

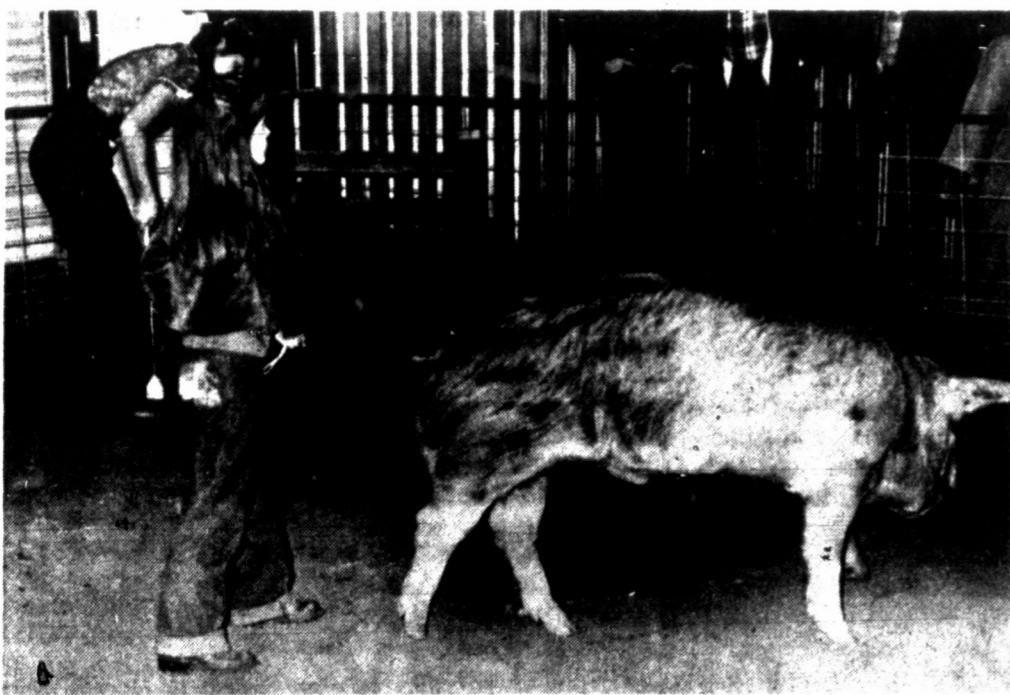

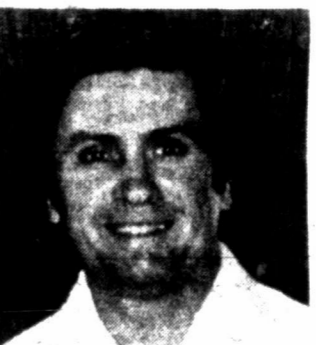
Mac Perkin

Since moving to Colorado City, Valdez has been active as a member of the chamber merchants' committee and Christmas parade committee and is a member of the Colorado City Lions Club.

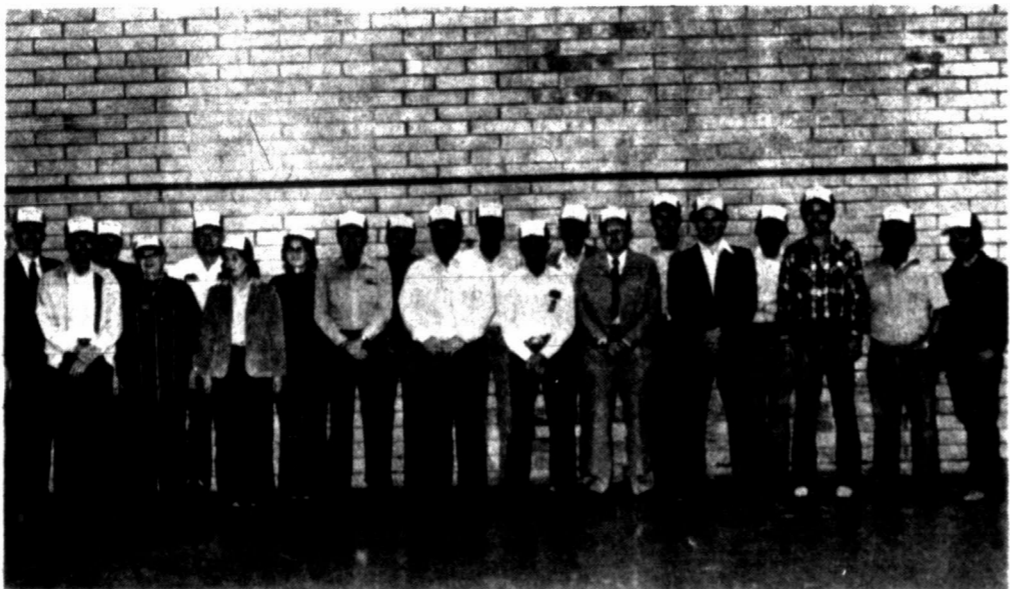
Valdez and his wife, Linda, along with their three children, Omero, Jr., 7, John, 5, and Joshua, 3, attend the First Baptist Church.

