### FIRST 1947 GRAIN IS SOLD HERE WEDNESDAY

Jack Kuykendall of the Pleasant Valley Community brought in Garza County's first two loads of 1947 grain yesterday to W. F. Pierce and Sons Grain Company. It was Martin maize, which sold for \$2.95 per hundred.

This year's grain crop is much smaller than usual. Only about a third as much was planted as was planted the preceding year. Grain in all parts of the county has suffered from drought.

## Garza Vetoes College Bill

Of approximately 1,800 qualified voters in Garza County, 180 persons turned out to cast ballots in Saturday's election which carried the \$60,000,000 College Building Amendment.

Complete unofficial returns from the nine boxes in the county showed that 165 voters were against the bill, as were the majority of West Texans, and 13 were for it, as were 32.8 per cent of the Texas voters.

## "Public" Approves Unanimously Of Garza County's 1948 Budget

As required by law, the Garza County Commissioners Court sweated out a public hearing on the County's 1948 budget all day Monday.

Judge J. Lee Bowen and the County Commissioners started sitting around the conference table at 10 a. m. and they sat and they sat. It was a long time until 5 p. m., but after it was all over they felt that their efforts were well worth while, as the public had contained no dissenters.

The budget had been prepared, after a long and laborious survey, by Sedwick and Cherry, Certified Public Accountants of San Angelo. All the details of county expense were there, neatly tabulated in black and white.

Everything the county owed, which is currently \$172,500 in bond and time warrant debt but will be reduced to \$168,000 by January 1, 1948, when the new budget goes into effect, was down there in black and white for the public to see and approve.

Also everything that the county owns was listed and evaluated, along with the list of current and anticipated expenditures, right down to the last dime. The public had been notified through the Post Dispatch for two weeks in a row that there was a chance to come in

and see and approve, or disapprove.

The financial statement looked pretty good to the public: \$77,685.29 on hand, plus anticipated receipts of \$97,450, making a total of \$175,135.29 from which the approved 1948 expenditures of \$81,270.50 will be deducted.

The public couldn't see anything wrong with that so it approved unanimously.

The public consisted of this reporter, who was the only soul who put in an appearance Monday when Judge Bowen and Commissioners W. T. Panchman, W. C. Quisenberry, Boone Evans and Buck Gossett sat on hard chairs, staring at each other from 10 a. m. until 5 p. m.

Such a "hearing" is held each year in August. Although it is open to both women and men taxpayers, this reporter is the only woman in the history of Garza County to show up and look the budget over, Judge Bowen believes.

If memory serves court house oldtimers correctly, the reporter is the first person, man or woman, to show up at a public budget hearing since the death of Jay Slaughter in 1940. The late Mr. Slaughter used to drop in almost every year and study the budget on public hearing day.

## A Year Ago Today Rain Poured Down

### Clouds Bring Smiles But Not Much Water

A year ago today, it was raining. Post got 4.42 inches to break an eight-week drought.

Last year's rain started with spotty showers a year ago yesterday. Some sections got as much as half an inch.

Clouds the past few days have threatened a repetition of last year's deluge, but as far as is known only a narrow strip in the Pleasant Valley region got enough rain yesterday to do any good. It was reported that the narrow strip received three inches of moisture yesterday afternoon.

Spotted showers earlier in the week brought cooler weather and smiles to the faces of a few people. Post received two one-hundredths of an inch on Sunday and 29 one-hundredths of an inch on Monday.

Reports from various parts of the county indicated that about a fourth of an inch fell west of Post, one half of an inch in some areas southwest, and one strip on the plains, near Southland, received about an inch of rain this week.

The showers were very spotted, however, and most areas are still suffering from lack of moisture. Grain is suffering more than cotton, farmers report.

## Military Rites To Be Extended Lt. Alton Trull

A formal military funeral service for Lt. Alton (Bo) Trull who was killed when an airplane which he was flying crashed near Munich, Germany, on July 14 will be held at the First Methodist Church at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

The body will arrive here from New York Friday morning.

For the funeral, the casket will be draped with a flag of the United States, taps will be played and a gun salute will be given. Chaplain Winan F. Beadle of the 416th AAF Base Unit, Hobbs Army Air Field, Hobbs, N. M., will officiate. Pallbearers will be six officers from the Hobbs base.

