## RATE AMONG HIGHEST IN AREA

### \$1 Million Jump Shown In Local Bank Deposits

Bank deposits in Colorado City this spring show one of the greatest rates of increase in all West Texas. And a near-record jump in deposits has been recorded over last year's figures, bank officials told the Record Saturday.

According to Gus Chesney, vice-president of Colorado City's City National Bank, deposits are up more than \$1,000,000 over the figure recorded in the spring bank call of 1957.

On June 6, 1957, total deposits at the Colorado City bank were \$3,705,000, Chesney said.

Present deposits stand at \$7,076,737.97, he added. This represents a deposit increase of more than \$400,000 since Jan. 1 when total deposits were listed as \$6,652,622.82.

A substantial increase also was reported by the First State Bank at Loraine, with deposits there rising to \$1,081,023.36 from \$994,517 in January 1957.

According to size, the Colorado City bank showed a greater rate of deposit increase than any bank in this general area, except for Midland which boasted an all-time high in bank deposits.

The highest deposit figure in Colorado history was established in 1950, on the eve of the drought, when local deposits soared to a record \$9,800,000, Chesney said.

Present deposits are at the highest level since 1952, he added.

Late harvesting of county crops may have played a large part in putting deposits at their present level, he said.

According to figures com-

puted by the Daily American Banker a New York banking trade newspaper, the City National Bank now ranks among the top 3,500 banks in the United States in deposits.

The newspaper's report places the local bank in 3,482nd place among the nation's 14,000 banks. Its ranking at the end of 1956 was 3,608th.

Texas banks in general showed healthy increases in comparison to last March, in spite of slackening in the economy in other parts of the nation.

But only a few of the state's banks could show a deposit increase over Dec. 31 figures which were swelled by Christmas deposits by merchants.

Little increases were noted by banks in Sweetwater, Snyder or Abilene. Big Spring banks showed an increase of about \$500,000, climbing from \$27,855,125 to \$28,367,753.

Reports of deposits were made as of March 4 after a call for condition of bank business by the U. S. comptroller of the treasury and the Texas banking commissioner.

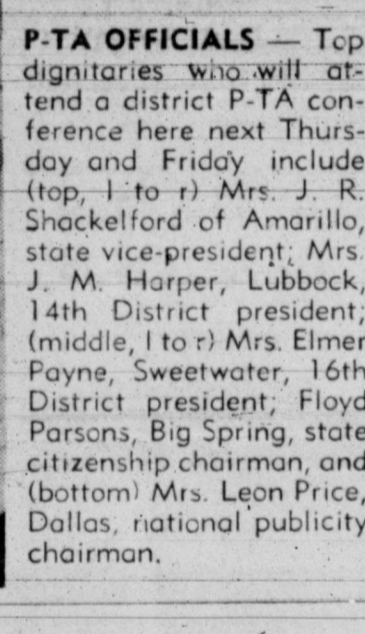
### AUTO, BUS IN MINOR MISHAP

## TURKEY, A 'MELTING POT'

# Doctor Relates Foreign Duty Experiences for 1921 Club

Dr. Seth B. Cowan was a guest speaker last Friday for members of the 1921 Study Club in the home of Dr. R. H. Rathiff.

Dr. Cowan spoke of his experiences and his impressions of the land of "Turkey; having recently returned to the United States from Izmir, Turkey, where he was stationed for the past two years with the U. S. Air Force.

"Turkey is a melting pot," Dr. Cowan stated, "as people originating from practically all races are found there.

"The people are likeable, friendly and especially kind to Americans," he said.

"Turkey, in land area, is a little larger than Texas.

Dr. Cowan showed colored slides to illustrate his talk and told the group many interesting facts about the people, government, religion, education, language and many historical places in that part of the world.

In speaking of the beauty of Izmir, he said, "There is a great deal of beauty in Izmir, as well as in other cities of Turkey, in spite of the fact that one is continually aware of the poverty and unsanitary conditions."
