

Firefighters continue watch over butane blaze that claimed two teens

KEMP (AP) — The fire ignited by a leaking butane pipeline that took the lives of two teen-agers who were trying to warn authorities of a leak has finally burned out.

It had burned for 26 hours before it burned itself out on Sunday.

A pickup carrying Danielle Smalley and Jason Stone, both 17, exploded Saturday afternoon as it passed through fumes from the leaking gas. Authorities believe that the truck's ignition system may have triggered the blast, killing the two and starting the fire.

Brandy Kennimer, a longtime friend of Miss Smalley, said Sunday, "I want people to remember them as heroes."

Miss Smalley had been scheduled to leave home for college on Sunday.

The Koch Industries-owned pipeline,

which runs from Medford, Okla., to Mont Belvieu, just east of Houston, was immediately shut off and residual gas continued to burn.

Residents were still mourning the two teen-agers who died in the explosion.

Miss Smalley's father, Daniel Smalley, sent his daughter and Stone off to report a gas leak around 3:30 p.m. Saturday, Kaufman County Sheriff Robert Harris said.

As they left the house in a pickup, the vehicle's ignition apparently sparked gas that had settled in a low spot nearby, officials said.

"They were going to warn everybody they smelled gas and as they were pulling out of the yard, they got in this area where the pipe runs through it

and it just blew up," said Lola Simon, a Scurry-Rosser High School senior who knew Miss Smalley.

One home was destroyed in the rupture, which occurred near where the pipeline crosses Farm-to-Market Road 148. Flames and a column of black smoke could be seen for miles.

The explosion occurred near Lively, about nine miles southwest of Kemp, in a subdivision with about 16 homes that housed as many as 60 people, many of them children. Kemp, a small town of slightly more than 1,200 people, is about 46 miles southeast of Dallas.

Kaufman County Deputy Don Lindsey said 21 residents called 911 after smelling fumes so strong they were afraid to turn their lights on or start their cars.

"We were responding to the smell of gas and were in route down here when we heard there was an explosion," said Constable George York. "We came around the corner and saw this ball of fire."

Koch spokesman Tom Heilman was en route to Kemp from the Koch Industries operations in Corpus Christi Sunday and offered few details.

"I have been told there was a leak and it reached an ignition source and that's what caused the fire. This is purely hearsay, I haven't seen it yet," Heilman said.

Representatives from the Wichita, Kan.-based company were at the scene to investigate the source of the leak. They were unable to get very close to the line until the fire was out Sunday.

This is one of the worst fires in two decades in Kaufman County, said one county official. Authorities and residents said that while they were fleeing, they could feel more underground explosions for 30 minutes after the main blast.

Koch owns and operates several pipelines in Texas along with a 104,000 barrel-a-day refinery bought in 1995. Another series of pipelines that carry refined gasoline, diesel fuels and commercial jet fuel run from Corpus Christi to Dallas-Fort Worth Airport via San Antonio and Waco.

The company was responsible in 1994 for a 2,000-barrel oil spill in Nueces Bay just north of Corpus Christi.

No funeral details for the two teen-agers had been finalized as of Sunday.

Democrats begin convention today in Windy City

CHICAGO (AP) — Claiming strength in diversity as they try for a re-election boost, Democrats open a unity convention today in the city that once symbolized their divisions. On a whistle-stop train to the city, President Clinton set the theme: "Stay on the right track."

"We enjoy our diversity here. We don't see it as a liability; we see it as an asset to our party," Sen. Chris Dodd, the party chairman, said today. Delegates gathered for breakfast meetings before swarming to the United Center convention hall.

Hillary Rodham Clinton and Vice President Al Gore rallied the faithful in the convention city and reminded Democrats "We need to stick together."

"This is first time in 60 years that a sitting Democratic president has not been challenged in his own party," Dodd, the party chairman, said today on ABC's "Good Morning America."

The president will not arrive until Wednesday, the night delegates nominate him for a second term. Campaigning by train in West Virginia, Kentucky and Ohio, Clinton set the tone. "Shall we keep going on the right track or should we turn around?" he asked.

And he took aim at Republican challenger Bob Dole's proposed tax cut in a CNN interview, calling it "this big tax cut that we can't afford, which will cause a big increase in the deficit." Dole now has adopted "an economic theory he rejected all his public life," Clinton said.

In the manner of modern political conventions, the hall that is home to Michael Jordan and the Chicago Bulls is wired to make the most of the attention it will get from voters and TV viewers.

Directly behind the rostrum looms a wall of 56 television screens to provide ever-changing images designed to reinforce the moment's theme.

The Democrats will use the four days to counter the Republican message in San Diego two weeks ago: that Clinton is a failure and the GOP a party that reaches out to women and minorities.

