We saw the following editorial somewhere and it fits our thinking so closely on the subject we thought it appropriate to run FARM INCOME

There is a saying in the rural areas of Texas that "when the stock market spirals higher and higher and farm prices plunge lower and lower, then you know there is a Republican in the White House."

That gauge of White House tenacity is holding true to form today. The Nation's farmers have consistently lost one billion dollars in income for each year of the Republican Administration, while brokerage houses, stock and bond holders and financial institutions have reaped unparalleled profits.

The economic advisers of President Eisenhower have followed the historic pattern of the Republican Party—shift the emphasis of wealth from the basic levels of agriculture and small business to the upper echelons of high finance. This has been accomplished primarily by destroying the stabilizing influence in the farm program and substituting the "hard money" policy of higher interest rates and drastic credit curbs.

This dangerous game of economic "topsy-turvy" uses federal tax money as a catalyst. A prime example is the U. S. Treasury which has nearly tripled its own interest payment rates to financial institutions from which it borrows money. Thus, Secretary Humphries gives a modern twist to the role of Robin Hood—rob the poor and give to the rich.

The result is that money lender profits are now running at a record high level of \$17.3 billion a year—which is 41% greater than in 1952.

At the other end of the scale, farm income has dropped 20% in the same period from \$15.1 billion to a near record low of \$11.1 billion annually, and the trend is still downward.

The policies of the Eisenhower administration should raise some grave doubts in the minds of the voters when a handful of money changers, backed by the government, make \$6 billion more a year than 22 1/2 million of our nation's farmers.

Such tactics qualify the Republicans to strike a new coin for use in interest payments to New York banks, mottoed "We serve the Greedy, not the Needy."

Hal Bennett Resigns From N.F.L.A. Board

Culminating 16 years of service, Hal Bennett resigned at a called meeting of six appointed directors representing the Colorado and Snyder National Farm and Ranch Loan Associations at the Snyder office, in favor of Dave Womack.

The Monday meeting was the third joint meeting of the two associations, resulting in combining the two for future service. The first meeting, held in Lubbock October 9, was attended by area directors and representatives of the Federal Land Bank of Houston, who recommended consolidation of 120 associations in the state into 84. The main purpose is to reduce expenses in secretarial help and office maintenance, thereby keeping the interest on money borrowed by stockholders at a minimum.

A second meeting was held in the Colorado City office October 22, when directors from each association voted in favor of consolidation. Since the Colorado association owns its building it was decided to keep the central office there with the name unchanged. Newby Pratt will continue as secretary-treasurer. The Snyder secretary-treasurer will maintain a small office and will take care of farm and ranch loans especially in that area.

The new district includes portions of Kent and Borden counties as well as Scurry and Mitchell. All decisions of the board of directors awaits the approval of the stockholders in a special meeting called for November 7.

The new association calls for six directors while the two, Colorado and Snyder associations, had five directors each. It was necessary that two men from each district be eliminated. C. C. Thompson, who is a director on the board of the Federal Land Bank of Houston, was not available for further service on the local board because of new regulations. Dave Womack, who has served as director about three years, was chosen to continue as director along with K. McCauley and George Dawson.

At the annual meeting of shareholders in August, 1957, an entire board of six directors will be chosen to serve 1, 2 and 3 year terms.

Better Fertilizers Are On The Way

College Station, Nov. 29—Fertilizers are a lot better than they used to be, but more improved fertilizer materials can be expected in the future, reports M. K. Thornton, extension agricultural chemist.

Higher analysis fertilizers containing more nutrients and less bulky inert matter, and soluble or liquid fertilizers—all now on the market—have reduced weight and bulk and made both storage and application of fertilizer materials cheaper and easier for farmers and home gardeners.

Industrial and State-Federal research now being carried out will undoubtedly lead to further improvements, says Thornton.

