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WASHINGTON GOSSIP

Officers Named for Imaginary Army



WASHINGTON.—An army that does not exist is being offered by the war department in obedience to the mandate of congress. Fifty and more men versed in the profession of arms are already on the eligible list for commissions in this army. Three new boards of army officers, composed of seasoned colonels, experienced majors, captains and first and second lieutenants, were recently named to pass upon the qualifications of other candidates ambitious to direct imaginary military forces.

Artemus Ward's shoulder strap company of warriors, assembled to take part in the big family feud of 1865, had at least one private—the humorist himself, who was in command; but the army of the United States volunteers to have none. Don Quixote armed with a big stick, his head protected by a "Madrino helmet," mounted on his charger, "Rosinante," and followed by the faithful Sancho Panza

was a more real, more tangible and more formidable force than the ghostly army of United States volunteers. It's a joker in the Dick militia bill, enacted into law by congress on May 27, 1908.

The Dick bill originally provided for an actual army of United States volunteers similar to the volunteers who enlisted for the Spanish-American war after state organizations were found to be troublesome.

The bill also provided for a separate section for an eligible list from which officers were to be commissioned when the army of United States volunteers, subject only to the will of the commander-in-chief of the armies of the United States, might be called into being in a condition of war.

The section providing for the volunteer army was stricken from the bill in the course of a legislative wrangle over the privilege of the states to organize volunteers. The authority creating the army was thus destroyed, but the contingent section bringing into existence the list of eligibles for the army's commissioned officers was not disturbed. The bill thus passed congress, dismembering the army but providing officers for it. That is why the war department is now qualifying men as eligibles.

Postal Clerks Ask Right to Organize

EMPLOYEES of the postal service, particularly the men employed in the railway mail branch, are making a determined fight for legislation under which they may organize and affiliate with the American Federation of Labor. Samuel Compa, president of the federation, is supporting the movement.

Many men formerly in the postal service, but who were let out because they were active in encouraging employees of the service to organize, have told the committee of the wrongs which they assert are done the employees. In a general way, the grievance of the employees is that men are frequently dismissed for purely political reasons, men let out of the service have no recourse.

It is pointed out that the postoffice department now forbids the individual employee from laying any complaint he may have before his senator or member of congress. The civil service commission has come in for much



criticism because it has not taken more interest in cases of dismissed employees. Witnesses have pointed out to the committee that the commission will not act in the case of a dismissed employee unless it has prima facie evidence that the dismissal was because of politics. It is next to impossible, say the dismissed employees who have testified, to prove that men were removed from the service through political influence.

Some of the new members of the house who have become much interested in the grievances of the postal employees believe a remedy of some sort will be found in the committee on civil service.

Would Label the Unspoken "Speeches"



REPRESENTATIVES VICTOR MURDOCK, Independent Republican, of Kansas; Swager Shierley of Kentucky and Frank Clark of Florida, both Democrats, have been fighting to have every unspoken "speech" printed in the Congressional Record labeled something like this: "Not delivered in the house of representatives."

These men believe that the Record, as it now leaves the press, perpetrates a fraud on the reader every time it declares that Congressman — delivered the following speech on such a date, when all Congressman — did was to get permission to insert in its columns a carefully prepared manuscript intended for the consumption of his constituents, at the expense of the United States government.

"It is the only honest way," declared Murdock to the correspondent.

"The Record, under the present system, is not a true report of the proceedings of the house. It may well be that an article of value, prepared by a member of congress, should be printed in the Record, but it should be so designated.

"The first result of labeling things in the record by their right names would be the abandoning of the present abuse by individual representatives. When a man's constituents begin to ask him, 'Did you really deliver this speech, or did you just have it printed?' he will quit the practice.

"Congress could not possibly afford the time that would be necessary for the delivery of all the speeches that appear in the Record. Therefore, speeches will have to be shortened, and they ought to be.

Auto-Suggestion Way of Keeping Cool

A WILTED representative, John J. Fitzgerald of Brooklyn, N. Y., chairman of the house appropriations committee, is the first distinguished convert to Dr. Harvey N. Wiley's theory with respect to the effect of auto-suggestion on the temperature of the body.

