Wolves Lose To Winters, 34-14

The Colorado City Wolves just "weren't ready to play," Friday night when they traveled to Winters for a District 6-AA game, said Coach Mike Farda after the contest.

The scoreboard showed that Winters was ready to play as they won the contest 34-14.

The first three and a half quarters belonged to Winters as they rolled up 34 points in that time on 353 yards rushing and 30 yards passing.

In the first three and a half quarters, the Wolves had only five first downs on less than 50 yards rushing and passing. In the first half, the Wolves had only 17 yards on offense.

Winters took their first two possessions of the game and marched 49 and 51 yards to score. The try for points after touchdown failed. With nine seconds left in the first half, Winters scored on a one-yard run and the points after were good to make the score 20-0 at half.

Two Races Add Interest

May Be Good Turnout For Tuesday Election

Sometimes Mitchell County voters come out to the polls on election day, and sometimes they don't, at least that's the evidence shown from the past few years' voting records.

Largest turnout was in the presidential election year of 1972 when 2,879 of 4,266 registered voters trekked to the polling places, a good showing of 63 per cent.

Next largest percentage was in the 1970 gubernatorial election when 55.9 per cent of 3,720 registered, amounting to 2,081 voters, came to cast their ballots.

A sad showing, only 10.2 per cent of voters, bothered to exercise their voting freedom in the off-year election of 1973, when actually the only issue was amendments to the state constitution.

Another race being watched by oldtime political observers is the campaign for the Texas Senate, 30th District, between Ray Farabee, Democrat, and Mary Virginia Kirchhoff, Republican.

Most analysts would not have given Mrs. Kirchhoff much of a chance a few years ago, as the 30th District, including Mitchell County, has always voted Democrat, sometimes a straight ticket. But in recent years, voters have started ignoring Party affiliations and voting for the person rather than the Party.

Both Farabee and Mrs. Kirchhoff have been to Colorado City and Mitchell County a number of times, both before the primary election and since.

The estimated 225,000 registered voters in the 29-county area will decide their elected representative in the Texas Senate.

County clerk Marie Bassham says that 48 ballots were cast absentee in the upcoming election. About 15 of those were mailed out by request.

Five party columns and a write-in space are provided on the ballot. Party headings include Democrat, Republican, Raza Unida, Socialist Workers and American.

Omar Burleson is unopposed for U. S. Representative. The Governor's race has five candidates: Dolph Briscoe, Democrat; Jim Granberry, Republican; Ramsey Muniz, Raza Unida; Sherry Smith, Socialist Worker and S. W. (Sam) McDonnell, American Party.

For Lieutenant Governor: Bill Hobby, Democrat; Gaylor Marshall, Republican and Dan Fein, Socialist Workers Party.

Attorney General: John Hill, Democrat; Tom Cole, Republican and Pedro Vasquez, Socialist Worker.

Comptroller: Bob Bullock, Democrat; Nick Rowe, Republican and Sas Scoggins, Socialist Worker.

Only two candidates entered the State Treasurer's race: Jesse James, Democrat and Robert G. Holt, Republican.

Commissioner of General Land Office: Bob Armstrong, Democrat; Mary Lou Grier, Republican and William Rayson, Socialist Worker.

Commissioner of Agriculture: John C. White, Democrat and Zack Fisher, Republican.

Railroad Commissioner: Jim C. Langdon, Democrat; Joe P. Cain, Republican; Fred R. Garza, Raza Unida and Rick Can-

gress, Socialist Worker.

Lakes Still On The Rise

Lake Colorado City was only one foot 8 and 1/2 inches from capacity late Friday afternoon, an increase since August 1 of 15,371 acre feet of water.

Don Delaney, TESCO plant operator, explained that many acre feet of water amounts to 5,419,522,561 gallons of water.

Lake Champion, at the last elevation reading, was at 2,047.20 feet, showing an overall gain of 11.65 feet since midsummer. The low reading was 2,035.55 feet of elevation.

Lake Colorado City's low reading during the summer was 2,056.90 and the new reading shows not only the almost five and one-half billion gallons increase but also on elevation gain of 11.50 feet to the 2,068.40 mark.

The Candidates Speak

The Colorado City Record offered candidates in a contested race the chance to speak to voters personally. Their statements, in their own words, follow.

Ray Farabee and Mrs. Mary Kirchhoff are running

for the Texas Senate, 30th District. Caddo Matthews is running a write-in campaign against Democrat nominee Olson Sweat for the office of County School Superintendent.

Ray Farabee, Democratic nominee for the Texas Senate, wrapped up his campaign this week by visiting in 18 communities in the 30th senatorial district.

