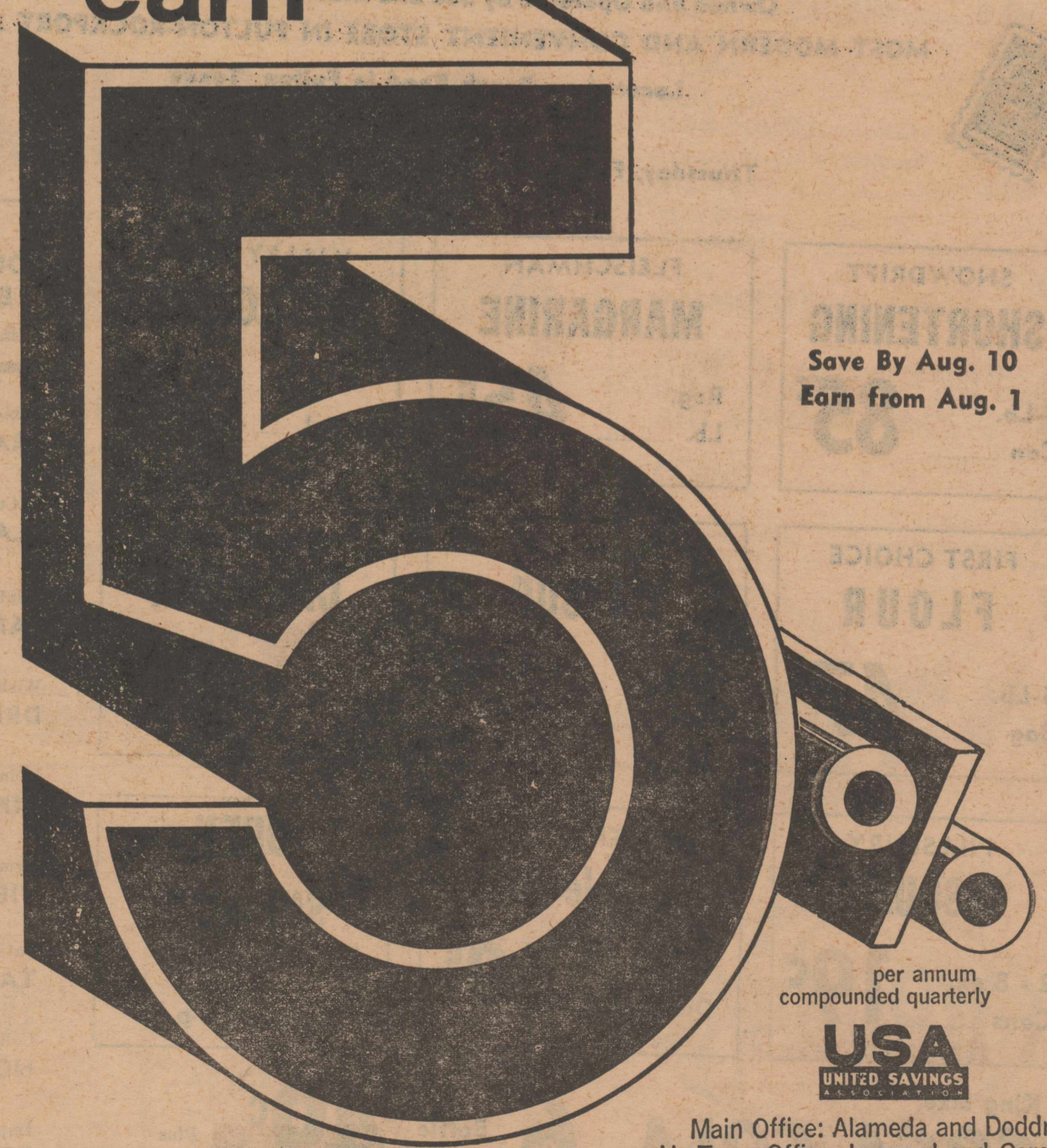

Editor's Note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 209 W. Ninth Street, Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions. Classified Ads Get Results

Q—We were talking last week about men who could be drafted without a lottery number, and you told me that volunteers, men age 26 up through 34, or 19-year-olds who didn't yet have a lottery number could be drafted on some other basis. Is there any one else?

