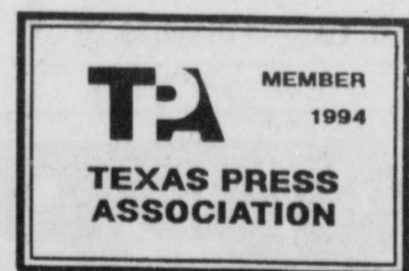

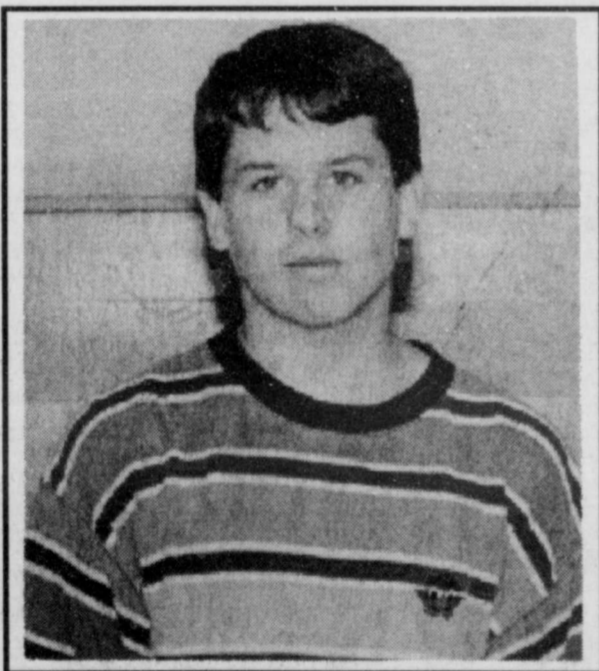

Red River Healthcare Center Needs Sunday School Teacher

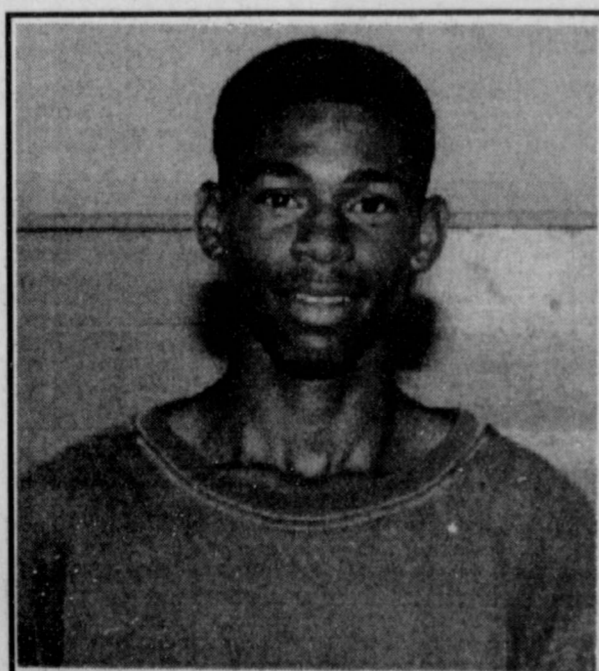

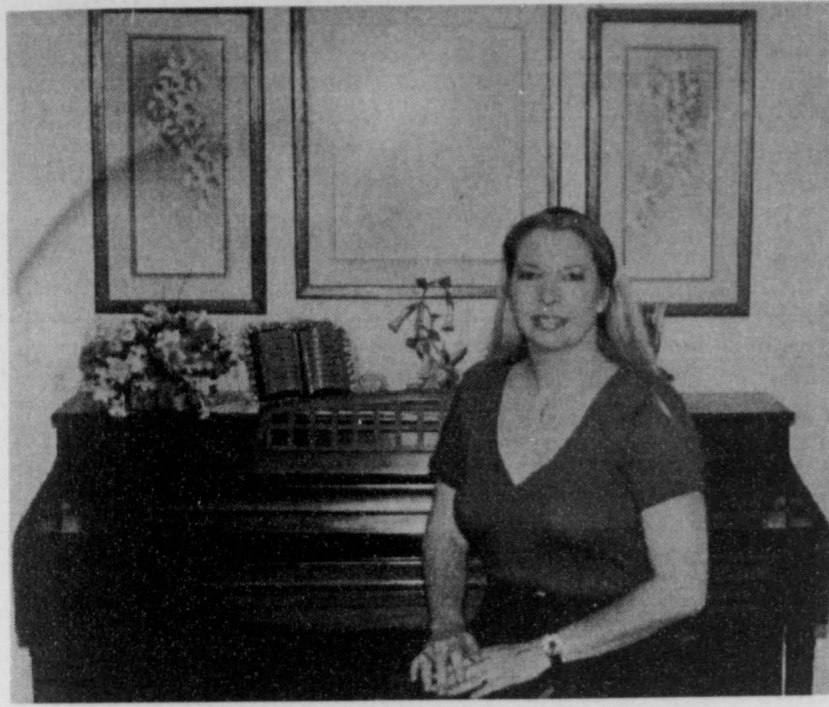

My Prize Winning Apple Cake
by Cody Deaton
Cake:
1 1/2 cup sugar
1 cup canola oil
3 eggs
2 cups self-rising flour
1 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon
1 tsp vanilla
1/4 tsp ground nutmeg
3 cups (3 medium) chopped Granny Smith Apples
1 cup coarsely chopped pecans
Frosting:
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup packed brown sugar
1/4 cup milk
2 cups powdered sugar
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour 13X9X2" pan. Mix sugar, oil and eggs until blended. Stir in remaining ingredients except apples and nuts. Beat one minute. Add apples and nuts. Pour into pan and bake 35-45 minutes, testing with toothpick. Cool and frost with caramel frosting.

Heat butter in 2 qt. saucepan until melted; stir in brown sugar. Heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Boil and stir over low heat 2 minutes; stir in milk. Heat to boiling and remove from heat. Cool to lukewarm. Gradually stir in powdered sugar. Place pan in sink in cold water and beat by hand until smooth and of spreading consistency.

Low Fat Chicken and Rice
6 to 8 boneless, skinless chicken breasts 1 pkg. (12 or 14 oz.) long grained Brown or Wild Rice
1 can Campbell's Healthy Request Cream of Chicken soup
1 can Campbell's Healthy Request Cream of Mushroom Soup
1 can Campbell's Dry Onion Soup Mix
1 3/4 cups water
Juice of 1 lemon, lemon Pepper Seasoning, Seasoned bread crumbs, Worcestershire Sauce, Low Fat Cooking spray.