Lieutenant Trull, who was born in January, 1924, and was reared in Garza County, attended the Graham Chapel school as a boy. He had many friends in Post and throughout the county. He entered the service in January, 1943.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Trull, who now live on Route 2, Wilson; three brothers, Harold and Cecil Trull of Wilson and Weldon Trull of Abilene, and three sisters, Mrs. Ruby Bishop of Port Isabel and Mrs. Louise Pierce and Mrs. Bernice Smith of Post. All members of the immediate family and a number of other relatives are expected here for the funeral.

Burial will be in Terrace Cemetery, under supervision of Mason and Company.

## HD Clubwomen Make Plans For Another Bazaar

The Home Demonstration Sale held Saturday in Greenfield's Hardware Store netted \$78.10, Miss Jewell Hipp, Garza County home demonstration agent, said this week.

A similar sale will be held on September 10 in connection with the Harvest Show for home demonstration clubwomen and 4-H club girls of the county. Details of the time and place of the sale will be announced later, the agent said.

For the next sale, each of the seven home demonstration clubs in the county will provide five chickens, five pies and five cakes, the agent said this week.

Miss Hipp announced that the next regular meeting of the Garza County Home Demonstration Council will be held at the court house on September 13, rather than September 20 as previously announced, in order to avoid a conflict with the Harvest Show.

The home demonstration agent and the county agricultural agent, D. F. Eaton, will be in College Station the first week of September assisting with the state 4-H Round Up. Their offices will be managed by their secretary, Miss Melba Jo Miller, during their absence. Both expect to be back in Post by September 8.

## Dallas Flooded By Nine-Inch Rain This Week

While Garza County's crops were thirsting for threatened rain this week, other Texas areas were suffering from the heaviest rains in history.

The Associated Press this morning described a tropical storm which lunged inland 300 miles in two days and gave Dallas the heaviest rain ever recorded there then moved on to Oklahoma to die yesterday.

In its wake, the storm left flooding rivers, inundated fields and damaged crops, highways closed by water, many injuries and Dallas with several hundred thousand dollars in damage to repair.

The Trinity and Colorado Rivers were flooding. The Trinity with a flood stage of 28 feet, was up to 31.4 feet at noon yesterday, out of its banks and still rising. Warnings were issued to evacuate lowlands.

The official rainfall total in Dallas for the 24-hour period ending at dawn yesterday was 9.18 inches, far above the former all-time record of 6.22 inches established May 28-29, 1946, the AP said.

Unofficially, the fall was recorded on standard weather gauges as high as 10.20 inches.

Water was over curbs on the Main streets of Dallas. Power failed in some sections, and a few elevators were out of order.

A bumper rice crop of 75.5 million bushels is expected from U. S. rice growers this year. Such a crop would exceed last year's record crop by 4 million bushels.

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## South Plains Cotton Figured At 650,000 Despite Drouth Damage

A minimum South Plains cotton crop of 650,000 bales this year, despite severe drouth damage, was estimated in Lubbock Saturday by K. N. Clapp, area manager for Anderson-Clayton and Company, cotton firm. Clapp's findings were reported as follows by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal:

The crop should be much larger if a good rain falls within the next two weeks, Clapp said, but it is extremely unlikely the yield will reach the million-plus bales indicated by conditions earlier in the season.

However, the present and prospective markets virtually insure that the dollar value of the crop will break all records. The staple alone of a 650,000 bale crop, it was estimated, would be worth well over \$100,000,000.

With total acreage estimated at somewhat more than 2,000,000 in the 18 counties of this area, conditions as of Saturday were summarized in this manner:

### Rain Would Help

About 10 per cent of the cotton, or approximately 200,000 acres, has been extremely hard hit. It is doubtful whether it will average one-fourth of a bale to the acre.

Approximately 40 per cent, or 800,000 acres, is at the "critical stage." Rain within the next two weeks would make an enormous difference in its production.

About 36 per cent, or 720,000 acres, does not seem to have suffered greatly, and will make a good crop regardless of rain unless there should be hail or other weather of disaster proportions.

### Irrigators Are Safe

The remaining 14 per cent is under irrigation and an abundant yield is expected to average well over a bale to the acre.

Even the 650,000-bale crop estimated by Clapp as a minimum would be somewhat phenomenal when compared with the records of previous years.

It would be more than three times as large as last year's "drouth crop" of 260,000 bales; 125,000 bales larger than the av-

erage production of 525,000 bales in this area, and within about 300,000 bales of the all-time record crop of 859,000 in 1937. Acreage that year on the South Plains approximated 1,500,000.

