Insects Can Ruin Trees

Shade tree borers:
Many insects boring or living in the wood of shade trees are the larval or grub stages of beetles. Some species may attack healthy trees but most attack trees and shrubs already weakened or injured by transplant shock, drought, flooding, dirt fills, mechanical damage, diseases, etc.

The most predominant stock tree borers include the round headed and flat headed borers. The adult round headed borers also are called long horned borers because of their long antennae. The adult flat headed borers often are called metallic wood-boring beetles because of their iridescent metallic luster.

Round headed borers:
The cylindrical, hard-shelled adult beetles are colored in contrasting bands, spots or stripes. The antennae are usually at least half as long as the body and may be nearly one and a half times as long as the body in some species. Body length varies from 1/4" to over 3".

The larvae or borers have no legs, are white to yellowish, fleshy and rather round bodied.

Adult beetles emerge

from infested trees from late spring to early fall. After mating, the females seek egg laying sites, often under bark scales, in crevices or in tree wounds. Some of the long horned beetles cut elliptical niches in the inner bark to lay eggs. After hatching, the larvae of some species may feed beneath the bark for a time before entering the wood. Other species do not bore into the wood but remain under the bark. Life cycles of the different species vary from several months to two or three years.

Flat headed borers:
Adults of the flat headed borers are beautifully colored, metallic, boat-shaped and 1/2" to 1" long. These borers are destructive to newly transplanted shrubs and ornamental trees.

The larvae or grubs are 1/4" to 2" long, yellowish-white, legless and have a pronounced flattened enlargement just behind the head. This enlargement bears a horny plate on both the upper and underside.

The larvae emerge from most trees in early spring and summer and lay eggs in cracks and wounds.

The larvae bore first beneath the bark and then enter the heart wood. Their tunnels are packed with boring arranged in

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Garcia Sweeps First

Colorado High's Ruben Garcia snatched the gold medal for Class AA mile run at the state track meet in Austin Friday.

Garcia became the state champion when he stopped the clock at 4:20.9, giving him the best time recorded by a Class AA mile runner this season.

Going into the final turn of the track, Garcia held third place but managed to zip by his Karnes City and Muleshoe opponents, breaking the tape a second ahead of the Karnes City contestant.

Garcia moved into eighth place for having the best time among Texas high school runners this year.

The other Wolf state competitor, Ricky Sanchez, took fifth place in the 120 yard high hurdles. Sanchez was half a second off from his regional qualifying time in the event when he crossed the finish at 14.6.

Sanchez was also entered in the 330 yard intermediate hurdles in the state meet but did not place.

Colorado City managed to nab 15th place in the state track meet with 12 points, although only two athletes qualified to compete from Colorado High.

Columbus took the Class AA state title with a total of 50 points.