Mr. Fitzgerald sat at his desk all through a scalding, sweltering day, wearing a smile of perfect peace. His coat was buttoned tight, by the collar it turned up around his neck, and ever now and then he shivered with unseasonable delight.

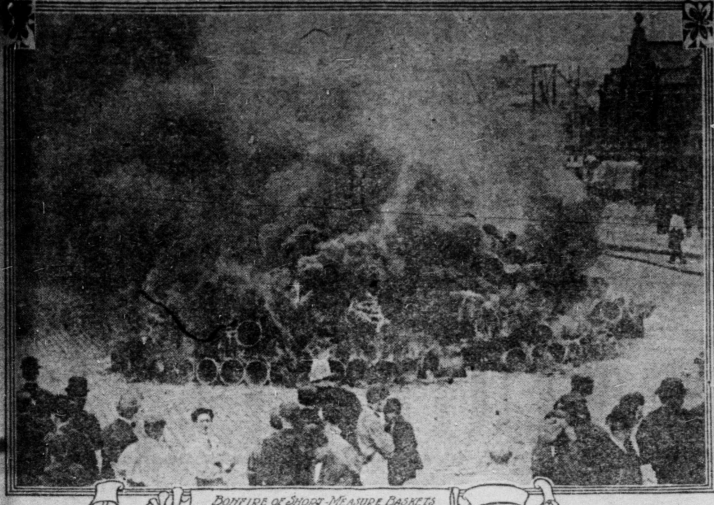

CREMATION OF SHORT MEASURE BUSHEL BASKETS



NEW YORK.—A cremation of short measure market baskets took place recently at the Wallabout market, Brooklyn, by order of Commissioner of Weights and Measures Walsh. There were over three thousand of them, all were of the bushel persuasion, and they were taken to Wallabout and Gansevoort markets. For some weeks inspectors had been wayfaring the wagons of the guileless rustic with the result that many of them were found to contain "bushel" baskets that were from four to fourteen quarts short. It is stated that the seizures will probably result in congress taking action to the end of compelling a standardization of so-called barrels and bushels all over the country. As matters stand, the terms are variously interpreted in different sections, and invariably to the disadvantage of the consumer.

DANDELION AS PEST

Unusually Luxuriant Crop of Weed This Spring.

No Safe Remedy, Say Experts, Except to Get Down and Dig Them Out by Roots—Big Damage Is Seen in New Jersey.

Chicago.—Dandelions are getting a strange hold upon Chicago's lawns this year.

While other cities are estimating in six figures the loss caused by the condemned yellow blossoms, Chicago gardeners are looking with disgust upon one of the most luxuriant crops of the big-leaved weeds that the lawns upon which they sowed grass ever had in late spring, followed by a hot hot weather, seem to have been just what the dandelions have been waiting for to show what they can do in the way of rapid growth, and some of them have almost leaped out of the ground in their eagerness to mount skyward. In some of the parks, in places where much tramping has weakened the more delicate grass, a second crop of dandelions is blooming in the spaces left by the first. The earlier crop is now going to seed, and for large areas the grass is almost invisible. The leaves of many of the plants have been lifted clear of the ground by the rapidity of growth.

Other cities are watching the dandelion crop with even more concern than in Chicago. Gardeners in East Orange, N. J., estimate that a damage approximating \$100,000 has been done the lawns in that section within the last fortnight.

In other of the eastern states where much pride is taken in the appearance of the lawns the dandelions have secured an equally strong start. The belief is stated by some of the naturalists that some natural enemy of the dandelion which has kept it more within bounds in former years has been absent this season.

That continued activity with the lawn mower and careful fertilization of lawns are safer preventives of the dandelion pest than any chemical preparations was the advice given by several Chicago gardening experts in speaking of means of dealing with them.

Like many antidotes for poison, their main objection is that they kill the patient as well as ridding him of the trouble, they declare. Sulphate of iron, which is recommended as sure death to dandelions, is almost, if not quite, as hard on the grass.

