Local Football Fans Disappointed That Game Not Here

Memphis football fans were considerably chagrined today with the announcement that the McLean-Shamrock play-off for the district title of district 3B will be played Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock on Harvester Field in Pampa.

Local school authorities and the athletic council were trying to have the championship game played in Memphis, but at an all-day meeting by the district Inter-scholastic league committee yesterday in McLean, it was decided that the play-off game should be held in Pampa.

Because of the fact that the annual Amarillo-Pampa football game is to be played in Pampa on Thursday, it was thought that Memphis had a good chance to secure the important tilt here; and it was thought that a bigger crowd would turn out here than in Pampa.

EMPLOYMENT NOW AVAILABLE

NRS Office Now Has Jobs for Relief Clients in N. M.

Unassigned relief clients in Memphis and Hall County are requested to call at the National Employment Service office here if they are interested in securing employment at Tucumcari, N. M., at a wage scale of \$44 per month.

The relief clients must be registered by the local NRS office before being qualified for work on the Conchos Dam, near Tucumcari, F. N. Blevins, head of the local NRS office, stated.

Those who wish to take jobs in New Mexico must be able to furnish transportation to the job and must be in a position to furnish themselves with food and shelter for two weeks, until a pay-day may be had.

Drillers and auto mechanics will be paid a wage scale of \$63 a month, Mr. Blevins said.

ENFORCEMENT OF TRAFFIC LAWS

OF ALL the weapons being used to combat motor traffic accidents, enforcement is ultimately the most important. This is not to minimize the vital need for such primary measures as education and engineering, for education is a great hope and only through it can we achieve the ideal of self-enforcement. Traffic engineering is a fast-developing science which can and does go far in reducing the probability of motor accidents caused by faults in street and highway design and construction. Nevertheless, until education teaches the motorist better habits and a proper respect for the added advantage given by traffic engineering safety, enforcement must assume the practical leadership in accident reduction.

People who are otherwise law-abiding, deliberately break the traffic laws every day. The result last year was 36,000 killed and close to a million injured. The police cannot afford to let down in their enforcement efforts—rather must they intensify them. Probably the first requisite for good enforcement is good laws to enforce. The truth of this statement

is proved by a survey made by the National Bureau of Casualty and Surety Underwriters. This survey showed that the trend in the ratio of motor accident fatalities to gasoline consumption increased 20 per cent in six years in a group of states having no license laws, while at the same time, it decreased 25 per cent in those states with standard license laws. So long as the law itself is lax, not only about licenses but also about the whole motor vehicle code, it cannot be surprised that the motorist is also lax.

A second requisite is intelligent application of the law. All offending motorists are not alike, either in their attitude or the degree of their offence. No police officer has the right to abuse his authority by abusing a motorist where harshness is not called for. The policeman who can explain how the safety of the offender and of others has been endangered by the offenders violation is far more likely to win a convert to the good driving idea. Correction and not punishment is the aim of modern traffic law enforcement.

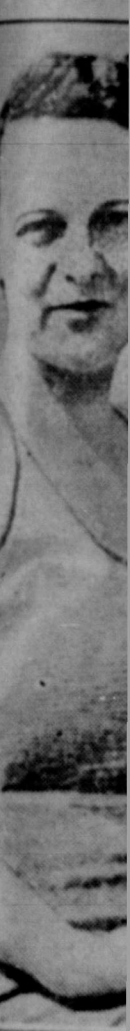

Bank's Banks In Sound Condition

PARK, Mass. Nov. 26.—years at a salary of only \$15,000 per year. If the members of such a board are to be removed from political thought, influence and dictation, then they should be given of personal security. Only a life-long pension with a good salary could give them such a feeling. One of the most crucial jobs which faces President Roosevelt today is to select this board which is to play such an important part in the business future of the country.

Now that the Banking Act is definitely out of the way, bankers can begin to speed up credit expansion. Up to now they have been fog-bound. They had to stay anchored until the banking question was settled. Only the bravest dared to make a move. Now with business forging ahead, with security prices rising almost daily, and with optimism returning everywhere, no banker has any excuse for withholding loans to good risks. And when I say this I mean loans at a reasonable rate of interest. I have no sympathy for those bankers who are complaining that business men do not want to borrow money at the same rate which prevailed in 1929.

