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WELL-OILED MACHINE.

Jersey City evidently thinks differently from the rest of the United States. Elsewhere Americans do not like what they hear of the autocratic rule of Mayor Frank Hague, or of the wastefulness and omissions of his city government. Yet Jersey City has just elected him to his eighth term, by a 3 to 2 majority.

Leaders of both parties oppose him. The Republican governor Walter E. Edge, and his Democratic predecessor Charles Edison, have striven to clip his wings, yet Hague has triumphed over both. Whether or not Jersey City cares to recognize the fact, there is a nemesis for such political subjection. In the 28 years before Hague the city's population almost doubled, and business expanded in proportion. In Hague's 28 years of office population has stood still, and the last census showed a decline from 318,000 in 1930 to 301,000 in 1940.

Once almost every American city was handicapped by a Hague, but municipal government has now advanced to the point where Hagues are comparatively few. And, perhaps, when new deal politicians have settled the southern poll tax question to their complete satisfaction, they'll get around to the Jersey City situation, right at their elbow.

CIVILIZATION?

It is well that the European war stopped when it did, and it is also desirable that the Japanese war shall be won as soon as possible. For the longer any war lasts, in these ultra-scientific days, the more opportunity there is for both sides to use new and more deadly means of destruction. Our own country is far ahead of Japan in scientific progress and talent, whether for war or peace; but still the Japs are capable of adapting themselves to new modes of destruction, thereby prolonging the war, and possibly reaching us even across the sea.

Alexander de Seversky, one of the modern wizards now rising to take the place of the famous Thomas Edison, says that the Germans have developed a four-engine jet bomber capable of making transatlantic round trips to this country and, enroute, bombing New York and other eastern cities. A foreign expert, Heinrich Bernhard Oelerich, has surrendered important jet secrets and aircraft designs to the American army. Our own inventors, of course, are alert in this field. De Seversky believes that, even before this war is ended, we may be using planes capable of flying 10,000 miles without refueling.

Obviously there is no more isolation in this world. Modern warfare can reach anywhere. Without peace, civilization has no hope.

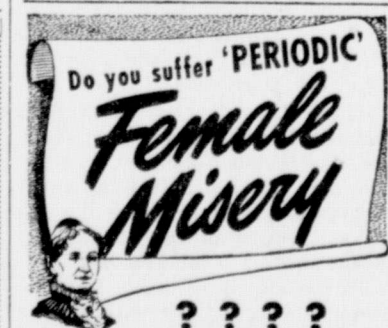

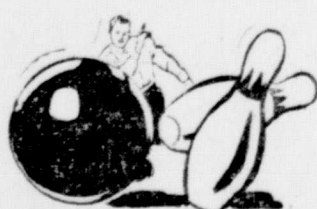

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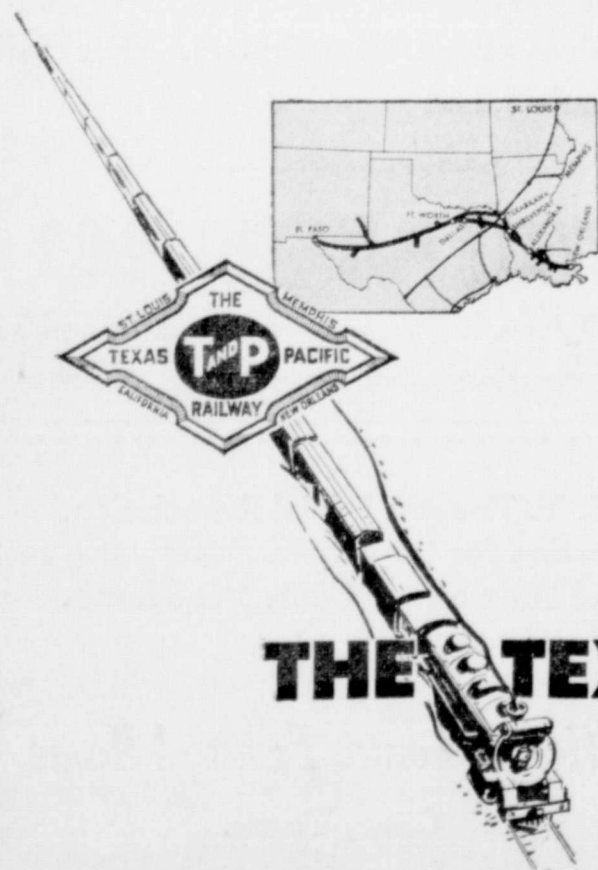