## School Child Examinations Are In Order

School days are here again. Thousands of Texas boys and girls and teachers are returning to the schools. Each child entering school should be as free as possible of any physical defects which can be corrected. The earlier these are corrected the better chance the child has for academic progress and for good social and emotional development, says Dr. George W. Cox of Austin, state health officer.

Now is the time for a complete medical and dental check-up. Eyes, ears, nose, throat, and teeth should be carefully examined by the family doctor and dentist, and all remediable defects corrected. If such defects are neglected, they may result in serious damage to growth and development.

Dental corrections often take time, but a person is repaid many times over for good dental care. Healthy teeth lend attractiveness to the personal appearance, enable thorough chewing of food, and promote general good health.

In schoolrooms, children expose each other to many communicable diseases, especially the common cold and diseases such as measles, scarlet fever, whooping cough, and diphtheria. Protect the child from diphtheria and whooping cough, as well as smallpox, by safe and dependable immunization.

Parents, see that your child has complete protective treatment against preventable diseases: a clean healthy throat and mouth; the best possible vision and hearing; adequate diet, sleep and rest to build up resistance against disease. It will pay good dividends, and your child will be ready for school, the officer advises.

## Sugar Process Important When Cooking Fruit

Miss Jewell Hipp, Garza County home demonstration agent, offers this tip for housewives on making preserves out of the fruit crop.

Fruit preserves are successful only if the fruit holds its shape, yet is tender and translucent in the syrup, as sugar has a firming effect on fruit tissues but must be applied differently to various types of fruit.

Sugar is added "straight" to tender, juicy fruits like peaches, cherries and berries. If the fruits stand overnight in sugar, they become firmer and are less likely to go to pieces in cooking. The sugar draws out the juice and shrinks the fruit somewhat, but the juice provides enough liquid so that no water need be added, and this shortens the cooking time. The shorter the cooking, the better the color and flavor.

Juicy fruits with a firm skin, like plums, do not need overnight firming. But because they are juicy, they are put in a thick syrup. This helps keep their shape as they cook, and the juice, as it cooks out, thins the necessary amount.

Firm fruits like quinces and crabapples are put in thin syrup to cook, for thick syrup toughens them, and they have time to cook tender while the syrup boils down.

To keep the surplus low, Brazil destroys millions of bags of coffee annually.

## Record Number of Licenses For Hunting May Be Sold This Fall

The Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission predicts a good hunting season in Texas on the major game animals. The prospects are summarized, as follows, by the United Press:

The curtain will be raised on fall and winter shooting when mourning dove hunters in the northern zone start firing at morning twilight on Sept. 1. The season in the northern zone will stretch to Oct. 15.

Prospects for mourning doves, including those for the southern zone between Oct. 20 and Dec. 3, are good, the game commission reports. But the doves will be scattered, which means the hunter will have to find his doves where he can.

**Reminded of Statute**  
And the game commission adds that mourning doves and white-wing dove hunters should toe the line on the regulation requiring that shotguns must be permanently plugged to a three-shell capacity.

A number of former GI hunters were caught last year, the game commission said, because they were unaware of the requirement. It's a federal regulation applying to all migratory game birds and U. S. inspectors mean business. Game officials this year also are making a special request for dove hunters to use dogs to retrieve their birds, as a lot of crippled doves were found after last year's hunt.

The game commission points out that for white wing dove hunters in South Texas, who will fire from 4 p. m. to sunset on Sept. 12, 14 and 16, it will be a double season.

**Limit Is 10 Birds**  
Though the mourning dove season won't open in the southern zone until Oct. 20, white wing dove hunters will be allowed also to kill mourning doves, "because many can't tell the difference." However, the bag limit will still be not more than 10 in possession at a total of both types.

The game commission describes mourning dove prospects in the southern zone as being "as good or better" than in the northern zone, and though there are no half-million flights of white wing doves expected there will be enough to satisfy hunters during the curtailed three-day season.

Here is an index to hunting prospects by the game commission on other open seasons.

**"Plenty" On Hand**  
Gallinules and rails, Sept. 1 to Nov. 30—these shore birds are not hunted much and there will be "plenty" on hand.

Antelope, in seven West Texas counties in October, by special permit. Antelope hunts are still an "every man for himself" proposition, the game commission says.

Ducks and geese, split season, statewide, Nov. 4 to Nov. 17 and Dec. 16 to Dec. 19—a "pretty fair concentration" of ducks is expected by game officials.

