23rd Annual goat cook-off begins Friday

It's almost here! The Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department will hold the 23rd Annual World Championship Boer Goat Cook-Off in Ruddick Park this weekend, October 5th and 6th. There are still a few spots left for cooks, and judges are needed to taste the entries!

Anyone interested in being a judge in the contest is asked to be at the pavilion in the park near the swimming pool at 10:30 a.m. Saturday. No sign up is required. Just show up hungry!

This year's cook-off is limited to the first 46 teams,

and Asst. Chief Tom Carlock said there are still a few spots open. Most teams wait until the last minute to enter, but if you wait, you may not get a spot. So, pick up your entry forms at the fire station.

Cost is \$175 per three-member team. Those who paid deposits must pay the remaining sum. All forms must be turned in at or mailed to the Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department, 620 E. 11th St. in Col-

orado City.

Half of a boer goat will be provided to each team at check-in on Friday from noon until 7 p.m. Contestants must cook and turn in the goat provided for judging, and all cooking must take place on site.

The real self-proclaimed cooks will have the chance to prove themselves, as there are four other categories in which to enter. A jackpot cook-off will be held for beans, pork ribs, brisket and dessert. This year, the fire

Frequently asked questions about an EDC

An Economic Development Corporation has been established by the City of Colorado City. This will be a vehicle for attracting new business and industry to the city, as well as creating a demand for new job skills.

This will, in turn, create a market for new and used homes, increase school enrollment, generate more retail sales, restaurant diversification, etc. The population change will stimulate more business and industry as well as medical service diversity, all leading to more jobs, etc. As these cycles repeat, the economy will expand and the standard of living here will rise.

No, this will not occur overnight. However, some changes are expected in three to five years. Some projects will take 10 or more years

There are many questions that will arise with an EDC. So, here are a few Frequently Asked Questions about the EDC and some answers.

1. The EDC may be partially funded through sales tax revenue. Will this affect my taxes?

No. It will be a reallocation only. The total tax rate is now 8.25% applied at the point of sale. This will not change. The state gets 6.25%, leaving 2% for the county (0.5%) and the city (1.5%). If the

proposed funding is approved, the EDC will receive 1/8th of 1% of the city's current 1.5% allocation. For instance, if the city currently receives a \$1500 allocation, under the proposed change it would now receive \$1375 and the EDC would receive \$125. The funds would be distributed by the state via direct deposit to the EDC bank account.

2. Is the EDC part of the city or is it its own legal entity?

Although the EDC is sponsored by the city, it will be a stand-alone Texas corporation whose purpose is to administer the sales tax allocation. It is governed by the Development Corporation Act of 1979 and the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act. It has its own by-laws. However, the city is the authorizing unit required by law (LGC Sec. 501.073). Any actions taken by the EDC must be also approved by the city council.

3. Is the EDC a political subdivision with its own taxing authority? No.

4. Is the EDC limited to a geographic area?

Yes. It is authorized to operate only within the city limits. However, if the county agrees, the EDC may participate with the county in a project that is outside the city limits. With the county's permis-

sion, the EDC may take on projects outside the extra territorial jurisdiction.

5. How is the EDC administered?

The EDC is administered by a seven-member board appointed by the city council. At least three of the members must not be city employees, city officers, or city council members. Appointees may be removed by the city council at will. They are appointed for two-year terms and must be a resident of the city. They may be appointed to consecutive terms.

6. How are disbursements controlled?

All expenditures are authorized by, and require approval of, the city council.

7. How are potential or identified conflicts of interest controlled?

The corporate by-laws address this issue. However, the EDC operates under the same state laws concerning ethics and the open meetings act (LGC Sec. 501.072) that all branches of government must follow.

8. How are board members compensated?

Only reimbursement of pre-authorized expenses is allowed. Board members do not receive a salary.

MCHD encourages women to get yearly mammograms

National Breast Cancer Awareness Month is a chance to raise the importance of detecting breast cancer early so that it may be treated. Mitchell County Hospital District is helping spread the word about the importance of self-breast examinations and regular mammograms.