"Dandelions are beautiful early in May, but for the rest of the year they are ugly, and therefore we have to keep them out," said Jens Jensen, in speaking of this year's crop.

"The only way to deal with them in large areas is to keep the grass close cut and in healthy condition, so that there won't be any bare spots for the seed to get through to the ground and sprout.

"If you keep their heads cut off before they have a chance to go to seed you prevent them from spreading. I don't know of any preparation that doesn't do too much harm to the vegetation you want to save to be safely used in killing them. Of course, if you have a small lawn, the best thing is to get down on your knees and dig them out by the roots."

O. C. Lincoln, landscape gardener for the Lincoln park commission, was of much the same opinion.

"Dandelions are pretty difficult to cope with, and there certainly are a lot of them this year," he said. "Sulphate of iron is recommended by

many, but it undoubtedly is pretty hard on the grass. It is a little harder on the dandelions than on the grass, so in many cases it kills the one and the other survives. It is rather a desperate remedy, though."

MEN MAKE BETTER TEACHERS

President Charles W. Eliot of Harvard Says Plan to Equalize Salaries Is Most Destructive.

New York.—In regretting his inability to lecture in New York on the question of equal pay for men and women teachers, which the board of education proposes to adjust by reducing the salaries of men, former President Charles W. Eliot of Harvard writes to Joseph Van Denburg:

"The sex of the teacher is of absolutely no importance in education. It is a perfect waste of money to have experience that men make better teachers for boys over twelve than women do. You tell me the board of education is planning to reduce the salaries of men teachers. A more destructive policy could hardly be imagined. There are two reasons for paying women teachers less than men. First, with rare exceptions, they do not and cannot do the same work. Secondly, teaching as a temporary occupation for young women is more desirable among the occupations open to women than it is for young men among the occupations open to men."

PINEAPPLE VESTS WEAR LONG

Englishmen Returning From India Bring New Kind of Strong Fiber—Cost Small.

London.—Pineapple underwear is one of the latest wonders threatened by mechanical science.

It has long been known that the fiber of the pineapple leaf can be manufactured into the most durable, washable material, but the cost of extracting the fiber has made the price of the fabric almost prohibitive.

A retired Indian colonel, who is the proud possessor of three undervests made from pineapple leaves, said they were more luxurious and comfortable than the very finest silk.

"They cost me something like \$20 apiece," he said, "and though I have worn them for over thirty years, they show no signs of wear even yet."

"I doubt if they are procurable anywhere in London. In India the natives extract the fiber from the pineapple leaves by hand, and the process is long and laborious. The products of rami, or China grass, are fairly well known, but only a few know of the luxury of the pineapple."

While pursuing inquiries on this interesting subject among silk brokers and silk manufacturers, whose businesses are threatened by this new invention, it was found that the existence of pineapple silk was scarcely known.

"After all, silk is silk," said a leading broker, "and this new invention or discovery will rank among artificial silks, of which there are already enough to form a market amongst themselves."

In the office of one of the principal fiber merchants of Mark Lane were seen specimens of a beautiful silk-manufactured fabric which had been manufactured from the pineapple fiber under the superintendence of Charles H. Dodge, the fiber superintendent of the United States government.

ISOLATE LEPER UNTIL END

Lee Tung, Afflicted Pittsburg Chinaman, to Live Rest of Life Away From the Public.

Pittsburg.—Lee Tung, the local Chinaman who is suffering from tubercular leprosy, was taken to the municipal hospital the other day where he will live the rest of his life, isolated from the public.

The Chinaman's face is badly swollen and web blotches mark his wrists and forearms. He contracted the disease eight years ago while on a visit to China.

Dr. R. A. Booth, the city physician, says that the leper probably will live for four or five years. In the meantime the city will have to provide a home for him. During the warm weather he will live in a tent on the hospital grounds, but before winter sets in a house of some sort will have to be built for him.

Students' Food Is Costly.

