Jaywalking Legalized At Busy El Paso Street Intersection

EL PASO (P)—Jaywalking, especially catty-cornered jaywalking, is legal these days in El Paso—at one of the city's busiest intersections.

What's more, the cops are planning to make such jaywalking legal at other intersections.

After two week's trial of the so-called "Denver Plan," El Paso police are loud in their praise of the system, although it was not easy to teach milling thousands at downtown Mesa and Texas intersection to ignore old traffic rules and learn new ones.

A three-way light control, the new system permits pedestrians to walk only when the "walk" sign appears.

But when it's time to walk the pedestrians are urged to go every which-way, while all vehicle movement is stopped both east-west and north-south.

Traffic Capt. J. C. Risinger says the new traffic system is "working just fine," and Police Chief Roy Vinson plans extension of the plan to other busy intersections in the near future.

Risinger admits he had headaches when the new system went into effect.

Between 50,000 and 60,000 pedestrians cross the Mesa-Texas intersection in every 24 hours.

When the new system went into effect the vast majority of them flatly refused to any jaywalking, even though officially encouraged by police officers standing by.

Maybe many pedestrians could not believe their ears when a

police loudspeaker informed them:

"Watch the bottom signal light. When 'walk' goes on take the shortest possible route. Cross diagonally if you wish."

For a time many persons could not resist the automatic reflex to start walking on the green—which isn't proper under the new system.

Traffic officers say that the traffic experiment has speeded up movement of cars through the busy intersection, and they feel

that installation of the system at other intersections will add to the public's better understanding of the plan.

Even though the pedestrian gets a chance, under the "Denver Plan", to do some legal jaywalking, he still had better be ready to hop.

The "walk" sign remains on only 19 seconds—and the police loudspeaker laconically warns, "When the 'walk' sign goes off you have two seconds to reach the curb."