The American Cancer Society recommends yearly mammograms for females age 45-54. Women ages 40-44 who are at average risk for breast cancer may also choose to have mammograms. Women over the age of 40 and women who are at high risk should talk to their physician about screening.

A mammogram is an X-ray image of the breast tissue. A

physician uses the image to look for signs of cancer developing. It is said that a mammogram can detect breast cancer up to three years before it can be felt. It is crucial that breast cancer is found early, when it is most treatable.

Clarence Wayne Clark 1933-2018

BOERNE – Clarence Wayne Clark, 85, formerly of Colorado City, passed away Wednesday, Sept. 19, 2018 at his home in Boerne.

Mr. Clark was born in Lamesa on July 24, 1933 to Cecil and Obie (Standefor) Clark. He attended Buford School until it closed, transferring to Colorado City in the 4th grade. He graduated from Colorado High School with the class of 1950. He worked at City National Bank until he was old enough to join the U.S. Air Force and served in the Korean Conflict, stationed in Okinawa.

While still in the air force, he married Yvonne Buckner on Oct. 18, 1953. The wedding was held at Oak St. Baptist Church in Colorado City, which both of their fathers helped to build. Mr. Clark died one month short of their 65th wedding anniversary.

After serving four years in the USAF and attaining the rank of Staff Sgt., Mr. Clark worked for Core Labs in Midland, moving to Big Spring in 1957 to work civil service at Webb Air Force Base. He attended Howard College before transferring to Texas Tech University in Lubbock where he graduated with a bachelor's degree in accounting in 1963. His career with Armour Inc. took him to several states but he returned to Texas in 1980 and eventually retired as comptroller at KCBT TV in Lubbock.

Mr. Clark was involved for several years in the River Ministry, helping to transport building and medical supplies to mission projects in the Fabens area border towns with Mexico, as well as staff Vacation Bible School, often taking the grandchildren with him. He also initiated the start of a Southern Baptist Church in Alliance, Ohio. At the time of his death, he was a member of First Baptist Church, Boerne.

Mr. Clark was preceded in death by his parents and a daughter, Stacia Turner.

He is survived by his wife, Yvonne of Boerne; two daughters, Katherine (Mrs. Kenny) Hammond of Colorado City and Chrystal (Mrs. Marvin) Walker of Boerne; eight grandchildren including Amie (Mrs. Ty) Wood, Carla (Mrs. Andrew) Sauer and Eric Hammond, all of Colorado City; Sam Walker (wife, Deborah) of Spring Branch and Nathan (wife, Kami) Walker of Wichita, Kansas; Alyx (Mrs. John) Douglas of Lubbock, and Kirby (wife, Kylee) Turner of Jacksonville, NC; and 23 great-grandchildren. He is also survived by his brother and sister-in-law, Don and Ellen Clark of Enid, OK.

A memorial service is planned for Mr. Clark Oct. 20, 2018 in Boerne, with interment in the Colorado City Cemetery.

Merket, Monroe inducted onto CHS Wall of Fame

This week the *Record* continues the coverage of the Colorado High School Wall of Fame inductees. Highlighted this week will be Bo Merket and Marcus Monroe.

Bo Merket

Bo Merket was a lifelong resident of the China Grove and Colorado City communities. He was a 1946 graduate of Colorado High School. After graduation from CHS, Bo went on to further his education at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene. He graduated in 1950 with degrees in English and mathematics. Bo went on to serve his country where he was a corporal in the US Army from January 1951 to November 1952. Prior to his deployment, Bo married the love of his life, Nina Wallis.

After his return to Texas in 1952, Bo and his brother, Lindy, owned and operated the Merket Brothers Dairy and he farmed as well. In 1958, Bo was asked to teach in Colorado ISD and a new career began. He is remembered by many for teaching Algebra 1 and 2 including honors and physics. Bo was well known by his students and colleagues for coining the phrase, "Algebra is Beautiful", and for the passion with which he taught it. Another Bo phrase is "Sorry chalk!".