Preheat oven to 325. In larger bowl, combine 2 cans of soup, dry soup mix, and water, mixing well. Stir in Rice. Pour into 15X10X2" baking dish prepared with low fat cooking spray. With fork, prick chicken breasts on both sides. Shake on Lemon and pepper seasoning and Worcestershire sauce (to taste) Squeeze lemon over breasts, then roll in bread crumbs. Place breasts on top of Rice mixture in baking dish. Cover with foil, and bake approximately 1 1/2 hours, server 8.

Easy Blueberry Cobbler
3 cups fresh blueberries
1 Tbsp lemon Juice

1 cup all purpose flour
1 cup sugar
1 egg (beaten)
6 Tbsp melted light margarine

Place berries in 10X6X2" baking dish (sprayed with cooking spray) Sprinkle with lemon juice. Combine flour, sugar and egg; Stir until mixture resembles coarse meal. Spread over berries. Drizzle with melted butter and sprinkle with sugar. Bake at 375 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes (Other Berries may be used)

Strawberry Cream Cake
Cake:
4 eggs
3/4 cups all purpose flour
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 cup sweet butter
1 tsp vanilla
3 Tbsp Kirsch
Filling and Frosting:
2 pts. Strawberries
1/2 cup confectioners sugar
3/4 cup slices blanched almonds, toasted

Preheat oven to 350. Grease 3-8 inch round pans. Line bottoms of pans with waxed paper and grease and flour sides. Place eggs in mixing bowl over pan of hot water 5 minutes to warm eggs. Beat eggs at high speed until fluffy. Gradually beat in sugar, beating 10 to 12 minutes, until mixture falls from beaters in thick, glossy ribbons. Beat in vanilla. Remove bowl from pan of water. Sprinkle flour over egg mixture and fold in with Rubber spatula. Fold in butter until well blended. Divide batter among 3 pans. Bake 18-20 minutes, or until done by "touch test." Cool on wire rack 5 minutes. Loosen edges of cake with metal spatula and invert from pans onto racks. Peel-off waxed paper and cool. Prick each layer several times with fork and sprinkle with 1 Tbsp Kirsch.