Deer and turkey, Nov. 10 to Dec. 31—there will be smaller deer but there "should be just as many if not more" than last year, game officials report. They will be slightly smaller in some areas because of lack of feeding. Turkey prospects are "really surprising," game officials say, and there are some turkey in areas where they have been unseen for 10 years.

Quail, Dec. 1 to Dec. 16—quail will be good but "spotty" as cover will be concentrated in scattered areas, the game commission forecasts.

The game commission reports it expects to sell a record number of hunting licenses this year, judging from requisitions for licenses sent in by game dealers on the num-

## Orchard Trees Require Sandy Type of Earth

Letters of inquiry from Texas fruit growers have prompted Extension horticulturists at Texas A. and M. College to offer a few pointers on selecting a site for planting a new orchard this fall, winter or early spring, according to D. F. Eaton, Garza County agricultural agent.

A big point to remember, say the horticulturists, is getting the soil in good shape early enough that late summer and fall rains can put the finishing touches on the ground so that it will be ready when planting time comes around.

Drainage and soil type are two things to watch in selecting that orchard location now. Since fruit trees don't like "wet feet," both top and subsoil must have good drainage. Land with a slight slope to the northeast is good, since such a slope protects the trees from prevailing winds and still offers thorough drainage.

Growers have found that good orchard soil has these qualities: Moderately rich (over-rich soil may cause too fast a vegetative growth); high in organic matter; a pH, or acidity rating, of 6.5 to 7; completely free of such trouble makers as nematodes, cotton root rot, oak root rot, crown gall or Bermuda grass. Most fruit trees produce on many different soil types if drainage and ailing is good. However, the horticulturists like to see orchards on 12 to 18-inch deep sandy or sandy loam soil, with well-drained sandy clay soil underneath. They tell growers never to plant fruit trees on old orchard sites, which may be diseased and insect infested. Newly cleared land also may have termites left from decaying wood.

The smart orchardist, when he selects a new site, goes ahead to terrace the land, pulverize the soil, plant an adapted winter legume, fertilize and set stakes where the trees are to go.

## FALL GARDENS REQUIRE DIFFERENT TREATMENT

Comes this time of year, and with it fall gardening.

Extension agents at Texas A. & M. College and county home demonstration agents already are being questioned: "Do I handle my fall garden just like my spring garden?"

The answer is "No, not exactly. . . ." There are several pointers to remember about fall gardens that differ from spring gardens.

The idea on fall gardens is to keep them growing, and fast. Mulch materials should be spread on the ground to hold in moisture and speed up seed germination. The fall garden needs watering thoroughly at three to five day intervals. Early morning or late afternoon are the best watering times.

From 20 to 25 per cent more seed should be planted now than in the spring, since germination is usually poorer in the fall. Seed should be planted slightly deeper than in the spring.

To make things go faster: Soak seed in water for 24 hours before planting, and when the plants are up, side dress them with commercial fertilizer every 30 days.

Wind protection is necessary in this area. Tender plants need partial protection from the hot, late summer sun. If outside conditions are unfavorable or unsuited to vegetables, a frame garden should be used.

Also seen as possibilities are Dorrell McCurry of Lubbock, and newcomers Joe Bob Tyler of Burkburnett and Dan Purcell of Kilgore.

Winkler Returning  
Bernie Winkler, Temple veteran, is almost certain to be at left tackle again, with Marshall Gettys, lengthy Amarillo sophomore rated highest at the other tackle. Also in the picture are Ted Moss, Amarillo; Howard Tucker, Sherman; George Zoller, Van; and Eugene Rush, Big Spring.

The ends provide the greatest question. Seen as possibilities are starters of last year, Joe Smith of Electra and Bill Kelley of Idaho. Rated high are Frank Ottmers, Fredericksburg letterman, and R. W. Mayers, Lubbock, 1945 UP Little All-American.

The starting quarterback will be either Freddie Brown, Burkburnett, or Ernest Hawkins, Lawrence. It is agreed on the sidelines. Brown in 1943 hurried passes to Hubert Bechtel, later Texas All-American, to ring fifth in ground gaining for the nation. ## Record Number of Licenses For Hunting May Be Sold This Fall

The Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission predicts a good hunting season in Texas on the major game animals. The prospects are summarized, as follows, by the United Press:

The curtain will be raised on fall and winter shooting when mourning dove hunters in the northern zone start firing at morning twilight on Sept. 1. The season in the northern zone will stretch to Oct. 15.

