Tydings Hints New Line Of Probe Inquiry

Senator Denies Any McCarthy Tie In Committee Work

WASHINGTON, April 17. (AP)—Sen. Tydings (D-Md.) talked guardedly today of a new line of inquiry in the Senate Communist investigation.

"This has nothing to do with any information Sen. McCarthy has given us," said Tydings, chairman of the Senate foreign relations subcommittee which is looking into McCarthy's charges of communism in the state department.

McCarthy, Wisconsin Republican, has been outlining his accusations to the inquiry committee. The committee so far has mostly just listened.

"Now we are doing some investigative work on our own hook," Tydings told a reporter.

He declined to amplify that statement, but indicated there might be some discussion of the matter at a closed meeting of the committee today.

Yesterday the committee's chief counsel, Edward P. Morgan, served former Communist Louis F. Budenz with a subpoena. Budenz, one-time managing editor of the Communist newspaper, Daily Worker, is scheduled to testify at a public hearing Thursday.

SKUNK, OFFICER RUN DEAD HEAT

SAN ANTONIO, April 17. (AP)—Police Officer George Richmond apparently ran a dead heat with a skunk here early today—but in opposite directions.

Answering a disturbance call at a residence, Officer Richmond found something brush against his trousers as he knocked on the door.

He flashed his light and there was the skunk. He said he didn't know which got off the gallery first, himself or the skunk.

"God Is With Me," Says Doomed Man After Sentencing

PALO PINTO, April 17. (AP)—Dan White smiled up at District Judge Ernest Belcher today as he was told he will die early April 23 in the electric chair at the state penitentiary.

"God is with me," said the 45-year-old former Vernon man. "Why should I be afraid of man?"

White was convicted by a district court jury here April 17, 1949, as an accomplice in the slaying at Stephenville Jan. 29, 1949, of Crockett Ross, a service station operator.

Formal sentencing came today after two unsuccessful appeals to higher courts.

White's nephew, Robert Bagwell, was accused of the actual shooting and was sentenced in February, 1949, at Stephenville, to life imprisonment. The state claimed White sat in a car while Bagwell shot Ross in the course of robbing the station.

White appealed to the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin, which twice affirmed the death sentence recommended by the district court jury here which convicted him. The case was brought here on change of venue.

CHARGED WITH LYING

Pick Jury In Trial Of Johnny Maragon

WASHINGTON, April 17. (AP)—John Maragon, who used to run in and out of the White House as a friend of Presidential Aide Harry Vaughan, went on trial today on charges of lying to a Senate investigating committee.

The process of picking a jury got under way shortly after 9 o'clock in the court of the U. S. District Judge Jennings Bailey. The 35-year-old Maragon was flanked by three lawyers. He had nothing to say to reporters about what he has been doing the last few months while he has been on bail.

A grand jury accused Maragon last January of lying four times about business connections and financial affairs. Maragon was a witness at the Senate inquiry into activities of five percenters—men who represent others in dealings with the government for a cut that usually amounts to five per cent.

The talkative little Greek-American, who used to shine shoes in Kansas City and then became a man about town in Washington, pleaded not guilty. If convicted, he could be jailed for 2 to 10 years on each count of the indictment—a maximum of 40.

First to today's proceedings were such preliminaries as selecting judge and jury. Assistant U. S. Atty. Charles B. Murray, in charge of the case for the government, said

the prosecution would need about a week. Irvin Goldstein, Maragon's lawyer, said the defense also would require a week.

It was last July 26 that Maragon gave the Senate investigating committee the testimony—behind closed doors—that now has him in trouble. Later on he appeared at a public hearing and refused to answer questions after question on grounds he might incriminate himself.

But in the interval, other witnesses had told stories that varied widely from Maragon's account of personal affairs and business dealings with the government.

It developed, among other things, that Vaughan had been given seven deep freezes for himself and friends by the Albert Valley Petroleum Co. of Chicago, which had Maragon on the pay roll.

The investigators rebuked Vaughan later in a report. President Truman stood by his military aide and kept him on the job.

McGRATH URGES CRACKDOWN

Gamblers Infiltrate Into All Sports

WASHINGTON, April 17. (AP)—Atty. Gen. McGrath said today that big time gamblers apparently have moved into amateur and professional sports with large scale operations.

