MIXED FEED PLANT

Industry Begins New Operations

One of the most modern mixed feed plants in Texas has begun operation in Colorado City as a new addition of the Continental Oil-Cotton Co.

The new plant is located on the same location with the cottonseed oil mill on Front St., is this city's newest industry.

Inside the new pre-fab steel building, the "most modern machinery available has been installed along with storage and office facilities.

Two grain storage tanks by the plant loading dock have a capacity of 500,000 pounds of grain.

The ingredients for the feed is stored in the various bins near the mixing machinery. The different parts of the mixture are weighed and measured and then dumped into the mixer.

After all the ingredients have been thoroughly mixed together, it then fed into a special machine that forms pellets or is processed in bulk form.

The mixture may be processed with or without the

addition of molasses to the ingredients.

A storage tank with a capacity of 60,000 pounds holds the molasses prior to being mixed with the dry ingredients.

The mixing machine at the new plant has a capacity of 4,000 pounds.

After the pellets are formed, they are transferred into another part of the machinery to be cooled and screened. This process insures a standard size on all pellets and culls out those of irregular size.

The plant will produce two types of pellets, four feedlot rations and three kinds of bulk feeds.

Custom mixing will be available for those stockmen desiring to have a feed mixed into a special ration.

Repps Guitars is the manager of the new mixed feed plant, coming to Colorado City from Abilene with his

wife and two children. His family resides at 1332 Vine St.

Other employees at the plant include Simon Barrera and Catarino Silva who assist in the feed mixing operations and in the sacking and weighing of the finished product.

New Feedlot

In the near future the next addition to the operation is planned.

According to Guitars a new feedlot will be opened around Feb. 1 with a capacity of 1,500 head of cattle.

Under the planned setup, the plant will provide feed and care for stockmen placing cattle in the lot to feed out.

The company will charge rent per head per day on the cattle and for the feed furnished the stock.

The new feedlot is expected to be on a location just east of the old railroad pens.

Contest Entries Deadline Is Set

Frank Deregibus Presents Case

Petitions containing the signatures of an approximate 600 local citizens asking that baseball be reinstated to the Colorado High athletic program are expected to be presented to the School Board in its regular monthly session Monday night.

Discussion of the reinstatement of the sport was not on the official agenda prepared Friday by Supt., of Schools Frank W. Wilson.

Asked about this, Wilson replied, "No one has talked to men about appearing."

Frank Deregibus will be the official spokesman for the group favoring putting baseball back into the sports program.

A flurry of interest in the question arose after the November board meeting at which time the school trustees voted unanimously to remove the sport from the CHS athletic program. The action was taken upon recommendation of Athletic Director and Head Coach Truman Nix.

Nix asked that the sport be taken from the program due to difficulties in scheduling games since no other towns in District 5AA or other cities of our size engage in the sport at the high school level.

Since the initial decision for removal, local efforts in circulating some eight petitions have resulted in the estimated 600 signatures.

Many supporters of keeping the diamond sport in the program feel that the scheduling difficulties are not enough to put baseball out of the program.

Others say that the dismissal of the sport from the program in high will hurt the Little League and Pony League programs in the community, since the players will not

have a chance to play in an organized program at the high school level.

The suggestion of having a summer teenage baseball program in the city has also been discussed as an answer for play in the older age groups.

Other Business

In other matters the board is expected to discuss the appointment of 15 teachers to a committee to adopt new textbooks for some subjects.

A report on the Elementary and Secondary Education Act will be heard.

Approval of 19 census enumerators will be made to take the school district's census in Jan.-Feb. 1966.

A review of progress of construction in the school building program is to be made.