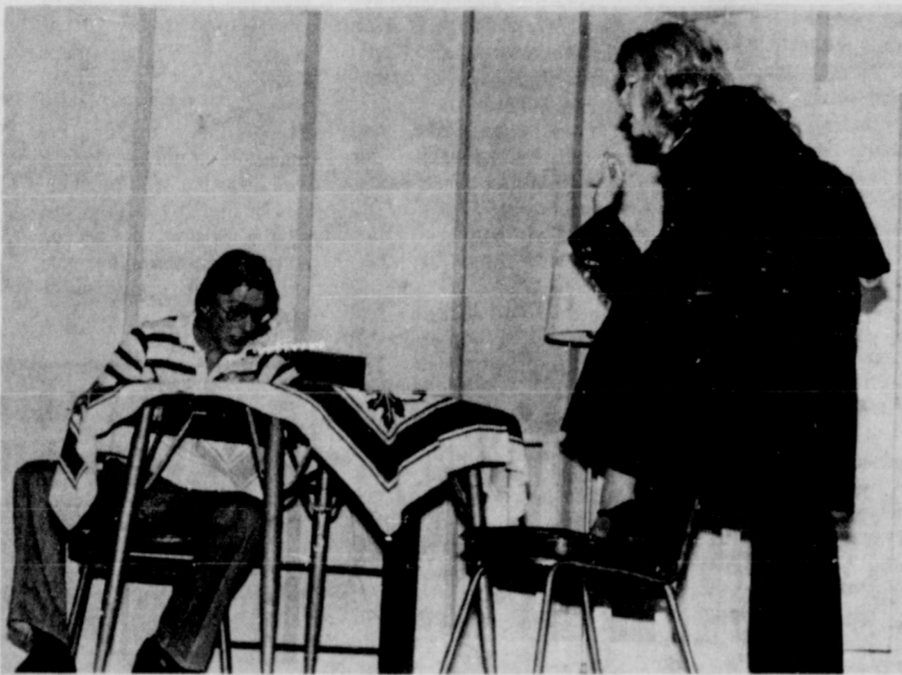

Ambulance Board Organizes Plan

Mitchell County Ambulance Board met in an unannounced meeting Wednesday in Root Memorial Hospital to organize, elect officers, and make plans for the transition of the service from the city to the hospital district, according to Board Member Bob Reilly.

In the meeting which lasted from 9:30 a.m. to noon, County Commissioner Johnny Shackelford was elected chairman and Reilly, hospital district representative, vice chairman.

The board decided the Attorney To Run Unopposed

Colorado City Attorney James W. Gregg won the democratic nomination for District Judge in the 118 Judicial District (Big Spring) in the Democratic primary.

Gregg will fill the bench seat to be vacated by Judge Ralph Caton who chose not to run again.

Gregg will run unopposed in the national election and when elected, Colorado City will be looking for a replacement for city attorney.

business manager for the hospital, George Witten, would take the minutes of each meeting and replace Gloria Erwin as bookkeeper for the service.

The board will meet in the hospital the first Thursday after the second Monday of each month.

Colorado City Chief of Police Fred McWhorter, who served as director of the ambulance service while it was run by the police department, met with the new board to explain the different problems to be anticipated and when the service is officially transferred June 1.

Arrangements have been made for a telephone to be placed in the entrance to the emergency room at the hospital and turned on June 1.

Reilly explained that the charges would remain the

same for the ambulance service—\$40 in county—\$45 out of county plus \$1 a mile one way. He noted there had been an additional fee of \$10 an hour added for stand-by service of over an hour.

The ambulance service as been purchasing gasoline on a rotational basis from all local retail service stations. The ambulances average six miles to a gallon. Under the new system the board plans to approach the city with a request to purchase gas through them.

The city buys gasoline wholesale on a rotational basis from wholesale stations within the county. The city is required to pay the state tax but no federal tax. This should bring the price of gasoline down to between 47.5c and 49.5c for the service.

Final Planting Date Is May 31

May 31 is the final date producers are expected to plant cotton, according to Don Stewart, county executive director of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

He added this does not mean cotton cannot be planted later. He cautioned Mitchell County producers that every cultural practice must be carried out to be eligible for prevented planting.

Loraine Has "0+" Dialing

Continental Telephone customers in Loraine have a new system of dialing long distance.

According to a report by Continental Telephone Company, work has been completed on the new dialing system that allows all Loraine customers to dial "0+". Customers can dial all collect, person-to-person and credit card calls themselves.

Presently Loraine customers have "1+" or direct distant dialing, but under the new system, the operator will only come on the line to get information as the call is going through.

"This system allows calls to go through quicker for the customer," explained Allan Armstrong, Loraine area customer service manager.

Under the new "0+" system, customers dial "0"

and the area code—if it is different from 915—and the number being called.

After dialing, the operator will come on the line and ask what type of call is being made (collect, per-

son-to-person or credit card) and will obtain necessary information as the call is being completed.

The new dialing system is already in effect for Loraine customers.

Mrs. Lee has previously worked in the city secretary office in Slaton under Alex Webb.