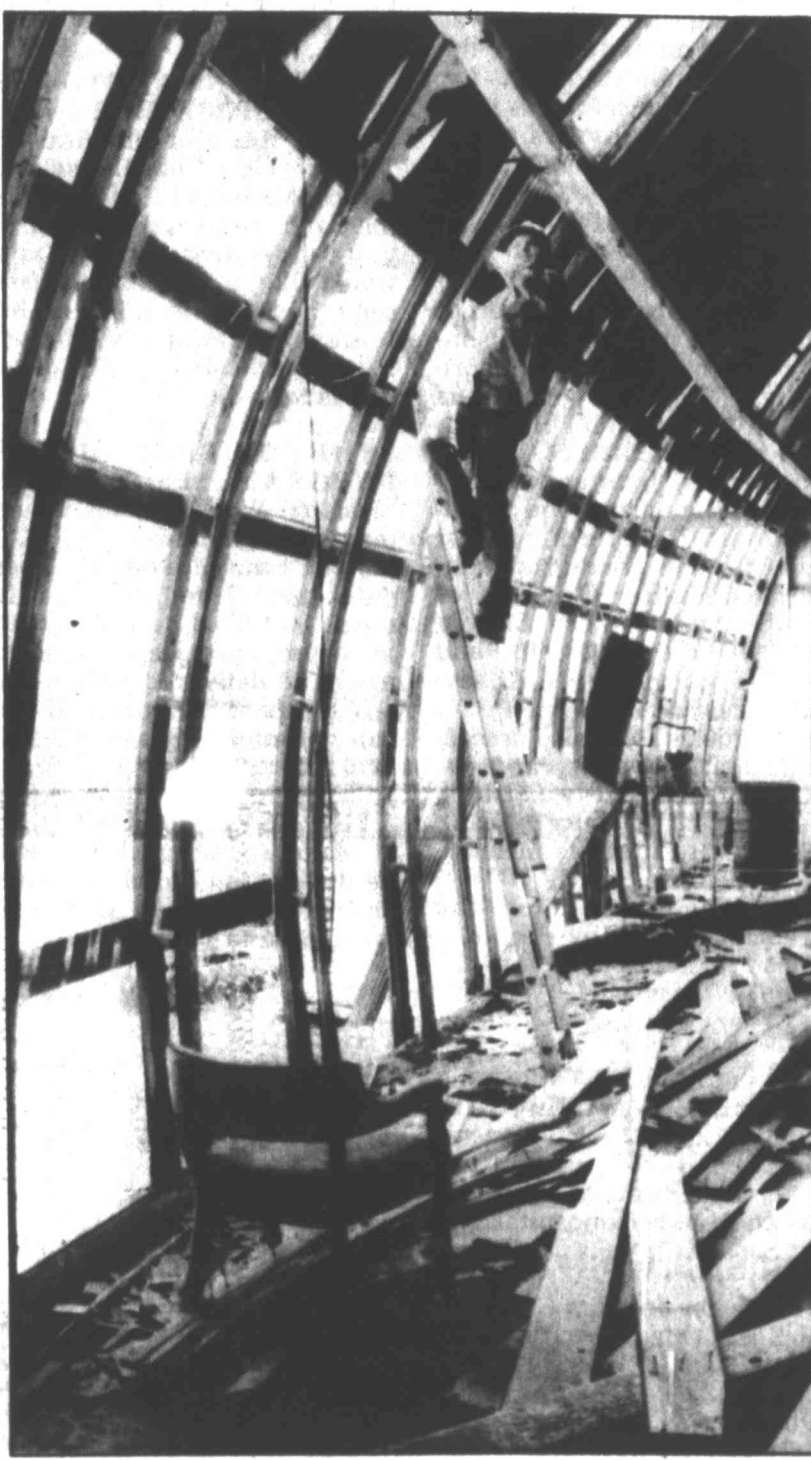
"They almost erased the reality of the Republican Congress," said Clinton campaign deputy manager Ann Lewis.

Different though their messages, the two conventions are remarkably similar in method. Like the Republicans', the Democrats' opening night will highlight the party's commitment to minorities, with speakers famous and little known.

On the Democratic program was a video tribute to Ron Brown, the commerce secretary who died last spring in a plane crash while on an economic aid mission to Bosnia.

Actor Edward James Olmos, who portrayed a tough Hispanic teacher in the movie "Stand and Deliver," will speak. And closing the night's program was Christopher Reeve, the paralyzed Superman star who has campaigned for federal spinal injury research.

Weekend rains delay work at 4th and Main

Last Thursday's break in an 8-inch 1929 cast iron water line at the west intersection of 4th and Main streets caused traffic to be temporarily diverted in the area, and weekend rains may cause traffic to be diverted a little while longer.

Repairs to the busted line were completed early Friday morning, but repairing the roadway had to wait because of wet conditions.

"What we did instead of using a repair clamp on the line was install new valves and pipes all the way across the street," City Engineer Ralph Truskowski said.

Traffic at the intersection was shut down all weekend, but Truskowski said he hoped the city could have at least one lane opened sometime late in the day today, but that was questionable with a 40 percent chance of rain today and tonight.

As Truskowski was hoping to have at least one lane opened

later today, he also acknowledged that it was already beginning to sprinkle again.

"What we'll have to do now that the new line has been put in is come back and do pavement repair using the hot mix asphaltic concrete (HMAC) overlay process," Truskowski said. "Our plans are to try to have at least one lane opened later today, but it's hit and miss right now."

"We're probably going to have to wait a couple of days to lay down the hot mix," Truskowski added. "We'll probably have to bring the materials from Midland, but we have to have dry weather for this process."

Truskowski said laying the hot mix is an expensive process.

The public is still advised to seek alternate routes because of construction in the area.

Truskowski said the city is required to use the hot mix process at the intersection because Fourth Street is a state road and the city has to build the road back up to the same state standards prior to Thursday's waterline breakage.

Big Spring has its pigeons, but Waco invaded by bats

WACO (AP) — It's enough to drive city officials batty.

Several thousand free-tail Mexican bats, a protected species in the United States, have invaded downtown Waco this summer, and they've proven to be less than gracious guests.

"They sleep all day, stay out all night and refuse to go away, at least until they fly south for the winter."

"They make a terrible mess and smell," said George Walker, the city of Waco's building official.

The bats are roosting in a downtown parking garage, causing such a disturbance that the city isn't able to charge for parking spaces in the immediate vicinity.

"Since we had to inconvenience our parking customers with bat droppings, it's such a nuisance we've offered free parking," Walker said.

Authorities say there are always bats in Waco, but no one can remember a colony like this before.

"We didn't have anyone who knew anything about small flying mammals," Walker said.

The consultant has been paid about \$100 for his advice. So far that advice is simple: wait for the nocturnal creatures to leave and then thoroughly clean and seal the crevices in which they are roosting.

The Waco bats are the same breed as those that make up the famed bat colonies that live under the Congress Avenue bridge in Austin during the warm weather months, normally from March to October.

"This is generally a migratory cycle. Generally, they'll go down south for the winter to Mexico," said Kenneth T. Wilkins, a mammals specialist and associate professor of biology at Baylor University.

"This is the time of year that the roost is bigger because the females have had their young and they're beginning to fly on their own," he said.

While Wilkins said he hasn't known of a bat problem in Waco before, Baylor has seen a few small roosts.

"It's very common for them to roost in buildings. They go where they can get a good drop space when they leave and fly off," he said.

Report: Proposed law would give cigarette makers protection

NEW YORK (AP) — Proposed legislation would give cigarette makers protection from liability lawsuits and federal regulations in exchange for billions of dollars in payments. The Wall Street Journal reported today.

Quoting sources, the newspaper said the legislation would largely give tobacco companies immunity from liability lawsuits for the next 15 years and allow them to escape regulation by the Food and Drug Administration.

