Hart Voters Re-Elect E.E. Foster Mayor, Commissioners, Trustees Also Named

Hart voters gave overwhelming approval to Mayor E. E. Foster's bid for re-election and elected W. T. Sanders and Aubrey Myers to posts on the city commission in Saturday's balloting.

Meeting Monday evening to canvass the election results, the commission released the results of the contested races.

Foster, beginning his seventh year as mayor, polled 158 votes. Claude Kropp received 19 votes in seeking election to the post.

Making their bids for posts on the city commission, Sanders polled 148 votes with Myers receiving 116. T. D. "Butch"

Martinez drew 44 votes while R. A. Futrell received 38.

Incumbents David Nelson and Preston Upshaw were returned to office as members of the board of education by voters in Saturday's election.

Nelson received 165 votes followed by Upshaw with 130. Cleve McLain, defeated in his bid for trustee, drew 118 votes.

Meeting in regular session, the school board Monday evening canvassed the election ballots and oath of office was given to Nelson and Upshaw.

Officers for the new year were named with W. T. King as president; Nelson, vice presi-

dent and Deryl Clevenger, secretary.

Paul Lyle, school attorney, met with the board and discussed duties of board members and school taxes.

An athletic budget of \$9,000 was approved for the 1971-72 school year. A local bonus of \$500 for teachers for the 1971-72 school year was approved.

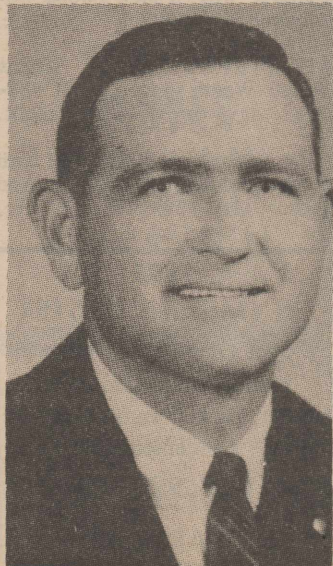

Financial Facts

Do you know when the Indian Head Cent first and last appeared?

An interesting part of our heritage, the coin first appeared in 1859. The obverse design was a representation of a bonneted Indian girl. On the reverse was a laurel wreath. In 1860, the wreath was changed to oak and a small shield was placed at the top. The composition was copper-nickel.

In 1864 the composition was changed to bronze and the weight was reduced. These standards remained until the demise of the Indian Head in 1909.

Three of the more valuable of the coins are the 1864 bronze (with a visible L on the ribbon),

the 1908's and the 1909's. Any of these coins will bring somewhere between \$20 and \$400.

Partaking of the elements in groups of 12, each participant broke bread from a home-baked loaf and poured his own symbolic wine.

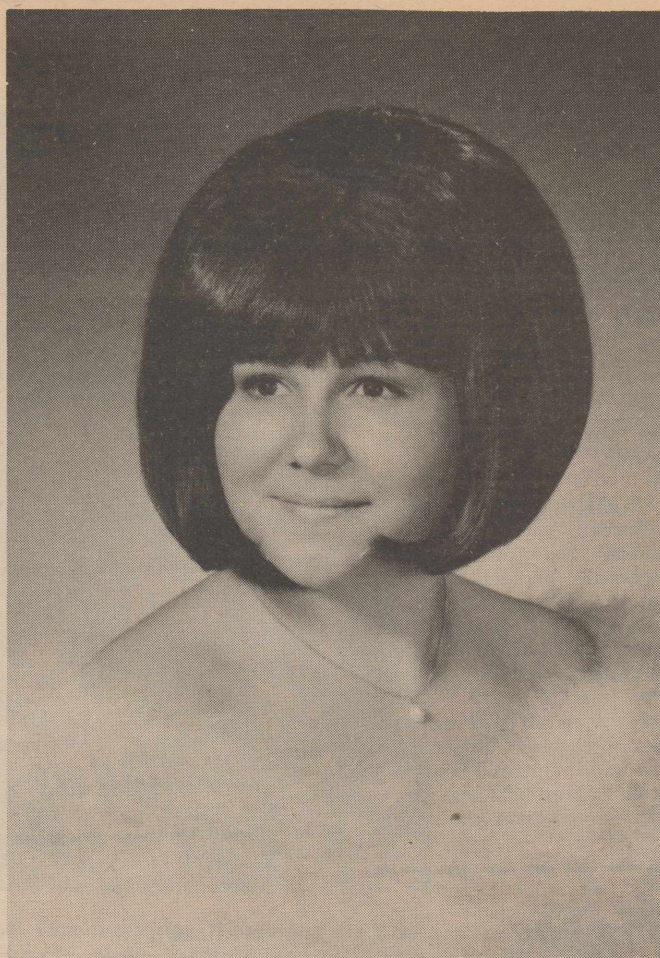

Salads provide a special touch to a meal. They add a spot of color and a taste of crispness.

