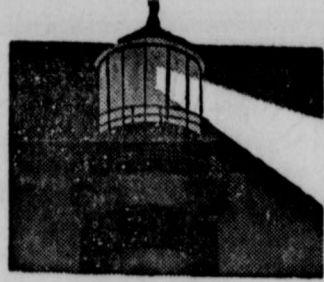


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On The BEAM

WORKING PEOPLE OVER 65 MAY RECEIVE \$ 5. BENEFITS

Possibly because of misfortune obtained from friends and partly because "times have changed," many persons over 65 and still working, are not aware that they qualify for benefits, Erven Fisher, district manager, Big Spring Social Security office, announced today.

These people and others who qualify but have not applied for benefits total more than 1,000,000 persons, Mr. Fisher said. Some of them live in this area.

"Many of these people believe that they do not qualify for benefits because they are working," he said, "or that their present earnings are too high to enable them to qualify for benefits."

Actually, Mr. Fisher explained, depending on how much the worker is now earning, he may be eligible for some or all of his benefits. Moreover, if he is unemployed for any month of the year, he may receive his full benefit for that month.

Leaflets explaining more fully how earnings affect older persons' social security payments are available at the social security office, 700 Runnels Street, Big Spring, Mr. Fisher added.

1961 Crop Loan Cotton To Be Acquired By C.C.C. On July 31

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced June 26 that the Commodity Credit Corporation will take title to all 1961-crop loan cotton (upland and extra long staple) on which loans have not been repaid at the close of business July 31.

Notice that the 1961-crop loan cotton will be acquired by CCC at loan maturity is being given now so producers will have sufficient time to redeem their cotton, and mills and merchants will be able to obtain any additional cotton they may need from the loan before maturity date.

In accordance with the loan agreement, CCC will not pay for any market value the cotton may have in excess of the amount of the loan plus interest and charges.

Until the close of business July 31, producers and purchasers of loan equities may repay the loans. Any loan notes sent to local banks for collection at the request of producers and purchasers of equities must be paid at the local banks by the close of business July 31. Any repayments by mail must be received by CCC or the local bank before the close of business July 31.

Through June 15, a total of 4,849,823 bales of 1961-crop cotton was reported pledged for loans. As of the same date, 1,253,321 bales had been redeemed, which left loans outstanding on 3,596,502.

In her talk she stressed the use of our time for God and not use all of our time for ourselves, and for worldly things.

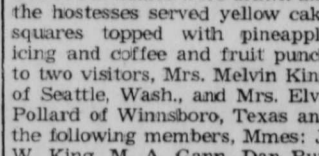

1962-CROP GRAIN SORGHUM COUNTY AND TERMINAL SUPPORT RATES ANNOUNCED

The U. S. Department of Agriculture June 26 announced 1962-crop grain sorghum county and terminal support rates.

These rates are based on the national average support price announced Jan. 9 at \$1.93 per hundredweight for 1962-crop grain sorghum grading No. 2.

The national average support for the 1961 crop was also \$1.93 per hundredweight.

The method followed in determining individual county and terminal rates is the same as that used in setting rates in previous years. While the 1962 national average support price is the same as for 1961, Gulf and California terminal rates were increased 1 cent per hundredweight for 1962 to reflect changes in market price relationships.

For most producing areas, as in the past, county support rates reflect terminal rates less the freight and handling charges needed to get the grain sorghum to terminal markets.

County and terminal rates are further adjusted by premiums and discounts for grade and quality to determine support prices for individual producers. For 1962, a premium of 1 cent per hundredweight is included for Grade No. 1 grain sorghum and the basic support rate will be for Grade No. 2 only instead of Grade No. 2 or better as in the past.

The discount schedule is unchanged except for elimination of the discount for discolored grain sorghum.

Revisions in grain sorghum grade standards which become effective Aug. 1 will be used for



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the 1962 support operation. Grain sorghum producers who participate in the 1962 feed grain program will be eligible for price support on their 1962 production.

Under legislation authorizing the program, there will be quantitative limitation on the 1962 production of grain sorghum that can be put under support from eligible farms. The eligible quantity will be equal to the farm's 1959-60 average per acre yield times the 1962 grain sorghum acreage, both as determined by the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee. The provision was in effect under the 1961 feed grain program.

Producers who do not participate in the 1962 feed grain program will not be eligible for price support on 1962 grain sorghum production.

Following are 1962 terminal rates per hundredweight for grain sorghum grading No. 2 compared to 1961 rates:

Copus, Christi, Galveston, Houston, and Port Arthur, Texas; and New Orleans and Baton Rouge, La. 1962 Rate; 2.45, 1961 Rate; 2.44.

Price support will be carried out, as in previous years, through farm and warehouse-stored loans and purchase agreements. Support will be available from harvest time through Jan. 31, 1963. Grain sorghum price-support loans mature Mar. 31, 1963.

County rates are available at State and County ASCS Offices, and also from the Grain Division, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington 25, D. C.

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STORM CELLERS CAN BE CONVERTED TO FALLOUT SHELTERS

College Station, July 19—Many of the tornado and underground vegetable cellars in Texas can be made into good fallout shelters, says W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer.