There are a few, limited exceptions. Class-action or individual smoker lawsuits already under way could proceed, but

with a damage cap on how much plaintiffs could collect.

The tobacco industry would have to pay billions of dollars a year, partly to reimburse states for health care costs. The money would also fund tobacco-control programs and an anti-smoking advertising campaign aimed at minors, and provide some compensation for sick smokers.

The latest draft calls for the industry to pay \$6 billion in

The latest draft calls for the industry to pay \$6 billion in 1997, increasing to about \$10 billion in the fourth year and continuing over the following 11 years.

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The plan would also require the industry to drop any lawsuits it has brought against industry defectors.

A draft of the legislation, an attempt to forge a consensus on the tobacco industry's toll on the health of U.S. smokers, is expected to be presented to

industry executives later this week, the newspaper reported.

If the attorneys general, tobacco companies, the FDA and the White House agree, Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss., has agreed to broker the deal, the report said. Lott is said to have strong ties with both the tobacco industry and plaintiffs' lawyers.

Interest in the plan, which has been circulating on Capitol Hill for about a month, intensified last week as the FDA prepared to announce its rule to regulate tobacco for the first time, it said. The rule was issued Friday.

Search continues for two inmates from FCI

Law enforcement officials are continuing to search today after two inmates from the Federal Prison Camp walked away from the minimum security facility sometime Friday afternoon.

During a 4 p.m. count, officials discovered Enrique Trevino and Guillermo Rivera were missing from the camp. Both men are considered non-violent and were serving time for distribution of cocaine.

FCI Public Information Officer

Brad Wiggins said, "They had adapted well to institutional life but some problems had developed in their personal lives and they thought those were important enough to risk it all."

Wiggins added the inmates had no prior history of escape and they met the requirements to be put in the minimum security camp. The camp is a satellite facility of the Federal Corrections Institution and has no secured perimeter.

A search of the camp and the surrounding area were conducted but to no avail. "The first

thing we did was search the camp to make sure they just weren't somewhere else. Once it was determined they weren't at the camp, we did a clearing and search of buildings in the immediate area," Wiggins added.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation and the U.S. Marshals Service were then notified of the escape. The federal law enforcement officials are responsible for the apprehension of Trevino and Rivera. Once they are found, they will be charged with escape.

Wiggins said local law enforcement officials were also notified

of the incident and assisted in searching for the two men in the area as well as at the bus station.

The inmates were sent to the federal prison camp this spring and each had 150-month (about 12 1/2 years) sentences.

Trevino is 43 years of age. He has black hair, brown eyes, is 6-foot tall and weighs 215 pounds. Rivera is 40. He has black hair, brown eyes, is 5-foot, 7-inches tall and weighs 180 pounds. Both are Hispanic males and naturalized American citizens. They are medium build and both were wearing mustaches.

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Former South Korean presidents found guilty

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Former military strongman Chun Doo-hwan was sentenced to death Monday after being convicted of mutiny and treason in South Korea's "trial of the century." His successor Roh Tae-woo was also found guilty and received 22 years in prison.

A three-judge panel found the two ex-presidents guilty of staging a coup 17 years ago and being responsible for a violent crackdown on a pro-democracy uprising six months later that killed hundreds of people.

Chun's death sentence is subject to automatic appeal. Roh's attorneys also were expected to appeal his sentence.

Even if Chun's death sentence is upheld by the country's highest court, execution is rare in South Korea and it is unlikely the sentence would be carried out.

The trial, which opened in December, is seen as South Korea's attempt to come to terms with its bloody and militaristic past. The country was ruled by successive military generals until President Kim Young-sam took power in 1992 and instituted sweeping reforms to eradicate their legacy.

The prosecution had demanded that Chun be sentenced to death and Roh to life imprisonment.

Chun became president in 1980 and was succeeded by Roh in 1988.

The two also were found guilty of amassing hundreds of millions of dollars in illegal political funds during their terms. Chun was fined \$270 million and Roh \$350 million.

In a lengthy statement preceding the sentencing, the chief judge said Chun and Roh put down the pro-democracy movement "to clear the way for their rise to power, and used martial law for their own political purposes."

"Under the circumstances," the judge said, "their actions cannot be justified."

Thirteen other ex-generals were sentenced Monday to prison terms ranging from 4 to 10 years for their roles in the government takeover and subsequent crackdown in the southern city of Kwangju. One former general, Park Jun-byung, was acquitted.

The trial pitted the two former presidents against prosecutors under Kim, the nation's first civilian president in 32 years. Chun, helped by Roh, a childhood friend and later military buddy, seized power in a 1979 coup, the event that brought the mutiny charges. The treason charges stemmed from the "Kwangju massacre," a pro-democracy uprising six months later that left hundreds of people dead or injured.

Both Chun and Roh have claimed their indictments were a "political circus" engineered by a president trying to boost his sagging popularity. The court allowed six TV cameras and photographers to cover the opening of the session, but not the actual reading of the verdicts or sentencing.

The country's media has covered the court proceedings extensively for the past eight months, dubbing them "the trial of the century."

In drizzling rain Monday, 30 protesters demonstrated outside the court, which was guarded by 600 riot police. Bodyguards were assigned to the three-judge panel. South Korea does not have a jury system.

Thousands of people throughout the nation halted work to watch, clustering around television screens in railway stations, bus terminals and other public areas.

"It confirmed a simple truth that any one who commits crime should be brought to the court of history," said Kim In-ho, a Seoul office worker.

Also awaiting verdicts were 14 more ex-generals, former presidential aides and businessmen.

Water project breeds suspicion at Highland Lakes

AUSTIN (AP) — Residents along Central Texas lakes and rivers say they're wary of proposals that would help ease San Antonio's water woes by running a pipeline to waterways in their backyards.

The first phase of the "Trans-Texas Water Program" yielded about 40 proposals, including one to run a huge pipeline along Interstate 35 from Lake Austin or Lake Travis to San Antonio.

An alternative would be to run the pipeline along Interstate 10 from the Colorado River near Columbus.

Carl Roland, former mayor of the Lake Travis resort community of Lakeway, near Austin, has helped organize opposition to the pipeline among Highland Lakes-area residents, business owners and elected officials.

Some opponents of proposals to aid San Antonio argue that the city's residents have been reluctant to cut back on water use and have rejected construction of a dam and reservoir.

