**Candidate Jimmy Carter** and the other hatchet men of his campaign organization have been working hard at picturing Ronald Reagan as a warmonger. Referring to Reagan's statement that we have to increase our military strength in order to get respect from the world's trouble makers, they say that this reveals his aggressive intentions, therefore he can't be trusted.

The fact is that the GOP candidate has not said or done anything to justify this image which his opponents are trying to create. The charge is plainly an attempt to plant a lie in the minds of voters.

It's ironic that Carter should be so free with his insinuations about the harm that Reagan may do to the country when he himself has been guilty of real, not imaginary harm.

The real issue on this matter is not the uncertainty of what might happen but the certainty of what has happened. President Carter has been a disaster to our economic and political relations with other nations. Our security is weakened because of what he has done to help our enemies and hurt our allies.

Case No. 1, the Panama Canal giveaway to our communist enemy Trujillo, in spite of the objections of a big majority of US citizens. Besides the shameful arrangement by which we taxpayers pay the enemy to accept it, this deal was a great loss to our economic and military security.

Case No 2, our support to the communist revolutionaries upsetting governments of Rhodesia and Nicaragua. These countries were on our side in the world conflict with communism. We've not only betrayed them but weakened ourselves by turning allies into enemies. This is the pattern in all the revolutionary affairs. We take the side of those who plot our destruction.

The same applies on the economic level. During April and May a seven man mission of business experts visited Guatemala, Costa Rica, Honduras, Jamaica, Haiti, the Dominican Republic, Barbados, Trinidad and St. Vincent, and also conferred with representatives of Nicaragua and El Salvador. The key finding of their mission was that "US policy, frequently indifferent to the area and often unfriendly or unconcerned about private enterprise, is undermining Central America and the entire Caribbean Basin."

Many of the people interviewed thought that the apparent lack of a clear US commitment to the region has a serious destabilizing influence. One member of the mission said that the State Department is pushing these countries to the left with faulty land reform programs which actually impoverish the countries.

Carter's charges about the risks of a Reagan presidency are absurd. In the first place every suspicion is ungrounded. In the second place those wild imaginings, if true, could not do as much damage as Carter's deliberate blunders and/or mischief.

About the hassle with Governor Clements about calling Carter a damn liar for claiming US military strength increased during his leadership: It is true the governor was out of line. Such words, along with many other expressions of profanity, blasphemy, filth and gutter morality are out of place on radio, TV or print. Despite the claims that this represents real life, it is unnecessary and repulsive, and not in keeping with the dignity of anyone in high office. Governor Clements was out of line in saying it.

## Nation Will Vote Tuesday

The long and bitter campaign of 1980 will come to a welcome end next Tuesday as voters from all over the country make their choices at the polls. At the same time candidates for other offices, from local to federal, will also receive the voters' verdict.

In Muenster the election will be held at two locations, as usual, and the voting hours at each will be 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. John Pagel will be election judge in the K of C hall and Paul Fisher will be judge in the VFW hall.

Though the ballot is lengthy, with 36 candidates listed in four columns, plus nine proposed constitutional amendments, public interest centers on the presidential contest. The Reagan-Carter

race has received extensive and intensive attention, pointing to a probable high turnout of voters. The keen interest prevails all over the state and is expected to liven Republican - Democratic races for other offices.

Tiller (D) for Cooke County Sheriff. In addition there are 15 uncontested Democratic candidates for office.

The Libertarian Party lists Ed Clard and David Koch for president and vice president. The Independent party lists John Anderson and Milton Eisenhower for president and vice president.

The nine proposed constitutional amendments are:

1. Authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines.
2. Authorize appeal of certain pretrial rulings in a criminal case.
3. Requiring single appraisal and single board of equalization within a county for ad valorem tax.
4. Authorizing bingo for non

profit organizations when approved by local option election.

5 Granting governor power to exercise fiscal control over expenditure of appropriated funds

6 Authorizing governor to remove appointed officers with advice and consent of senate.

7 Authorizing counties under 5000 population to perform private road work.

8 Changing name of Court of Civil Appeals and names and qualifications of justices of the Supreme Court.

9 Allowing spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property.

### National Resolutions

Among resolutions adopted for presentation to the FB national convention are the following.

