James E. Kelley, 86, long time editor and publisher of the Stanton Reporter, died last week. He had suffered heart attacks and had been confined to the hospital for several weeks.

Mr. Kelley was one of the most colorful editors in West Texas. His column, "Shooter Knows," which he wrote for more than thirty years, was always filled with spicy sayings about friends, community betterment, and government doings.

Kelley was an editor of the old school. He called a spade a spade and scorned the more modern way of reporting. He said what he had to say in style that all could understand.

Jim and I were neighbors in the newspaper business for many years and were also fast friends. His passing leaves an empty spot in our heart and an empty spot in the life of the community of Stanton.

The people of Loraine will have an opportunity before long to vote whether or not they want to issue \$20,000 in bonds with which to pave some streets in our city.

No one could hardly deny the need for paving on most of our streets. The City Council has come to the conclusion that the bonds can be voted and paid with out raising taxes. This can be done because the City has been putting every third dollar collected in taxes in an emergency fund since all of the bonded indebtedness of the city was paid a few years ago. This practice has accumulated a considerable sum of money which can be used for paving.

The Council is asking each property owner along the streets to be paved to pay for the curb and gutter for the number of feet his property covers at the rate of \$1.00 a lineal foot. If you have a 50 foot lot it will cost you \$50.00 for curb and gutter. The city will pay for all the paving from curb to curb. The paving is to be 38 feet wide.

I know there are some property owners along the streets to be paved who are not financially able to pay for their curb and gutter all at one time. Arrangements can be made to pay for it a little at a time if you need it that way.

Paved streets add more to a town than most anything. Your property value will be enhanced considerably besides the convenience and satisfaction you will derive from living on a paved street.

The street I live on is not included in the paving project at this time. The city will have to do a little at a time as it is able. My street will come later, so will many more. I am going to vote for the bonds. I hope that no one will vote against them just for the sake of being against something. Investigate every angle of the matter before you decide what you want to do.

### Mrs. S. S. Changes Automatic Representative will be Here July 18

Most of the Mitchell area residents who will directly benefit at this time from the Social Security Amendments signed into law by the President on June 30 do not need to write or contact their social security office, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene district manager for the Social Security Administration.

He has furnished us the following summary:  
**AUTOMATIC CHANGES:**  
1. Aged widows already receiving benefits on their late husband's accounts will get a 10% increase in September, for August, 1961.

2. Beneficiaries with no dependents, who are receiving unreduced benefits of less than \$40 will be raised to \$40 in September, for August.

3. Women receiving reduced retirement benefits because they started being paid before age 65, will get some increase if their basic rate, before reduction, was less than \$40.

Persons in the above groups do not need to take any action at this time.  
A representative will be in Loraine on July 18.

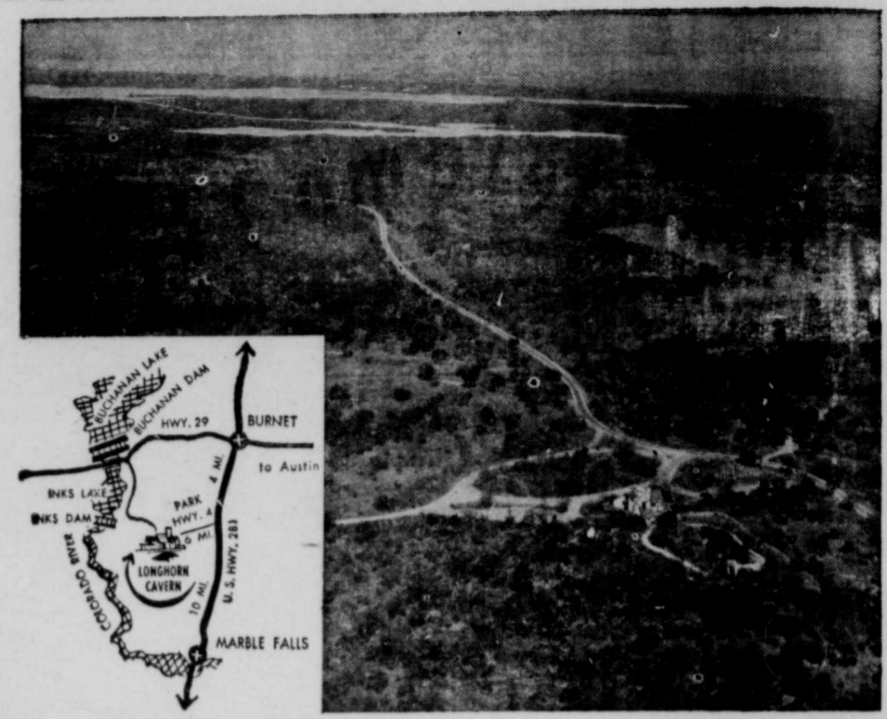

**NATIONAL FARM SAFETY WEEK SET JULY 23-29**  
College Station, June 15 The period from July 23-29 has been designated as National Farm Safety Week by a proclamation released by President Kennedy.

The President called attention to the fact that more than a million farm residents are injured and thousands are killed each year in accidents and that these accidents bring suffering and sorrow to our farm families and inflict heavy economic losses upon both the farm community and nation. The safety of these people, he continued, who produce our food is vital concern to all our citizens.

President Kennedy is urging all persons and organizations interested in the safety of farm people to support and participate in this special endeavor to help reduce the number of farm accidents. He asked farm residents to remember that "Safety is a Family Affair."