Roland also complains that piping water from the lakes to San Antonio would hurt his area's tourism and recreation-based economy.

Others cite studies showing that Austin, which draws its water from Lake Austin, and other lake communities will need the water in the future.

Trans-Texas officials say publicity about the pipeline proposals created an unnecessary hysteria around the lakes.

No firm decisions have been made and any action is years away, they say.

"It would be jumping the gun

a bit to even say the pipelines are a viable alternative," said Steve Rabbe, the water program's project manager for the Central Texas region.

Roland suggested that Trans-Texas is looking for a way to outsmart Highland Lakes residents.

"The consensus around here is that they are trying to figure out our strategies and our concerns so that they can better combat them," he told the Austin American-Statesman.

Trans-Texas was formed after studies showed expected population growth in Austin, Corpus Christi, Houston and San Antonio that could create water shortages in those cities.

According to Trans-Texas, Houston's water needs will double by 2050, Corpus Christi will

outgrow its water supply by 2010 and Austin will not have enough water by 2036.

San Antonio, with more than 1 million residents, relies solely on the underground Edwards Aquifer and is already suffering from a water crunch.

On Friday, Senior U.S. District Judge Lucius Bunton III ordered San Antonio and other users of the aquifer to reduce pumping from the subterranean reservoir.

Environmentalists worry that decreasing levels in the aquifer will threaten some endangered species.

The city of San Antonio said it would file an appeal of Bunton's ruling today with the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans.

Nation's "toughest sheriff" to start female chain gangs

PHOENIX (AP) — Maricopa County Sheriff Joe Arpaio, calling himself an "equal opportunity incarcerator," says he plans to put the nation's first female chain gang to work next month.

"These women will be placed in the same areas where I place the men, out in the streets of Phoenix where everybody can see them," he told The Associated Press last week.

"I don't believe in discrimination in my jail system," he said. "I feel that women should be treated just like men."

Arpaio, who revels in his reputation as the nation's toughest

sheriff, began his chain gangs for men more than a year ago, linking inmates by leg irons and putting them on busy streets to pull weeds or paint over graffiti.

"If women can fight for their country, and bless them for that, if they can walk a beat, if they can protect the people and arrest violators of the law, then they should have no problem with picking up trash in 120-degrees," he said.

Each female chain gang will consist of 15 inmates, who will work five days a week for 30

days. The women will wear the county's new jail uniform of pants and tops with black horizontal stripes. Armed volunteers will guard the group.

Arpaio was criticized recently after a preliminary Justice Department finding that his officers used excessive force with inmates. He is known across the country for banning cigarettes, coffee and Playboy magazines for prisoners.

Critics say his latest move is just another attempt to garner publicity.

"He likes to come up with a new gimmick every three

months," said Louis Rhodes, state director of the American Civil Liberties Union. "Most of his programs or his ideas are basically harmless. They aren't illegal or unconstitutional, they just end up wasting a lot of time and taxpayer money."

Last year, Alabama was the first state to revive chain gangs, followed by Florida and Arizona. Alabama Corrections Commissioner Ron Jones was fired in April after he suggested putting women prisoners on chain gangs.

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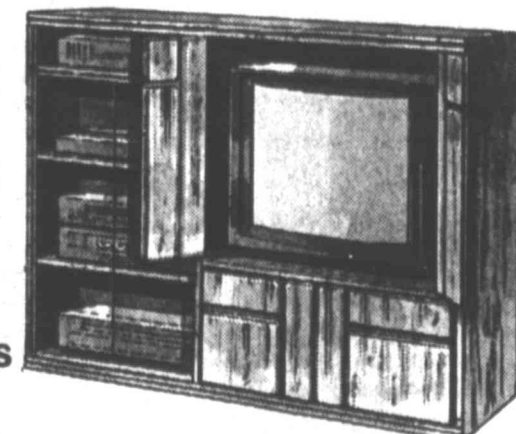
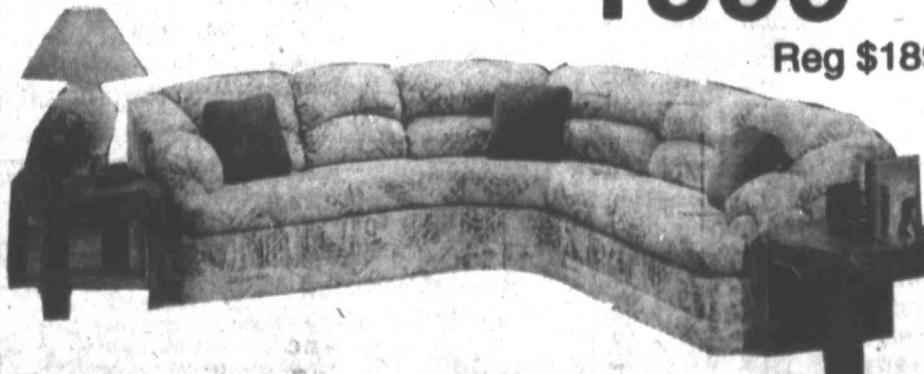

Vote for our future;
Say "yes" on bonds

Early voting is now under way in the Sept. 14 Big Spring Independent School District's \$12.52 million bond election to construct a new junior high school and air-condition the district's seven non-cooled campuses.

We recommend your vote and support of this issue, which we feel to be vital to the future of our community.

There are some basics to consider:

- Runnels Junior High School was built in 1917 and is now into its 80th year.
- There is an asbestos problem in the school.
- There is a safety issue in the facility in regards to potential fire hazard.
- There is no more space in the facility.
- There are serious structural problems with the facility.

Should voters act favorably on the bond election, both Runnels Junior High and College Heights Elementary would be retired from daily service.

The new junior high, to be built on the old Boydston Elementary site, would accommodate the district's seventh- and eighth-grade students.

With the movement of students, the current Goliad Middle School would become the district's city-wide sixth-grade facility as well as housing the current student body of College Heights Elementary.

Approval of the bonds would also allow all students within the district to attend class in air-conditioned facilities.

It will require a 12.5 cent tax per \$100 valuation to retire the bonds being placed before voters for consideration.

That means that a house on the tax rolls at \$40,000 would be taxed at an additional \$50 per year for the bonds.