One of these improvements will be the development of slower acting or less soluble forms of chemical fertilizer that will not leach out of the soil so rapidly. This will mean that enough fertilizer can be applied in one operation to meet the demand of a long-season crop, thus eliminating the need for repeated applications throughout the season.

It will also prevent excessive potash consumption, now a problem in alfalfa and certain other crops in many parts of the country.

Other improvements will change the physical makeup of fertilizer materials, making them easier to store and to apply. A start in this direction has been made with the development of some granular products that have less tendency than older materials to cake and harden during storage and that distribute more easily and uniformly in the field.

A lot more work needs to be done in developing these better fertilizers, says Thornton. But farmers would do well to be alert for new developments in this field because they will open opportunities for increased efficiency of production and greater farm profits.

Press Manager Gives Pro and Con On Amendments

Austin, Texas.—Eight decisions on state policy soon will be squarely up to the voters. In addition to party candidates, eight proposed amendments to the state constitution will appear on the general election ballot.

Through a procedural slip-up, a ninth will be considered at a special election on Nov. 13.

Each amendment will be printed on the ballot twice—once preceded by FOR and once by AGAINST. Voters must mark out the statement they oppose and leave the other clear.

List of the amendments and arguments pro and con:

1. Authorizes the legislature to compensate persons fined or imprisoned for crimes they did not commit. PRO: Would make amendments for hardships unjustly imposed on the innocent. CON: Might open the door to numerous fraudulent claims.

2. Allows county commissioners courts to vary allocations of tax money without special elections. PRO: Greater flexibility would make for greater efficiency in county financial management. CON: Commissioners courts would have too much authority.

3. Adds other colleges to the building program financed by the University of Texas Permanent Fund and authorizes investment of the fund in corporate stocks and bonds as well as government bonds. PRO: Would provide an increase in college building money without new taxes. CON: Risk involved in diverse investments is not worth the possible return.

4. Increases the benefits of the teacher retirement system. PRO: Would attract more persons to the dwindling profession. CON: Would increase taxpayer obligations by \$4,500,000, take a larger nick out of teachers' salaries.

5. Authorizes another \$100,000,000 bond issue for veterans land buying. PRO: Program has been put in order, and additional money is needed to enable more veterans to participate. CON: Program does not permit public confidence; only about one percent of Texas veterans have benefited.

6. Provides a different oath of office form for elective and appointive officials. PRO: Would clarify present inconsistencies. CON: Clutters constitution with minor details.

7. Requires competent medical or psychiatric testimony before commitment of a person to a mental institution and allows waiver of jury trial, except in criminal cases. PRO: A mentally ill person should not be convicted as a criminal. CON: Jury trial is a safeguard against "railroading" of persons into mental institutions.

8. Permits judge to deny bail to persons convicted of two previous felonies. PRO: Would curb habitual criminals. CON: Right of bail is one of our fundamental civil rights.

9. Authorizes the Legislature to give aid with federal assistance to citizens permanently and totally disabled by a mental or physical handicap. PRO: State has a moral obligation to these needy persons. CON: Tie-in with federal program would lead to more federal encroachment.

Veterans' News**Questions and Answers**

Q. If I sell my GI home, and get relieved from liability to the Government, will my entitlement for another GI loan automatically be restored to me?

A. No. Relief from liability of your present GI loan would not automatically entitle you to another loan. Veterans may have their loan entitlement restored only under certain unusual circumstances, such as losing their homes through fire or flood; condemnation by the Government, or being forced to change

locations because health or job transfer.

Q. If I add the total disability income provision to my National Service Life Insurance term policy, will the rates be based on my present age, or on the age that my premiums are figured on?

A. The rates would be based on the age that determines your regular premiums, and not on your present age.

Q. Is it possible for a young man or woman to pursue a regular high school education under the War Orphans Schooling program?

A. No. Regular high school training is prohibited by the law. To enroll in school below the college level, the young person must have completed or quit

regular high school, and the low-college course must be one that fits him for a vocational goal.