Charge welfare and food stamp costs to HEW rather than to the Department of Agriculture.

Abolish the Windfall Profits Tax.

Object to obscenities in political broadcasts and printed matter.

Urge American FB to demand that test weight, protein content, moisture and foreign material be declared as mandatory factors in determining quality of grain.

In hard cover form, the book contains over 500 pages with a complete index. It will be for sale for \$21.95 plus \$1.10 tax until December 1, when the price will be \$25.

## City Let Down by Census Population Reported at 1399

Include Muenster with the vast number of cities which claim to have received a short count in the 1980 census. The population is 1399, according to the official census bureau report just received by the city of Muenster. That's a decline of 12 since the official count of 1411 in the 1970 census, and a great let-down after expecting the new total to be more than 1800.

Considering that more than 100 new houses and mobile homes have been built during the past ten years, the report cannot possibly be correct, according to City Secretary Celine Dittfurth. She points out that the number of new homes is a matter of record as indicated by the residential building permits issued by City Superintendent Steve Mosier.

The figure also is far out of line with Mosier's estimate based on additions and subtractions. In relation to water connects and disconnects, he has added to or subtracted from the current count. Likewise he has recorded changes not

related to water connections such as births, deaths, and other moves in and out. By that method, he estimates the present count at 1870.

Deflating community pride is not this community's only gripe, Dittfurth said. It has also been short changed by the short count. It will receive less than its share of Revenue Sharing because federal payments are determined by population. And it may be short changed in congressional representation because of the same miscount.

Other population figures released by the Census Bureau indicate that the county and the cities of Gainesville and Lindsay have grown. Lindsay had a big increase of 33.8 percent for a total of 582, Gainesville increased 2.1 percent to a new total of 14,122 and the county increased 19.5 percent to a total of 28,042. Valley View at 516 and Callisburg at 280 are listed for the first time on the census roll. Since the cities were not incorporated in 1970, there are no comparative figures.

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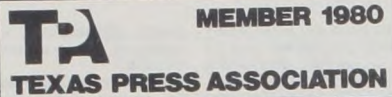

### THE ETERNAL STRUGGLE FOR FREEDOM

It has often been said that we are engaged in an ideological struggle, a conflict of ideas. Historically it has always been so, for two forces exist in the world in the sense of control over man: the forces of regimentation and the forces of freedom.

One could illustrate these forces by drawing a long, straight horizontal line with the forces of regimentation on the left, those of freedom on the right.

For most of the 6,000 years of recorded history man lived under a system of absolute monarchy with total regimentation of every aspect of life. Under these conditions government would be depicted at the far left extremity of the political spectrum.

Then here in America, a little over 200 years ago, the spark of freedom lit a flame that spread round the globe. As the flame spread nation after nation threw off the yoke of regimentation and moved far to the right on the spectrum, near total freedom.

As in our own case, country after country bound down their governments with chains of written constitutions. Government, the force of regimentation, was to be strictly limited to those functions which rightly inhere in each individual. Namely, to protecting the lives,

liberties and property of the people.

In all other affairs the people were to be totally free to pursue their own creative endeavors as they saw fit. As a result of this new birth of freedom all nations prospered mightily, especially our own blessed land.

Unfortunately, however, the forces of evil — regimentation — burst forth again in the form of Socialism in its many variations such as Communism, Nazism and Fascism, all standing for essentially the same thing: regimentation and control of man by the state.

These ideas have made great inroads in our own country. So here we are again, battling once more for our political lives, the forces of freedom struggling against those of regimentation. But how does one conduct an ideological struggle? Well, first of all, one must remember that we are dealing with ideas, which by their very nature suggest the direction of the effort. The great German philosopher, physician and missionary in Africa, Dr. Albert Schweitzer, once wrote:

"A new public opinion must be created privately and unobtrusively. The existing one is maintained by the press, by propaganda, by organization, and by financial influences which are at its disposal. The unnatural way of spreading ideas must be opposed by the natural one, which goes from man to man and relies solely on the truth of the thoughts and the hearer's receptiveness for new truth."