Yes, that amount can be broken down to minute amounts — so much per month, per week, per day — but we won't take you through those calculations. We'll only ask you to stop and think if the education and safety of our youth isn't worth an extra \$50 or \$100 per year?

If you honestly don't believe the future of our children is worthy of that investment, then vote "no."

If you agree with us that it is, you'll join us in voting "yes" for the bonds, "yes" for our children and "yes" for our community.

OTHER VIEWS

One way you know it's an election year is the polls raining down on the nation day and night, threatening a flood in some respects unhealthy for the republic.

Polls do have their usefulness, of course. Only someone with no use for information and free speech would want to legislate them out of existence. In fact, they're not going to go away. But it is possible for politicians and journalists to be more responsible in their use and for the public to be more reflective about their true meaning.

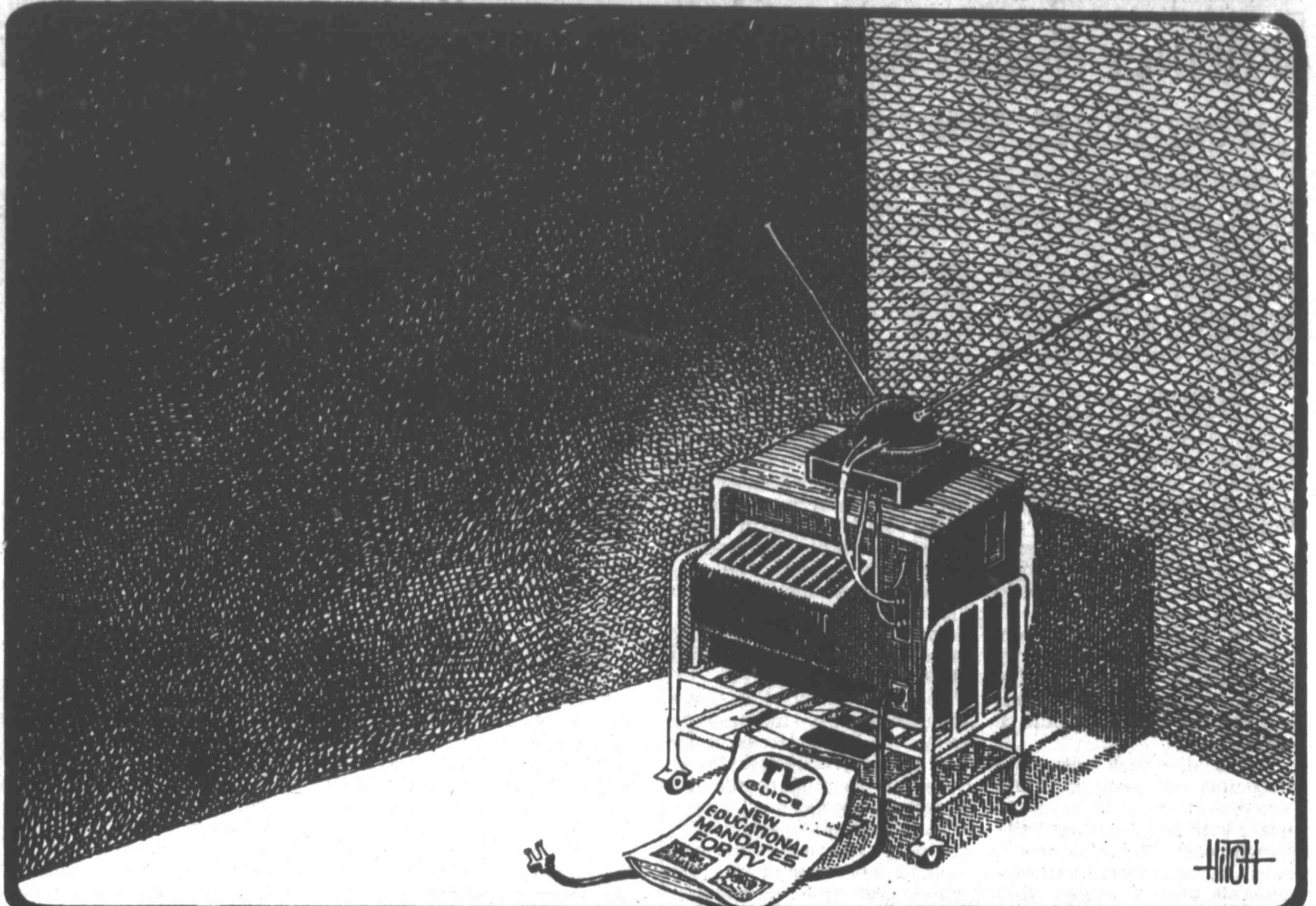
One abuse is that some politicians too often use them as the chief guide instead of just one of many guides to policy formulation. It goes without saying that people in public office should rely primarily on their own principles and analyses in deciding what measures to support or oppose, not some reading of the public's mood of the moment. The popularity of a cause does not make it right, and most citizens, after all, do not spend long hours studying issues. Their notions of what they favor on nine matters out of 10 may be little more than impressionistic, and they're often ready to be led by good arguments from those whose values, character and intellect they find trustworthy.

Many large news organizations these days compete with one another to see who can

update the public the most on who is ahead of whom and by how much in the presidential race. As pollsters point out, however, these polls are snapshots — the freezing of a brief period of time — and do not constitute predictions of final outcomes. The polls can nevertheless be self-fulfilling as money drifts toward apparent winners and as voters jump on the bandwagon. They absorb an extraordinary amount of the resources of news organizations, and, when used excessively, they tend to divert attention from issues and to make campaigns seem more like horse races than means by which the nation determines its political future.

It's vitally important in all polls to understand precisely what question was asked — was it leading, for instance? — and to understand as well that polls mainly skim the surface; they seldom offer more than the vaguest clues of what is going on in the deepest recesses of the hearts and minds of people. Journalists must be meticulous in preparing their accounts of poll results, for otherwise they can be utterly misleading. Used with restraint and care and properly understood, polls can better inform us about the nature of our land, but it doesn't take a poll to conclude they rarely provide final answers to anything.

Perot returns with a peculiar lack of profundity

WASHINGTON — Here's the deal. Taxpayers must put up \$29.2 million so that billionaire Ross Perot can plug the Larry King show, provide comic relief in the upcoming debates and show us charts during his TV infomercials.