A—Yes, but first, it is emphasized that the men 26 and above and the 19-year-olds without a lottery number cannot be ordered until all the men age 19 through 25 with lottery numbers have been ordered. The additional group which could be ordered without a lottery number would be males aged 18½ but not yet 19, in the order of their birthdates, oldest first.

Q—The volunteers are ordered ahead of the men with

the lottery number. Right?

A—Correct.

Q—Under present circumstances, draft calls can be filled with volunteers and a part of the group which has lottery numbers. Isn't that right?

A—That is right. A big war or emergency could change that.

Q—For the remainder of 1970, the draft boards will fill calls with men whose numbers were drawn in December 1969, and in 1971 with men whose numbers were drawn in July of this year. Correct?

A—Yes, except that deferred or exempt men whose numbers were drawn in 1969 will be placed in the I-A pool in 1971 if they go into I-A in that year. 1971 will be their year of maximum exposure instead of 1970.

Q—In the draft lottery, what if a draft board doesn't have men with birthdays on every day?

A—It goes to the next number.

Q—In the July draft lottery, I heard that the alphabet was randomized the same as all the possible birthdays. What is the purpose of that?

A—The alphabet was also randomized in the drawing

held in December 1969. It's done in case a board has two or more men with the same birthday required to order one but not all of them to fill a quota. Their sequence of induction will be determined by the first letter of their names, both last and first, using the randomized alphabet.

Q—If a man gets a lottery number he doesn't like, does he have a chance to get another one the next year?

A—No. He gets one, and only one, random sequence number. However, his year of first priority for selection will be the year in which he's classified I-A or I-A-O. The sequence in which a man's birthday is drawn means nothing until he's classified I-A or I-A-O. For example, a man born November 9, 1950, in college in 1970, draws lottery No. 80 in 1969. He graduates in 1971. Meantime, a man born December 26, 1951, not in college in 1971, has also drawn lottery No. 80. Both being in I-A, if they are in the same board, they will be selected on the same call. If only one is needed, the random alphabet will determine which one.

Fires Threaten Whooping Crane Nesting Grounds

CALGARY, Alta.—Canadian troops were ordered out July 23 to fight a forest fire advancing on nesting grounds of the rare whooping crane whose call once echoed across the skies of North America.

"We have a critical situation here," said a spokesman for Wood National Park, habitat for 50 to 60 of the stately adult white birds, the only band still living in a wild state. There also are some yearlings in the park, plus an unknown number that hatched this summer.

About 110 troops were called out to fight the blaze, one of nine reported burning over some 20,000 acres in the park astride the frontier between Alberta and the Northwest Territories. Five were out of control.

The cranes are nesting in a portion of the park that juts into the Northwest Territories near Fort Smith, about 450 miles north of Edmonton. In winter they migrate to the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge north of Rockport.

Dr. A. H. Macpherson, western director of the Canadian Wildlife Service, told a reporter the fire threatening the national park is within a few miles of areas "which we think are important" for nesting.

He said the threatened areas are mostly wet areas on the edge of ponds and biolo-

gists believe the young hatched this year should be strong enough to escape. "I understand the fire is not endangering the area very urgently," said Macpherson, "but we should be very concerned if it got much closer."

There was no indication what action would be taken to protect the whooping cranes, particularly the young, should the fire move into their nesting grounds.

The majestic four-foot birds were on the brink of extinction when their number dropped to a low of 15 in 1943, as a result of slaughter over 150 years for their prized plumage.

Canadian and U. S. laws now protect the species, and both countries have programs aimed at boosting the whooping crane population to several thousand.

There are about a dozen whoopers in captivity.

General Election Nov. 3, 1970 NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR15)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(a) The State Building Commission is created and succeeds to the powers and duties heretofore vested in the agency of the same name by this Constitution and to the powers and duties the Legislature has vested or may vest in the Commission. Its membership shall consist of three Texas citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The term of each member shall be six years except in the first appointments to the Commission the Governor shall appoint one member for two

years, one for four years, one for six years, and thereafter one member biennially. The Governor shall biennially designate one member as Chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

General Election Nov. 3, 1970 NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a

home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary renting of the homestead shall not change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired."

General Election Nov. 3, 1970 NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR28)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company."

"(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such dis-

trict or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts, may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county, for the construction, maintenance, and operation of macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the county, and without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation. The county may levy and collect taxes to pay the interest on the bonds as it becomes due and to provide a sinking fund for redemption of the bonds."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property taxing electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county."