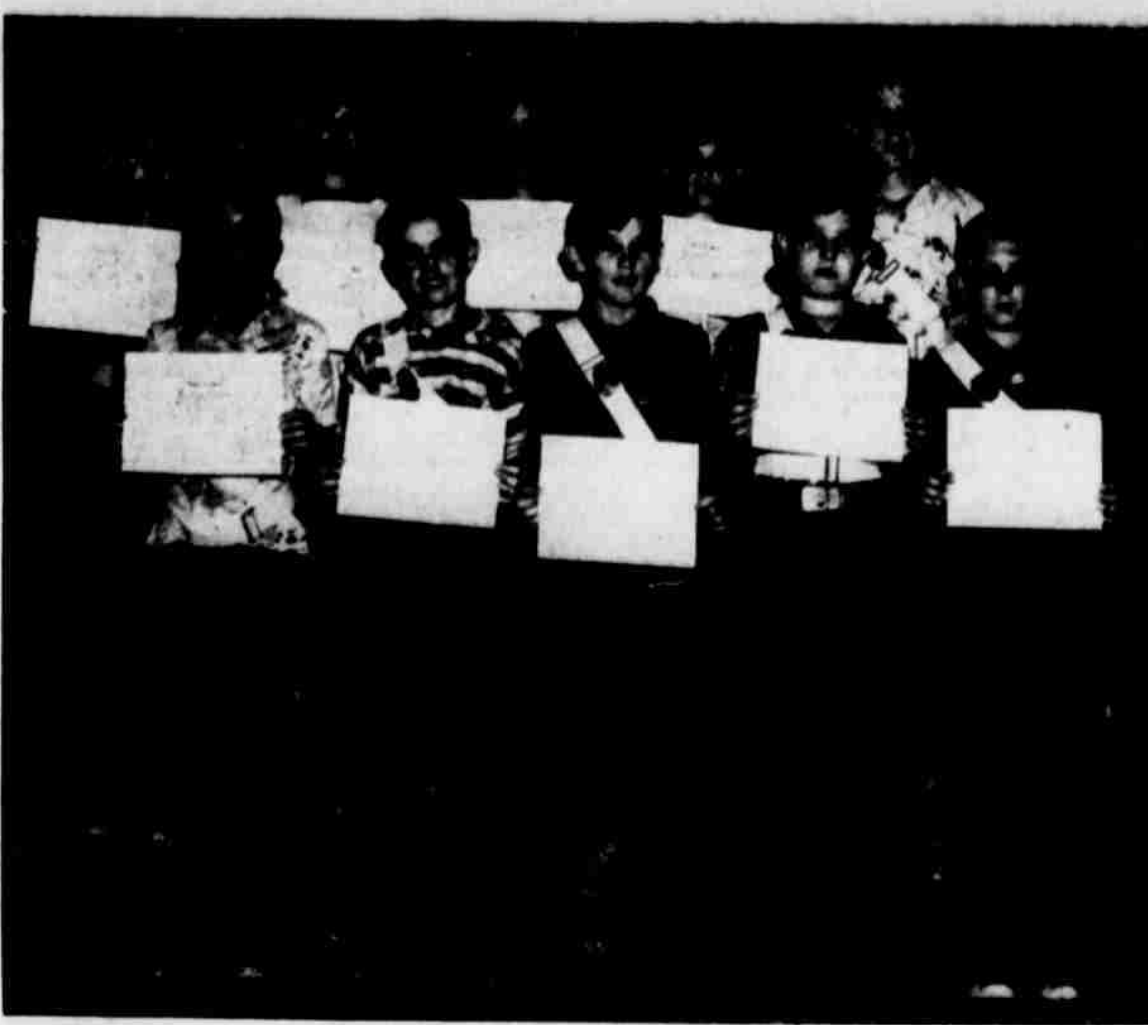

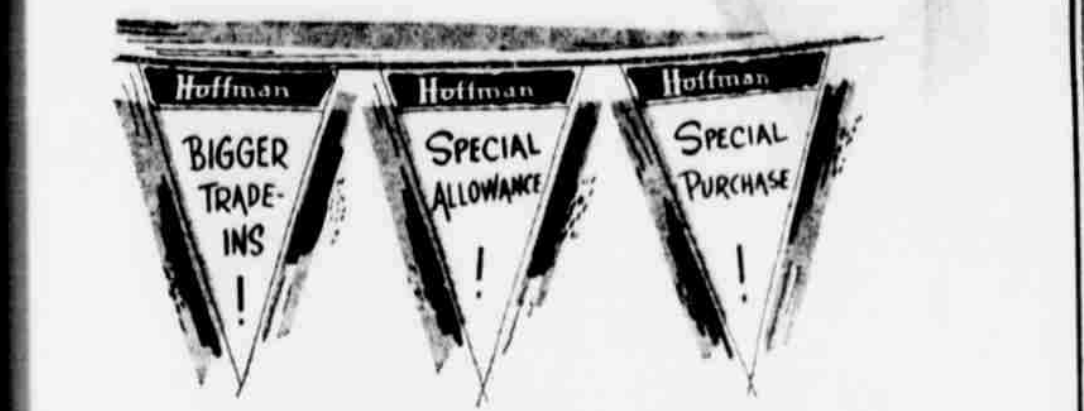
Boy Scouts will live in tents and will eat in the dining hall, which will be under direction of the same chef who has served five years at the camp, A. G. Finney, Plainview.

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TIPS FROM YOUR COUNTY AGENT

By JESSIE PEARCE

I attended a work simplification training meeting for home demonstration agents recently. It started me to thinking about these sandstorms and all of the extra work in keeping the house clean.

I know the kitchen cabinets are going to need cleaning to get the sand out. To do a good job of this you have to move all of the dishes, utensils or food stored there. While you have the shelves cleaned off, why not treat them with a two per cent Chlorodane solution to kill the roaches and to keep ants out?

The best method to use in putting the Chlorodane solution on the shelves is a paint brush. Brush the solution into all the cracks. Be sure to work the poison into all the cracks around the sink too. Roaches live where you see them, so that is where you want to get the poison.

As you clean the sand out of the windows paint the solution on the sills to keep out ants.

Just a word of caution about using Chlorodane. It is extremely toxic and should not be used where there is any danger of getting it into food or on dishes and utensils. It does kill roaches and ants and one good treatment should control these pests for several months.

For additional information on insect control in the house, see your county home demonstration agent.

Did you know there are more than 40 different fruits that you can prepare for family meals? You can buy these fruits in 150 different ways, too.

Frances Reasonover, foods and nutrition specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says there's an average of three ways to prepare each kind of fruit, so it should be an easy matter to get the TWO FRUITS A DAY that the Texas Food Standard suggests for safe eating.