It's only fitting. The reason Perot is on the political scene is because he's rich. And the reason he's rich is that he had a lot of government computer contracts way back when.

On Thursday, Perot told the Veterans of Foreign Wars that Americans are losing the freedoms they fought for because of the budget deficit and the loss of manufacturing jobs.

What nonsense. Democracy has nothing to do with a changing global economy, which a futile return to isolationism won't help Americans deal with responsibly. Democracy has nothing to do with the political will to cut entitlements such as Medicare or Social Security. And wish-

ing that steel plants would magically open again in Pittsburgh's Monongahela Valley, for example, is whistling in the wind.

Perot's prime example itself makes no sense. He berates the Pentagon for using foreign suppliers for some military equipment at the same time he demands the budget be balanced. One reason why the Pentagon is using foreign suppliers abroad is to save money.

But let's look at why Perot gets to dip into the federal till. In 1992 he got 19 percent of the votes cast for president, many of them representing disaffected Democrats and Republicans. To garner that support, an impressive slice of the pie in a year when many people liked neither George Bush or Bill Clinton, Perot spent \$60 million of his own money. He made a big point of demanding campaign finance reform and pledging he would not take the people's money.

That was then. This is now. Under federal election laws, because he got such a large share of the votes in 1992, in 1996 he qualifies for federal funds from the checkoff on IRS income tax returns, even though he has demonstrably less support than he had in 1992.

At the moment, Perot's support is in the single digits —

anywhere from 6 percent to 9 percent. As he promotes himself during the next 2-1/2 months, he may rise into the low teens.

The amazing thing is that after his saying these many months that millions of people support a Perot presidency, only 32,145 people in the entire country mailed ballots checking off his name. Poor Dick Lamm, the thoughtful, earnest ex-governor of Colorado, got only 17,121. That is a total of 49,266 votes out of what Perot's Reform Party says were 1.13 million ballots mailed.

After Perot complained in 1992 that Republicans were trying to ruin his daughter's wedding, a lot of people began to look skeptically at the feisty billionaire with the improbable haircut and endless charts. Then he debated Al Gore on the merits of the North American Free Trade Agreement and was smashed to smithereens in public opinion polls.

But Perot would not admit he was bested. He told Gerald Posner, a freelance journalist who concluded that there was no national conspiracy behind the death of John F. Kennedy, that he thought Gore was fed "answers" in his earpiece during the debate.

Posner, author of a new book called "Citizen Perot," says Perot has little respect for Bob

Dole or President Clinton and concludes that Perot is a charming, complex and contradictory tough guy worth about \$3 billion who engenders not only intense loyalty but fear and contempt.

One of those with nothing but contempt is Ed Rollins, who managed Ronald Reagan's 1984 re-election campaign and worked a few weeks for Perot in the summer of 1992.

Rollins says in his new political autobiography, "Bare Knuckles and Back Rooms," that Perot was a "paranoid lunatic on an ego trip, a short man with a tall appetite for attention."

Perot disdainfully replies that he was urged against his better judgment to hire Rollins and that he fired Rollins after only three weeks.

Perot's staying power is stronger. Clinton's campaign now says it's willing to accept a debate schedule that includes Perot, so the Texas maverick will be a factor right up until Nov. 5.

But this year he has to get at least 25 percent of the votes cast to qualify for federal money in 2000.

This could be his last hurrah.

"Hush, Blue," you'd say, and when Blue heard his name, he knew he'd better hush.
Mr. Brady didn't have a dog. He had chickens, but people generally don't name things they eat.

These days, I live 3,000 miles and some 20 years away from the town where I grew up. But this town, too, is small enough that I know the names of most

of my neighbors, and they seem to know mine.

"Aren't you that woman that writes for the paper?" they say, crouching as if they're about to run.

I even know the names of their dogs. At least, I used to know them. The neighborhood has changed a lot lately. Take our newest neighbors, for example. Nice people. Very friendly. No children. No dogs. No noise. As neighbors go, it can't get much better.

Then one day, when I happened to be watching out my kitchen window, I noticed they have a cat. A sleek, black, haughty "I'll climb any damn tree I please" kind of cat.

At first I thought my neighbor was talking to a tree. Some people do that here in California. Then I saw the cat, high up in the oak, staring down at the poor woman with one of those catty-kinds of looks I call "taunting." Later, when I looked again, both the cat and

the woman were gone.

Next day, every tree trunk in that yard was covered with tin flashings. Looked like an army of robots. The things we do for love.

I intend to have a little neighborly talk with that cat. This is what I'll say:

"Look, Midnight or Blackie or whatever your name is, this neighborhood, for the past 27 years, has been ruled by dogs. Across the street from your new home, there lived Festus, a pit bull who stood guard, or sat it, day and night. Next door to Festus was Lady, a German shepherd, who was aptly named. But you would not want to mess with her.

"Over your back fence lived Annie, a little mop of dog, who couldn't hurt you but would 'yip' you to death. And in our yard was Tuffy. No, I didn't name him. He was a sheltie who managed to survive growing up with my three children. They thought he was their dog,

but really he was mine. And I have to tell you, Tuffy hated cats.

"He was a good dog, they all were, and it would behoove you to show them some respect. You can prowl their yards, ... get to know their masters. Most of us could use another animal in our lives. Even a cat. But keep out of the trees, will you? That way, your owner might get rid of the flashings and your trees can be trees instead of robots.

"You can sun on my garage roof. I'll call you by name. Who knows? We might even get to be friends, as well as neighbors.

"But I surely hope Tuffy never finds out."

Penn State clouts USC as soph Enis runs wild

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — The questions that Joe Paterno had about Penn State have been answered by Curtis Enis and an offensive line that is better than anyone expected.

If the sophomore tailback and the line stay healthy, the 11th-ranked Nittany Lions are going to be good. Make that very good.

Enis has the fourth-best rushing day in Penn State history by following his line for 241 yards and three touchdowns in the Nittany Lions' 24-7 win over No. 7 Southern California in the Kickoff Classic at Giants Stadium on Sunday.

It was a performance that left Trojans coach John Robinson frustrated, particularly in the way Enis ran over and around what was expected to be a good defense en route to TD runs of 24, 9 and 4 yards in his first start.

"I think our team is obviously young and you can talk about that," Robinson said. "But the fact that their tailback dominated the game with his running was the deciding factor."