"(1) The improvement of rivers, creeks, and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes.

"(2) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof.

June 1969, 2,541,400. Brownsville - Port Isabel: June 1970, 1,184,600 pounds; Jan.-June 1970, 5,599,000; Jan.-June 1969, 6,934,500.

Totals: June 1970, 4,006,600 pounds; Jan.-June 1970, 14,160,800; Jan.-June 1969, 11,840,600.

Vessels working brown shrimp along the north Texas and southwest Louisiana coast made trip catches of 200 pounds of large brown shrimp per night in water beyond 20 fathoms. Smaller vessels working shallow waters off Louisiana made sporadic heavy catches of small brown shrimp used in that State's canning industry.

Bay units working Texas waters had no difficulty in obtaining the 300 pounds per day limit of juvenile brown shrimp with exception of Matagorda Bay. This system has not contributed adequately to the offshore brown fishery since 1967, compared with the other major estuaries along the coast.

Trawl units working white shrimp landed 1 million pounds of large whites, chiefly from Gulf waters. This was by far a record June volume and value for this species in Texas surpassing the 1965 record of 693,000 pounds valued at \$564,000. Fishing pressure was extremely heavy on this fishery throughout June even though the inshore waters were closed to conventional trawling.

Blue crab landings amounted to about 400,000 pounds in June. This was some 20 percent below landings during the previous month and 21 percent below June landings in 1969. Part of the current decline resulted from catch restrictions by some processors.

Three new "super trawlers" made maiden voyages in June; two vessels were lost at sea. All crewmen were rescued.

have 180 days of actual classroom instruction, (where teachers and students are together in learning situations) instead of the 175 days previously required under foundation program law. (Some schools had already been operating programs longer than the minimum.)

—Most Texas teachers will be paid on a 10-month basis. (Vocational and special education teachers may be paid for 10, 11, or 12 months.)

—In addition to the 180 days of classroom instruction, teachers and other personnel previously authorized for less than 10 months under the foundation program shall be required to be on duty for an additional 10 days, making a total of 190 days, exclusive of

holidays approved by the local board of trustees.
—School districts may employ teachers for more than the specified 190 days, but if they do their salaries for work beyond the 190 days must be paid wholly from local funds.

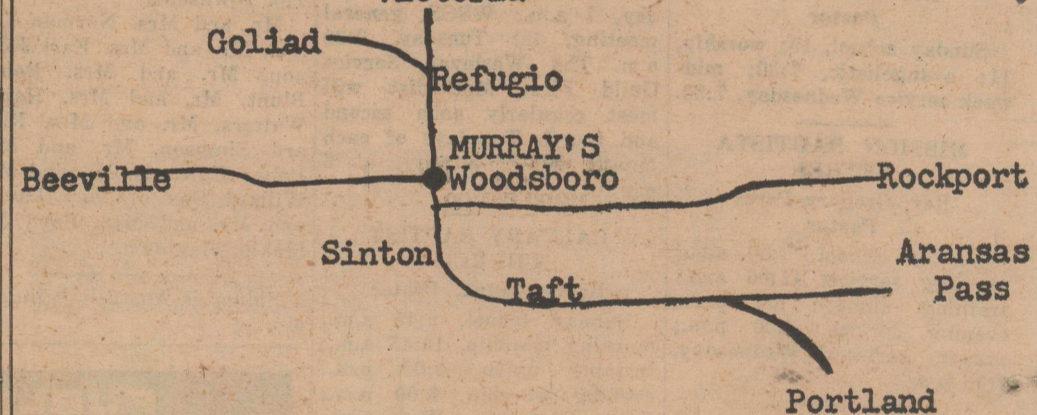
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June Bond Sales \$1,841

During June there were new purchases of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$1,841 according to Aransas County Chairman Fred Bracht. Sales for the first five months totaled \$19,819 or 33 percent of the

1970 goal of \$60,000.

Texas sales during the month were \$13,658,647 compared to \$1,549,134 during June of 1969, a rise of 18 percent. Year-to-date sales totaled \$90,771,252 for 50 percent of the 1970 goal of \$179.9 million.