Bo was selected as Outstanding Secondary Educator

of America in 1975. He was also nominated for Texas Excellence Award for Outstanding High School Teachers. He received several leadership awards for sponsoring UIL, where he coached mathletes that included Number Sense and Calculator. He also sponsored several students in science fair and similar events.

In addition to his teaching, Bo also drove a school bus for 25 years. For some high school students who were of the age to drive, he knew they had gotten in trouble at home when they had to ride the bus. He would ask them, "You're grounded, aren't ya?". Bo also filmed the varsity football games for 20 years.

The energy and enthusiasm Bo had for his career was exemplified by his involvement in extracurricular activities and events already mentioned, and others such as prom and Howl Nite organizer and performer. Other teachers have expressed their gratitude for his mentoring during their early career years and for the professional and personal relationships that endured. Bo's tireless commitment to his students and to the profession as well as his impeccable character and the respect he enjoyed for all who knew him made him an exceptional educator.

Upon his retirement in 1990, Bo was selected as an honorary member of the Class

of 1990, and he was recognized at the graduation ceremony. A scholarship entitled "Algebra is Beautiful" is awarded to a graduating CHS senior each year in his honor. Bo was an avid fisherman and hunter. He was a member of the Colorado City Bass Club and an honorary lifetime member of the Concho Bass Club of San Angelo.

Marcus Monroe

Marcus Monroe is a 1992 graduate of Colorado High School. While at CHS, Marcus was a member of National Honor Society, FCA and a four-year member of the CHS band. He graduated in the top 10 in his class. Marcus also excelled in sports. He was a three-year letterman

in football and basketball in which he was selected to three All-Area teams in both sports. Marcus earned Sophomore of the Year honors in basketball, and he was named to the Converse All American Team during his senior year.

After graduation, Marcus went on to further his education at McMurry University. He completed his degree in Psychology/Sociology in 1998. Marcus then worked as a manager of a mental health facility for the next 15 years.

In 2007, in a quest to improve the quality of life in Colorado City, Marcus reopened the Palace Theater. He is proud to be able to provide entertainment in a nice, safe,

family type environment. Marcus also became heavily involved in youth mentoring. For the past 13 years, he has spent countless hours training and developing young athletes. In 2010, along with his wife Bea, he helped establish the Colorado City Youth Travel Teams. The mission is to use sports to teach young men and women how to be successful at home, in the classroom, in the community and in life after sports.

Marcus is married to Bea and together they have three children. Markis is a senior at Colorado High School; Mia is a sophomore at Colorado High School, and Mayson is a 7th grader at Colorado Middle School.

Landry and Leeder visit C-City

Drew Landry, Democratic candidate for State Representative District 83 and Jennie Lou Leeder, Democratic candidate for U.S. Congress Texas District 11, came to Colorado City last Tuesday for a town hall meeting. Both candidates talked about the issues important to them.

Public education was one of the main topics discussed. Leeder said she has a real issue with the federal government passing unfunded mandates, such as No Child Left Behind. Leeder has been a teacher for 11 years, her mom retired after 25 years and her dad after 27 years in the profession.

She also said the standardized state testing is a problem. Leeder said Texas and Alaska are the only two states in the U.S. that use a different test. "And our students' scores on the SATs are not rising be-

cause of it," Leeder said.

Leeder said she will have paid more than \$30,000 in interest on her student loans once they are paid off. She said she would like to see all federal student loans offered at 0% interest, and she has a plan to pay for it.

The Democrat is in favor of repealing the latest tax reform. She would also like to see the money used to give retired teachers a raise. She said retired educators have not had a raise in 15 years, not even a cost-of-living raise.

Landry said he is pro accountability in school, but he would like to see Texas get rid of the STAAR test. He said the state spends \$300 million on the STAAR test that causes teachers, students and parents a huge deal of anxiety.

Landry would like to see the \$300 million, plus the \$800

million now being spent on immigration in Texas, spent on public education. He said the money could be spent to keep good teachers teaching.