CONGEALED SALAD

1 box lemon Jello
1/4 tsp. ginger
1 1/2 c. Boiling water
1 c. cottage cheese
1 1/4 c. crushed pineapple
3 c. small marshmallows.

Mix in order given and refrigerate.

CINNAMON - CHERRY FLAVORED SALAD

Mix 2 cups applesauce with 1/4 cup brown sugar and 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon. Add to 2 small packages of cherry flavored gelatin, which has been dissolved in 1 3/4 cups boiling water. Chill in salad mold for several hours.

PINK SALAD

1 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese
1 large can fruit cocktail, drained
1 med. jar chopped cherries
2 pkgs. Dream Whip

Whip Dream Whip according to directions on package. Combine cherry juice and cream cheese. Mix well. Mix cheese mixture and Dream Whip. Add fruit cocktail and cherries. Mix well. This is better if made a day ahead of serving. May also add 1 can crushed pineapple.

MACARONI SALAD

1 10-oz. pkg. elbow macaroni
1 jar corn relish
1 4-oz. jar pimento, chopped and drained
2 tsp. grated onion

1 c. mayonnaise
1/2 c. sour cream
1 1/2 tsp. salt

Cook, rinse, and drain macaroni. Mix all ingredients in order given, except mayonnaise and sour cream. Mix these in small bowl and pour over all. Refrigerate overnight before serving.

TUNA CRUNCH SALAD

1 6 oz. can tuna, drained
1/4 c. chopped sweet pickles
1 T. minced onion
1 T. lemon juice
3/4 c. salad dressing
1 1/2 c. shredded cabbage
1 1/4 c. crushed potato chips or corn chips.

Combine first 5 ingredients. Chill, covered until ready to serve. Add cabbage and toss, then add 1 cup chips and toss. Heap in bowl and sprinkle with remaining chips.

The consumer with a mini-sized budget and a working knowledge of sound shopping techniques can still furnish her home with elegance. But to do so, she must be a skillful shopper who knows what she wants and understands what she is getting when a purchase is made.

Skillful shoppers have several sources available to satisfy furnishings needs at minimum cost. Some second-hand stores carry furniture of good quality which may be more economical than low quality new furniture. Auctions, sales from model homes or apartments and want ads in local papers may offer good buys. It pays to inspect the items carefully and to learn as much as possible about previous use. There are usually no guarantees or refunds on second-hand furnishings.

Unfinished furniture and furnishings offer opportunity for savings if the consumer is reasonably skillful at refinishing.

Seconds or slightly damaged furniture can be economical too. Fine furniture, slightly marred in shipping or handling, is often sold at greatly reduced prices. Be sure you know the full extent of the damage and the cost of repairs before you buy.

Furnishings sales sometimes offer excellent money saving opportunities. February and August are usually the big months for clearance in home furnishings. However, individual stores may hold special sales at any time. Watch local newspapers for information on sales and special events. Keep in mind that all "sale" items are not a bargain. It takes know-how to make sale purchases count!

Personal skills in decorating can cut costs if you are reasonably skilled. Many homemakers tailor their own draperies, upholster furniture, paint and refinish furniture, and restyle old items for today's needs.

