GERMANY ACCEPTS EXPERTS REPORT

(By Associated Press)
BERLIN, April 15.—The German cabinet today decided to accept the experts' report on reparations as a basis for negotiations, and it was ordered by the cabinet that the reparations commission be informed of this fact.

This is in line with the attitude taken by the conference in yesterday's meeting between the central government premiers and federated states. The acceptance of the reparations commission's committee of experts' report by the Germans brings a brighter outlook for solving the problem which has been blocking peace.

LONDON, April 15.—The first official expression of opinion on the reparations experts' report from Prime Minister MacDonald came in the House of Commons today when he announced that the British government had learned with the greatest satisfaction of the unanimous signing of the experts' findings.

"The experts' reports constitute in our opinion," said the premier, "an unbiased and carefully thought out endeavor to aid the governments concerned in their task of reaching a settlement of this vital and long standing problem."

Rev. Messer urges all his members to get in the harness and work for the meeting, and everybody is cordially invited to attend the services.

REVIVAL CROWDS THROUGH CHURCH

The Methodist Church was filled practically to its seating capacity again Monday night for the first week-day night's service of the second week of the union revival, and Evangelist Hendrick remarked that the crowd was a "fine one for Monday night."

The crowd gathers almost half an hour before time announced for the services to begin, and the splendid singing holds the throng with intense interest and paves the way for Dr. Hendrick to preach to the people.

"Five Minutes After Death," was the subject the evangelist used for his message Monday night, taking the parable of the rich man and Lazarus as his text. He made a strong appeal for his hearers to prepare for the experience through which they would have to pass at the end of the journey of life. Dr. Hendrick illustrated how the memory of man lives in the present life, and quoting that part of his text which says "My Son, Remember," he emphasized the great teachings of the parable that man will remember his evil life, or his good life, as the case might be, when he enters into the world beyond, and like the rich man would remember his lost opportunity.

The down town service at the Maeroy Theatre Tuesday morning was well attended, and the 10:00 o'clock service at the church also brought out another good crowd. Interest in the revival has increased since the meeting began and much good has already been accomplished, about twenty-five members having been added to the church.

Says Egg Market Situation Is Not as Good as Poultry

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, April 15.—While the outlook for the future of the egg industry of the nation is such that increase in production would necessitate a correspondent acceleration of the consuming rate to keep prices within the range of profit, the dressed poultry situation is much more favorable, and indications are for a satisfactory absorption of the prospective supply, according to a detailed statement on the outlook for this industry for 1924, released by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics through Texas Radio Market News Service.

"The dressed poultry situation presents a somewhat more favorable outlook (than eggs) at this moment," the statement remarks. "The carry-over of frozen stocks on March 1 were 17.6 per cent lower than on the same date last year and were 1.1 per cent lower than the five year average.

Poultry prices also are in a more favorable position than egg prices. This shortage of storage stocks of poultry may be expected to permit an increased production of poultry to be marketed without greatly reducing prices. Turkeys do not share in this favorable storage position, for the stocks are heavier than ever before. The possibility of lowered egg prices, however, may have a material effect upon the dressed poultry situation. If egg prices decline sufficiently, larger numbers of hens will be marketed with the resulting effect on poultry prices, especially of hens. Such reduction of flocks would tend to reduce egg production and strengthen egg prices."

A greater production of eggs per hen and higher quality are suggested by the bureau as most effective means of counterbalancing the unfavorable situation in that commodity.

GIVE G. O. P. \$50,000; COULD SELL LIQUOR

COOLIDGE HAS 494 DELEGATES

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, April 15.—Approximately one-half of the delegates to the republican national convention have been selected. Of the number of delegates selected the managers of the pre-convention campaign in behalf of President Coolidge claim 494 instructed delegates favorable to Coolidge. It requires 556 necessary to nominate a candidate for the republican party.

34 delegates are pledged to the candidacy of Senator LaFollette, of Wisconsin; 14 are instructed for Senator Johnson, of California.