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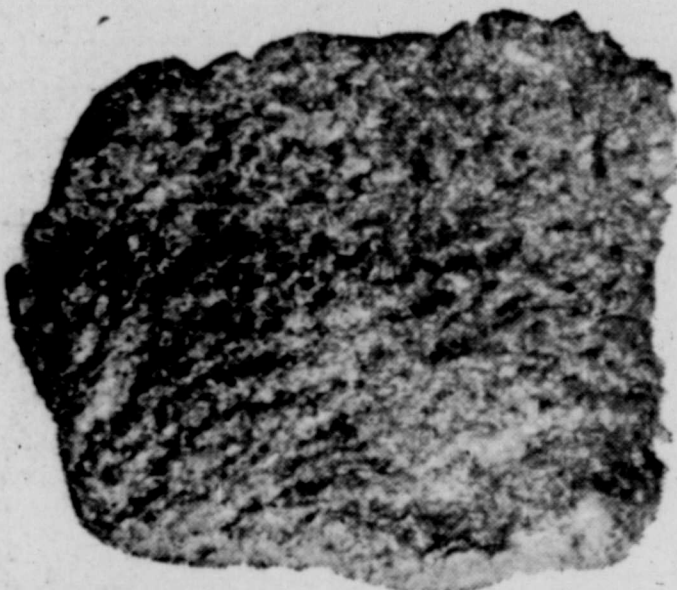

Classing Office Samples Steady

Quality of samples received at the U.S.D.A.'s Cotton Classing Office in Abilene was steady compared to the past two weeks.

B. B. Manly, Jr., in-charge of the office said the 79 gins in District 2 contributed 25,800 of the 35,800 samples classed.

Season classing total reached 216,400 samples on Friday night which represents 1/2 of the expected total for the 1965-66 year.

As soon as the frost killed cotton becomes dry enough for machine harvesting, gins in the counties west of Abilene are expected to operate at capacity and sample receipts at the Classing Office should reach a new high.

Producers are urged to delay harvesting until the cotton is thoroughly dry. Harvesting cotton while it is green results in lower grades and poorer lint turnout, according to Manly.

The percent of samples classified in each color category were: 14, white; 83, light spotted; and 3 spotted. Three

percent of the samples were reduced in grade due to "bark" compared to 5 percent for the previous week.

Percent of samples in each staple length was: 5, 7.8; 53, 29.32; 40, 15.16; and 2, 31.32. The average length was 29.35/32 inch.

Micronaire readings showed a slight drop but remained very good. Ninety-seven percent of the readings fell in the 3.3 through 5.1 range.

The cotton market became more sluggish. Very little demand was shown for middling light spotted cotton and producers received even to slightly above Commodity Credit Corporation loan rates for that quality. Buyers preferred not to buy white cotton, but a small volume did sell at even with the CCC loan rates.

Strict low middling light spotted and lower grades of cotton drew strongest demand; however, it was off slightly from the previous week. These lower qualities grossed producers \$2.00 to \$1.50 per bale above loan rates.

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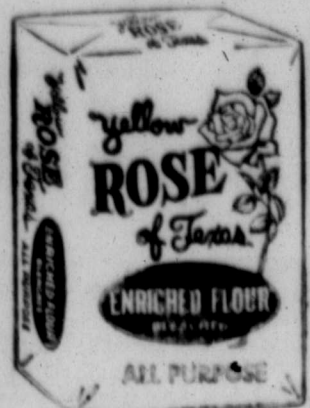

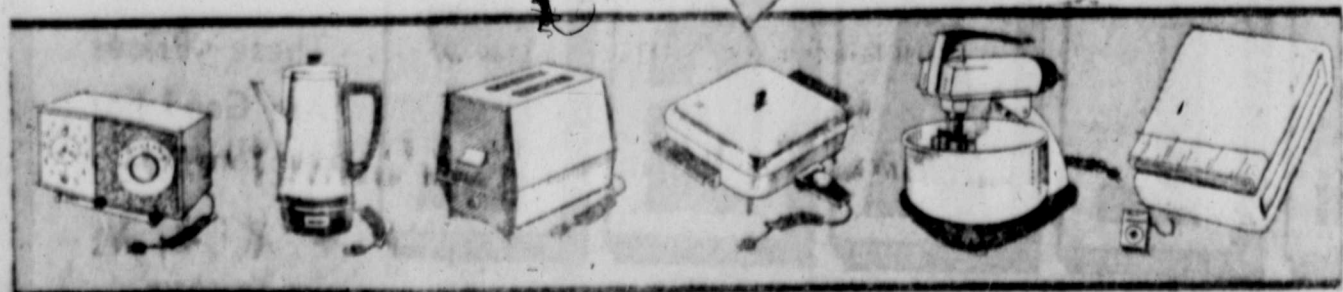