Prospects for mourning doves, including those for the southern zone between Oct. 20 and Dec. 3, are good, the game commission reports. But the doves will be scattered, which means the hunter will have to find his doves where he can.

Reminded of Statute  
And the game commission adds that mourning doves and white-wing doves should be the line on the regulation requiring that shotguns must be permanently plugged to a three-shell capacity.

A number of former GI hunters were caught last year, the game commission said, because they were unaware of the requirement. It's a federal regulation applying to all migratory game birds and U. S. inspectors mean business. Game officials this year also are making a special request for dove hunters to use dogs to retrieve their birds, as a lot of crippled doves were found after last year's hunt.

The game commission points out that for white wing dove hunters in South Texas, who will fire from 4 p. m. to sunset on Sept. 12, 14 and 16, it will be a double season.

Limit Is 10 Birds  
Though the mourning dove season won't open in the southern zone until Oct. 20, white wing dove hunters will be allowed also to kill mourning doves, "because many can't tell the difference." However, the bag limit will still be not more than 10 in possession at a total of both types.

The game commission describes mourning dove prospects in the southern zone as being "as good or better" than in the northern zone, and though there are no half-million flights of white wing doves expected there will be enough to satisfy hunters during the curtailed three-day season.

Here is an index to hunting prospects by the game commission on other open seasons.

"Plenty" On Hand  
Gallinules and rails, Sept. 1 to Nov. 30—these shore birds are not hunted much and there will be "plenty" on hand.

Antelope, in seven West Texas counties in October, by special permit. Antelope hunts are still an "every man for himself" proposition, the game commission says.

Ducks and geese, split season, statewide, Nov. 4 to Nov. 17 and Dec. 18 to Dec. 19—a "pretty fair concentration" of ducks is expected by game officials.

Deer and turkey, Nov. 16 to Dec. 31—there will be smaller deer but there "should be just as many if not more" than last year, game officials report. They will be slightly smaller in some areas because of lack of feeding. Turkey prospects are "really surprising." Game officials say, and there are some turkey in areas where they have been unseen for 19 years.

Quail, Dec. 1 to Dec. 16—quail will be good but "spotty" as coveys will be concentrated in scattered areas, the game commission forecasts.

The game commission reports it expects to sell a record number of hunting licenses this year, judging from requisitions for licenses sent in by game dealers in the num-

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## Orchard Trees Require Sandy Type of Earth

Letters of inquiry from Texas fruit growers have prompted Extension horticulturists at Texas A. and M. College to offer a few pointers on selecting a site for planting a new orchard this fall, winter or early spring, according to D. F. Eaton, Garza County agricultural agent.

A big point to remember, say the horticulturists, is getting the soil in good shape early enough that late summer and fall rains can put the finishing touches on the ground so that it will be ready when planting time comes around.

Drainage and soil type are two things to watch in selecting that orchard location now. Since fruit trees don't like "wet feet," both top and subsoil must have good drainage. Land with a slight slope to the northeast is good, since such a slope protects the trees from prevailing winds and still offers thorough drainage.

Growers have found that good orchard soil has these qualities: Moderately rich (over-rich soil may cause too fast a vegetative growth); high in organic matter; a pH, or acidity rating, of 6.5 to 7; completely free of such trouble makers as nematodes, cotton root rot, oak root rot, crown gall or Bermuda grass. Most fruit trees produce on many different soil types if drainage and ailing is good. However, the horticulturists like to see orchards on 12 to 18-inch deep sandy or sandy loam soil, with well-drained sandy clay soil underneath. They tell growers never to plant fruit trees on old orchard sites, which may be diseased and insect infested. Newly cleared land also may have termites left from decaying wood.

The smart orchardist, when he selects a new site, goes ahead to terrace the land, pulverize the soil, plant an adapted winter legume, fertilize and set stakes where the trees are to go.

## GETTING OUT

Charlie Benson, who has been living down at the Post Dispatch for a week or two while applying white and green paint to the outside and pale green, yellow, ivory and aluminum paint to the inside of the front office, told some shocking things that I could expect from otherwise honorable citizens.

When he told me that people would absent-mindedly strike matches on his snow white building front, I didn't believe him. But, sure enough, before he could get coat 3 of white paint applied, the match strikers had already scratched up coat 2.

Then when he started on the inside walls, he pointed out to me that people who come into my office on business have been striking matches on the wall just opposite each door leading to the back office. Why they choose those two particular spots, is more than I can figure out.