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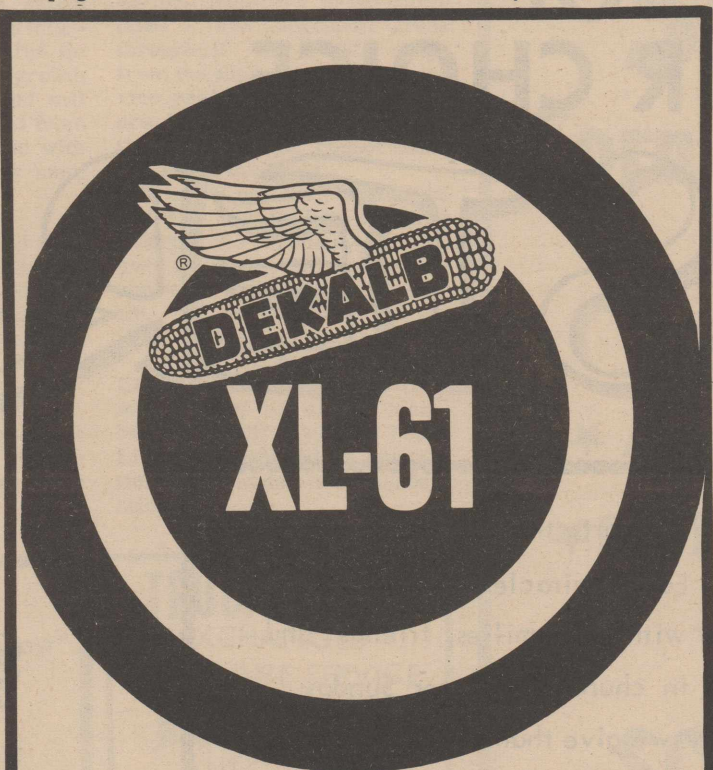
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DISTRICT CHAMPIONS in 3-A freshman track and field are these Hart High School freshmen, who racked up two relay cham-

CASTRO CO. H.D. AGENT

Last week a group of interested women met to have a program on Freezer Foods and discuss plans for organizing a Home Demonstration Club in Dimmitt. There was a good group present and they plan to meet again Thursday, April 22 at 9:30 a. m. at Patricia Powell's house. Anyone interested in becoming a club member is invited. The program will be on what's new in home furnishings.

It is again time to share the garden calendar with you that is sent out monthly by our landscape horticulturist, Everett Janne. GARDEN CHECK LIST FOR APRIL

1. Fertilize azaleas as they finish flowering and begin to put on new growth. Because of their shallow root system, be sure the soil is moist before applying. Several light applications at 6 week intervals are better than one heavy application.

2. Prune azaleas immediately after flowering if they need it.

3. Encourage children to plan and plant a garden of their own.

4. Repair any storm damage to trees as soon as possible.

5. If canna beds need thinning, now is the time to do it. Using a sharp knife, cut the root mass into sections with a growth bud on each piece. Plant 12 to 15 inches apart and three to five inches deep.

6. Plant bermuda grass using the hulled seed. Seed bed should be well prepared before planting. Roll seed bed after planting.

7. This is Fire Blight season on pear, apple, crabapple, loquat and pyracanthas. Prune out all infected wood to eliminate source.

8. Inspect Camellias for scale on underside of leaves. Use Cygon or a summer oil to control the scale. Always follow directions on container.

9. This is insect season so check the plants in the garden frequently. Sucking type insects can usually be controlled with Malathion and chewing insects can usually be controlled with Sevin.

10. Daylilies should be divided and transplanted now.

11. As soon as spring flowering bulbs have finished blooming fertilize the beds to encourage bulb growth for next year.

12. As soon as the spring flowering trees and shrubs have finished blooming, perform any corrective pruning required.

13. Stake Dahlias to prevent storm damage.

14. Do not neglect roses. Spray at 7 to 10 day intervals to control blackspot.

15. Select Caladium tubers as soon as possible to obtain good quality. Do not plant until soil temperature is at least 70° F. In the College Station area this is about May 1.

16. Do not allow the Chinch-bug to get ahead of your St. Augustine lawn this spring. Apply a good insecticide in mid-April and follow this with a second application in early July. If considerable Chinch-bug damage is evident in the neighborhood, a third application may be necessary in early September. The easiest and probably most effective control is to use one of the granular formulations and apply with a cyclone-type spreader. Water thoroughly after applying. Since L-199 is not available at this time, I will suggest the use of the granular formulations of Aspon, Trithion, Diazinon or Ethion. Use according to instructions on the container.

SUMMER FLOWERING ANNUALS

There is nothing more colorful and rewarding, or so easy and fast to grow as the popular summer flowering annuals. From seed, or young nursery plants, summer annuals are easy to use in the landscape as they offer a wide range of color, height and form.