Wash and hull strawberries, reserving 5 for decoration. Thickly slice remaining strawberries and set aside. Beat cream until thick. Add Confectioners sugar and milk and beat until firm. On Serving plate, spread 1 layer with 1/4 of whipped cream mixture. Arrange 1/2 sliced berries on top. Top with second layer, spread 1/4 whipped cream mixture and follow with remaining berries. Top with remaining layer of cake. Spoon 3/4 cup of remaining whipped cream mixture into pastry bag fitted with star tip and place in refrigerator. Spread remaining whipped cream over sides and top of cake. Press almonds around sides of cake. Cut 5 reserved berries in half and arrange in circle, cut sides down, on top of cake. Pipe reserved whipped cream in swirls or rosettes around top edge of cake and in center. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

Safety Tips From Your Game Warden

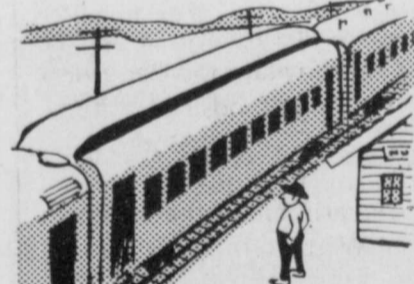


Memorial Day is coming soon and once again boaters and fishermen will flock to area lakes to have fun in the sun. Unfortunately, this usually brings about some accidents causing injury and death. It seems that every year boaters give way to the happy-go-lucky carefree atmosphere of the warm weather and cool waters. They carelessly fail to realize how much danger is present on crowded lakes especially when people drink alcohol or disregard water safety regulations. This is why Game Wardens patrol area lakes and strictly enforce these regulations.

To prevent the embarrassment of being arrested and fined and the tragic loss of life, boaters need to be reminded that it is illegal to operate a boat while intoxicated. Since the combination of sun, wind and waves dramatically increase the ill effects of alcohol, drinking and driving a boat is a very deadly thing to do. Boaters also should make sure that they have

proper approved life preservers for each person in a boat, and are encouraged to wear them. Children under 13 years of age must wear a life preserver of proper size when the boat is underway. There are several regulations requiring safety equipment, registration and safe operation that boaters need to review before they go to the lake. Water Safety Digests are available at sporting goods stores, bait shops and from your local Game Warden. Failure to abide by these regulations can result in fines and many times accidental damage to property or even loss of life.

Your local Game Wardens ask that you consider water safety before you go boating, be careful on the water so that all may have an enjoyable and safe Memorial Day weekend.



Steve James To Present Program At Old Church Theatre

Steve James has made a name for himself over the years as one of the top authorities of Blues music and its origins.

Steve has traveled throughout the Deep South and sat in with old Blues Bands, learning the songs and the stories behind them.

He sat on many porches "pickin'" with some of the original players from the cradle of the Blues era.

When he left his home in Manhattan, Steve moved to the infamous East Greenwich Village, where he worked in a guitar factory and played for the hat in the Bowery. In 1973, he moved to Bristol, Tennessee. He played old-time country and honky-tonk there during this time his book,

Old Time Country Guitar was published by Oak Press.

While living in Memphis he befriended Sam McGee, who showed him his version of Railroad Blues originally cut in 1934. He picked up some pointers from Furry Lewis, who also imparted some valuable musical advice, "you play this lick and they give you .75 cent, a fish sandwich and all the moonshine you can drink."

Steve eventually settled in Central Texas in the late 70's where he worked with a San Antonio Museum doing interpretive music programs. Currently, Steve tours the country and abroad and makes regular appearances at Anton's in Austin. He is a contributing editor of Accoustic Guitar magazine, he teaches guitar, as well as building and repairing them.