However, there are several points that must be kept in mind when remodeling these shelters to provide adequate fallout protection. They are: (a) adequate shielding, (b) a protected entrance, (c) positive ventilation, (d) storage facilities for supplies, (e) and installation of a radio antenna for radio reception.

The most economical means of providing the additional shielding needed is with a layer of soil to a depth of about 3 feet over the entire cellar roof. Most cellars will require additional reinforcing in the roof in order to hold this extra weight. A seal reinforced, six inch thick concrete slab cast over the roof may be used instead of the soil cover. A local contractor can tell you the amount of steel necessary for your situation, but for most cellars 1/2" steel bars laid 12" centers in both directions will be sufficient.

A right angle entrance into the cellar, essential to protection from fallout, may be made by building a partial wall inside the existing cellar. If the cellar is not large enough to permit this wall inside, then a new entrance should be constructed with the necessary right angle in it.

A mechanical blower should be installed to provide positive air exhaust in time of disaster, and an inlet and outlet vent provided. The blower should provide a minimum of 5 cubic feet per minute per person. A filter is not necessary for the average home shelter.

There should be enough shelves and storage space to hold the recommended amount of supplies and a radio antenna should be installed to receive CONELRAD broadcasts. Be sure that your battery powered radio will work in the shelter and will connect to the antenna.

Fallout shelter plans are available from the Extension Service Office, Office of Civil Defense, and other organizations concerned with civil defense.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. Did veterans of the Revolutionary War draw pensions in old age, and if so, how much were they paid?

A. Yes. The Act of March 18, 1818, authorized payments to former officers and servicemen of the Army and Navy who were citizens of the United States and who became in need of financial support from their country because of reduced circumstances.

The payments were for life and amounted to \$20 a month for commissioned officers, and \$8 a month for enlisted personnel. Requirements were service until the end of the war or for a period of at least nine months or longer during the war which was officially ended in April, 1783, when the Treaty of Peace was ratified by the States.

Q. Have memorial plots in national cemeteries been set aside to honor memories of "missing in action" veterans?

A. Yes. This also applies to deceased members of the Armed Forces whose bodies were not identified, or were lost or buried at sea or listed as unrecoverable. For further information, check any Veterans Administration office.

Q. Where can a veteran replace lost discharge papers?

A. To the Military Personnel Records Center, General Services Administration, 9700 Page Boulevard, St. Louis 32, Mo.

Major General Thomas R. Yancey, commanding general of the VIII US Army Corps, so commended Army Reservists from Texas and New Mexico who were called to active duty during the Berlin crisis last fall. VIII Corps, with headquarters in Austin, Texas, administers all Army Reservists in the two-state area.

"It is a privilege to welcome these fine young men home who have answered the call of our nation in time of need," General Yancey said. "They have borne a proud responsibility and have aptly measured up to standards set by thousands of young men in generations past who have served in the cause of freedom."

The VIII Corps commander, a veteran of more than 25 years' military service, said he would like to be able to express his appreciation to each individual personally. At the same time, he pointed out that citizens of areas to which the Reservists will return have definite responsibility to the men who were suddenly uprooted last fall and sent away in the military service of their country.

"These young men—our soldiers and our sons, brothers, fathers, friends and business associates—have strengthened the nation," General Yancey said. "Perhaps only the Kremlin can fully evaluate their service in helping to provide the means by which the United States and other free nations could effectively counter further aggression. I hope you will welcome them home as soldiers who have served selflessly and well," he added.

The general said that, although the Reservists have been released from active duty, many will continue as citizen soldiers participating in the Army Reserve program.

"In these times of international tension and dangers to the freedom of the world, it is necessary for our country to maintain strong defenses and in this we must rely heavily upon the Reservists," he said.

"It therefore becomes the responsibility of all of us—civilian and military—to work together in mutual support of this effort. I know the people of Texas and New Mexico, in appreciation of the job done by their Reservists and realization of the difficult road ahead, will go all out to aid their citizen soldiers in the transition from active military duty to their former roles as residents of your community."

FARMERS COMPLETE WORK UNDER 1961 ACP

228 county farmers reported completing conservation work under the 1961 Agriculture Conservation Program, according to Orrion J. Llanan, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee.

This indicates total participation in the 1961 ACP of 321 farms or 32 per cent of the county's total of 966 farms. ACP participating farms contain 59 per cent of the county's farmland.

The average cost-share for conservation under the 1961 program averaged \$216 per farmer, including increase for small cost-share and advances made for conservation services.

Major conservation accomplishments established with cost-share assistance of the 1961 ACP include: New or improved permanent grass or legume cover 195 acres. Increased acreages of grass or legumes in rotations, 534 acres. Deferred Grazing - 8891 acres. Livestock water wells - 3 Stockwater pipelines - 3171 linear feet. Terracing - 1210 acres. Diversion terraces to control runoff of water, 8218 linear feet. Water storage and erosion control dams - 7. Control of Competitive shrubs - 3313 acres.

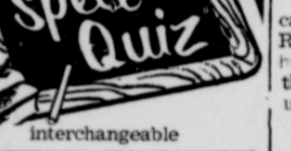