In Texas, plans are going forward for the observance of the Week, reports the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council. In many counties extensive programs will be carried out, emphasizing that safety is a family affair. County extension agents, 4-H Club members and their leaders, farm and community organization leaders and others with deep interest in the promotion will contribute to the overall plans.

The Councilmen said that in many counties a different phase of farm and home safety would be emphasized each day during the week: Sunday, reverence for life; Monday, safety begins at home; Tuesday, agricultural chemicals; Wednesday, prevent falls; Thursday, highway safety; Friday, farm machinery and Saturday, recreation safety.

The failure of rural people to observe safety in their daily living is a chief contributor to their safety record. The Council said this record includes a disabling injury accident every 32 seconds and a death every 35 minutes to farm residents of the nation. The Council concludes it is time to stop this needless waste from accidents since most could be prevented.

**KNOCK OUT 1962 ROOT ROT NOW**  
College Station, June 19 To reduce "dying-off" or root rot, a cotton farmer needs to know when dry weather is expected for 10 days to 2 weeks. When dry weather follows deep plowing, root rot will be reduced, says Harlan E. Smith, extension plant pathologist.

Soil should be plowed 6 to 18 inches with a disk or moldboard type. The drying of the soil that follows helps to kill the root rot fungus. Deep plowing and drying helps to kill old cotton roots of susceptible weeds that harbor the root rot fungus.

Deep plowing plus the turning under of a large tonnage of old crop straw, stalks or leaves will give added insurance against root rot, Smith continues. The deep plowing and turning under of organic matter can often be done in one operation. Grain sorghum, small grains, clovers and winter peas, where adapted, are often turned under to supply organic matter. Cotton burs have also been used. The organic matter must be turned under deep in order to be effective against root rot the following season.

Following the deep plowing, rain may occur before the soil dries. When this happens the deep plowing should be repeated or a resistant crop should be planted, explains Smith. Crop rotation in itself will not reduce root rot. However, a rotation using deep plowing and burying of organic matter will reduce root rot.

Because of different amounts of rain each year, no single practice is likely to reduce root rot everytime. A combination of practices carried on for a number of years is necessary for best results, says Smith.

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**ONE STAR Agriculture**

Released by The Texas Department of Agriculture

**GUARANTEED STAND, SEED MAY BE NO BARGAIN**  
The "whoop-la" bally-hoo gimmicks of big-time advertising have found their way into the important Texas seed market, and many Texas farmers are facing the test of cautious common sense versus the "don't-delay" push of ad agency promotions.

The gimmick in this instance is the drive by large operators to sell "guaranteed stand" seed to farmers at higher-than-normal prices, promising free planting replacement seed if the original seed fails to come up for any reason other than poor-farming practices.

Prices on such seed is sometimes almost twice as expensive as that obtainable from local sources. Under this arrangement, a farmer in effect pays for his planting replacement whether he needs it or not.

Seed promotion practices of this type have been conducted in other parts of the country for some time but have only recently come into Texas. The primary place in activity in our state presently is in the Plains grain sorghum area, but it could easily become more widespread.

**Legal Recourse Doubtful**  
The Texas Department of Agriculture Seed Laws require that all seed offered for sale in commercial quantities bear a TDA Texas Tested Seed Tag - which helps the buyer determine the true value of the seed by furnishing purity and germination information. Certain seed which bears a TDA Registered or Certified Seed Tag indicates the seed is of exceptional quality and has been proven successful under favorable crop conditions. Although the seed being promoted in these big campaigns must bear the Texas Tested Seed Tag, there is no assurance that it bears either the TDA Registered or Certified tag.

In any event, there is no provision under TDA Seed Laws for any legal recourse against dis-

satisfaction with "guaranteed stand" seed. Nor is it certain that a buyer would have any recourse otherwise if the seller of such seed decided it was "poor farming practices" instead of an Act of God that prevented the seed from coming up in the first place.

**Investigate Before Buying**  
Before buying any seed, and especially any "gimmicked" seed, the farmer will be best protected if he will:

1. Talk to his local seedsmen. He's the man who has to stay in business over the long haul and his advice is to be respected.

2. Check with his experiment station as to local adaptability and variety.

3. See which TDA label the seed bears. The required Texas Tested tag is white. The Registered tag is purple, and the Certified tag is blue.

4. Always compare prices before buying.

**Veterans News**  
QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS  
Q. I know of an employee of a Federal nonmilitary agency who became ill overseas and was rushed back to the U. S. and into a VA hospital. He is not a veteran. How can he receive VA care?  
A. As a beneficiary of the Federal agency, on request of this agency to the VA. About 0.3 percent of the VA hospital patient load is made up of non-veterans for whom the VA receives reimbursement. Included are military personnel on active duty and Federal employees injured or disabled in the course of their employment.  
Q. Will the VA accept a court order declaring presumptive death after a seven year unexplained absence of a veteran?  
A. Not usually. However, the specific facts should be presented to the nearest VA office for an individual ruling.  
Q. Is Confederate service the same as Union service for the purpose of VA benefits for dependents?  
A. Yes, widows and helpless children of Confederate veterans have been eligible for pension payments since July 1, 1958.  
Q. My foster son was killed in service recently. We raised him since he was a baby. Am I entitled to benefits? I have no income.  
A. Yes, get in touch immediately with your nearest VA office.