New Haven, Conn.—The appetite of the average Yale undergraduate looms large in food statistics compiled by the management of the university dining hall, where 999 students eat three times daily. During the first five months of the college year, it took 129,000 quarts of milk, 29,000 quarts of cream and 215,000 fresh eggs to satisfy the college boards. Other notable items are 7,500 pounds of breakfast foods, 14,000 pounds of butter, four and a half tons of crackers, 450 barrels of flour, 20,000 pounds of roast beef and 19,000 pounds of chick en.

SETS TOWN TO SCRATCHING

School Boy Is Accused of Distributing 'Cow Itch'—Joker Will Be Publicly Flogged.

Wilkesbarre, Pa.—A practical joker recently had had the residents of Conyngham, a country town near here, scratching continuously at the great special committee of the school board is endeavoring to find and punish him.

The afflicted ones did not know what was wrong at first. Some thought it was an epidemic of hives; but it did not develop like hives; the skin merely grew red, there was a slight swelling and the irritation was continuous, while the number of those affected grew until half the residents were scratching.

Finally it was learned that it was all due to "cow itch" which had been distributed in the school in two lodge rooms, the postoffice, and at a horse sale during the week, evidently by some practical joker, probably a pupil.

The people are so indignant at their prolonged irritation that the joker is likely to be publicly flogged if caught.

DISCARD FISH YARNS

They Are Dead, Dumb and Nearly Blind, Says Professor.

Brains Are Comparatively Small and Old Stories Must Be Regarded as Merely Mythical—Really Does Not Think at All.

London.—All the popular notions about fishes are exploded by Professor Harold Russell, the zoologist. He announced after a series of experiments, that fish are deaf, dumb and practically color blind. They cannot cry, much less shed tears, as many generations of comic artists would have the public believe.

The old stories of fish which came to be fed when called or when a bell was rung must now be regarded as mythical. All that the fish possesses is a rudimentary inner ear, and it is a modified part of the so-called "lateral line," the most mysterious thing in fishes. By taking the calcareous stones out of the ears of fish, the fish lose all sense of equilibrium and roll about as if crazy.

The brains of fishes, says Professor Russell, are comparatively small, though the parts and the general position of the nervous correspond with those of monkeys and mankind. In a trout the brain does not half fill the cerebral cavity, the roof of the space being occupied by a greasy fluid.

In the front of a fish's brain are the olfactory lobes, from which the nerves of smell issue. Behind these lobes are the cerebellum, the thinking part, very small and insignificant. The trout has no cerebra cortex or "think box." Behind the cerebellum are the optic lobes, into which run the nerves from the eye. Lastly come the cerebellum, which controls the power of movement.

Discussing these and other curious features of fish life in the Natural History, Professor Russell says a fish really does not think at all, but acts by reflexes. A message is sent inward to the brain, and the muscles at once contract. Sensations are changed into movements, and actions take place without thinking. Reflex actions are, therefore, immediately suggested and directed by the influence of external things.

A fish is thus an impressionist. Fear and anger are its chief emotions, and the search for food and for a mate chiefly occupies its activities.

Most fishes but their food by sight alone, though the sea deity solely on their sense of smell. The structure of a fish's eye does not essentially differ from that of a human eye. A trout has no eyelids and sleeps with its eyes open. Fishes have no tear glands. They are, however, as a rule, fishes are short-sighted. The fish's eye is at rest when regarding something close at hand. A man's eye is at rest when it is directed to some far-away object, such as a star.

How little taste or smell is possessed by fishes is shown by experiments on a conger eel in an aquarium. It devoured with equal avidity fish covered with anchovy extract, cheese, camphor spirits, iodolform and turpentine. Many fishes have no tongue at all, but it is conspicuous and well developed in the trout and its allies. Carp have broad, flat back teeth with which they masticate their food with apparent gusto. A fish's tongue is without power of movement. Salivary glands are absent in all fishes and their mouths never water even at sight of the most appetizing flies.

Professor Bateson reports that some fish in an aquarium ignored a straight piece of wire, but eagerly snatched at words. This raised a laugh from all the members who could read with ten eyes, instead of only two. One woman remarked: "That can't happen to our letters."

