Stock Show Set For Jan. 6-7-8

All judging of the Mitchell County 4-H and FFA Stock Show this year will be on Saturday, Jan. 8 according to the following schedule:
--8:30 a.m., Lambs.
--10 a.m., Swine.
--3 p.m. Heifers and Steers.
This year's show, set for Jan. 6, 7 and 8, marks the 40th Annual livestock show

for 4-H club members and members of the three FFA chapters in the county: Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook.
Swine entries must be weighed by 6 p.m. Thursday, sheep entries have to be in the barn by 6:30 p.m. and calves will be weighed beginning at 7 p.m. Thursday.

Superintendent in charge of Weights and Tags will be Don Stewart, assisted by David Marion and Bob McClure.

Presentation of awards will be by Mitchell County Judge Bill Carter, assisted by FFA chapter sweethearts: Kathy Wilson, Colorado City; Catherine Meadows, Loraine and Dana Dorn, Westbrook.

Judging the sheep and swine entries will be the Vocational Agriculture teacher at New Home, Bob Ballard. Ollie Limer, County Extension Agent at Plainview, will judge beef entries.

Awards will include the following:

--Grand Champion Steer banner and trophy, sponsored by City National Bank; Reserve Champion Steer banner and trophy, M&T Food Service and Best Calf Bred in Mitchell County, rosette.

--Grand Champion Lamb banner and trophy, sponsored by First State Bank in Loraine; Reserve Champion Lamb banner and trophy, Colorado City Record; Champion Pen of Three,

rosette, and the Jim Maddox Memorial Trophy, sponsored by Powell Cattle Company, to be presented to the Best Lamb Bred in Mitchell County.

--Grand Champion Barrow banner and trophy, sponsored by Lone Wolf Electric Co-op; Reserve Champion banner and trophy, T-X Farms; rosettes to the champion and reserve champion in each weight class; Best Barrow Bred in Mitchell County, rosette; Champion Pen of Three, rosette, and the Robert Cooper Memorial Trophy, presented by the Livestock Association, to the outstanding showman exhibiting in two or more divisions.

Showmanship trophies will be sponsored by Hutchins Ford to the showman in each of the three divisions: Beef, Lamb and Swine.