Landry would like to see Texas legislators use \$1-\$2 billion out of the Rainy Day Fund to fund public schools, provide better transportation infrastructure, back agricultural producers and help provide better healthcare for all rural areas of Texas.

Leeder said leveling the playing field for rural areas should include providing better broadband, so opportunities are available for all.

Landry said the average income for persons in District 83 is \$30,000 to \$50,000 per year. He said he thinks legislators who are earning way above that income bracket can't understand the average voter.

Colorado City PD adds new Chevy Tahoe to fleet

The newest piece of equipment in the Colorado City Police Department's arsenal was delivered to the station last week. It's a 2018 Chevy Tahoe, and it's ready for police work.

Thanks to a larger body-style and backseat, the Tahoe will be used to transport crime scene equipment and will primarily be driven by Lt. Kelsey Rivera. It sports the latest in law enforcement add-ons, such as a light bar, radar, a telescoping bracket for the computers and more.

CCPD Chief Charles Rice said the department decided to go back to the white color scheme but kept the Wolf logo. He said the white vehicles are easier for citizens to see.

The new SUV means CCPD is now using fairly new cars. Two of the older Dodge Chargers are still in use, but most of the other vehicles are newer.

The 2018 Tahoe was ordered in May and has been undergoing installation of all the police bells and whistles. It came from Defender Supply in Argyle, the biggest distributor of police vehicles in the

country. Rice said there's a warranty on all equipment, as well as the vehicle.

9. How many board members must vote 'yes' to approve an action?

A majority of the entire board, i.e., four of the seven, must be present and vote 'yes' to approve any action. Missing members count as a 'no' vote. Proxy or telephone votes are not allowed.

10. Are there any pre-approved expenses?

Yes. Administrative expenses, including staff, that are required to implement projects, are pre-approved.

11. Does the Open Meetings Act apply?

Yes. Meetings must be posted in advance and must be held within the city. Executive sessions may be held during a public meeting to discuss topics not currently suitable for public dissemination.

12. Are public hearings required on projects?

Yes. One public hearing is required before spending money to undertake a project unless the project is defined in the Local Government Code.

13. Is there a waiting period before spending funds on any given project?

Yes. Funds may not be disbursed for 60 days following the first public notice of a specific EDC project.

14. Are EDC actions subject to the Public Information Act? Yes.

15. What kind of incentives may the EDC use?

The EDC may provide funds, land, buildings, equipment, improvements, etc., for projects that create or retain jobs required, or are suitable, for development, retention or expansion of a variety of applications, such as: manufactur-

ing and industrial facilities; research and development facilities; recycling facilities; distribution centers; small warehouse facilities; infrastructure such as streets and roads, drainage and related improvements, etc.; targeted infrastruc-

ture projects to promote or develop new or expanded business enterprises; development or expansion of airport facilities, including hangers, maintenance and repair facilities, cargo facilities located on or adjacent to an airport

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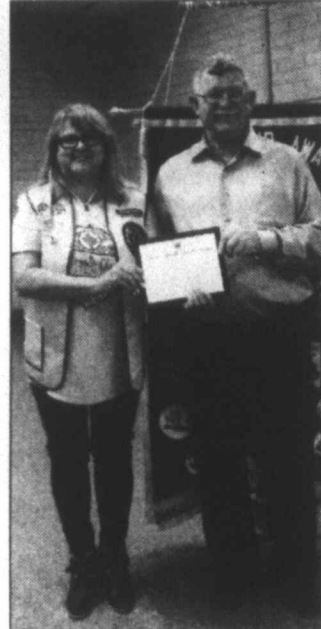

New Loraine mayor speaks to Lions Club

Dearl Messick, new mayor of Loraine, was the guest speaker at the Colorado City Lions Club meeting Friday. He talked a little about himself, the road to becoming mayor and current happenings at the City of Loraine.

Messick was born in Rotan, but he graduated from high school in Arizona. He is an Eagle Scout and served in the military from 1973 to 1976 as a Military Policeman. He earned his associate's degree and joined the carpenters' union in Arizona.