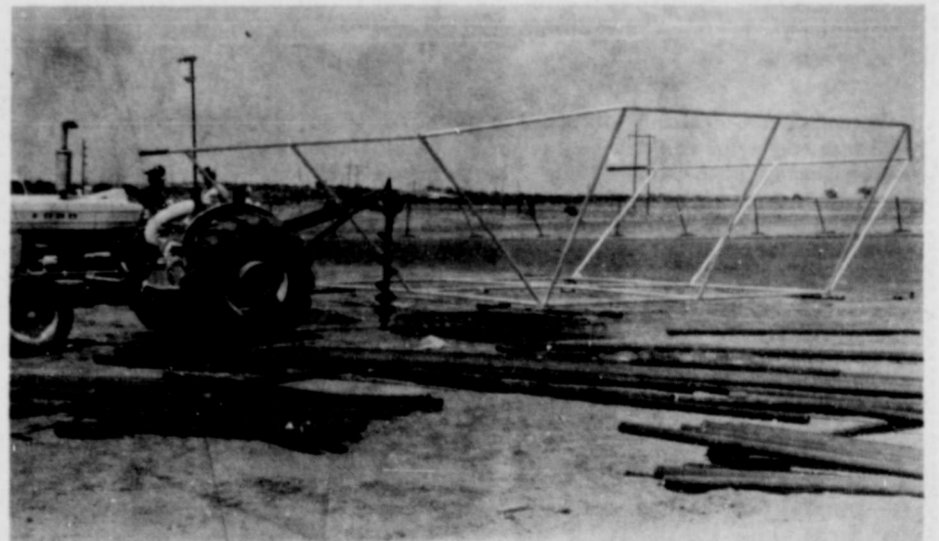

Mrs. Lee and her family live in the duplexes in Loraine and are members of the First Baptist Church of Loraine.

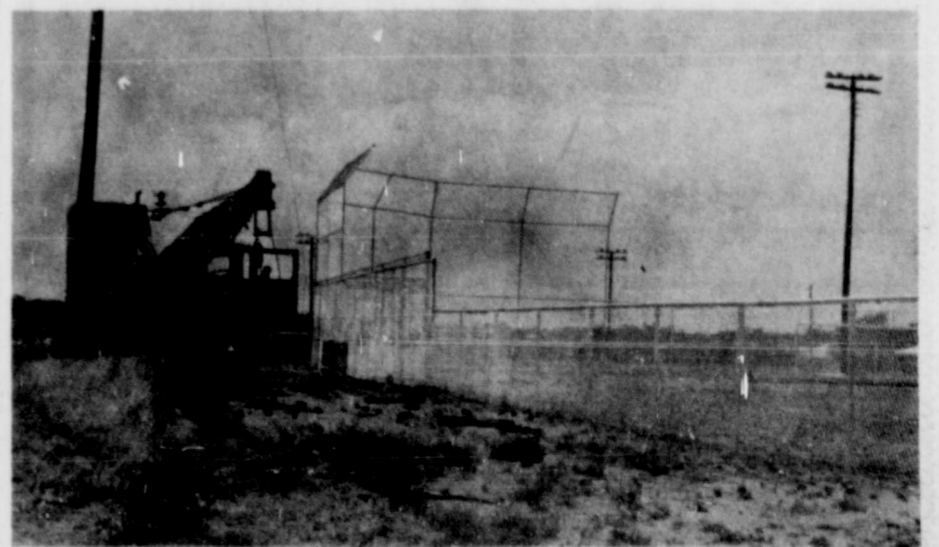
Fruit Tree Meeting Is Set Tuesday

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concentric layers so that arc-like bands appear when the galleries are exposed. Most species complete the life cycle in a year but some may require two to three years.