The ideas of regimentation are indeed today being promoted by the news media, by the federal government through its socialistic departments of Health and Human Services, Housing and Urban Development, and the newest, the Department of Education which will serve to condition the nation's children for regimentation.

At first thought it would appear the outlook is hopeless with such formidable adversaries, funded by the people's own tax money, but such is not the case. Ideas are powerful. The truth is powerful. The nature of man is the key.

## Your Vote May be Important

HOW IMPORTANT IS YOUR VOTE on Tuesday, November 4? It could make all the difference! On numerous occasions throughout history the course of the world has been changed by the margin of a single vote, according to Senator Lloyd Bentsen.

But for one vote, what we know today as the United States of America might be merely part of the fading British Empire.

On September 28, 1774 the First Continental Congress, meeting in Philadelphia, debated the "Galloway Plan."

The effect of the Galloway Plan would have been to transform the American colonies into a British dominion ruled by an English type of Parliament and a British governor.

Delegate Patrick Henry of Virginia made an impassioned speech against the plan before it came to a vote that day.

The Galloway Plan was defeated by one vote. With millions of votes being cast this year, it might be easy to assume that your lone vote would be lost in the shuffle, that it makes no difference whether you vote or not. That would be a mistake.

JOHN F. KENNEDY WAS ELECTED PRESIDENT by less than one vote per precinct across the nation. One-half of one percent of the votes cast in Illinois and New Jersey swung 43 electoral votes to Kennedy. Had that tiny percentage of the votes in those two states been reversed it would have been enough to throw that election into the House of Representatives for a decision.

In 1800 Thomas Jefferson was elected President over Aaron Burr by one vote in the House of Representatives, following a tie in the electoral college.

In 1824 John Quincy Adams gained the Presidency by one vote when that contest was decided in the House of Representatives.

And in 1876 Rutherford B. Hayes was elected President over Samuel J. Tilden when a special Electoral Commission voted 8-7 in his favor.

Repeatedly, throughout history, a single vote has changed the course of our civilization:

★ The U.S. Senate in 1845 agreed to annex Texas by a one-vote margin;

★ one vote cost King Charles I of England his head in 1649;

★ Elizabeth II is Queen of England today because some 250 years ago the British House of Commons voted in favor of the House of Hanover, 96-95;

★ In 1863 the U.S. Senate twice failed to convict President Andrew Johnson in his impeachment trial by single vote.

There is another story of a one-vote heartbreak that is repeated often in our nation's capital.

A Member of Congress from California, the story goes, was seeking renomination and when all the votes were counted he and his opponent each had exactly 10,429 votes.

Corp., and no new agency be created and no new office building be constructed for that purpose.

In the event of a grain embargo, demand law interest loans from government enabling farmers to buy embargoed grain for livestock feed.

Propose legislation requiring foreign owned grain companies to comply with grain embargoes, and that such companies be prevented from foreign grain dealings to countries which are embargoed by U.S.

Require that a grain embargo be subject to a majority vote of both houses of Congress.

Require that in case of an embargo on agricultural products, an embargo be declared also on sale of all other American products.

Oppose SALT 3 and all other SALT treaties.

State Resolutions Resolutions are addressed to the state FB as follows.

Authorize each county FB to sponsor an expense-paid trip by one of its members to Washington while Congress is in session.

Exempt alcohol from alcohol tax when used as fuel.

Re-affirm FB policy stating that "cities buying property for municipal use for lakes outside their own county should be obligated to pay all taxes to which the property is obligated."

Oppose health plans paid out of the national treasury and encourage hospitals and doctors to cooperate in lowering health costs.

Re-affirm policy of no penalty for drivers under 25 with a good record.

Re-affirm opposition to no fault automobile liability insurance.

Oppose discrepancy in age, sex and occupation in purchase of auto insurance.

Recommend that drivers over 65 not be penalized or required to pay a higher premium for auto insurance.

## County Collects \$945,559 in Auto Sales Tax

Cooke County's gross collections of the 4 percent tax on sales on cars, trucks, motorcycles and mobile homes during the fiscal year ending September 1 were \$945,559.51.