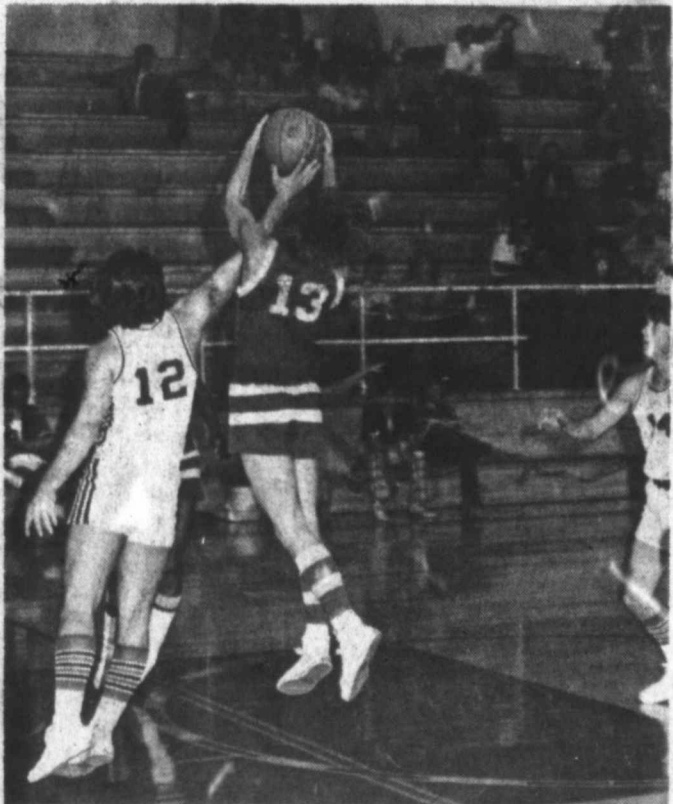
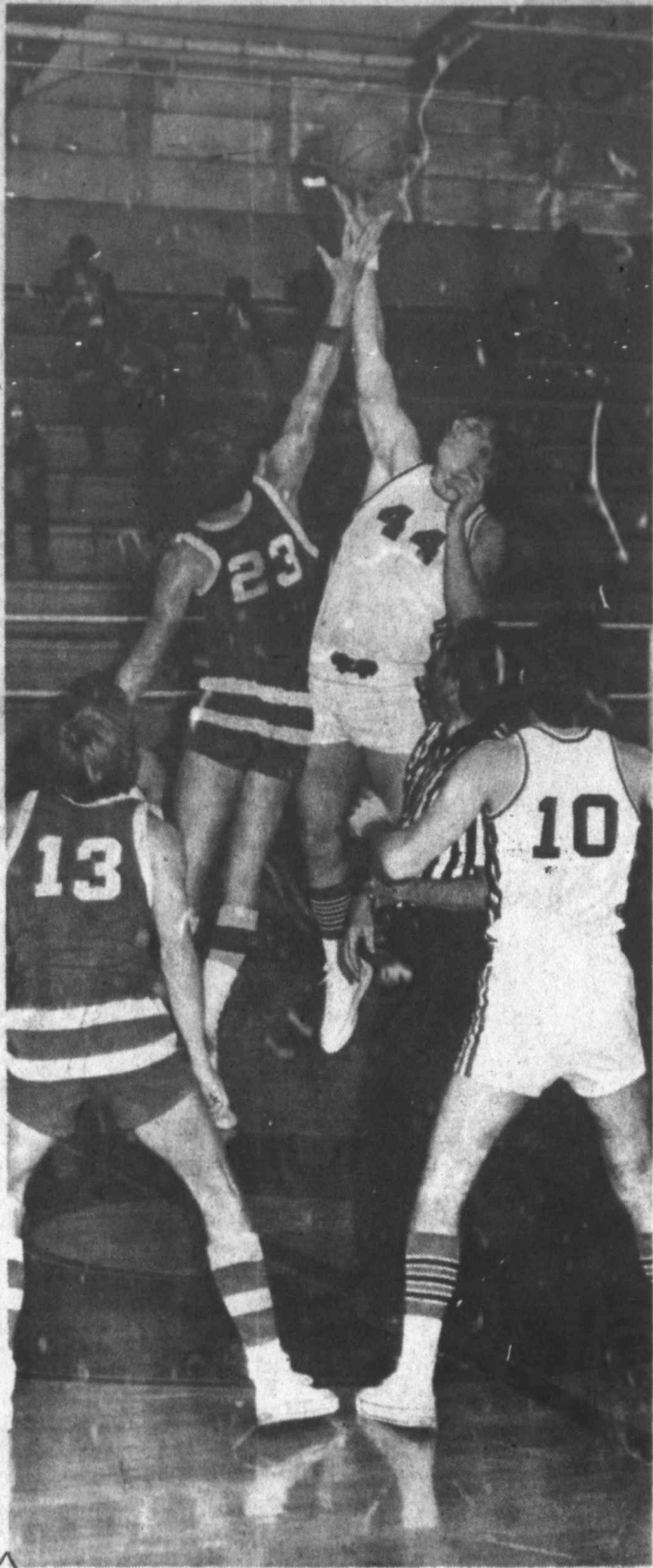
Mitchell County Commissioners Marcus Vest, John

--Thursday, Friday and Saturday the 8th and 9th grade boys are entered in the Sweetwater Tournament.