Signs of Attack:
The round headed borers group of beetles are more numerous, more destructive than flat headed borers. Borers commonly burrow into the heart

wood, tunneling holes often as large as a pencil. The burrow entrance usually is packed with coarse, excelsior-like frass. An accumulation of these wood fibers or frass often is observed around the base of the trees. Generally there is a discharge of sap from the tunnel opening which wets and discolors the bark of the tree below it.
Injury caused by the flat

headed borer consists of shallow long winding oval galleries beneath the bark, usually on the sunny side of the tree. Only larvae borer. Flat headed borers damage or kill ornamental and shade trees by mining beneath the bark or tunneling into the sapwood and heartwood. Dark, dead areas of bark are often present with sap exuding from their burrowing. Tunnels made by the larvae do not have outside exit holes although the sawdust-like frass may be visible from cracks in the bark or where the bark sloughs from the trees.

Plea Bargaining Is Demonstrated

Plea bargaining in order to expedite judicial procedures was again demonstrated in the court system when on April 21, Diana Strode, Michael Arlan Murphy and Pamela Joyce Christesen pled guilty before District Judge Weldon Kirk to knowing and intentional possession of a controlled substance.

They were fined, and placed on probation for five, five and three years, respectively.

The trio had been charged with theft at Anthony's March 20 and attempted break-in of Perry's and possession of methamphetamine. The first two charges were dropped because of their plea of guilty to possession of methamphetamine which is a second degree felony.

Each paid court cost of \$18.66. The women were

fined a probation fee of \$15 a month for the duration of the probation and Murphy was fined \$500. All three were probated to Stanislaus County, Calif.

A fourth person involved with the trio in an alleged till-tapping March 20 at Anthony's Department Store and attempted break-in at Perry's Variety Store, Jerry Strode, remains in Mitchell County Jail awaiting trial on charges of theft by taking, out of Big Spring; possession of methamphetamine; carrying stolen credit cards and burglary.

Prevention:

The presence of borers usually is not evident until it is too late to prevent extensive damage and sometimes even to save the tree. Therefore sound tree managed practices are most important in preventing borer attacks. These practices include:

1) Wrapping the trunks of young or transplanted trees with nursery wrapping paper or burlap.

2) Watering and fertilizing trees properly to maintain vigorous growth.

3) Pruning dead or dying branches and treating with a good wound paint.

YOU ASKED FOR IT
Many of you have written in asking specific questions about purchasing or caring for your carpeting. Space will not permit us to answer all of them, but we will periodically pick the most representative questions and devote a column to them.

I have new carpeting in my living room and hallways. Recently, a friend told me that some types of vacuum cleaners cause carpet damage. Is this true? Ans. Certain vacuums are better for your carpeting than others. I recommend a brush and beater type of vacuum for today's carpets. Most uprights are of this type, and some canister and tank types have attachments which use this principle. A vacuum with a head consisting of combs or teeth should be avoided as these can catch in the carpet loops and pull out the tufts.

How can I tell how much carpeting I will need for my room? Ans. Multiply the length (in feet) of the room times its width. Then divide by nine. This will give you number of square yards. **DO YOU HAVE A QUESTION?** Send it along to me. Or, better still, stop in at