This figure was revealed by State Comptroller Bob Bullock along with those for all counties of the state.

Bullock also said the total tax received by the state for sale of those vehicles was \$439.4 million, a decline of \$3.7 million from the preceding year reflecting the sagging sales of automobiles.

Motor vehicle sales taxes are collected by county tax assessor-collectors, who retain five percent of the amount and send the rest to the state.

## POSITIONS OF THE CANDIDATES



Jimmy Carter

**ABORTION:** Believes personally that abortion is wrong, but is against a constitutional amendment which would overturn the Supreme Court decision permitting abortions.

**ERA:** Strongly supports ERA; determined to "do everything within my power" to ratify the amendment. Has used the White House to further the cause of ERA.

**SCHOOL PRAYER:** Opposes an amendment on school prayer; rites separation of Church and State, feels it would discriminate against atheists.

**HOMOSEXUAL RIGHTS:** Supports legislation which would remove homosexuality from a list of "sexual aberrations" for which aliens can be denied immigration. According to a White House staff member, says "have in the White House a President who is meeting with you and respects you."

**DRAFT:** Has called for draft registration in response to the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan. Supports drafting of women. Carter believes in the Volunteer Army and sees need to upgrade pay-scale and benefits.

**DEFENSE:** Opposed B-1 bomber, deferred production of neutron bomb, delayed production of cruise missile, Trident submarine, SSN-688 attack submarine, and Trident missile system. Has now asked for authorization for "rapid deployment force," and a 5% increase in defense spending.

**SALT II:** Supports the SALT process; feels it is "in our nation's interest," but that because of Soviet presence in Afghanistan is "inappropriate at this time."

**ECONOMIC POLICY:** Plans to continue his policies of wage and price guidelines, regulatory reform, and restraints on government spending. He does not favor wage and price controls. Carter is now seriously considering a tax cut for 1981.

**MIDDLE EAST:** Brought about the historic signing of a peace treaty between Egypt and Israel in March 1979 following the Camp David Summit. Does not support West Bank settlements or Palestinian Autonomy.

**ENERGY POLICY:** "We will never be completely strong at home or secure abroad until we have solved our nation's excessive dependence on foreign oil." Proposes stand-by gas rationing plan, converting electric power plants from oil to coal, development of alternative forms of energy and synthetic fuel. Says we must cut our imports of foreign oil in half by 1990.

**ABORTION:** Opposes abortion-on-demand. Believes that "interrupting a pregnancy is the taking of a human life and can only be justified in self-defense; that is, if the mother's own life is in danger." Suggests a constitutional amendment banning abortion.

**ERA:** Opposes ERA: "I do not believe that the ERA is the answer. The amendment would not itself redress inequalities in rights, and, by increasing the courts' legislative power, could do more harm than good."

**SCHOOL PRAYER:** Proposes an amendment to permit voluntary school prayer. "We are a nation under God." Says people are interpreting freedom of religion to mean freedom from religion.

**HOMOSEXUAL RIGHTS:** Does not advocate "gay lifestyles." Does not feel that any unique lifestyle should be given favored attention. "An employer should not be subject to special laws (such as 'gay ordinances' passed in some cities) which, in effect, would compel him to hire a person because of that person's sexual preference."

**DRAFT:** Opposes universal service and the drafting of women. Supports all-volunteer army. "Universal service rests on the assumption that people belong to the state, and are simply statistics to be manipulated by social engineers."

**DEFENSE:** "Thousands of years of human history have demonstrated that the most effective deterrent to armed conflict is military strength, not weakness." Supports development of B-1 bomber, neutron warhead, and MX missile.

**SALT II:** Sees it as fatally flawed...more of a strategic arms build-up than an arms limitation...should be shelved and the negotiations should go back to the table.

**ECONOMIC POLICY:** Tax cuts a priority. Plans to cut taxes by 30% over next 3 years. Hopes to provide substantially less government interference in people's lives. Plans to cut government costs, consolidating some departments and dismantling others, such as the Department of Energy and the Department of Education.

**MIDDLE EAST:** Strong supporter of Israel. "The crucial element determining the success or failure of American policy is the fate of Israel. Israel is America's natural ally."