There are summer annuals to suit every gardener, be he the weekend type or the devoted everyday one. Annuals, too, fit every landscape need from the border to the window box. As with most plant groups, there are some annuals which are easier to grow than others. Summer annuals which require little care or attention and which are not particular as to soil type include Gaillardia or Blanket Flower, Coreopsis or Caliopsis, Cockscomb or Celosia, Globe Amaranth, Portulaca,

Vinca or Periwinkle, and Spider-flower or Cleome. The more ardent gardener may wish to plant some of the new summer annual introductions such as the current All American Selections.

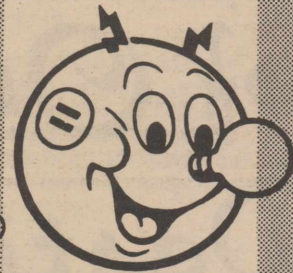
Annuals for window boxes, pots, or planters may include: Begonia, Dwarf Zinnia and Marigold, Portulaca, Petunia and Verbena. Border annuals may include: Dwarf Marigold and Zinnia, Begonia, Portulaca, Verbena and Dianthus. Fast growing annual vines for summer include: the popular Morning Glory, Cypress Vine, Gourds, and Hyacinth Bean Vine.

A large selection of flowering annuals for summer are now available to the gardener through local nurseries, garden shops, variety stores and seed houses. If you have not yet made your selection, late spring is the time to prepare for summer color. By purchasing plants, which are already growing, and often in flower, the

gardener has a head start and earlier beauty in the garden than when planting from seed.

At the time of transplanting be careful that the roots of bedding plants are subjected to as little injury as possible. If plants are obtained in hands, trays, or flats, remove them by slicing downward in the soil between the plants. Lift out each plant with a block of soil, without disturbing the root area, and place the block into a planting hole, at the plant's normal growing depths. Plants in peat-pots should be thoroughly watered prior to planting, as the peat-pots often dry out, and the roots will not penetrate the sides of the pot if not watered. All annuals do best in a well-prepared soil. Water them immediately after planting, and during dry periods. Do not fertilize until they are actively growing. Once established and growing, summer annuals, or children of the sun will provide unsurpassed enjoyment and beauty to your home grounds.

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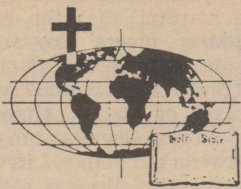
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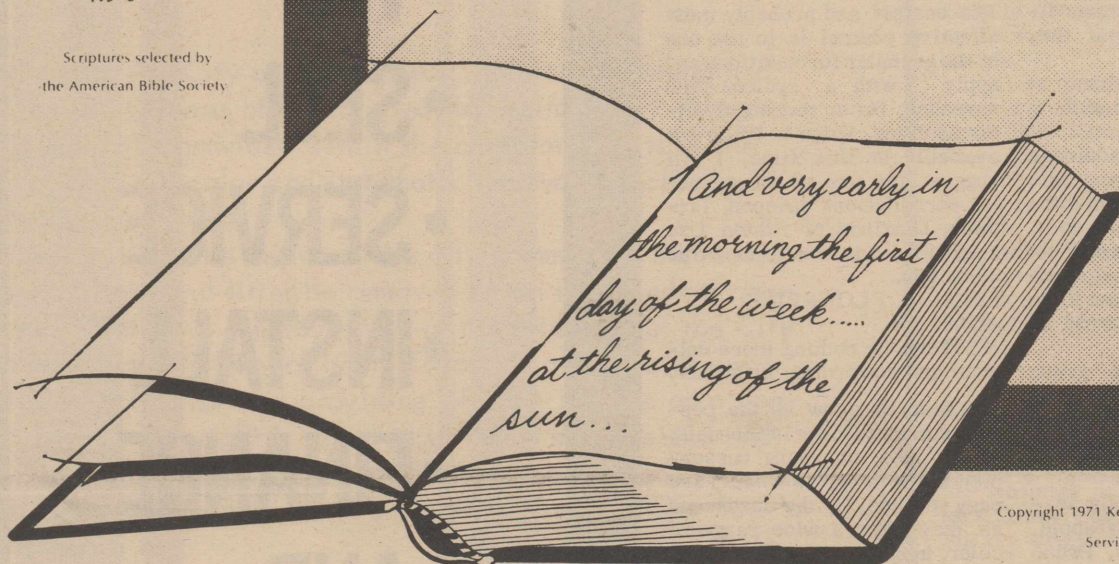