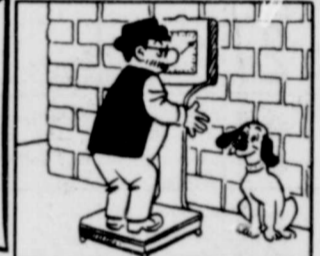

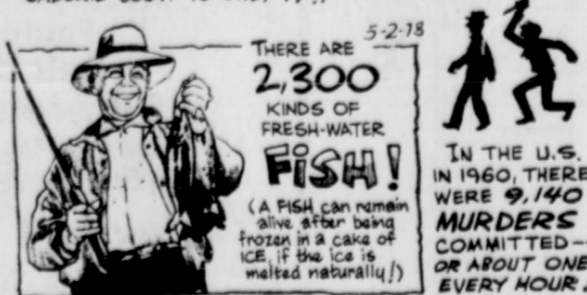

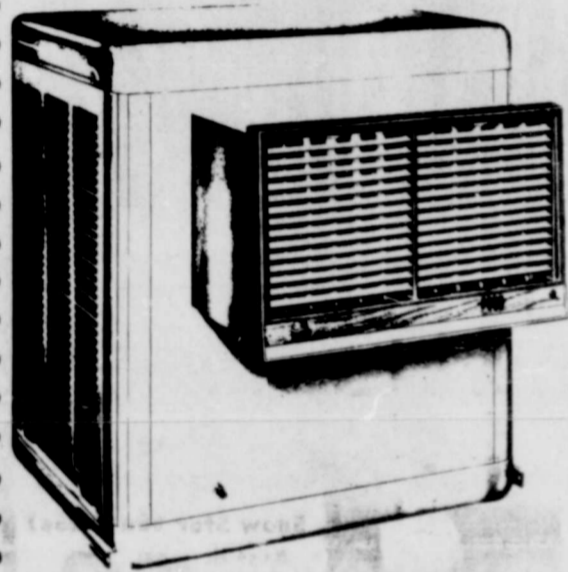

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Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

During the months of January, February, and March of this year, Texas motorists experienced a major change in the motor vehicle registration system. At the outset, there was some confusion as to how the system was designed to be implemented. However, the news media was a great help in explaining that, in the future, motor vehicle registrations will expire by the month instead of at one specified April 1 deadline. This year was the last experience that these Texans will have in facing long lines in order to register their motor vehicles.

There is one final step in the conversion system. Some motorists were given a one-time-only option to register their vehicles for

more or less than the usual 12-month period. For those choosing a shorter period, a second registration in 1978 will be necessary. This second renewal through September must be made without receipt of a renewal notice, due to insufficient processing time.

Each motorist with a registration expiring in the intervening months must re-register at his county tax assessor-collector's office in the proper month. Renewals thereafter will be for a 12-month period, and subsequent expirations will be preceded by a registration renewal notice.

We are enclosing a basic one-column reminder notice with a supply of insert months and figures (for countdown days) similar to those you may use for pre-Christmas shopping periods. Your use of these announcements in each of the coming months may prevent embarrassment, perhaps a fine, for motorists failing to register by the proper date during the initial familiarization period.

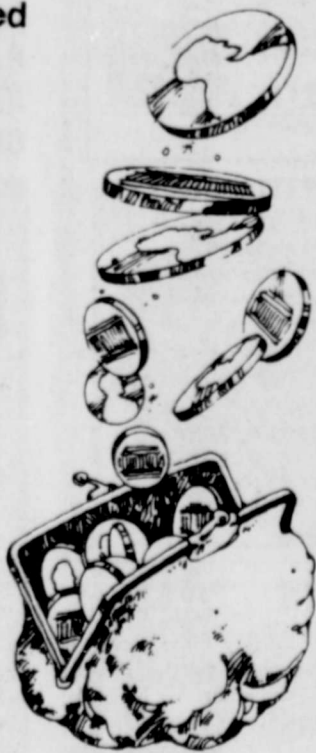

There is very little difference in people, but that little difference makes a big difference. The big difference is whether it is positive or negative.

Nowhere is this principle better illustrated than in the story of the young bride from the East who, during WWII, followed her husband to an Army camp on the edge of the desert in California. Living conditions were primitive at best, and he had advised against it, but she wanted to be with him.

The only housing they could find was a run down shack near an Indian village. The heat was unbearable in the daytime—115 degrees in the shade. The wind blew constantly, spreading dust and sand all over every thing. The days were long and boring. Her neighbors were the Indians, none of whom spoke English.

When her husband was ordered farther into the desert for two weeks of maneuvers, loneliness and the wretched living conditions got the best of her. She wrote to her mother that she was coming home—she just couldn't take it anymore. In a short time she received a reply which included these two lines:

Two men looked out from prison bars,
One saw mud, the other saw stars.