Certainly banks have all the reserves they need to do a tremendous business. In fact, our credit base today is the largest in the history of the country. Our good holdings will permit a credit expansion four times that experienced at the peak of the 1929 boom. We have laid the base for a credit expansion of about \$270,000,000,000 against an actual figure of \$55,000,000,000 at the 1929 peak. Furthermore, reserves are increasing daily. Demand deposits are \$4,000,000,000 above the low of 1933 and \$2,300,000 above a year ago. With the yields on government, municipal, and high-grade corporate bonds now close to the lowest level in history, bankers are itching to put their capital to work. Naturally they

Accordingly, I feel the recent gain in commercial loans means that these loans have finally hit bottom and are now on the upgrade. No interest is being paid on demand deposits and that means good profits whenever loans start to pick up in earnest. By paying no interest on demand deposits, banks are saving an amount nearly equivalent to the decrease in earnings from loans this present period of inactivity in banking is the depositor. The loss in earnings from the drop in loans and interest rates has been passed along to him. But there are better days ahead for both depositors and stockholders as loans increase.

Less Competition — Better Earnings

For instance, there are one-third less banks in the country today than in 1929. Hence, two banks now will do the volume of banks. Naturally in some districts, where failures were high, this factor will be of even greater importance than in others. Moreover, with such a tremendous volume of deposits on hand there should be no competition forcing banks to pay a higher interest rate on deposits than they should pay. So the outlook for bank earnings over the next two or three years becomes brighter every day. Bankers themselves, however, are concerned over government competition in the private banking field.

They are also getting jittery over the present pace of public spending. At New Orleans, the Association soundly scored spend-thrift policies. One of the ranking officers even proposed a bank "strike" against buying more public bonds until steps were taken to balance the budget. Whether this had anything to do with the President's announcement several days later that the next budget would be cut half a billion dollars, I do not know. At any rate, banks now hold fifty-three per cent of all government bonds against fifteen per cent in 1920. A sharp drop in the price of these bonds could create another banking panic. Hence all efforts toward balancing the budget are of vital importance to every bank depositor and stockholder!

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

Did anything ever smell better, I wonder, than the old-time Thanksgiving dinner cooking? Luscious fragrance of turkey roasting, savory dressing steaming, succulent turnips and onions boiling, spicy pies baking! I say "old-time," but I don't know why because the Thanksgiving aroma is about the same in the modern kitchen as it was in the old-fashioned one.

Of course for the small family, the roasting fowl may be chicken or duck or guinea hen instead of turkey, but the good smell is there anyway.

Here is a typical old-time dinner which, while simple, is interesting enough to give any cook ample opportunity to display her skill. Soup can be substituted for the fruit cup and such vegetables as turnips and parsnips may appeal to you more than brussels sprouts or broccoli.

For a modern touch to dinner, serve pumpkin pie Alaska. Bake a pie shell. Fill it with pumpkin ice cream, cover with a heavy meringue flavored with ginger and sherry and bake in a very hot oven (500-degrees F.) just long enough to brown the meringue. Serve at once.

Pumpkin Ice Cream

Two cups coffee cream, 1 cup whipping cream, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, 3 tablespoons cold milk, 2 cups light brown sugar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 teaspoon

BREAKFAST: Stewed prunes with lemon, cereal, cream, crisp broiled bacon, cornbread, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON: Baked macaroni and oysters, rye bread, hearts of celery, baked quince, milk, tea.

DINNER: Baked spareribs, mashed potatoes and sauerkraut, baked corn, grated carrot and apple salad, cherry pie (canned cherries), milk, coffee.

ginger, 1-2 teaspoon salt, yolks 4 eggs, 2 tablespoons sherry, 2 teaspoons granulated sugar, 1 cup cooked pumpkin rubbed through a sieve.

Scald coffee cream and add sugar. Stir until dissolved and stir in cornstarch mixed to a smooth paste with cold milk. Add spices and salt and cook and stir until thick and smooth. Soften gelatin in four tablespoons cold water and add to pumpkin. Beat egg yolks until thick, beating in sherry. Add to cornstarch mixture and cook and stir just one minute, removing from heat before mixture reaches boiling point. Stir in pumpkin mixture and chill. When thoroughly chilled, turn into freezing tray and freeze until firm around the edges. Then fold in whipping cream whipped until firm. Freeze three to four hours in mechanical refrigerator or pack in six parts ice to one part ice cream salt and freeze four hours. This will fill a twelve-inch pie shell.

In making the pie shell, don't roll the pastry too thin because it must act as a non-conductor of heat. The meringue forms a thick non-conductor, so be sure the oven is hotter at the top and put the pie as near the top of the oven as possible. If you can't regulate your oven this way, put the pie on a thick board.

