TUESDAY'S THUNDERSTORMS sent ranging torrents of water, waist deep, across the Snyder Highway, north of Buford Gin. This pickup, driven by a non-English speaking man, was swept into the rushing water and almost completely submerged by the time Volunteer Firemen were able to advance near enough to toss a rope to the victim and drag him from the flood waters, uninjured. Police also blocked traffic at Fifth and Seventh Streets, on Hickory Street, because the intersection at Sixth and Hickory Streets was flooded and impassable for a period. Game Warden Ronnie Aston assisted numerous motorists stalled at this intersection. The temporary crossing constructed by the city, where the bridge on Front Street washed away last Spring, was washed out and the Colorado River was still rising at press time Wednesday.

Bids will soon be open, pending school board approval, for sale of the 2,025 sq. ft. total-electric home recently completed by the Building Trades students of Colorado High School. The home, located on a 100 foot by 140 foot

## Aggravated Assault Of State Trooper Alleged

What began Sunday as a routine traffic accident investigation by Texas Highway Patrolmen resulted in charges against a Snyder man of aggravated assault on a law officer and driving while intoxicated.

Trooper Burson's investigation also showed the pickup had spun around in the road, left the paved surface and rolled over one and one-half times.

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According to a report made by Investigating Trooper James Burson, the accident occurred at 4:45 p.m. Sunday, three miles north of Colorado City on Highway 208.

Trooper Burson said he arrived on the scene to find a 1977 Chevrolet Pickup overturned and resting on its top in a bar ditch.

In his investigation of the accident, Burson said the driver of the pickup was Shelby James Jones, Jr., 29, of Snyder.

Jones was transported to Root Memorial Hospital where the alleged attack on Trooper Burson took place. Jones was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Henry Doss and bond was set at \$5,000 and \$1,500 on the respective charges.

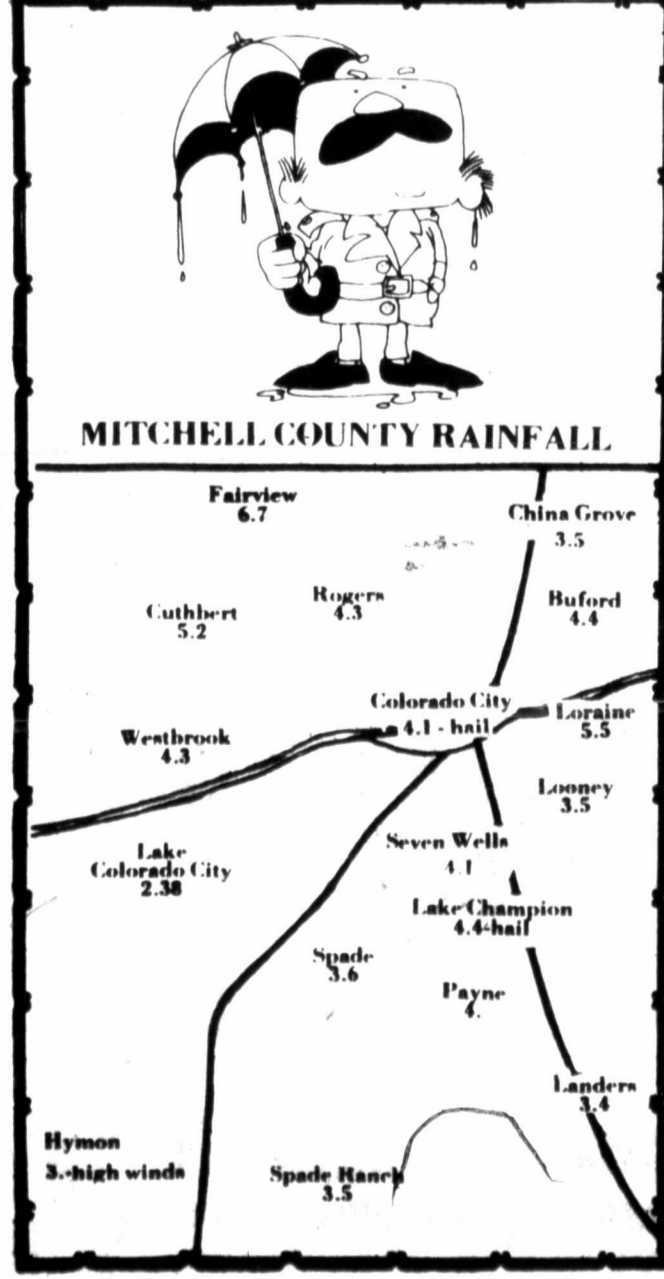

## Weed Control-Good Investment

During years when abundant rainfall is received in the Winter and Spring, numerous weeds appear. A rancher may want to consider controlling the weed population on his more productive sites.

Weeds use valuable moisture that is very important to grass during the Spring. Grass production on treated pastures has been known to increase 200 to 300 percent. Also, weeds such as broomweeds, cause a shading effect on seedlings that are trying to become established and grass that is already established.

This shading decreases the sunlight that reaches the grass. The sunlight is necessary for the grass and seedlings to grow and manufacture food.

In the Fall of 1974 and Winter of 1975 we received an abundance of rain but made a poor grass crop in 1975. The weeds had robbed the grass plants of valuable moisture and sunlight.

The application of 2, 4-D at one pound per acre active ingredient in the Spring is the recommended practice for weed control. Herbicide sprays should be applied

to weeds when they are seedlings or in a succulent growth stage. This year the spraying should be completed by at least April 30th in areas near susceptible crops. Rangeland not in the vicinity of cropland can be sprayed at a later date if desired.

The best air temperature range for the herbicide to work is 70 to 80 degrees Fahrenheit. When herbicides are applied, the wind velocity should not exceed 10 mph. The rains that fell on April 14th will put the annual weeds in good condition to spray.

When applying herbicides, caution should be taken to make sure the spray is not drifting to susceptible crops or fruit trees. Also, cattle should be removed from the treated pasture or area for seven to fourteen days after the spray.

## Fire Demonstration Is Held In Dowell Yard

Dowell sponsored a program Monday night in an effort to minimize injuries to local volunteer fire fighters in the event they should be called upon to fight a fire at their company yard on the Robert Lee Highway.

Volunteer fire department members were on hand to view a 20 minute film entitled "Burn & Live" after which they were given a tour of the Dowell yard where various chemical and machinery hazards were pointed out and discussed.

Due to the seriousness of a chemical fire the tour took approximately an hour and a half as fire fighting methods involving the various chemicals were categorized by those which can be fought with foam and those which can be fought with water.

safer by separating the chemicals according to the method needed to fight a potential fire.

In addition, four Nomex uniforms were donated to the fire department because of their resistance to fire and heat. Nomex uniforms are required attire in the Dowell shop, yard, and on location for all employees. This fire-resistant material is also used in uniforms for race car drivers and astronauts.

The presentation was given by three Dowell employees, Kenneth Golden, Roland Powell and Russ Brichacek.

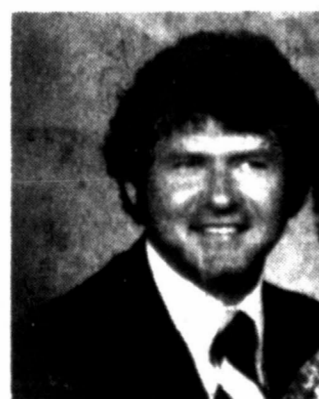