A big key was the Nittany Lions' offensive line which was supposed to be in the rebuilding phase after Jeff Hartings and Andre Johnson were taken

in the first round of the NFL draft.

"My job was to run the ball hard and do what I'm supposed to," said Enis, who started last season as a linebacker before being moved to tailback and gaining a team-high 683 yards. "My blockers just came out and gave me the holes to run through."

And when there weren't holes, Enis made his own.

"When he was getting the corner, we were there," Southern California defensive tackle Darrell Russell said.

"When we stopped the original play, he redirected. He made the plays himself. Half the plays were broken. If anything, most of his best runs were broken plays. So if anything, he's great back. He did a great job."

Paterno, who has been known to alternate his young running backs, gave Enis half of the Nittany Lions' 54 carries.

"Curtis had a great day," said Paterno, who on Tuesday wasn't sure if Enis would start. "He's obviously a much improved football player."

Enis' total rushing yards were the most ever allowed by Southern California, surpassing the 229 yards that Russell White of California gained in 1991.

Comeback gives Woods record 3rd title

CORNELIUS, Ore. (AP) — Everyone assumed Tiger Woods would make history at the U.S. Amateur Championship. No one thought he would take Steve Scott with him.

Woods on Sunday became the first golfer to win the U.S. Amateur three straight times, but it took a dramatic comeback from behind, 38-hole victory over Scott at Pumpkin Ridge Golf Club to do it.

The match was one of the most exciting and well-played finals in U.S. Amateur history. And if it turns out to be the last Amateur championship for Woods before he turns professional, it was a fitting finale.

Woods was 5-down with 16 holes to play and 2-down with three to go. But his stirring

comeback proved once again that Woods has the heart and the courage to back up his brilliant golf game.

Playing his best when he needed it most, Woods hit 28 of the last 29 greens after starting the morning round with a fat 41 and shot a 65 in the second 18, making five birdies and an eagle.

"I've played better before in my life," Woods said. "But I've never been in this situation where I've played this well."

The crushing blows came when Woods birdied the 34th and 35th hole — the latter with a thrilling 30-foot putt — to pull even in the match for the first time since the second hole.

"I'm going to celebrate like hell tonight," said Woods, who

tapped in a 2-footer for the victory after Scott missed a 7-foot par putt on the second extra hole. "I got off to an awful start this morning and I didn't start making any putts until the very end."

Surprisingly, Scott jumped out to a big lead — mostly on gifts from Woods — winning Nos. 3, 4 and 5. Even more surprisingly, Scott didn't fold when Woods made his expected charge.

"When I was 2-up with three to go, I thought I had a good chance," Scott said. "But you know Tiger. I didn't give him the holes, he earned them. I was trying to stop history."

But no one has been able to stop Woods' march through golfing history the last six

years as he has won three consecutive U.S. Junior Amateur titles and then three straight U.S. Amateurs.

When he made the winning par on the 38th hole, the 20-year-old Stanford student fell into emotional hugs with his mother, Kultida, father, Earl, and coach Butch Harmon.

The big question — when he will turn professional — remained unanswered.

"I can't think of that right now," Woods said. "I'll know better next week what's going on."

Scott, a 19-year-old from the University of Florida, shot the equivalent of a 68 in the morning round and was 5-up after 18 holes.

Bagwell bags 100 RBIs as Astros win

HOUSTON (AP) — Jeff Bagwell got the hits, the pitching staff got the praise.

Bagwell drove in two runs and surpassed 100 RBIs and Donnie Wall pitched seven strong innings as the Houston Astros beat the St. Louis Cardinals 4-1 Sunday to take a 1-game lead in the NL Central.

"Any time you hold that team to three runs for three games, that's outstanding," Astros third baseman Sean Berry said. "That is just great pitching, you can't get better than that."

Astros pitchers have yielded only three runs in the first three games of the important four-game series. Wall (8-4) allowed three hits over seven innings and Xavier Hernandez kept the Cardinals hitless over the final two innings for a combined three-hitter.

"All the credit for this one should go to the pitchers," James Mouton said. "Those

guys have been phenomenal. Our starters have had three outstanding games and they deserved to be 3-0. If we'd got them more support Friday that would have been the case."

After losing the first seven games of the season series to the Cardinals, the Astros have taken a 2-1 lead in this series. The fourth game is tonight.

Bagwell's third-inning homer, his 28th of the season, gave him 100 RBIs and his single in the eighth made it 101. He joined Derek Bell as the only two Astros to reach the plateau in the same season. Bell has 102.

"I'm feeling better up there, I have an idea of what to do," Bagwell said. "Those guys getting on base ahead of me helps. It gives me better pitches to hit."

Bagwell's RBI single in the eighth made it 4-1 and boosted his series average to .545 (6-for-11).

"We said the other day that Jeff was coming around," Astros manager Terry Collins said. "He's a great player and these are important games. This is what Jeff Bagwell's been waiting for."

Wall (8-4) allowed three hits,

struck out seven and walked two. Xavier Hernandez finished with two hitless innings for his fourth save.

After giving up a single to Ozzie Smith and hitting Ray Lankford, Wall retired the next 11 batters before Gary Gaetti doubled with two outs in the fourth.

Wall walked two batters and gave up an RBI single to Gaetti in the sixth, but retired the side in order in the seventh before leaving the game because of a knot in his right shoulder.

"I felt I had better command tonight than in some other starts," Wall said. "When you get the defense behind you like I had, it really helps. The defense did a great job. They gave me a lead and it's always better to pitch with a lead."

Alan Benes (11-8) hit two batters in the first inning, helping the Astros take a 2-0 lead. He hit leadoff batter John Cangelosi on the right knee to start the game, but shortstop Ozzie Smith made a diving stop on Craig Biggio's grounder in the hole and threw Cangelosi out at second.

Big earners meet the Turk on NFL cuts

When in doubt, cut the guy with the higher salary.

As teams NFL teams got down to their 53-man limits Sunday, it was clear that being well-paid sometimes doesn't pay in the salary-cap era.

Indianapolis, for example, released Craig Erickson, obtained last year to be the Colts' long-term quarterback. But he was beaten out last season by Jim Harbaugh, who signed a four-year, \$13 million deal this year, making Erickson's \$2 million too much to carry.

"We felt we could not keep Craig on our roster at the salary that was in his contract. That's just the way this game is played now," said Bill Tobin, the Colts' director of football operations.