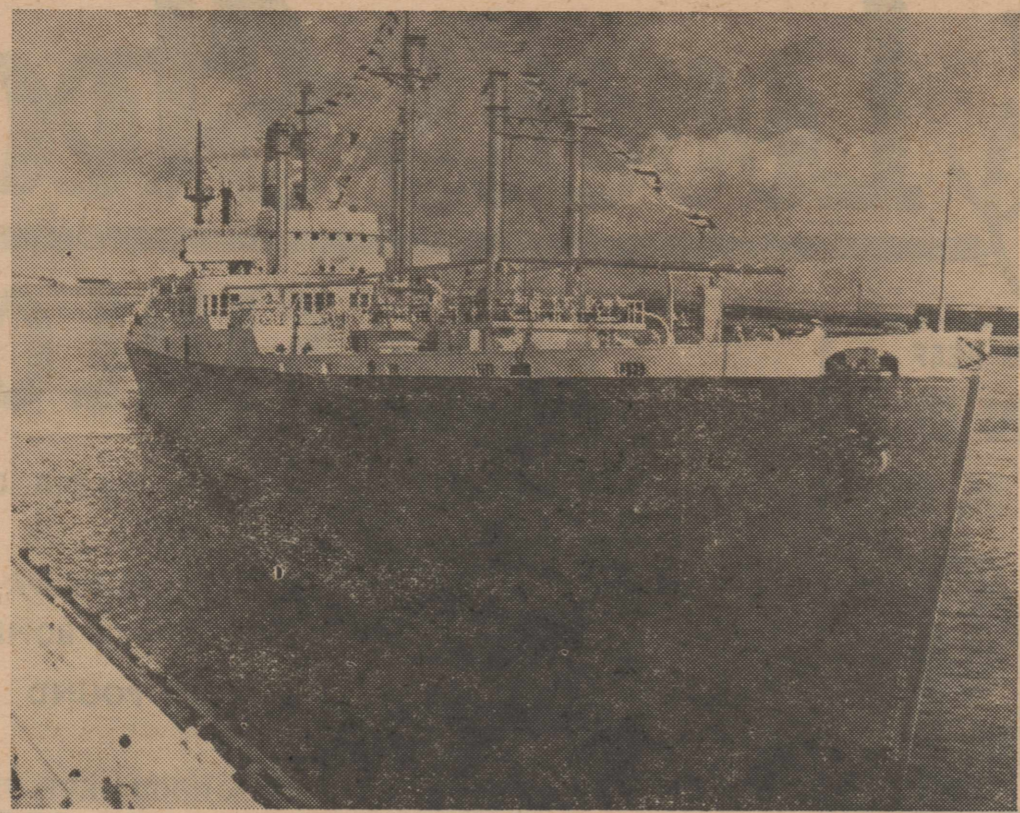
New purchases of E and H Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares over the nation during June amounted to \$465 million—a 25-year peak—while sales for the first six months of 1970 were \$2,514 million, 1 percent above 1969. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds amounting to \$213 million were reported for the first six months which represents a 31 percent increase over exchanges through June 1969.

As of June 30, 1970, \$52.0 billion in United States Savings Bonds were outstanding, which is 23 percent of the privately-held portion of the public debt.

Social Security Payments for Teachers

Texas school teachers and other school employees who are social security beneficiaries may not receive social security payments for the three summer months this year because of the extension of the school year, according to H. M. Cleveland, social security manager in Corpus Christi.

Under the new Minimum Foundation Program, students in Texas are required to attend classes 180 days; classroom teachers will work 190 days; counselors and administrative personnel will work 200 days.

The longer school year, plus teacher workshops which precede the actual class room work will mean that teachers and others may begin work in August, rather than September.

Social security benefits are paid to salaried beneficiaries who do not earn more than \$140 in a month. Beneficiaries who are school teachers, counselors, administrative personnel, and some other employees may earn more than \$140 in August. In such cases, the benefit check normally received on Sept. 3, will not be due.

Daily wages of school employees can be computed in the following way. Divide the annual salary by the number of working days. For example, an annual salary of \$5,700 divided by 190 days (classroom teacher) equals \$30 per day. Therefore, a teacher with the salary of \$5,700 who works 5 days in August, will earn \$150 and will not be entitled to social security benefits for August. All beneficiaries who believe their earnings will exceed \$140 in August should notify the social security office.

A host of dignitaries and public officials will be on hand Aug. 1 when the Texas Maritime Academy Training Ship TEXAS CLIPPER docks at Point Comfort.