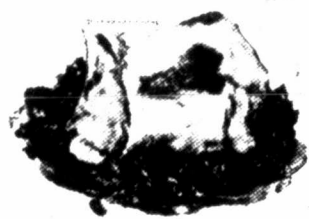

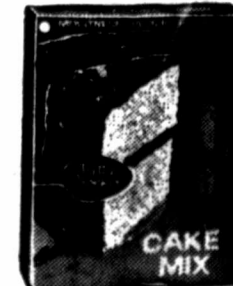

## The Consumer Alert By Mark White Attorney General

Cold weather is upon us at last. Just as Winter is sometimes late in arriving in Texas, especially the central and southern parts of our state, many of us are late in restocking our firewood supplies for the months ahead. So, if you are about to purchase this year's supply of firewood, here are a few things to keep in mind.

The most important step to take in acquiring firewood is to select a dependable firewood dealer. If you do not already have an established source, ask around for recommendations before you decide to buy. Although most consumers in the market for firewood never experience any difficulty, there are some who have been "burned" by a few unscrupulous dealers.

The most common complaint our office receives about firewood is that either less wood is delivered than was expected or that the price charged is more than was agreed on. The best way to get the amount of wood you want is to buy by standard measuring amounts. For example, a "cord" of wood, the standard unit by which wood is sold, contains 128 cubic feet and us-

ually measures either 4 x 4 x 8 feet or 2 x 4 x 16 feet. Measure the area where wood will be stored so that when filled, it will equal a cord. Then you will know whether all of the wood you ordered is delivered.

When ordering wood that is to be delivered, be sure to inquire into any extra charges for delivery or stacking. The price for the wood may seem extremely reasonable until the added charges are included.

Some dealers advertise wood at very expensive prices. Frequently, you will discover that they are selling wood by the pick-up-truck load or by some unit other than a cord. Since pick-up truck beds can vary greatly in size, this is a risky way to purchase wood if you plan to do any comparison shopping for prices.

Never pay for wood in advance. Some dealers will deliver a partial load and demand full payment, promising to deliver the remainder later in the day. Pay for the wood only when all of the has been delivered as agreed.

The type of wood you buy is important as the amount and should be determined before you

buy. In Texas, oak is the most popular firewood for several reasons. It is a "hard" wood that burns slowly and it has a rough, decorative bark that many people like. Mesquite also is a good firewood. Like oak it is hard and slow burning.

Soft woods such as pine and cedar should be avoided for firewood. They burn fast and hot and are good for little more than kindling. Pine is an especially dangerous wood to use because of the sap which, when ignited, will burn nearly as fast as gasoline.

Also, be careful before using wood from trees in your yard for firewood. Some trees that are decorative and useful in the yard may produce foul smelling odors when burning.

Finally, the age of the wood you buy also is very important. Wood that has dried out over several months or a year is usually preferred even though it is much more expensive. To keep costs down, some people mix a little green with the dry.

Amount, price, type and age—if you determine these four things before you purchase firewood, your chances of being satisfied with

your purchase are much greater.