**ENERGY POLICY:** Plans to dismantle the Department of Energy and its allocation rules. By DOE's own admission, "regulation has compounded any problem arising from imperfect market structures. Allocation formulas were mainly responsible for last summer's gasoline lines."

**ABORTION:** An opponent of the recently passed Hyde Amendment which gives Congress authority to refuse to federally fund abortions. "As a matter of conscience, I am saddened by the high incidence of unwanted pregnancies." The choice is a matter to be decided by a woman in conjunction with her God and her physician. Poor women should have government assistance to finance abortions.

**ERA:** Strong supporter. "The ERA is needed to enshrine in the Constitution the moral value judgment that sex discrimination is wrong." Voted against states' right to rescind, for the extension of the ratification deadline.

**SCHOOL PRAYER:** Anderson voted against school prayer in 1971, and according to his staff, would vote against a school prayer amendment again.

**HOMOSEXUAL RIGHTS:** Anderson is co-sponsor of H.R. 2074, a bill to amend the Civil Rights Act of 1964 to include homosexuals.

**DRAFT:** Opposes reinstitution of peacetime draft registration or compulsory service. "I am unalterably opposed to the draft during peacetime in the absence of compelling circumstances. Such circumstances do not exist."

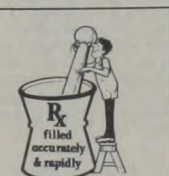
**DEFENSE:** "Every four years (during presidential elections) there is heightened fear about the Soviets as an excuse to take our minds off domestic problems." Opposes deployment of MX missile. Opposes defense hikes beyond 3%.

**SALT II:** Strong supporter. Believes SALT process should be continued to include an even more restraining treaty.

**ECONOMIC POLICY:** Supports holding down government spending, boosting productivity, encouraging personal savings, lessening the burdens of regulation and taxation on business, increasing research and development, and providing meaningful job training and continuing education programs. "Productivity is a vital national issue and should be brought to the forefront of domestic policy. Otherwise, we shall have to accept the resulting economic stagnation."

**MIDDLE EAST:** Supports an intermediary role for the U.S. without becoming an advocate for either Israel or Egypt.

**ENERGY POLICY:** Believes that a solution to energy crisis is to increase price of gasoline by fifty cents per gallon. Revenue raised would be redistributed through tax system to the poor and other groups.

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## Nominees Named for NFL/Miller Award

Eighty-four National Football League players, three from each of the 28 NFL teams, have been nominated on the basis of their participation in community affairs along with their playing ability for the 1980 Miller High Life/NFL Man of the Year Award.

Top each half with 2 tomato slices and several onion rings; cover with slice of cheese. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Mix together beef, salt and pepper; divide into 8 parts. Shape into oblong patties; place on top of cheese, spreading and sealing to edge of roll (this prevents cheese from running out). Place on baking sheet; bake 25 minutes or until beef reaches desired degree of doneness. When sandwiches are removed from oven, slices of Cheddar cheese may be placed on top as garnish. For special occasions use cookie cutters to make designs from Cheddar cheese slices.

### SPICED COCOA

Yield: 8 cups

1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup cocoa  
1/2 tps. cinnamon  
1/2 tps. salt  
1/4 tps. nutmeg

1 cup water  
7 cups milk  
Marshmallows, if desired

Combine sugar, cocoa, cinnamon, salt and nutmeg in a large saucepan; gradually add water. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly, and boil 1 minute. Add milk and heat to serving temperature. (Do not boil.)

# Hornets Scuttle Pirates 28-0

After a long string of disappointments, football was fun again for Muenster's Hornets as they rolled over Perrin 28-0. They had near complete success on rushing defense, holding their husky opponents to a net gain of only 7 yards.

On the other hand their own rushing was a pleasing improvement over former performance. Apparently the Pirates concentrated on pass defense and in doing so

allowed more opportunity for the runs. The result was that Muenster gained 194 on the ground but only 38 through the air. The opponents gained 66 on passes.

The game started with Muenster losing possession by interception on the second series, after which the teams exchanged punts and John Walterscheid recovered Perrin's fumble.