The ship will be returning from its summer cruise to Europe, where calls were made to ports in Ireland, France, Germany, Denmark and England. Point Comfort was added to the itinerary at the request of Senator Bill Patman to call attention to the newest deep water facility along the Gulf Coast. "I hope it will also start us to thinking about the great opportunities afforded Texans by our proximity to the ocean frontiers," said Senator Patman.

The 220 officers and men on board will dock at Point Comfort 12 noon, Saturday, Aug. 1. The ship, a 473 foot vessel of 15,000 tons, will depart the following day at 9 a.m. for Galveston. A public reception and barbecue dinner to celebrate the docking on Saturday will be held under the sponsorship of the Port Lavaca-Calhoun County Chamber of Commerce. The public will be welcomed aboard for an inspection of the ship between 1 p.m. and 5 p.m. Saturday.

Rear Admiral J. D. Craik, Superintendent of the Texas Maritime Academy at Galveston, describes the TEXAS CLIPPER as an ideal ship for training cadets. It was formerly the "Excambion" of the American Export Lines. It was converted in 1948 to carry freight and passengers to the Mediterranean, and was acquired by the Texas Maritime Academy in 1965. Engineering cadets on board must be capable of starting and stopping all apparatus and equipment in the engine room and assist in all necessary repairs. Deck cadets are thoroughly grounded in navigation, seamanship, watch standing, and all phases of ship operation. In fact, under the supervision of a licensed officer both on deck and in the engine room, the cadets operate the ship.

Admiral Craik will join the ship in Puerto Rico and will be on board when the ship arrives at Point Comfort.

Texas A&M University created the Texas Maritime Academy at Galveston in 1962. The academy currently ranks as one of the six major facilities of its type in the nation—and one of the only two affiliated with a major university. Students come from both the East and West Coasts, the Great Lakes and several landlocked states, in addition to Texas and other Gulf Coast states.

Many opportunities exist on shore as well as on board ship in the maritime industry for young men who have proved themselves at sea. Each of the seniors at Texas Maritime Academy averages seven job offers, reflecting the serious shortage of licensed officers. In addition, graduates of merchant marine academies have excellent backgrounds for work toward advanced degrees in transportation, engineering, business administration, naval architecture and admiralty law.

Among the men aboard the vessel are Charles Picton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Picton, and Eric Henderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Henderson, of this city.

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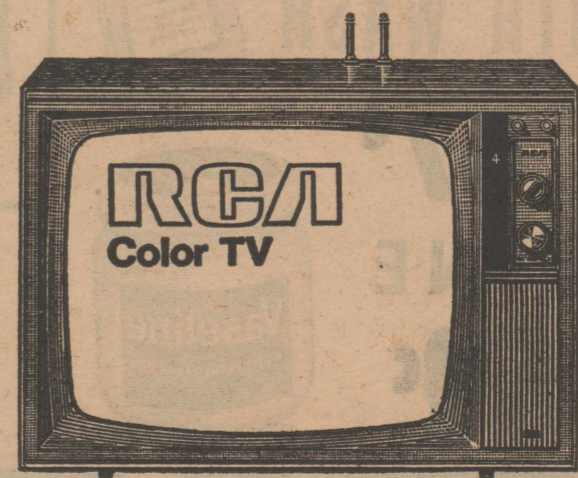
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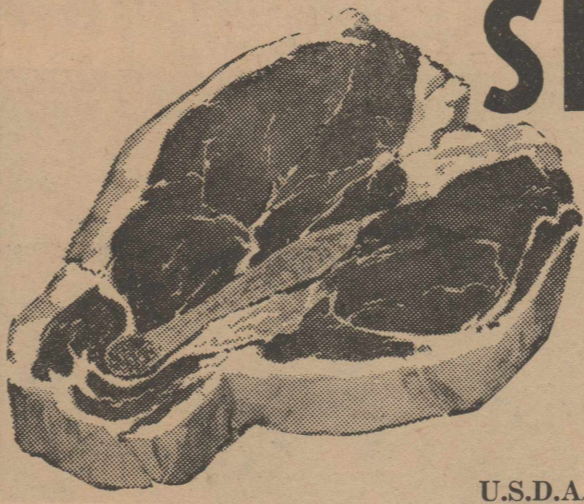
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