Eating two fruits a day is pretty good insurance for the Vitamin C which the body needs fresh each day. Vitamin C is the factor which has become identified as a nutrient essential to the healthy growth and maintenance of teeth—bones—tissue and blood. Research has found the nutrient water soluble, so you need a daily supply because the body cannot store Vitamin C from day to day.

Lack of Vitamin C in the daily diet may show in any place in your body—in skin surfaces, teeth, bones, muscles, blood. It is helpful in the healing of wounds.

Two fruits a day will supply the amount most of us need. All the familiar citrus fruits are bountiful sources of Vitamin C—half a glass or four ounces of orange or grapefruit juice, canned or fresh, goes far toward meeting a day's needs. The same is true of half a grapefruit, a whole orange, or a couple of tangerines.

There are many other suggestions for getting fresh fruits in the diet—ice cream, sherbet, or drinks made with the fruit juices are excellent and appetizing. For fresh strawberry ice cream use a quart of berries, mashed and strained, added to a partially frozen mixture of three cups of thin cream and four egg whites beaten stiff, freeze.

This recipe is also a good way to get fruit in the daily meal plan. Serve this salad for lunch or supper with crackers, cookies and milk:

Fruit Salad Boats

2 pineapples

2 cups strawberries

2 large bananas, sliced

8 ozs. cottage cheese

½ cup chopped celery

Cut pineapple in half; scoop out center. Remove core; cut in bite size pieces. Mix pineapple, strawberries, bananas, and celery. Pile into pineapple shell. Divide cottage cheese in four balls and place one on each salad.

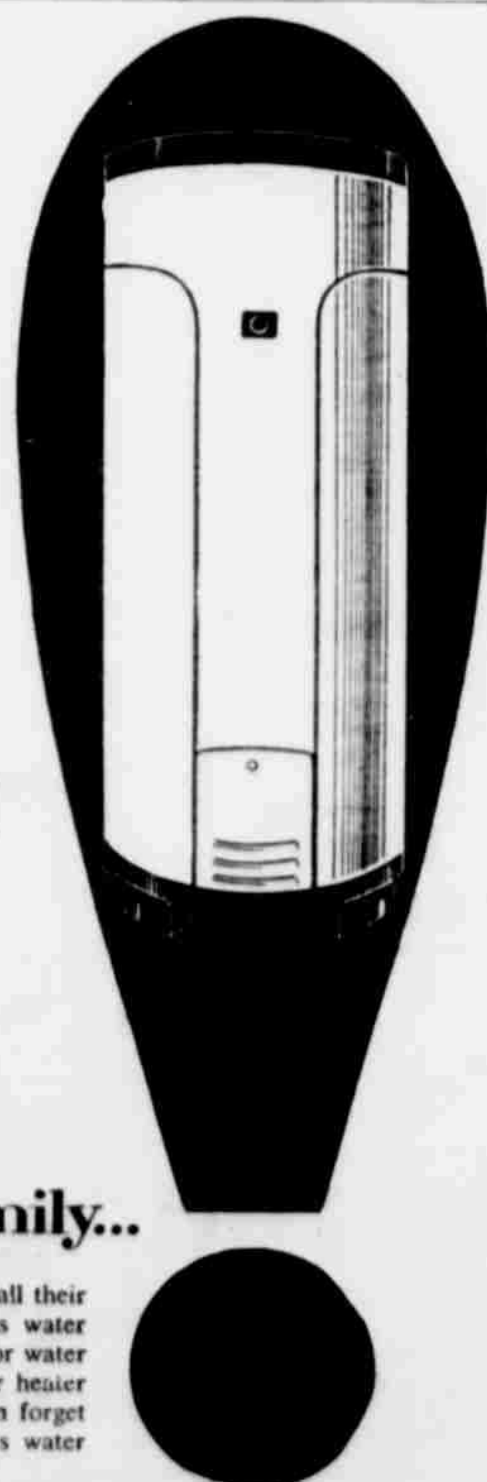

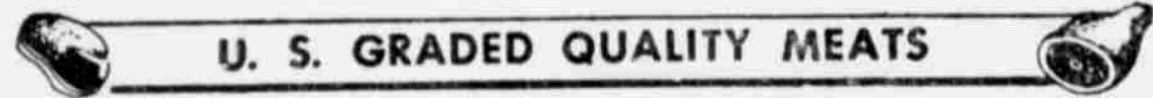