Seeking office for the first time, Farabee spoke earlier this week on Industrial Development in Snyder.

The Wichita Falls businessman and attorney has had broad experience working with business and industry seeking to locate in this senatorial district.

Farabee has frequently pointed out the need to maintain a climate favorable to business in Texas. He has spoken out against the personal and corporate income tax in Texas. He feels it is important to retain the right-to-work law in Texas.

Education is another issue that the candidate has stressed in this campaign. Farabee feels that this will be a priority item in the next session of the legislature.

Farabee supports emergency action to provide relief to local school districts whose budgets are pressed as a result of inflation.

Equally important, according to the 41 year old attorney, is the question of finding long range solutions to the funding of education in Texas that will take some of the burden off of the ad valorem tax.

Farabee has represented both rural and urban school districts and is familiar with the problems of local school districts. He is critical of legislatures that pass bills affecting local

school districts without providing the funding to pay for the changes required. He views this as irresponsible and unfair to local homeowners and landowners who must pay the bill. Other issues that are high on the candidate's priority list include development of water resources, economy in government and planning to both conserve and develop our energy resources.

Farabee favors pay as you go finance in Texas. He is critical of what he terms over regulation of our daily lives by state and federal government. He favors common sense solutions to problems with maximum authority being placed with the local governing units. "Too often our tax dollars are supporting large bureaucracies rather than reaching the citizens that need the services these dollars are intended to provide," observes Farabee.

Farabee decided to seek office for the first time because he felt government needed the involvement of people who understood the daily problems of working for a living and raising a family.

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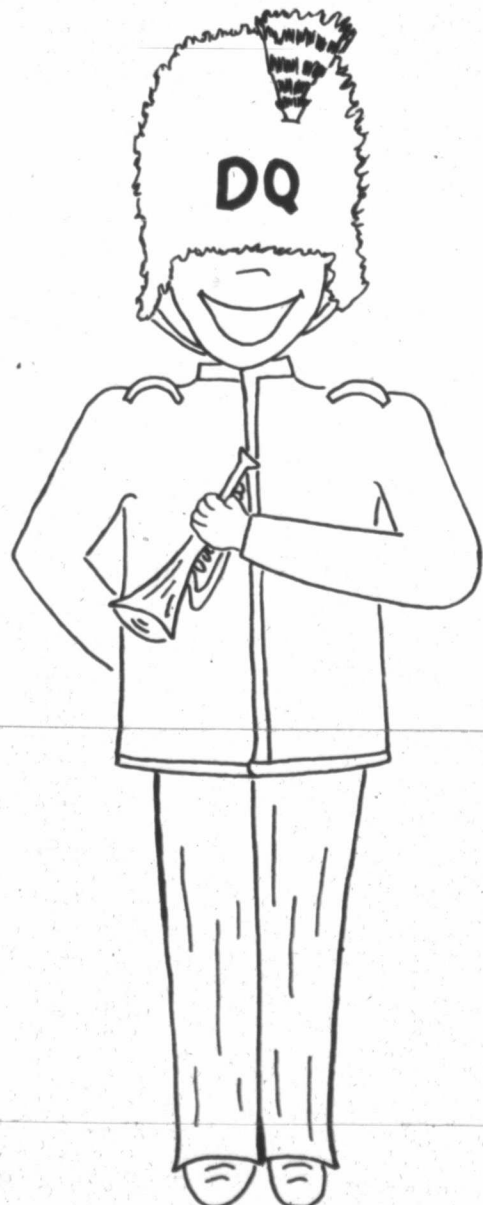

made to local school districts." (This means - in the year 1973-74 there were 1,923 school children in Mitchell County. The cost of operating the office was \$19,365 so it took away 10 dollars of each child's school money to operate the office).

2. "With the continuation of the county school board and with an Ex Officio superintendent the cost may not exceed \$2,600.

If elected superintendent, I cannot close the office alone, because it belongs to the good people of Mitchell County. There are two ways to abolish the office. One, by an Act of the State Legislature - the other, by the vote of the people. Therefore, if elected I will take necessary legal steps to abolish the office early next year and return any remaining duties of the office to the proper authorities.

However, after a special election for the abolishment of the office, if the voters indicate that the office should remain open, then, I would submit to their wishes and would serve as superintendent.

I am well qualified. I have a Bachelor and Master Degrees in school administration. I have served 15 years in administrative work in the public schools, Farm Security Administration, Sweetwater Production Credit Association - 20 years of teaching experience in Mitchell County. I have lived in the county for 30 years, own my home, a tax payer, and paid the required legal fee to get my name on the ballot, and furthermore there will not be any personal business carried on in the office.