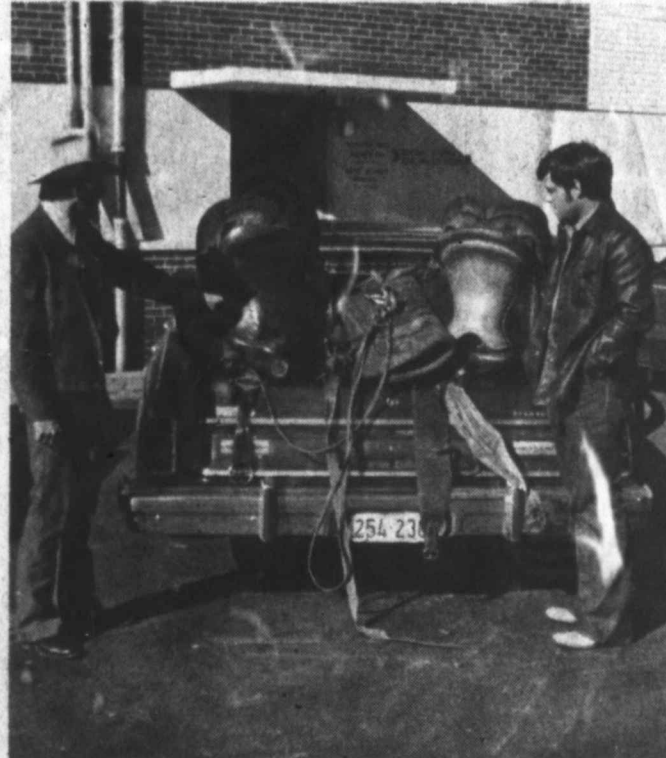
--Thursday, 9th grade girls and 9th grade B team boys play Coahoma here in

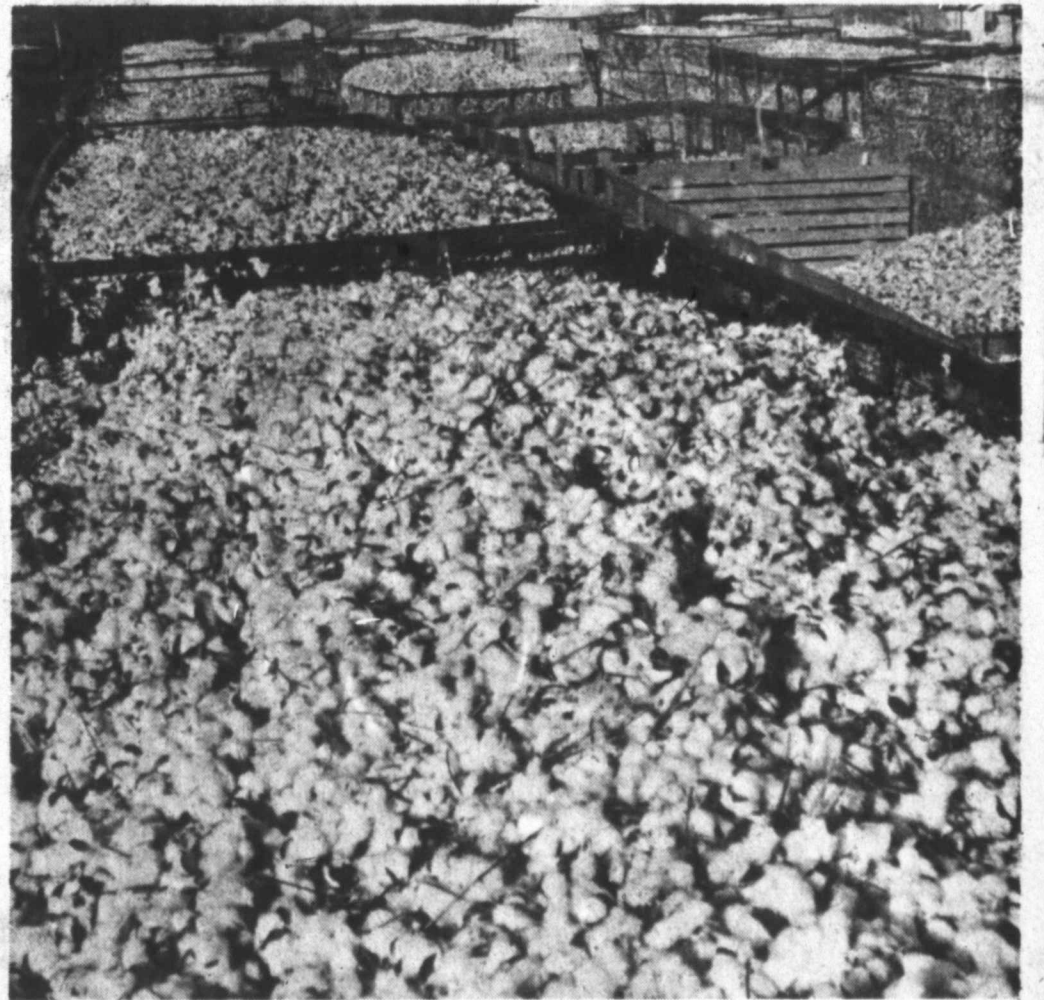
The arrest was made on the Wilson Land & Cattle Co. ranch 40 miles west and 30 miles south of Albuquerque.