Gary Porterfield, a native of Clarksville, who opens the show for Steve James, is known in the North-east Texas area as one of the best lead guitarists around.

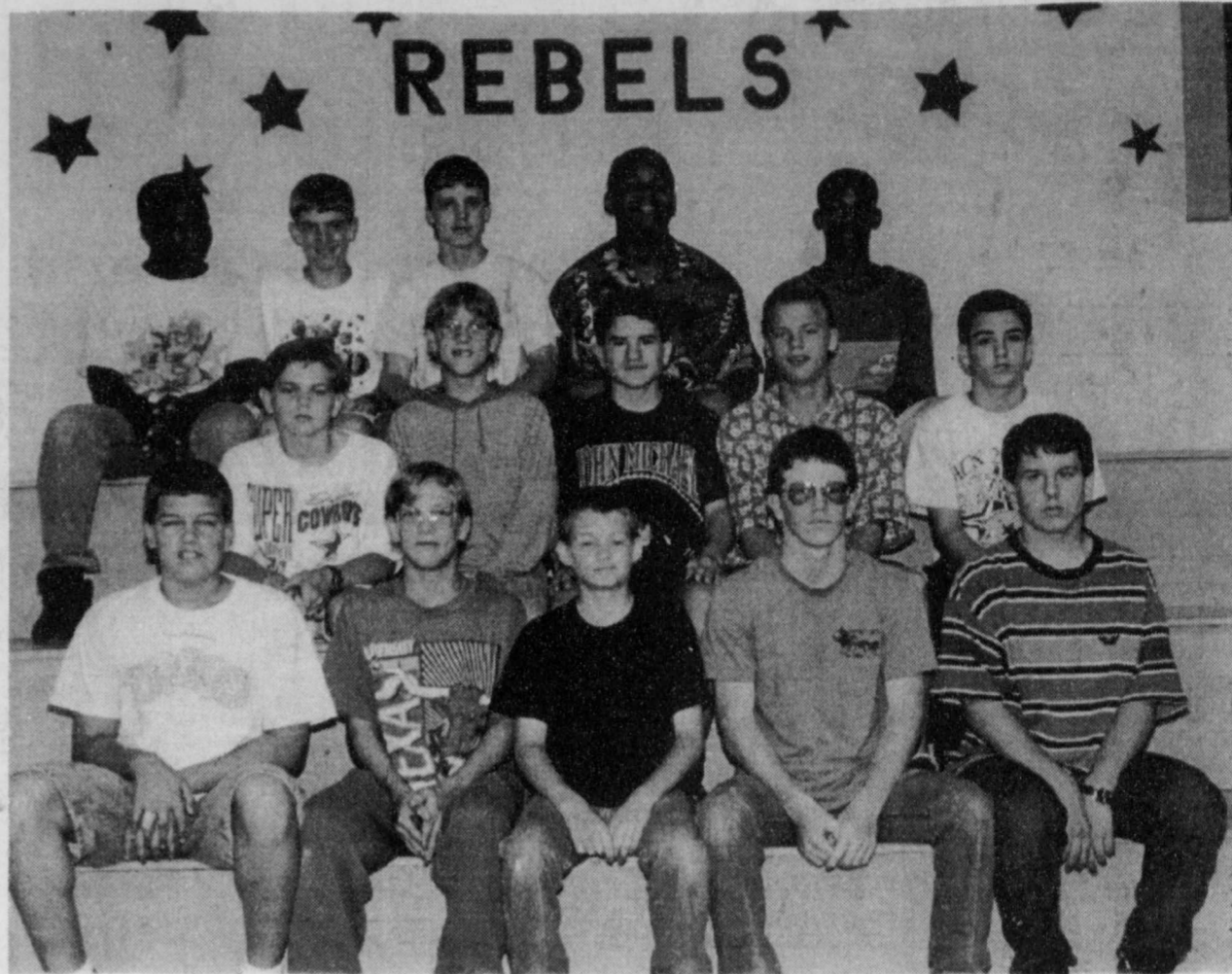