As a carpenter, Messick worked on construction of high-rise buildings, but he had a fear of heights. He said that was a fear he faced and conquered through lots of practice at work. Messick stayed in the union for 22 years and became a supervisor with the union.

Eventually returning to Texas, Messick went to work at the TDCJ Wallace Unit in 2001. He and his wife have been married for 30 years. She had six kids, he had four and together they have 10 kids, 27 grandkids and eight great-grandkids.

As a union organizer, Messick dealt with state and federal regulations. That continued in his job with TDCJ. He told Lions that education makes a difference, and usually leads to a path of success.

When Messick and his wife moved to Loraine, realtor Flo McKenney sold them what was once the home of Dr. Johnson. The couple paid \$14,000 for the home, put a little TLC into it and moved in on February 16, 2001.

The path to becoming mayor was interesting for Messick. He said he prays a lot, and he received word from the Lord that he was going to become mayor. Two weeks later, he was contacted by then-mayor Irene Graham, who invited him to join the city council.

Messick joined the council in May, and Graham announced in June she would be leaving her post. It was about this time Messick received a call from one of his sons who needed his help with work in New York. Messick told Lions he told the Lord, "Ok. This is a sign. If the job works out, I'll know the mayor thing was all me. If not, then I'll know you want me to be mayor."

It wasn't long before his son called to say the job was off, and Messick knew he was going to be mayor. He was appointed at the July council meeting.

Since that time, Messick has been working with new City Secretary Tracy Mallion and former City Manager Brenda Hammond to learn about the city's finances and proceed with city business. He said the city

had been paying \$22,000 to \$25,000 per month in salaries, but not anymore.

Messick is now working with water specialist Joe Vick from Roscoe, while city employee David Johnson obtains his certification. With Vick, Johnson, Mallion and Hammond on staff full and part-time, salaries for two months have totaled \$16,887.

He said the City of Loraine was two to three months behind on paying bills when he took the helm. Messick has talked to the city's creditors who are working with him to get caught up. He said some debts have already been paid off, and now the City of Loraine is in compliance with the Texas Water Development Board in less than two months.

Messick lauded the staff's hard work, saying they have

pride in their work. Many expenses have been cut to help Loraine's bottom line. Water testing that used to cost \$500 per month is now being conducted for \$104 per month, thanks to some advice from the City of Roscoe.

Thanks to help from Lt. Silva and Sgt. Fuentes and a work crew from the Wallace Unit, the cemetery is looking better. Water bill adjustments have been made, as meters are being read, and Messick said citizens' complaints are fewer now.

An auditor was expected to come in to conduct an inspection this week.

Messick is sure of what has made the difference at the city. He said the staff gathers every morning and prays together. "We honor the Lord at the City of Loraine," the mayor said.