Since Charlie called it to my attention, I have had the girls up front keeping tabs on the methods of the culprits—they tell me that more people strike matches on the wall coming from the back office than going to it. I'm tempted to put up a match-scratching pad on our new green walls and on our nice, new front, but I know it won't do any good.

I have heard of service station and bus station operators and other keepers of public rest rooms trying both match-scratching and lipstick pads in their rest rooms without any good results. People who wouldn't think of striking a match on the walls of their own homes or wiping lipstick on the walls of their own bathrooms will deface public property without ever giving it a thought.

Charlie says the oil of lipstick not only ruins the paint but the wood or plaster underneath it and makes redecorating almost impossible. The lipstick oil mixes with the oil of the paint and they both penetrate into the wood, taking the red color with them.

He proved to me that it is just as bad with match burns. The chemicals penetrate the paint and discolor the original surface, making redecoration extremely difficult.

And he is the only painter I have ever seen, who can paint for long hours, day after day, without getting in anybody's way or dropping drops of paint on the floor or windows or people's clothes and, most remarkable of all, he doesn't drop or smear it on himself. He comes to work all dressed up like a Philadelphia lawyer, goes back to the little boys' room and puts on some white overalls. At the end of the day, he changes from his still white overalls to his business suit and leaves here looking like a Philadelphia lawyer.

## Employers, Employees Both Are Cheating Consumers

Boston, Mass.—Last night, I spent in Wellesley. Desirous to get to Boston early, I went to the Wellesley Hills railroad station to take the 7 a. m. train. This is a very fine stone station of the Boston & Albany (New York Central System) Railroad. To my surprise, I found no ticket agent, no baggage master and no newspapers. The doors were locked and bolted.

Upon inquiring the reason, I was told later in Boston that, in view of a recent forced raise in wages, the railroad cut down the working hours of the station employees so the railroad did not have to pay out any more money. This, of

course, resulted only in enabling the station employees to lie abed a little longer in morning.

The station did not open until 7:30 a. m. until then no tickets could be bought, no newspapers were available, no baggage could be checked and the public telephone could not be used. I stood out in the mist awaiting my train; but a neighbor who was also shaking the door said: "Okay, I'm going down to the Square and get a bus into Boston."

## Why Costs Are High

Now let us forget, for a moment, whether our sympathies are with the railroad or its employees. The fact is that only the bus company wins by such nonsense! The employees have no more money to take home; the railroad loses customers; the newspapers lose sales and the public is much inconvenienced.

Of course, this foolishness can't go on forever. More hourly wages, shorter working hours, higher retail prices—all expanding like a balloon—are bound to collapse sometime. I don't blame any special group; but do say that the present system is a losing game to all concerned and the true reason for high prices.

The only hope of every reader lies with more production which means more work by all of us. What we get in money wages means nothing until we turn it into "goods." What we can get for our weekly pay in food, clothing and shelter is our real wages. This can be increased only through increased production which requires longer and better work and more new inventions. In fact, the real reason why wage-workers have more goods today is due to

inventors and laborers—not to labor leaders and politicians.

## What Is The Remedy?

Shall we destroy unions? No! Shall we abolish collective bargaining? No! Shall we enact more anti-labor legislation? No! Consumers want happy and satisfied labor with the highest real wages possible. But both employers and wage-workers must co-operate to increase production and the quality of the product. This could be brought about by the union and the employer agreeing on a wage that the "below the average" is worth and then pay a bonus for good work and more of it. Some sort of piecework or incentive pay is the consumer's only hope; and the wage-workers make up 60 per cent of these consumers.

The finished costs would then go down causing lower prices to

benefit consumers; while both real wages and real profits would go up for the more efficient. How can this be brought about? Well, the first step would be to insert a clause in every labor contract that neither the labor officials nor the company officials can get any pay while a strike is on! This simple clause would do more to help out us consumers than any other one thing.

I forgot a part of my railroad story. The train conductor was so busy gossiping with a woman that he failed to take up my ticket, although I had it out in sight. After leaving the train at Boston, I hunted him up and gave it to him. He did not even thank me; but I surely am thankful that I own no railroad stocks! Indifference and lack of interest by both employees

## Garza and the World

Her opinions, based on personal observations and subsequent news developments, do not necessarily reflect the opinions or policies of the Post Dispatch. The column is carried in the interest of applying world news to the situation here at home.