Q. May I attend a foreign trade school under the Korean GI Bill?

A. No. The only courses outside the United States permitted under the Korean GI Bill are those offered by approved institutions of higher learning.

Farmers Will Vote On Cotton Marketing December 11th

College Station, Nov. 1.—The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced the 1957 state acreage allotments for upland cotton; the national allotment for extra long staple cotton and set December 11 as the date for a referendum on marketing quotas for the 1957 cotton crop.

The total allotments available for distribution in the states were set by the USDA at 17,585,463 acres. The total allotment for Texas was set at 7,547,503 acres which includes 10,974 acres as Texas' share of the national reserve. The Agricultural

Act of 1956 provides that a national acreage reserve of 100,000 acres be apportioned among states on the basis of the estimated needs of each state for additional acreage to establish minimum farm allotments under the act.

The marketing quota for the 1957 crop upland cotton was announced on August 31 as 11,014,493 bales of 500 pounds gross weight. The marketing quota for extra long staple cotton, just announced, is 76,565 bales, and the national acreage allotment was set at 89,357 acres for the 1957 crop.

At least two-thirds of the cotton producers voting in the December 11 referendum must favor the marketing quotas if they are to be effective on the 1957

crops. Whether quotas are approved or disapproved, 1957 cotton acreage allotments will remain in effect as a condition of eligibility for price support.

The USDA announcement said that the state acreage allotments would be apportioned among counties and the county allotments among farms according to provisions if the law and regulations issued by the Secretary of Agriculture. Individual farm acreage allotments will be mailed to operators of cotton farms prior to the referendum.