Masters visits Westbrook ISD

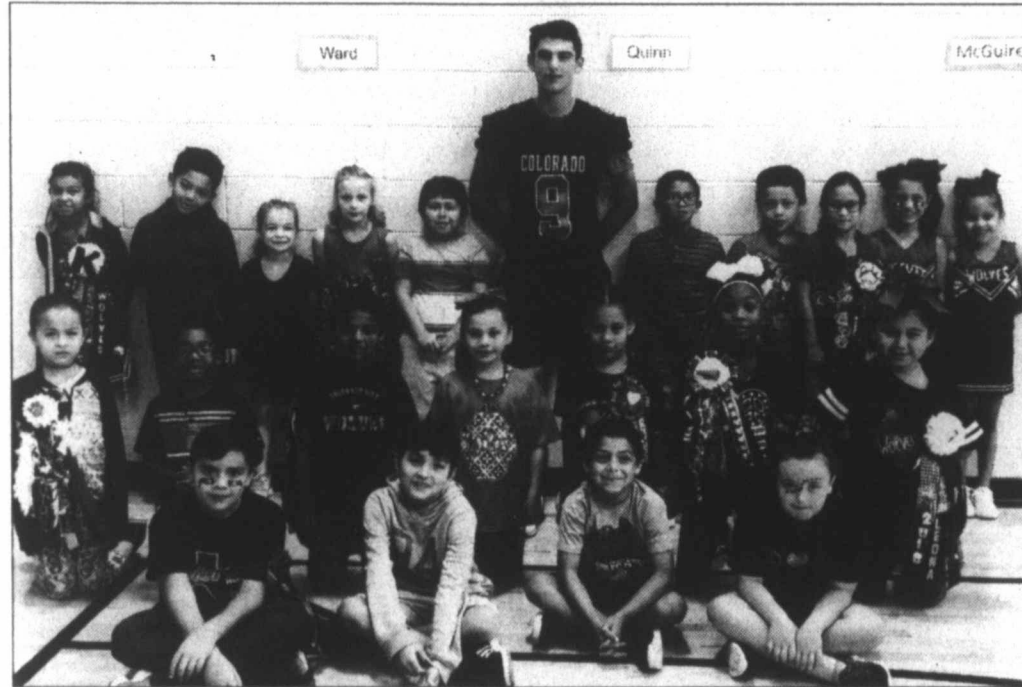

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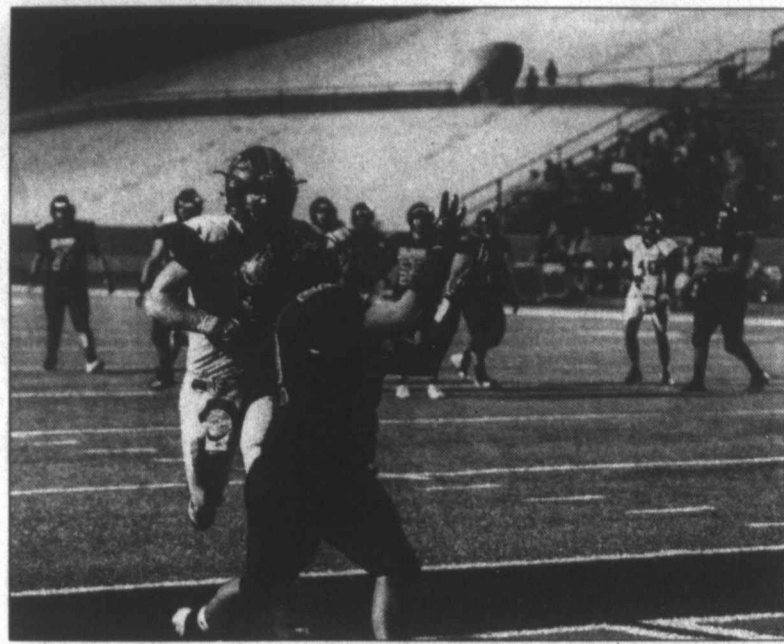

Wolves remain perfect with OT win over Clyde

It wasn't easy, but the Colorado Wolves remained one of only four unbeaten teams in the Big Country on Friday by grinding out a thrilling 27-26 overtime victory over the Clyde Bulldogs in a key non-district showdown. Although it was a bit closer than he preferred, the victory was sweet for CHS head coach Dan Gainey. Not only did the victory improve his team to

5-0, it also answered the question of how the team would react under pressure.

"It was a great win," said Gainey. "I thought our kids responded well in overtime after allowing them to get momentum during the fourth."

Clyde did everything it could to trip up Colorado City in the final 15 minutes of the contest. The Bulldogs scored a pair of fourth-quarter touchdowns to tie the game at 20-20 at the end of regulation, and then tacked on a third straight TD on their first drive of OT to grab its first lead since early in the opening period.

Facing a do-or-die situation on their first possession in overtime, the Wolves came up big. After starting at the Clyde 25, the Wolves marched to the Bulldog 7 before turning the game over to running back Bubba Williams. The CHS standout took a handoff from Markis Monroe and scrambled into the end zone for the game-tying score.

Williams finished the game with 54 yards rushing on 13 attempts.

Jacob Munoz followed Williams' touchdown with the game-winner. He booted the ensuing extra-point through the uprights to hand the Wolves their 16th victory in their past 18 games.

Clyde rolled into the OT stanza with all of the momentum.