Dr. George H. Gallup, the public opinion research man, and quite a few newspapers over the nation have been making fun of us men and women of the streets for not recognizing Victory Day. They claim the war ended two years ago this month.

They'll have to prove it to me.

Right now we are facing a showdown with Russia over the Balkan situation, and right now we have combat units training in Germany for a quick trip to Greece in case we are called upon to protect the Greeks against Yugoslavians, Albanians and Bulgarian Communists who have been trained and equipped by Russia.

And look at the rioting in India and Pakistan, at the never-ceasing fighting in China, the bloody strife between the Netherlands and Indonesia, the Yugoslav-Italian contention over Trieste, the rioting in Korea, the Jewish-Arab rioting in Palestine, the revolution threat in Costa Rica, France's colonial troubles in Indo-China, the Revolution in Paraguay, the trouble brewing between Cuba and the Dominican Republic, and think of the agony England will be having soon with the rest of her colonies now that India won its battle.

There are U. S. soldiers, sailors and marines risking their lives in many of the above spots. Victory Day means more to them than it does to me, because those men who went into service after that date are not eligible for the Veterans of Foreign Wars and many of the usual

veterans' benefits.

As far as I am concerned, the war is still going on. Prices are as high or higher, help is still almost as hard to get, the black market is still with us and Russia, by one means or another, is still getting as much of our food and war building materials as she did under the old Lend-Lease program.

Our "war relief" food, clothing and ammunition going abroad as fast as our ships can take them, are still feeding the black markets of Europe and going into warehouses of the privileged few while the majority of the people go ragged and hungry.

When I left Athens a year ago, it was possible (with a trunk full of money) to buy anything I wanted, from Nylon hosiery to American-made automobiles and certainly any type of food we wanted, in any amounts. Four of us could—and sometimes did—go to the exclusive Greek restaurants and eat the thickest, juiciest steaks imaginable, with all the trimmings, including a few glasses of wine, for a total of \$125.00.

These dollars were in drachmas, of course, and we could not bring them home with us. It would take a station wagon to carry the drachmas to the restaurant, but we had 'em to burn since we were Americans getting rare American salaries. In fact, the drachmas were so cheap we used them as kindling to light our embassy-provided coal in the fireplace. Real kindling was not to be had, as every piece of wood in the country (including some pianos and other non-essential furniture) had been used by the Greeks as fuel after the Germans destroyed their forests. And there was no such thing as waste paper. Scrap paper could be sold for more than its weight in drachmas.

When I left Greece there was enough food in the warehouses of about 60 families to feed the million and a half population of Athens for several months, and more food was arriving daily. But most of the people were hungry.

In the rural areas and the villages dotting Greece, conditions were not so appalling. As there were few transportation facilities, most of the products of their farms and of fishing industries were available to them. Their worst handicap was in having to cope with bombed out living quarters and to carry on without their menfolk, most of whom were either lost fighting the Italians and Germans or were shot as reprisals for German setbacks on Crete.

Their diet was monotonous, but ample. They seemed to have plenty of mutton, fish, fresh vegetables, fruit, olives and wine.

The Germans, while retreating, destroyed the railroads and most of the public utility systems in the country and airplanes of both Allies and the Axis played havoc with the country's bridges and roads, which were never too good. Bringing farm products to Athens and several other large cities was out of the question.

I agree with Secretary Marshall that we should share, insofar as is practical, with the unfortunate people of the world. But everything we send over there will go

Activities are now underway here by various organizations which are endeavoring to "put across" objectives which will definitely contribute in one way or another to the welfare of people living, or desiring to live, in Levelland. Should anyone hesitate to support any of these plans, he should study the matter long and thoughtfully before making a final decision. —Hockley County Herald.

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ALARMING INCREASE—Pre-harvest survey by the flour mills showed the percentage of undesirable wheat had increased in Crosby County by 11 per cent from 1942, according to information received here by W. R. Kimbrough, county agent.

The survey showed 15 per cent of undesirable milling wheat in 1947 where there was only four per cent in 1942. The millers report that they were using up to 20 per cent spring wheat in the baking mixture to strengthen their weak gluten Texas varieties.

This is a loss to all Texas wheat growers, the agent said, and if the county continues growing undesirable wheat varieties it is going to cost a lot of money to farmers that are growing it. It is so bad in some places that the elevators will not take the wheat for storage. All the undesirable wheat is being exported by the government.