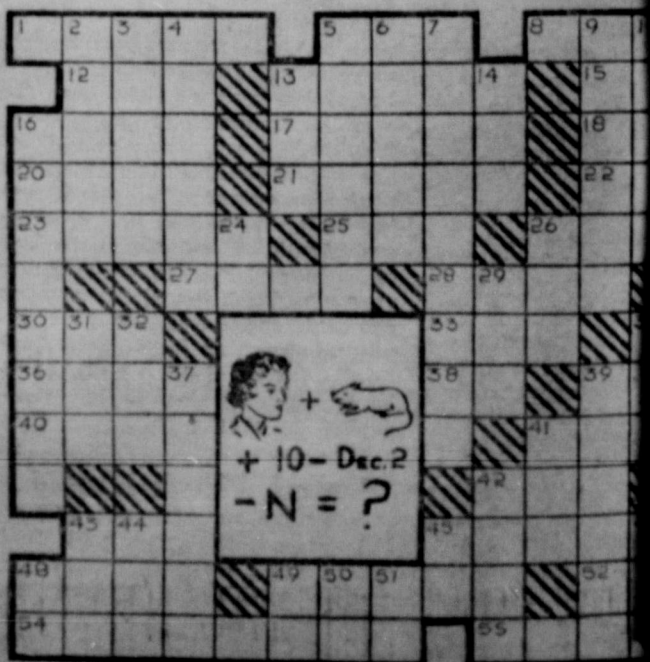

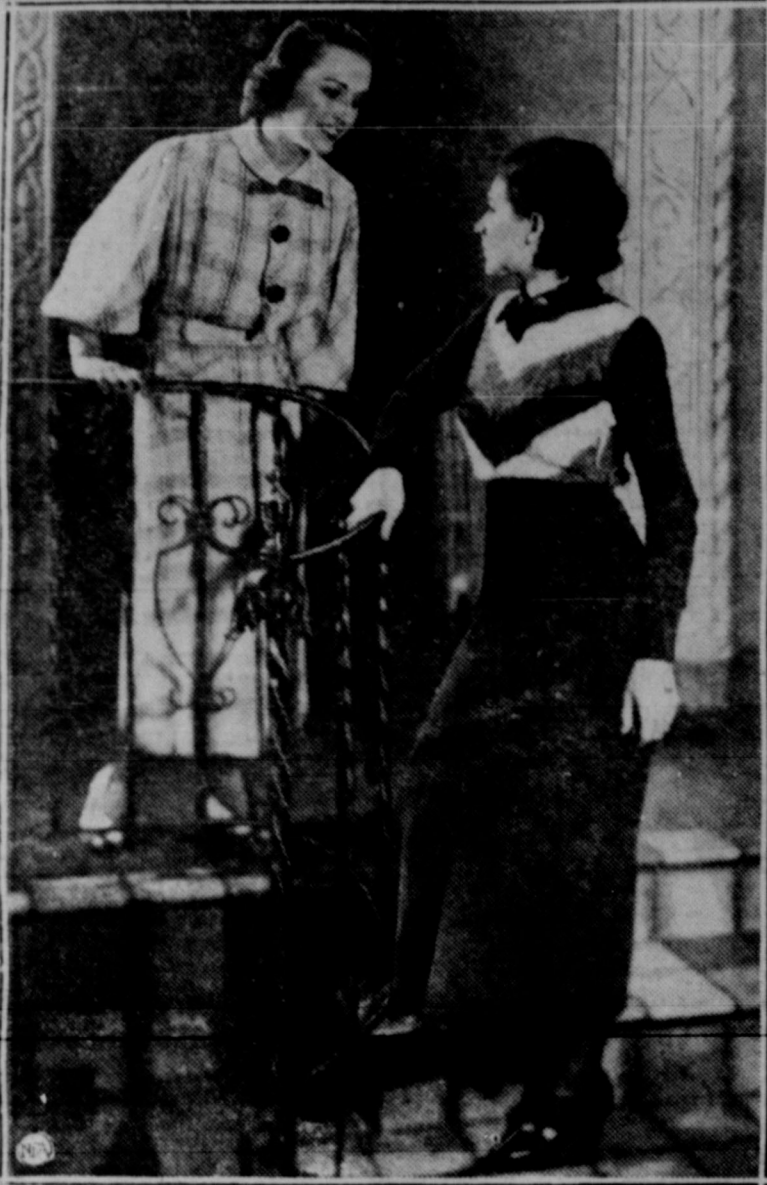