If you have any complaints regarding firewood, contact the Consumer Protection Office nearest you.

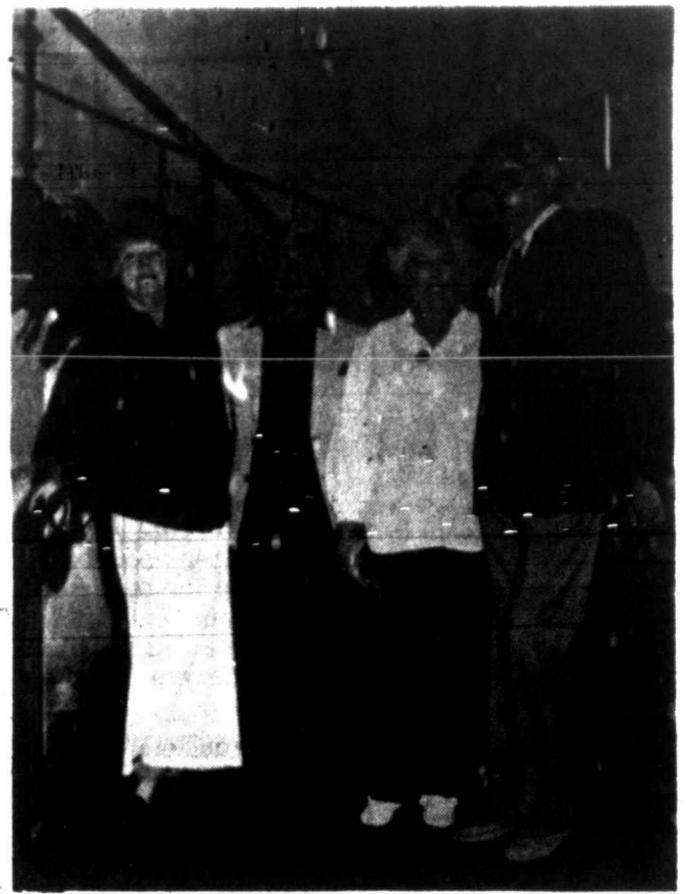

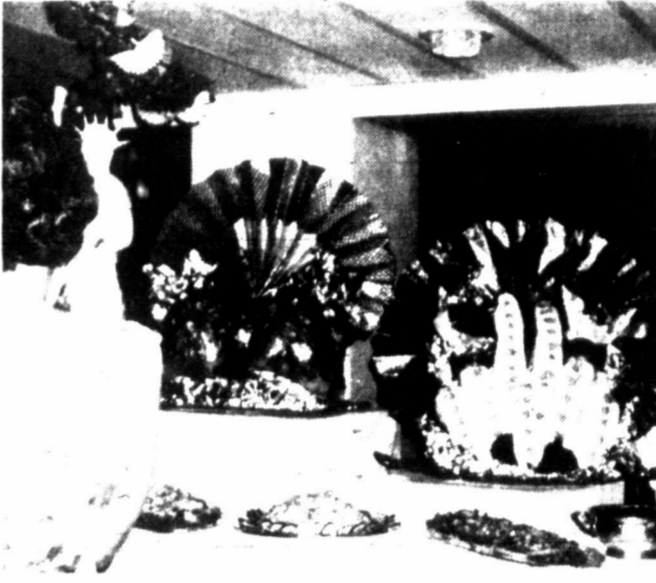

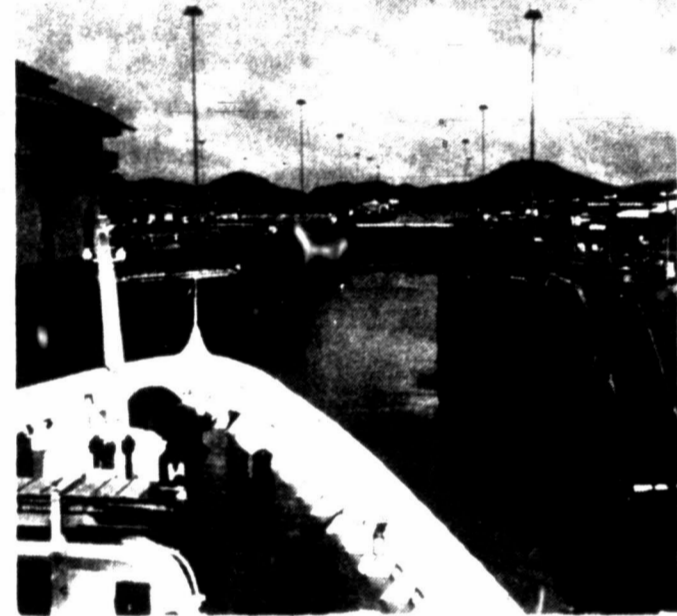

The 550 foot craft carries 630 passengers, along with 352 crew members and travels at 19 knots.

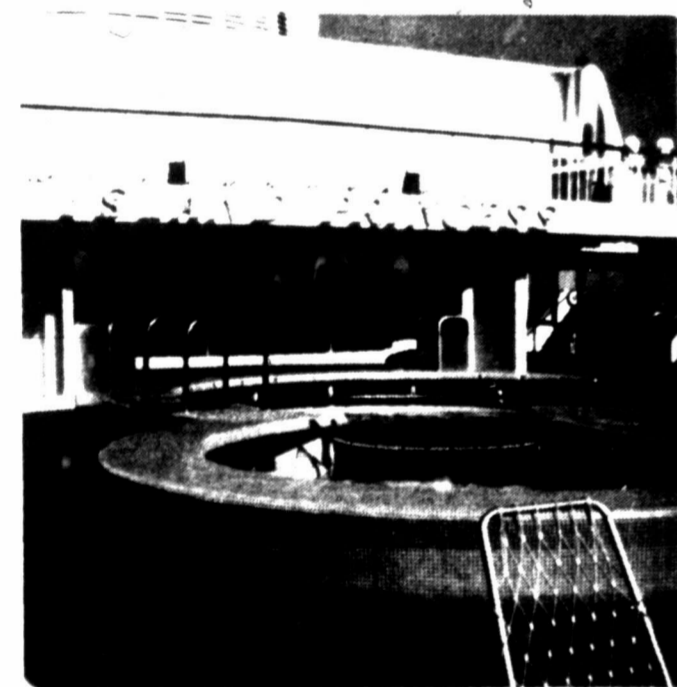

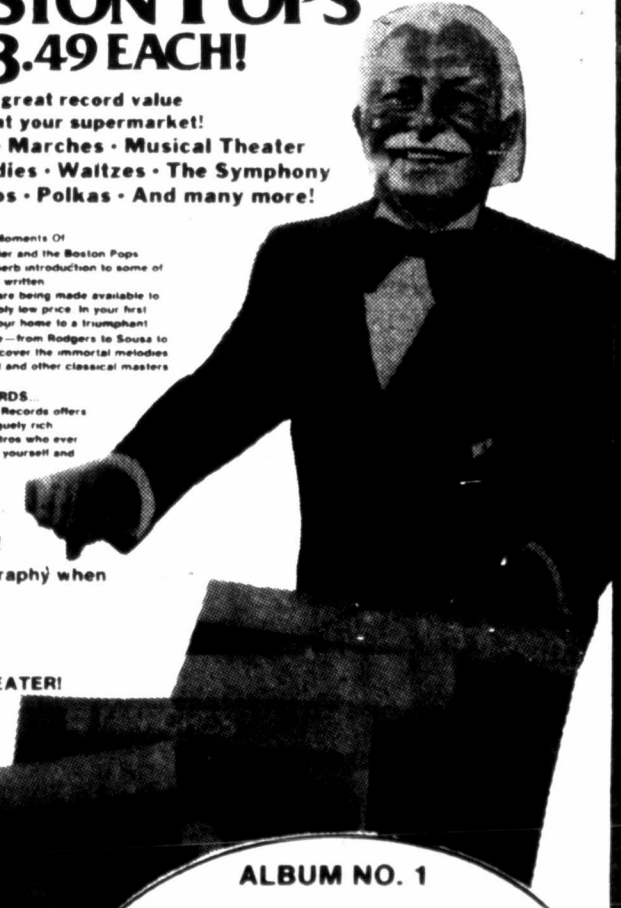

"We are already indebted to cattlemen and representatives of the entire cattle industry in formulating the Texas brucellosis plan. Revised regulations went into effect in July, 1980. We want to continue to get the input of the cattle industry so that we can improve the Texas plan, making it affordable and practical and yet epidemiologically sound," Armstrong added.