The home teacher of the association, who is a very active member of the club, and who goes into the homes of the blind, teaching them to read Braille, how to play games, how to make baskets and to knit, was telling some of her latest experiences in her work.

"This afternoon," she was saying, "I paid my fourth visit to an old colored mammy of eighty-three, who has been blind for more than half a century. During this time she has read nothing, has done little or no work, just sat in brooding idleness. Oh! she was so anxious to do something to occupy her mind. Today was her fourth reading lesson in Braille, and she read almost perfectly. In two or three more lessons she will be able to read anything."

VENDERS ARE "EARLY BIRDS"

"Stake Out Claims" Many Hours Before First Patron Appears—Competition Is Very Keen.

Atlantic City, N. J.—Through the arrangement of John Shain, a board-walk flower vender, in recorder's court, there was revealed a competition in this business so keen that the itinerant merchants select their posts as early as four o'clock in the morning, before the visitors appear, in order that they may get the most advantageous locations. One of these vendors had arrived on the boardwalk the other day at four o'clock, and "staking out his claim" at North Carolina avenue, indicated the fact by placing his tray upon the railing. He went down the boardwalk a short distance, and when he returned he found that his place had been pre-empted by Shain, who refused to move. A patrolman, recognizing the other's right of priority, placed Shain under arrest, and he was fined five dollars for insisting upon what he considered his rights.

DOLLAR BILL HAS ROMANCE

Man Contemplating Suicide Gets His Mind and Wins Fortune—Changes Money in Change.

Chicago.—A dissipated one dollar bill, passed out from the ticket window of one of the local theaters, disclosed the other day as strange a romance as ever was dreamed of by a writer of fiction. The legal tender, which bore a message of despair written on its face, fell into the owner's hands after fifteen years of wandering through the west and the gold fields of Alaska.

The man who had written the message was Roy Denton, a native of New York state, who fifteen years ago went west to find his fortune. Bad luck followed, his undertakings and schemes followed. He spent his last dollar for medicine, and in his disheartened condition he wrote on its face: "This is my last dollar. R. D." The medicine did not give the desired relief, and in his distressed state of mind, being without funds or friends, he wandered down to the bay, with the intention of ending his life.

On the way to the wharf he was discovered by a former schoolmate, to whom he confided his troubles. The meeting resulted in Denton changing his mind, and the following week the two schoolmates started for Nome, Alaska, where Denton took a claim which yielded him a fortune.

For the last three years he has been traveling in the great, returning to America last month, and was on his way to his old home. He stopped off in Chicago between trains and accompanied by a friend, went to a local theater.

He gave a five-dollar bill in payment for two seats and received in return two one-dollar bills. As the money reached his hands, Alfred S. Wisnahan, the ticket seller, noticed the man scrutinizing the bill, turning visibly pale and exclaiming: "There's a dollar I never expected to see again."

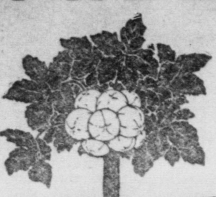

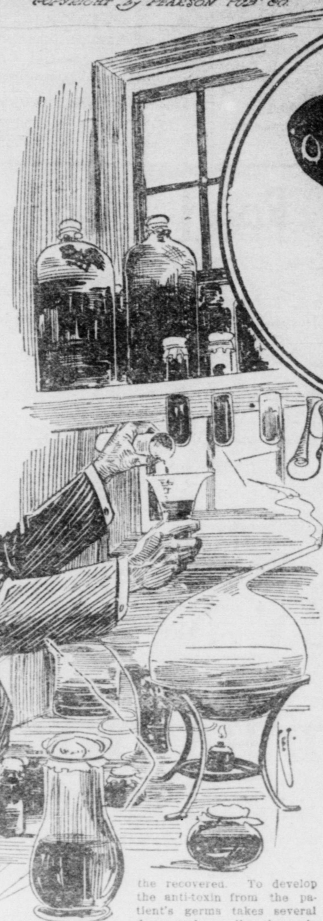

PAN FOR CLEANING SILVER

Tableware is Quickly Brightened
When Soaked in Solution—
Labor Also Eliminated.