When and if the government stops buying the wheat, farmers who are growing it will realize their position, he stated. —The Crosbyton Review.

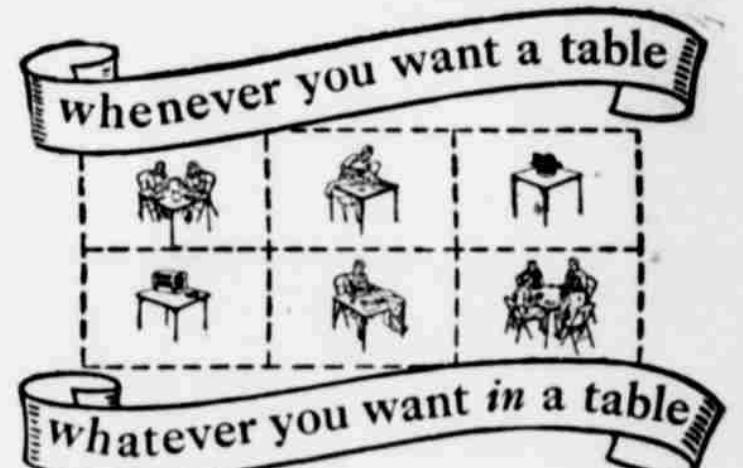

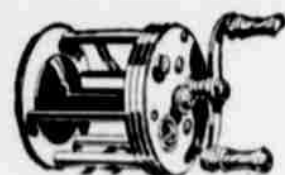

## Italian Wheat Looks Good To Scurry Farmer

Pleasant Hill Community neigh-  
bors of Joe Merritt in Scurry  
County laughed at him in 1945  
when he planted some wheat  
which his son, Woody, sent him  
from Naples, Italy. Now Merritt  
has the laugh on the friends who  
chided him for planting the "mac-  
aroni wheat," because tests made  
at Texas Technological College  
show that the Italian grain has a  
much higher protein content than  
the native grain.

In 1946 Merritt harvested two  
gallons of the wheat which he  
seeded in and got a yield of six  
bushels this year. After cleaning,  
he has four and a half bushels left  
for seeding purposes.

Merritt believes the yield next  
year will be 400 bushels from ap-  
proximately 12 acres.

A sample of the grain, sent to  
Texas Tech, tested 14.30 per cent  
protein. Wheat testing around 12  
per cent is regarded by the grain  
industry as a good wheat for mak-  
ing flour.

Merritt's skeptical friends have  
formed a waiting list for the seed  
to plant their own farms.

## Freeze Butter And Save Until Scarcity Hits

Freeze butter while it is plenti-  
ful and save it until later in the  
year when butter will become  
scarce, advises Miss Jewell Hipp,  
Garza County home demonstration  
agent.

In giving directions for freezing,  
Miss Hipp warns that pasteuriz-  
ed milk or cream should be used,  
as the butter may otherwise be-  
come rancid or off-flavored in two  
or three weeks after freezing.  
Here's how to freeze butter:

Prepare and season butter the  
same as for immediate use and  
salt it.

Some specialists say that un-  
salted butter keeps fresh longer  
than salted butter, but Miss Hipp  
explains that if the butter is of  
high quality to start with, and is  
kept frozen for only three to six  
months, salt will not cause it to  
become old and rancid.

Pack butter for freezing in half  
pound or one pound rectangular  
molds, and wrap it in cellophane  
paper; or package it in waxed  
cartons or clean, dry, plain tin  
cans. Never leave any air space or  
excess water in the package. Pack  
it tightly. It is a good idea to use  
it after it has been in the freezer  
from four to six months.

Anything can happen when the Levelland Rodeo association presents its annual Steer Roping and Branding on Sunday, August 31. Thrilling is the name for the gamut of emotion experienced from the time the first big Mexican steer is roped until the last animal is branded and removed from the arena on a sled pulled by a jeep.

Eight of the Nation's top-notch performers will compete for more than \$8,000 when they appear at Levelland in Texas' largest arena.

The steer will have a thirty-foot start on the roper. After that the animal is his. He must rope the wild beast by the horns, remove the rope, trip, tie and brand the steer.

The contestant will have no help. He may, however, change horses if his mount is injured while in action.

Steer Roping and Branding are the most dangerous of all cowboy shows. The animals are frequently injured and the rider is often hospitalized after being hurt during the melee. Last month Curtis Lamar of Norman, Okla., was killed in a contest held at Duncan.