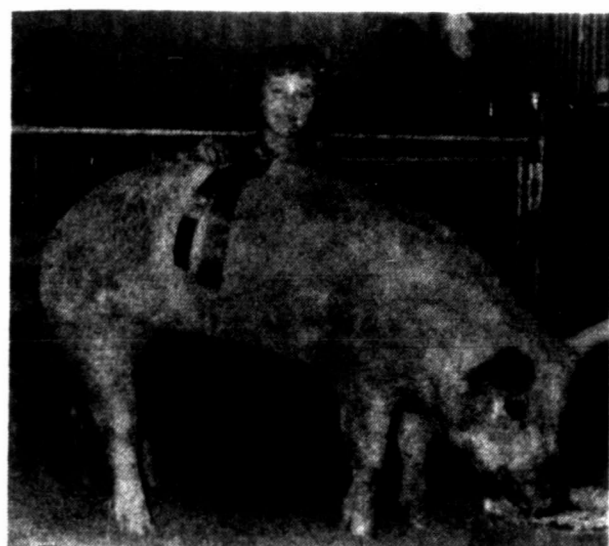

states on resources severed from the ground within their borders. The state of Montana has a 30 per cent severance tax on coal. A group of midwestern utilities and the city of Austin have filed a suit against the tax saying it's unconstitutional. The utilities and Austin have long-term contract to buy Montana coal.

In Congress, bills have been introduced to limit coal severance taxes nationally to 12 1/2 per cent. The Southern Governors Association sent a letter to their Congressional Delegation opposing the proposed limit on severance taxes. If the severance tax limit were to pass, some petroleum people believe that oil and gas severance taxes would be next in line.

There is some talk of an alliance between energy producing southern states and states in the Rockies and the west. The western states are trying to get back the land owned by the Federal Government because of the plans to develop synthetic fuels in that area. It's very sad to us that we may be fighting an energy civil war just at the time when we need to be united against OPEC and other energy problems.

## FmHA Producers' Emergency Loans Available

Producers emergency loans are available to qualified persons for farm and ranch operations, Farm Home Ad-

ministration County Supervisor David Marion announced Monday.

These loans are available only to persons

who have been denied loans by the private lending sector, Marion noted.

Producers will notice two major changes in qualifying for loans this year, Marion said.

First, testing for loan qualifications and collateral presented as loan security will be verified by FmHA.

Proof of need must be furnished by the producer in the form of written statements from the declining lender. In-

cluded in the statement must be a specific loan amount and collateral offered, plus the purpose for the requested loan.

These amounts must be the same as those requested from FmHA.

The second change applies to refinancing by use of a FmHA loan.

Refinancing is restricted and limited with intent to leave the producer with the private lender, Marion said.

Since it is the intent of FmHA for the farmer to

stay with present creditors, refinancing is limited only to existing delinquent installments, plus next installments which cannot reasonably be expected to be paid from normal income sources, Marion said.

A producer must have suffered at least a 20 per cent loss in production.

In order to make application for the emergency loan, low yield or other information concerning assistance from Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service must be supplied.

Producers will be required to provide FmHA with a listing of equipment, livestock and an itemized budget for loan requested.

Deadline for submitting applications is May 21.

Maximum loan amount available under the program is \$1,000,000.

Producers applying for loans above \$300,000 will be required to furnish proof that they have been denied loans by three private financial institutions.

Under the initial loss indemnity loan (five per cent), \$500,000 is the limit which may be borrowed.

This loan is further limited to the actual dollar amount lost or the actual amount of essential family and farm operating credit needed to carry on operation, which ever is less.

After the initial loan is made, the producer may apply for only two more loans in a period of three calendar years.