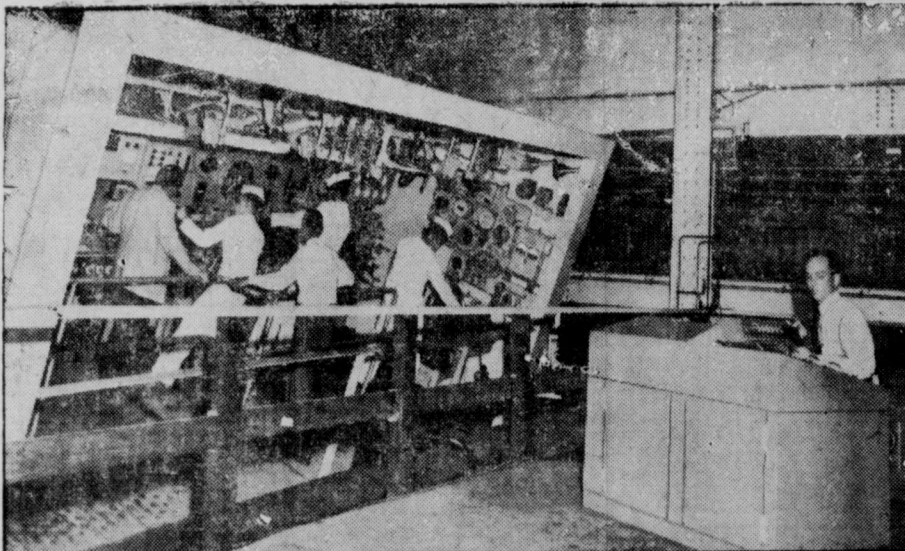

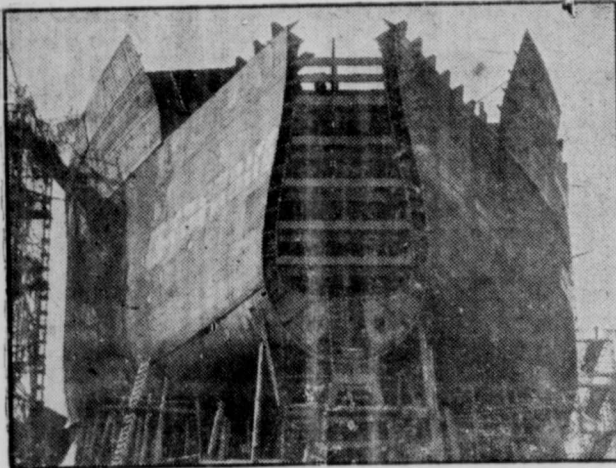

1 cup shortening
2 cups sugar
4 eggs separated
1 cup buttermilk
2 1/2 cups cake flour
1 bar German sweet chocolate
1 teaspoon soda.
Whip the 4 egg whites. Dissolve chocolate in 1/2 cup boiling water; cream sugar and shortening well; add beaten egg yolks; add 1/4 cup milk alternated with flour.
Dissolve soda in other 1/4 cup milk and add to flour mixture; add 1 tablespoon vanilla and pinch salt to chocolate and add to batter; then fold mixture into beaten egg whites. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Bake in three 9 inch pans or two large square pans.
ICING AND FILLING
3 egg yolks beaten and added to 1 tall can evaporated milk.
1 stick oleo
1 cup sugar
Mix and cook until thickens. Remove from fire and add 1 tablespoon vanilla; 1/2 cup chopped nuts; 1 cup coconut; whip and put between layers and on cake.

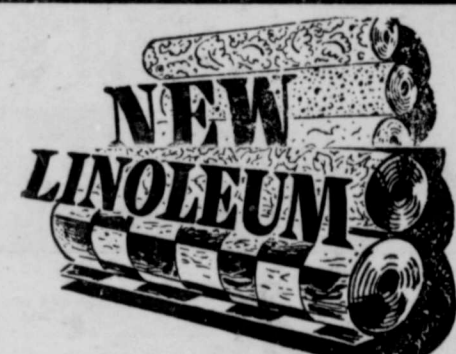

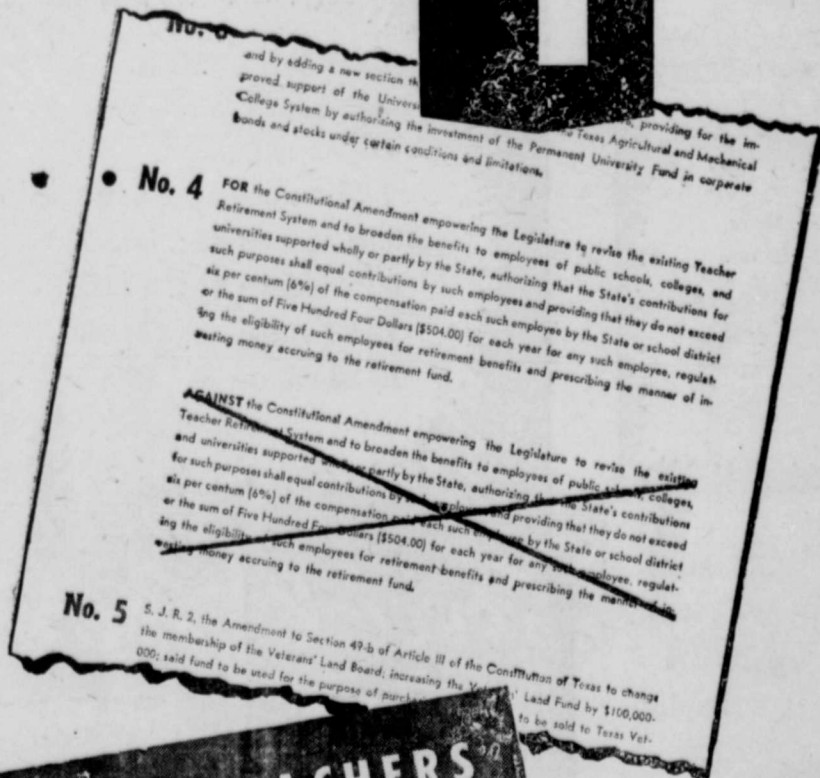