Loraine basketball teams, both junior high and varsity, have won the last games they played before the Christmas break, both boys and girls junior high teams taking wins over Highland in Loraine Dec. 20 and the boys and girls varsity winning over Hermleigh in Loraine Dec. 21.

Loraine Coach Ken Lightfoot said he could not remember the scores in those games, but all the Loraine teams won.

Next games for the varsity boys and girls is set for Tuesday, Jan. 4 in Ira starting at 7 p.m.

The junior high teams play Hermleigh in Loraine Jan. 6 starting at 6:30 p.m.

In a practice game Tuesday night, the Loraine girls were defeated by Rotan 75-58 as Loraine's Jackie Rose scored 41 points. The JV girls also lost 96-34.

Bale Count At 45,236

The eight gins in Mitchell County, as of Wednesday, had either ginned or had brought to the yards 45,236 bales of cotton.

The gins had completed 41,523 bales and had 3,713 waiting on the yards.

Of that total, about 34,500 bales were Mitchell County cotton, figured by taking about half of the China Grove Co-op, Loraine Co-op and Mitchell County Gin count.

The individual gins report the following:

--Buford Co-op, 5,190 ginned, 633 on the yard, 5,823 total.

--China Grove Co-op, 5,350 ginned, 273 on the yard, 5,623 total.

--Colorado Gin Co. in Colorado City, 1,600 ginned, 190 on the yard, 1,790 total.

--Farmers Gin in Colorado

City, 3,918 ginned, 233 on the yard, 3,651 total.

--Loraine Co-op, 11,266 ginned, 1,009 on the yard, 12,275 total.

--Mitchell County Gin in Loraine, 3,828 ginned, 470 on the yard, 4,298 total.

--Planters Gin in Westbrook, 3,305 ginned, 105 on the yard, 3,414 total.

--Producers Co-op in Colorado City, 7,662 ginned, 800 on the yard, 8,462 total.

--Totals, 41,523 ginned, 3,713 on the yards, a total of 45,236 bales.

About half of the China Grove count would be 2,800, half of the Loraine Co-op count 6,000 and half of the Mitchell County figure 2,000, a total of 10,800 bales that would be subtracted from the total of 45,236, leaving roughly 34,500 bales produced in Mitchell County.

Coach Hired At Westbrook

A coach for boys sports at Westbrook has been hired, according to Westbrook Superintendent L. M. Dawson.

Roland Beal, a graduate of Coahoma High School and a fall semester graduate of Angelo State University in San Angelo, will take over the coaching duties when classes resume Monday.