GRAND JURY IS IN SESSION AGAIN

After a two days recess the grand jury reconvened to carry on its investigations, presumably in the Tabor murder case, Tuesday afternoon. The body has already worked about two weeks, most of the time being devoted to an inquiry into a middle-of-the-road shooting on the night of December 19th when Crawford A. Tabor was shot down while out on a mission of what he thought was to help a traveler in trouble. It is expected that indictments will be returned in the case within the next day or two.

BONUS BILL IS REPORTED OUT

WASHINGTON, April 15.—The soldier bonus bill was formally reported to the Senate today by Senator Curtis, of Kansas, republican member of the finance committee.

The measure is the same as passed by the House with the exception of minor changes which provide for twenty-year endowment life insurance policies and a cash payment to those not entitled to more than fifty dollars in adjusted compensation.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—Cecil Kerns, president of the Victor Drug Company, of Toledo, Ohio, was called before the Daugherty investigating committee today to tell the circumstances under which he was paroled from the Atlanta federal penitentiary last February.

Kerns said that he was sentenced to the federal prison in a liquor conspiracy case and had employed John Todd, a former law partner of Mr. Daugherty. He said that he sold five hundred barrels of whiskey to Abe Ungerleider after Ungerleider had told him he could secure permits because of a fifty thousand dollar contribution he had made to the republican campaign fund.

JAPAN PROTESTS U. S. EXCLUSION

TOKIO, April 15.—Foreign Minister Matsui, in a statement today to American newspaper men, protested against the exclusion of the Japanese people from the United States.

"We have cause for grave anxiety," said Matsui, "and we appeal against any action which can only wound us to some extent and bring little satisfaction to you."

TELLS PEOPLE TO OBEY LAW

(By Associated Press)
GLEN ROSE, Tex., April 15.—Law enforcement was the principal subject of an address by Gov. Neff here this morning. The address was the second of his present week's series of speeches in North Texas in the interest of an uninstructed delegation to the democratic national convention.

When Governor Neff arrived here this morning three state rangers were in the governor's party, the rangers having joined the party at Cleburne last night. Rangers have recently been active in this section of the state in investigating alleged violations of the liquor laws.

In addition to urging law enforcement Governor Neff reiterated his plea that the Texas delegation to the democratic national convention be sent without instructions to vote for any particular candidate.

Governor Neff will make two speeches today, going from here to Granbury, where he speaks this afternoon.

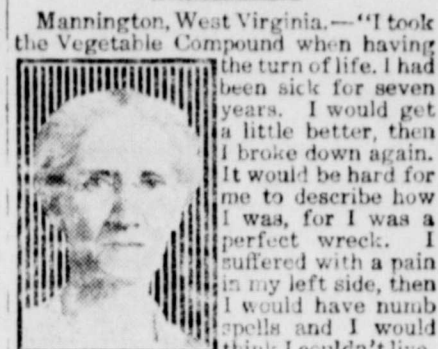

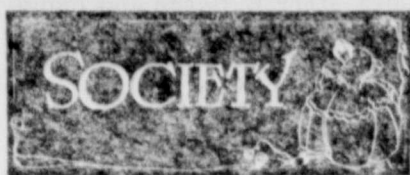
IROQUOIS LIVED IN CABINS

Members of Tribe Regarded Themselves as Supermen Among All Other Indians.

The Iroquois regarded themselves as supermen among all other Indians. They were particularly proud of their cabins, and were known by other tribes as Cabin Indians. Even when hunting, part of the woman's task was to carry the portable makings of a cabin and put them together.

These dwellings were constructed somewhat on the principle of a modern apartment house with accommodations for from five to twenty families, sometimes more. They varied in size, being usually about 35 feet in length, breadth and height; often as long as 140 feet, and sometimes exceeding 500 feet.

A passageway in the center divided the compartments on either side and served for fireplaces. Adults slept on mats placed on the ground or on a low platform, the younger members of the family sleeping on an upper tier. For privacy, such as it was, strips of bark or skin were used. They were not all rude; on the contrary some of them were neatly thatched with bark, and their crevices were covered with strips of skins.—Detroit News.