Down 20-6 at the start of the fourth, Clyde managed to get its offense in gear, the Bulldogs scored on a 26-yard pass from Dylan Neuman to Jax Roam to cut the C-City lead to 20-13. They tacked on a second score minutes later and forced the game into OT.

Neuman gave Clyde the lead quickly in the extra frame. He hooked up with Peyton Burton on a 26-yard TD strike to put the Bulldogs in front, 26-20.

Colorado City, which has outscored its five opponents by a staggering 196-100 margin, owned most of the momentum in the first three quarters. The Wolves scored once in the second quarter, and then tacked on two more TDs in the third.

Munoz got the CHS scoring attack started in the second. After Clyde had taken a 6-0 lead, Munoz helped C-City answer back. He capped the team's first scoring drive of the contest by hauling in a 12-yard scoring pass from Monroe.

Monroe proved he could score with his legs, too, in the third. He handed Colorado City its first lead late in the second by scrambling 20 yards for touchdown. Minutes later, he tacked on another scoring run — a 12-yard scamper — that sent Colorado City into the fourth quarter nursing a 20-6 advantage.

Monroe finished the game with more than 180 all-purpose yards, including 113 via a 12-for-21 effort passing. He added 75 yards rushing on 13 carries.

The Wolves finished the game with 257 yards of total offense on 59 plays. The total marked the first time this season Colorado City has been held for less than 300 yards.

The Wolves, who are open this week, will open district play on Oct. 12 when they face Lubbock Roosevelt.