That was squarely in mid-field, where MHS started

The punt at that time is one for the record books. With Hornets bearing down on him, Perrin's receiver chose not to catch the ball, but just stood still, apparently allowing it to roll to a

stop. Well, he should have looked. The ball came down squarely on his helmet and tumbled into the end zone where David Flusche pounced on it for a touchdown. Again Swirczynski's kick was good and the score was 21-0.

Late in the busy third period, in Perrin's second series after kickoff, Swirczynski recovered a fumble to start Muenster's last drive at the Pirate 47. The next five tries gained 27 to the 20 yard line and Klement stepped off 19 to the 1. Perrin got stubborn there stopping two Hornet tries, then Swirczynski finished the job with a quarterback sneak on the third play of the fourth quarter.

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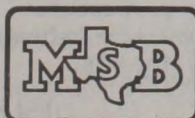
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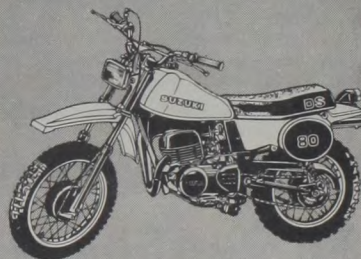


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## Hornets and Panthers will Meet in Old Rivalry Match

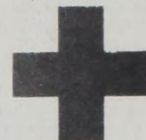

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## Young Motorcycle Pro Almost Quit, Now Stars on AMA-Winston Series



Ricky Graham was one of the major surprises of the 1980 Winston Pro series as the 21-year-old finished third in the overall points standings.

PACIFIC GROVE, Calif. — Young Ricky Graham nearly quit racing motorcycles a few years ago when his father and older brother gave up the sport. However, heeding the advice of a family friend, Graham continued to ride and today he's one of the top young stars on the American Motorcyclist Association's Winston Pro series.

"My racing career almost ended before it really got started," says the 21-year-old whose consistency on the Winston Pro circuit this season earned him a healthy third-place in the points standings.

"Dad entered short-track events all over California for many years and he got us (Ricky plus an older and a younger brother) started in mini-bikes when I was 12," explains Graham. "About three years ago, he just decided to sell all the bikes and devote full-time to his carpentry business."

After graduating from high school, Graham was prepared to go to work for his father and give up riding bikes despite the fact that he had finished third in the AMA's Western Region as a novice dirt-tracker the year before.

Dave Pestone, the influential family friend, had seen Ricky ride enough times to realize the youngster's potential. Pestone convinced the Gramahs that Ricky might have a future as a professional expert. Three years later, even that prediction may be a bit conservative.

Graham's record as a junior rider in 1977 was similar to his novice campaign — a series of consistent second and third place finishes, a few victories and a second place finish in the regional points race. He entered some nationals, including Houston, Denver and San Jose, as a rookie expert in 1978 but lacked the equipment needed to challenge the more experienced opponents.

"I guess it was the spring San Jose Mile last season (1979) where people first heard about me," says Graham. "It was a great race. There were 41 lead changes and it was televised by ABC. I finished second behind (1979 Winston Pro champion) Steve Eklund."

Just two weeks after his stunning San Jose finish, Graham set the top qualifying time at a half-mile national event at Louisville, Ky. He went on to record two more top-five finishes and ended up 13th in the Winston standings.

His 1979 record pales in comparison to what Graham accomplished this year. Prior to the Oct. 4 season finale at Ascot, Calif., Graham had finished in the top five in 10 of the 19 dirt-track events on the Pro tour this season. He also notched his first two national wins at Indianapolis and Tulsa, Okla.

"I was pushing really hard to win that first one," says Graham, who grew up here only minutes away from the famous golf courses of the Monterey Peninsula. "Winning at Indy was a big step. I'm looser and a lot more relaxed since then."

Graham has received some parts assistance from Harley-Davidson (he rides Harley equipment at most events) and has a limited sponsorship deal with Klotz and Wiseco Lubricants.

One of the main differences between this season and last has been the presence of Graham's 250-pound tuner, Tex Peel. "Tex is the greatest and he's really helped out a lot," notes Graham. "During the week, he holds down a regular day shift job at a Buick plant in Flint, Mich. At night, he works on my bikes. When I get to the races, all I have to do is ride."