"We researched the salaries of every quarterback in the National Football League and found out it was considerably higher than other backups."

Only Cincinnati, traditionally one of the league's lowest paying teams, deviated markedly. The Bengals kept Garrison Hearst and his \$2.1 million salary after picking him up off waivers last week from Arizona. Hearst, slated to back up Ki-Jana Carter at running back, has refused to renegotiate his contract to take less.

Hearst said he expects to stay in Cincinnati and would be surprised if he gets cut again or traded. The Baltimore Ravens, among others, were set to try and sign him as a free agent — for a lot less money — when the Bengals jumped in and claimed him.

"It's hard thinking about what's going on," Hearst said. "I can't control what they do. Sometimes I sit and think, 'What situation am I going to be thrown into or what's going to happen later on in the season or later in the week?'"

The Bengals did cut Rod Jones, a 32-year-old cornerback in the fourth year of a contract averaging \$756,000. Jones had started 37 straight games until he was injured last season, but was slated to be a backup.

The New York Jets cut Brad Baxter, their starting fullback the last five seasons. Baxter led the team in rushing in 1992, was seventh overall in team history and had 35 touchdowns.

But he also would have cost the Jets about \$650,000 under the cap.

Big Spring's Tasha Wilbert was voted to the all-tournament team, and four other Lady Steers were nominated for the honor squad. They were Juanita Valdez, Honey Bellew, Krissi McWhorter and Fulani Williams.

The Lady Steers play at Denver City on Tuesday night. The varsity match is at 6:30, and the jayvee and freshmen teams play at 5 p.m.

The Big Spring girls return to Denver City for a tournament on Friday and Saturday.

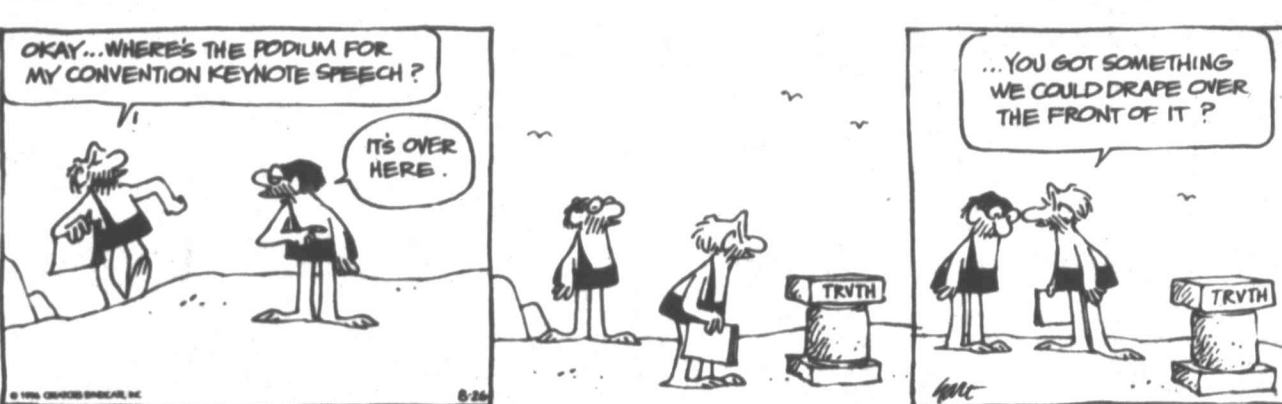

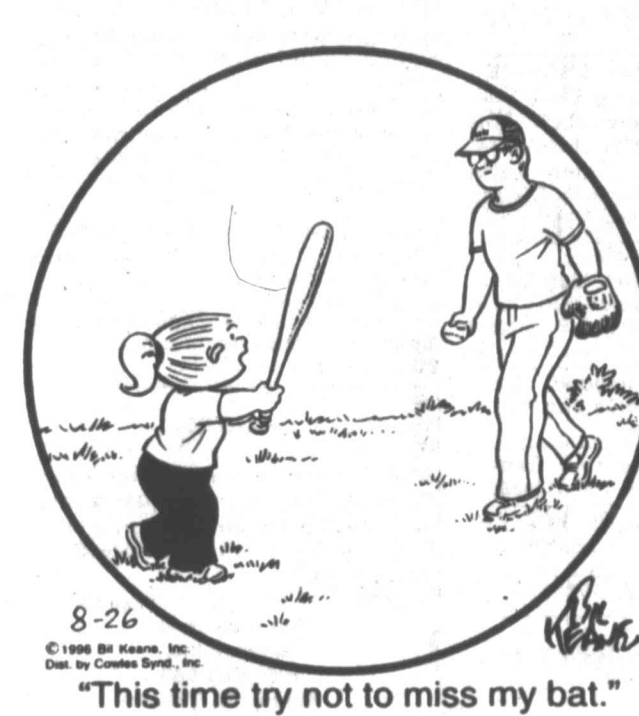

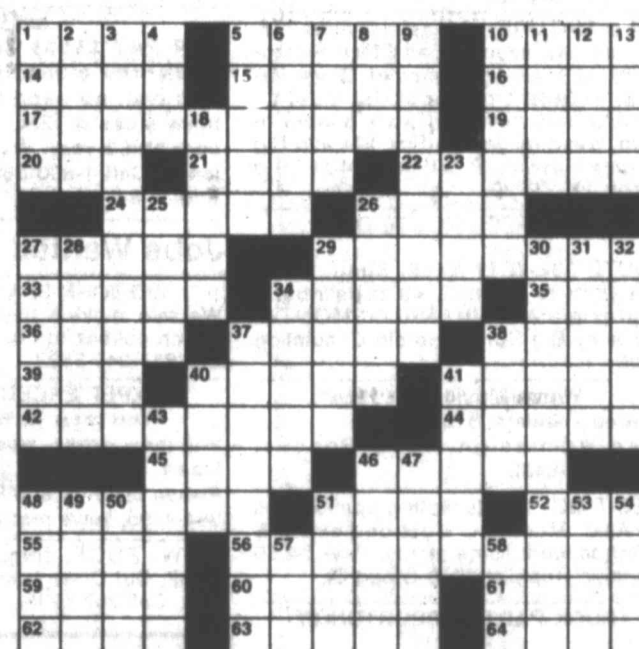