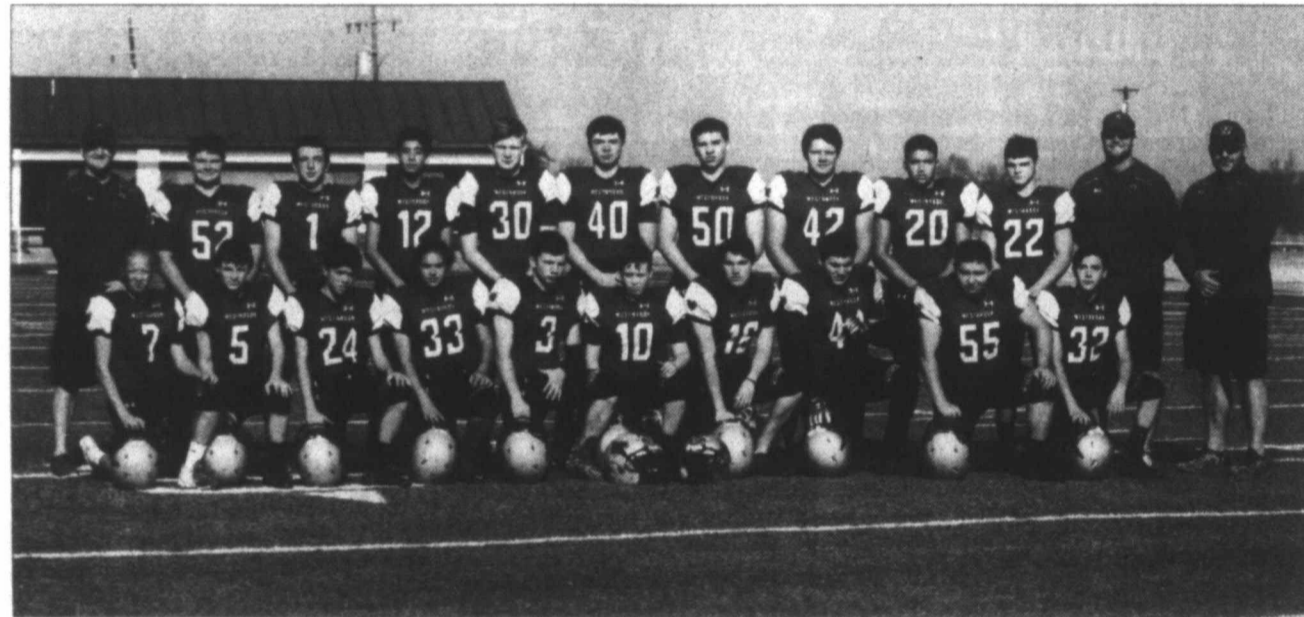

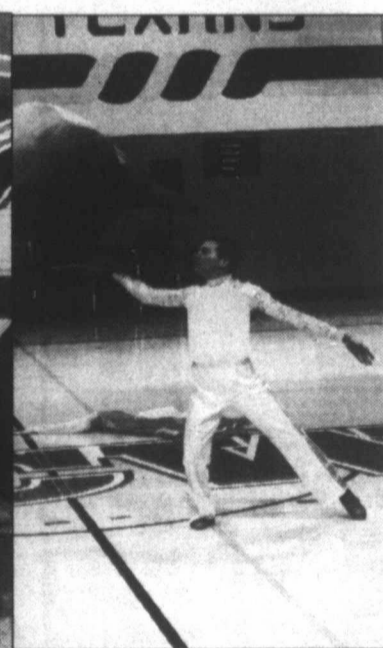

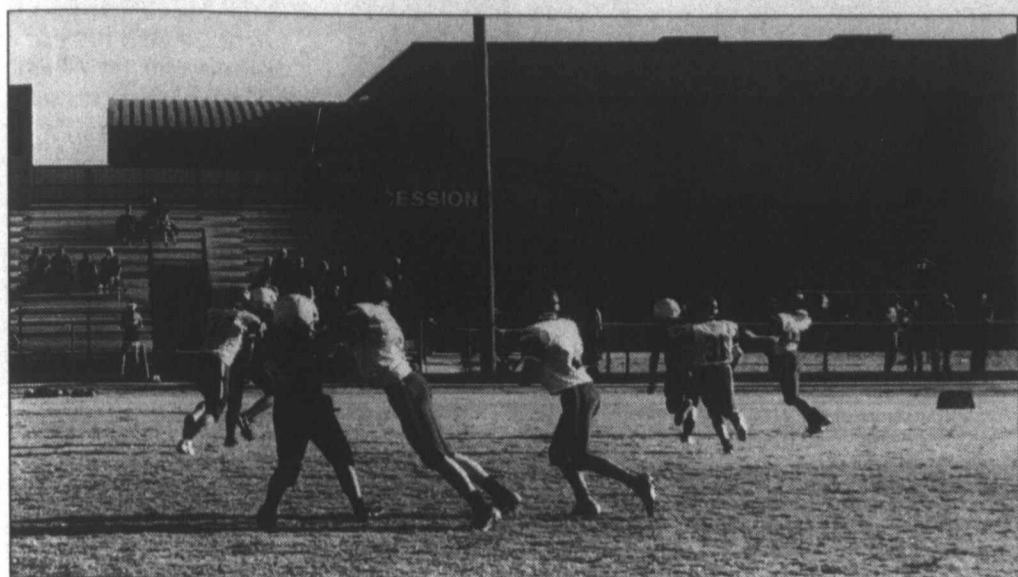

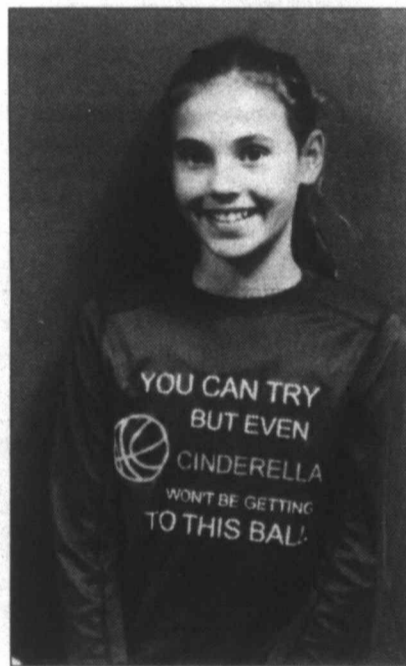
It wasn't long before the young man from C-City made a move to San Antonio. He just wanted to see if he would like wrestling.