Graham's boyish good looks sometimes belie his intense determination to succeed. His goal is plain and simple — he wants to win the Winston Pro series championship.

"I want to be No. 1, if not this year than next year or the year after that," says Graham, who entered the last event of the 1980 season trailing only Harley-Davidson's Randy Goss and Ohio privateer Hank Scott in the standings. "Someday, I want to be the best."

## energy answers

from the Texas Energy Extension Service

I have a gas-fired furnace and would like some guidelines on seasonal maintenance. R. O., San Marcos.

The following is a list of steps for preventive maintenance on gas-fired central systems provided by the Center for Energy Studies (University of Texas at Austin) in the Home Energy Analysis Training manual:

- (1) Oil the condensing unit fan motor.
- (2) Clean the condensing coil fins and condenser fan.
- (3) Check the condensing unit for refrigerant leaks.
- (4) Check the electrical connections inside the condensing unit to make sure they are tight.

- (5) Make a visual inspection of the compressor start and run capacitors.
- (6) Clean the air supply fan motor housing and oil the motor at least once a year.
- (7) Remove the fan assembly and clean the squirrel-cage fan blade.
- (8) Check the fan control and limit switch. (If you have doubts about how to handle this, consult a qualified service representative).
- (9) Check the furnace adjustments. Light the pilot and check the burner air adjustments, paying particular attention to the color of the flame. A sharply defined blue flame indicates the proper mixture of gas and primary

and secondary air. Then adjust the pilot light.  
(10) Clean the drip pan and the entering-air side of the evaporator coil.

Preventative maintenance should be done on a regular basis. Many air conditioning and heating service companies offer this service for a very reasonable fee.

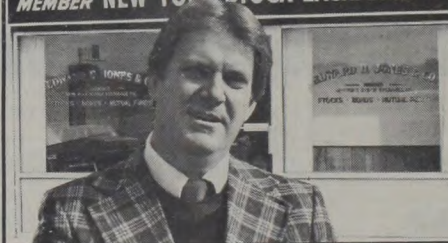

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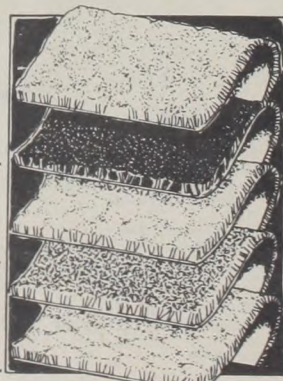
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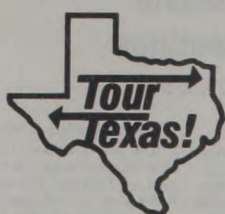

## Forecast For Texas Crops Still Dim; Reflect Drought

AUSTIN--The outlook is still dim for Texas crop production despite little changes in the October production estimates, reports Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown.

"At this stage of the game we have a good picture of the total effect of this summer's drought and heat wave, and it is obvious that the impact was severe," said Brown. "Both yield and production have declined in nearly every category, and we anticipate that lost production will amount to over \$871 million to crops alone. Losses of both crops and livestock will be over \$1.5 billion."

Brown noted that the Texas cotton crop is estimated at 3.6 million bales, 35 percent below last year's 5.5-million-bale crop. Average yields, at 258 pounds per acre, are down 131 pounds from 1979.

The smallest grain sorghum harvest since 1956 is pre-

dicted in Texas this year, Brown said. At 97.9 million hundredweight (cwt.), production will be some 28 percent below last year.

The Texas corn harvest will drop 18 percent this year, Brown said, with yields expected to run 80 bushels per acre, compared to 105 bushels per acre in 1979.

Rice, the only crop to show an increase, should be up slightly to 23.5 million cwt., due mainly to a slight increase in harvested acreage rather than higher yields. Pecan production was affected severely by the drought, with a 73-percent dropoff expected. The crop should total only 25 million pounds.

Hay should be in short supply this fall and winter, as production is expected to drop 31 percent to 4.2 million tons. The first estimates of the sunflower crop indicate a 29-percent decline. Soybeans will be down 27 percent.