She read the lines over and over and began to feel ashamed of herself. And she really didn't want to leave her husband. All right, she would look for the stars!

In the following days she set out to make friends with the Indians. She asked them to teach her weaving and pottery. At first they were distant, but

as soon as they sensed her interest was genuine they returned her friendship. She became fascinated with their culture, history—everything about them.

She began to study the desert as well, and soon it, too, changed from a desolate forbidden place to a marvelous place of beauty. She had her mother send her books. She studied the forms of cacti, the yuccas and the Joshua trees. She collected sea shells that had been left there millions of years ago when the sands had been an ocean floor. Later, she became such an expert on the area that she wrote a book about it.

What had changed? Not the desert, not the Indians. Simply by changing her own attitude she has transformed a miserable experience into a highly rewarding one.

We, here in Colorado City also need some attitude changing. I keep hearing, "We can't do that here. We're a small town." Sure we are but we don't have to stay that way. The Chinese say, "A journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step." Colorado City has gotten steadily smaller during the recent past. It is time we reversed this trend, but first we must change our attitudes. Nothing in life that is worthwhile comes free, easy or painless. We can do what we want to. But do we want to bad enough to pay the price for much needed change and progress? Or do we just want to keep on graduating our children from high school and forcing them to go somewhere else to make a living?

Miss Helm stated similarities in the Porter family and her own was the reason she chose the book.

The story is a narrative involving the Porter family headed by Papa, a Methodist preacher, a loving and devoted mother, and eight children who grew up stretching the walls of Methodist parsonages with their growing, merriment, and off-the-pastoral-record escapades.

Miss Helm began speaking in first person, assuming the role of Alyene, and introduced the family members to the audience. The family boasted six boys and two girls. Their interests ranged from aspiring to become a bishop, a financier, a grocery merchant, an actress, a musician, a Don Juan, a surgeon, to a red-headed brother who possessed no inhibitions.

Saturday was labeled the most important day of the week for the Porters. Preparation for Sunday began at 6 o'clock in the morning and didn't stop until midnight. The church was dusted and shined, the parsonage was polished, clothes were pressed, the phone was manned to answer calls concerning Sunday, and Mother prepared the food for Sunday.

As the story progressed, humorous events occurring in the family's lives were cited. Papa's four young sons at one time decided they were tired of going to church so they crawled under the church building and set fire to it. The boys were returned to their pew the next Sunday. Fortunately, the building suffered only slight damage.

Another time Papa, arriving at the church late after performing an impromptu marriage ceremony, was startled to hear youngsters praying about heartbreaks and yearnings for suitors when more appropriate prayer was in order.

Thirty years in all were spent by the family in college. Unable to sustain several in school away from home, Papa declined promotions to larger churches that he might stay near enough the university for the children to live at home and commute.

As stated by one of Papa's children, Papa and Mother lived with them, not for them. They entered into their play, work, study and grew with them.

The family suffered problems and heartaches, as do all families, but the children felt their parsonage life was a happy one and none would exchange it for the wealth of kings.

Papa carried on his work when his birthdays showed he had passed the age for active ministry. Since there was a preacher shortage he served a full-time church after the age of retirement. In 1969, Papa died in Plano at age 97. He was serving as assistant pastor of the First Methodist Church of Plano.

Following Miss Helm's review, Mrs. Elmer Martin conducted installation service for 1978-79 Council officers. Mrs. Martin explained the purpose and objectives of home demonstration clubs as providing inspiration, education, and recreation for homemakers. The audience joined her in reciting the THDA prayer. She recited the THDA Creed and challenged the club members to uphold the beliefs stated in the creed.

Mrs. Martin recognized each officer and delegated duties and responsibilities to them. Officers installed were Mrs. J. D. Gibson-Council Chairman; Mrs. C. Ross Smith-Vice Chairman; Mrs. Arthur Shepherd-Secretary; Mrs. Versie McMillan-Treasurer, standing in for Mrs. McMillan was Mrs. P. H. Pace and Mrs. R. D. Penny-Parliamentarian. Refreshments were ser-

ved from a table covered with an ivory lace tablecloth with a green underlay. A spring bouquet of flowers made of silk added to the setting of crystal.