Dawson said that Beal had played all sports at Coahoma and one year of basketball at Howard College in Big Spring before transferring to the San Angelo college.

He was also all-district quarterback at Coahoma about 3 1/2 years ago, Dawson said.

Beal is married and he and his wife are in the process of moving to Westbrook during the holidays.

"He went with the team a time or two before the Christmas break," Dawson said, "so he would be familiar with them and his first game is the Tuesday we come back after the holidays."

That game is with Hermleigh and set to be played there, the girls game start-

ing at 7 p.m. followed by the boys game.

Dale Byrd, Westbrook coach for the past 7 1/2 years, submitted his resignation effective Dec. 22 just before the holidays, saying he was going into business with George Munch in Colorado City.

The date for the Westbrook Stock Show has been set for Jan. 6, starting at 8:30 a.m. in the county ag barn in Westbrook.

Westbrook Vocational Agriculture teacher J. W. Schlee said that he expects about 50 entries in both the lamb and swine divisions. A judge has been selected but Schlee said that he has not confirmed judging the show in Westbrook.

Schlee said that the judging will be concluded about 10-10:30 so that entrants who wish to may enter the Mitchell County show in Colorado City.

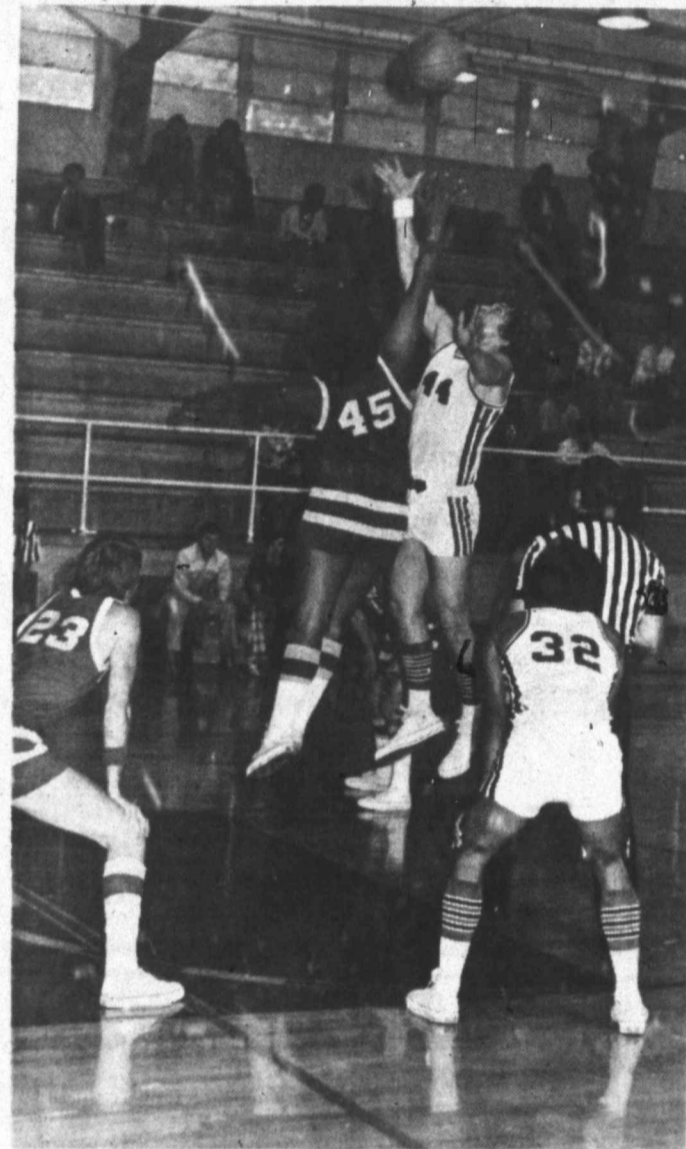

Wright Scholarship Fund Begun By Marions

The Rev. Cal C. Wright embodied the spirit of tireless Christian dedication which carried Methodism to remote, thinly settled Northwest Texas in the early days of this century. Because of this, those who knew this pioneering preacher are working to endow a scholarship in his memory at McMurry College, an institution close to his native Callahan County. The Reverend Cal C. Wright Memorial Scholarship was established Sept. 30, 1975, by Mr. and Mrs. David Marion of Colorado City.