Every housekeeper knows how much work is entailed in keeping silver clean. Furthermore, that this work must be done frequently, as the ware tarnishes even when stored away. A device has been invented by which the cleaning can be done in a fraction of the time heretofore required and without any scouring with powders or pastes. A metal pan, with a grating just above the bottom, is partly filled with a solution of warm



water and a tablespoonful each of common salt and baking soda. The pan is made of a material which will not corrode from the action of these substances in the water, but the same action will remove the tarnish from silver in a few minutes. The tableware is placed on the grating in the pan and allowed to remain there for about two minutes, if warm water is used, and from five to ten minutes if the water is cold. It is then removed and wiped dry, leaving it as bright as new.

OLD NEW ENGLAND DELICACY

Apple Slump Healthy and Appetizing, Particularly During the Months of Summer.

Pare, core and quarter one dozen cooking apples, pour over them one cupful of boiling water and put where they will be able to cook. Five minutes later add to the apples one and a half cupfuls of molasses and cook for 15 minutes more, while you prepare a soft biscuit dough, using two cupfuls of flour, one heaping teaspoonful of sugar, two level teaspoonfuls of baking powder, and one teaspoonful of butter, rubbed finely into the flour, and milk to stir to a dough that is too soft to roll. Put this over the apples, which should be tender, but not broken, cover the saucepan closely and cook 20 minutes without lifting the cover. Serve with a hot sauce, made by heating to a cream half a cupful of butter and one cupful of sugar, stirring in just before using one cupful of boiling milk and a seasoning of grated nutmeg.

CUCUMBER SOAP.

Buy two and one-half pounds of mutton fat in the leaf and try it out, and save the rest. I get the cucumber juice by running cucumbers through food chopper and straining. One can of potato, dissolved in one quart of water, let it get cold, one pint of cucumber juice, one-half cup of borax, ten cents' worth oil of sassafras, one tablespoon of sugar to make it lather, six pounds of grease, melt your grease and when it is lukewarm turn the liquid (all together) in a thin stream into the grease, stirring all the time, until all is together, then stir 15 or 20 minutes until it is pretty thick. Pour it into jars, and let it harden, cutting it in squares before it gets hard.—Exchange.

Fancy Shortcake.

Pour one cupful of boiling water over two cupfuls of sugar. Boil for five minutes, then cool. Separate the whites from yolks of four eggs and beat the yolks until thick; then add the syrup to them, beating constantly; now add two cupfuls of flour sifted with two teaspoonfuls of baking powder; add a pinch salt and one teaspoonful of lemon juice; then add in the whites, beaten stiff and dry; spread in two layer cake pans; bake in a quick oven. When done remove to a warm platter, spread with sugar, and strawberries crushed. Place on top a thick meringue of beaten egg whites with sugar or whipped cream and sugar. Arrange berries around the cake.

To Inset Cream Color.

To wash cream colored materials which tend to fade in washing, so that they will retain the rich cream cast original in them, it is only necessary to pass them through clean warm water in which onions have been boiled. White materials may be steeped in such liquid to give them a delicate faded nearly white should lie in the bath for a short time to regain their original tint. Rinse and finish in the usual way.

Salt Will Help.

A varnished floor can be cleaned more easily if sprinkled with coarse salt, which is allowed to stand for a few minutes, then brushed off with a soft broom.

Temperance Cake.

One cup sugar, one-half cup butter, two cups flour, two-thirds cup sour milk, one egg, one teaspoon soda. Flavor with nutmeg or lemon, or both.

Should Report Tuberculosis Cases.

The National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis says that the first requisite for a comprehensive campaign for the elimination of tuberculosis in a state or city is well-enclosed law requiring that every living case of tuberculosis be reported to the health authorities. Such reporting is now required by law or health regulation in 25 states, while in 28 states and territories no provision whatever is made for keeping record of cases of this infectious disease. Several cities in non-registration states, as for instance, Chicago, Cleveland, St. Louis, and New Orleans, have local ordinances requiring that tuberculosis be reported. In all, there are about 100 cities in the United States which have ordinances of this nature.