Mrs. Arthur Shepherd had charge of all the planning for the event and was assisted by Mrs. Mabel Givens, Mrs. P. H. Pace, Mrs. J. D. Gibson, and various Home Demonstration Club members.

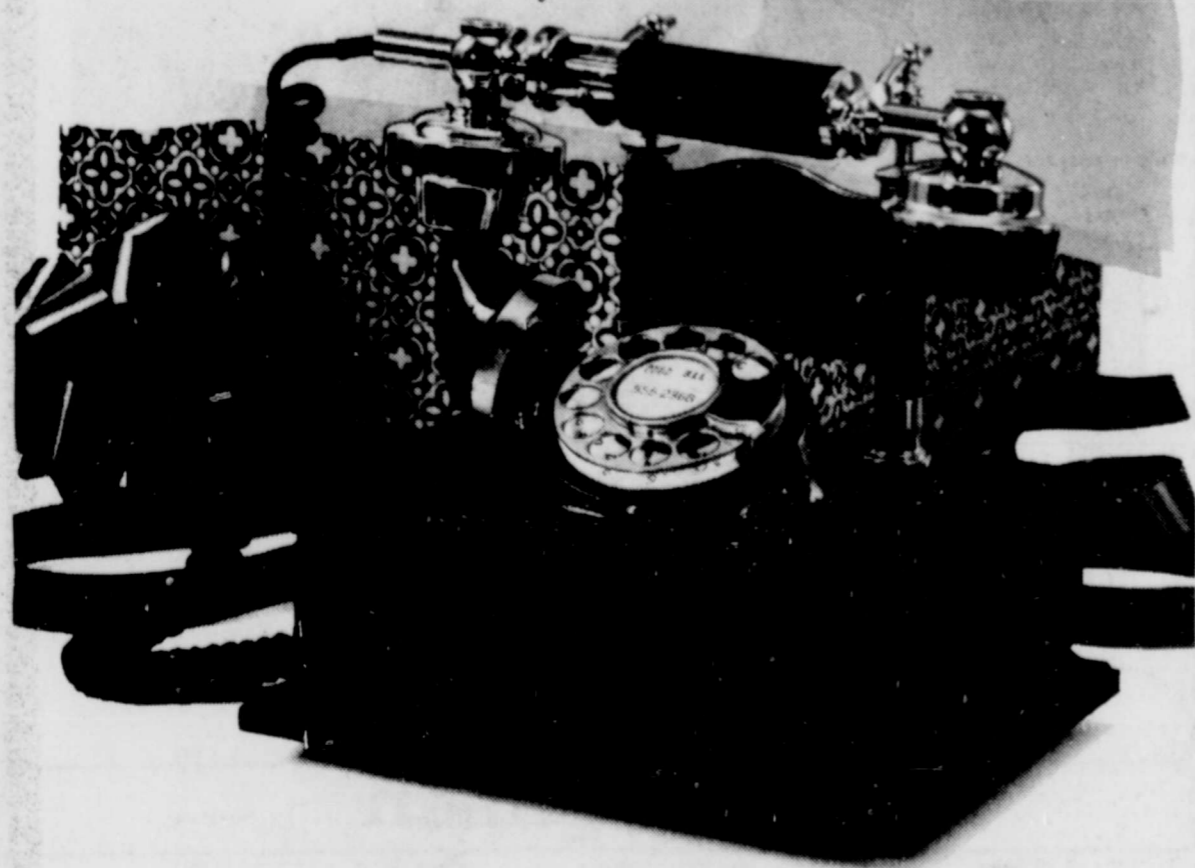
Moore contacted the *Record* office Thursday to inform persons who have submitted payment to expect a refund check in the mail by June 1.