"The scholarship, honoring Wright for his faithful and distinctive service to his church, his country, and to his fellow man, was designated to be awarded to a junior or senior preministerial student," said Dr. Thomas K. Kim, McMurry president.

Cal Wright made his profession of faith, was ordained and preached his first trial sermon within two weeks. Only 21 days after his profession, he was admitted to the old Northwest Texas Annual Conference at its session Nov. 10-15, 1909 in Stamford.

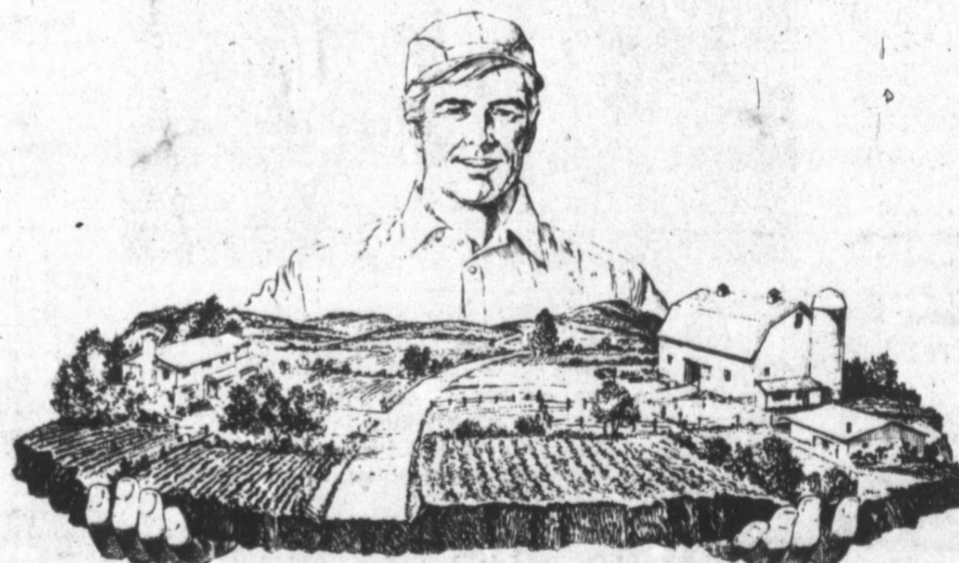

County Farm Income Told

The market value of all
agricultural products sold by
the 480 farms in Mitchell
County in 1974 amounted to
\$8,700,000, according to a
preliminary report of the
1974 Census of Agriculture
released by the U.S. De-
partment of Commerce's
Bureau of the Census.

Production expenses on
these farms totaled
\$8,954,000 in 1974.

The figures are for farms
qualifying under the defini-
tion first used for the 1959
Census of Agriculture: A
farm includes all agricultural
operations conducted at any
time during the census year
under the control of an
individual management,
provided that sales of agricul-
tural products amounted to,
or normally would amount
to, at least \$250 for places
of less than 10 acres or
\$50 for places of 10 acres
or more.

Figures for farms with
sales of \$2,500 or more are
shown for 1974 and 1969.
These farms accounted for
\$8,620,000 of all agricultural
products sold in 1974 and
\$5,722,000 in 1969.

There were 378 of these
farms in 1974 compared with
450 in 1969. The average
size increased from 1,470 to
1,604 acres during the five
years. The value per acre
increased from \$88 to \$129
raising the average value
per farm from \$130,035 to
\$206,840.