He urged that Congress crack down on the organized gamblers by forbidding the sending of gambling information across state lines.

McGrath testified before a Senate commerce subcommittee. The group is considering a bill to ban interstate transmission of gambling information.

Favoring the measure, McGrath said Congress could give horse race bookmakers a "knockout blow" by denying them the use of telephone, telegraph, and radio information needed in their operations.

Chairman McFarland (D-Ariz.) asked McGrath if the Justice Department has any evidence of a "national crime syndicate."

McGrath replied: "I could not with honesty say that we know there is any great syndicate presiding over by any great car."

He added that this was "not to deny" there are "big business operations" in individual cities.

The criticism was in a formal announcement that the U. S. will delay its reply to Moscow's note until all possible information about the incident can be collected and "a true fact" determined by calm and thorough appraisal.

The statement said: "This government believes that this careful approach is the only proper one in an important and delicate matter of international relations and regrets that the Soviet Government has failed to show equal calmness and restraint."

Applaud HST For Veto Of Kerr Gas Bill

WASHINGTON, April 17. (AP)—An applauding wing of his party prepared a champion-of-the-people campaign role for President Truman today on the strength of his veto of the Kerr natural gas bill.

Mr. Truman killed the bill Saturday in an action critics labeled as "purely political" and supporters said was "sound and timely."

The measure would have prevented the Federal Power Commission from regulating the sales of natural gas by so-called independents, who produce 80 per cent of the product but don't operate pipelines.

Congress approved the bill despite charges by opponents that it would pave the way for an increase in the price of gas to consumers.

While its proponents denied this vigorously, Mr. Truman made clear that was on his mind when he sent the bill back to Congress labeled "not in the public interest."

Unless the independents are subject to federal regulation, the President said, "there is a clear possibility that competition will not be effective, at least in some cases, in holding prices to reasonable levels."

Senator Douglas (D-Ill.), one of the measure's chief opponents, put into words the thought of a 9-m-m Democrat who wants Mr. Truman to array himself as a champion of the little fellow in this year's campaign for control of Congress.

Said Douglas: "God bless the President of the United States. He has once again shown he is the true defender of the common people."

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Free-For-All Develops On Television Show

When Gen. Hurley Blasts Yalta Conference

NEW YORK, April 17. (AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt's Sunday television show turned into a verbal free-for-all when Maj. Gen. Patrick J. Hurley attacked the late President's Yalta Conference.

The general, a wartime and post-war ambassador to China and a President Hoover's secretary of war, blasted "a secret agreement at Yalta" for the Chinese Communist sweep.

His charge and further arguments drew heated replies from his hostess, who was backed up by the three other guests on the NBC forum program.

These were: Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.), of the Senate Inter-State and Foreign Commerce Committee.

Dr. John Kim Fairbank, head of the Harvard School of Chinese

Studies.

Richard Lauterbach, newspaper man and foreign correspondent.

The old soldier and diplomat, asked by Mrs. Roosevelt to lead off a discussion of China, told of his missions to Russia and China for FDR.

Then warning up, he told her that "at Yalta your diplomats surrendered all the principles of the Atlantic Charter."

"Are you differentiating between yours and Mrs. Roosevelt's?" cut in Lauterbach.

"You can bet your bottom dollar that I don't give up," said the general. "I would not have surrendered every principle for which America said she was fighting."

Hurley then charged that Yalta violated China's integrity by giving Port Arthur back to Russia as a naval base.

"I am very much interested in that," Mrs. Roosevelt replied, "but if you were going to restore to Russia what she had before, that was giving her anything new. That was simply giving back to her what Japan had taken away."

"I don't think that was anything peculiar... that was more or less what one would expect, isn't it?" Dr. Fairbank cut in and told the group to "stop fighting the 1st war."

Lauterbach said the key to China is her poverty, and Magnuson told Hurley he didn't know Chinese history.

But Hurley returned to the attack when Mrs. Roosevelt said "we wanted Russia's help very badly... you might not do it today, but you certainly had every reason to do it then."

"We gave it to them because we were in favor of Communism," the

general returned.

"Who was in favor of Communism?" Magnuson demanded.

"Mr. Hiss and the crowd at Yalta," said the general.

"That's not true," shot back Mrs. Roosevelt. "We know x x x what were the main things we aimed at in Yalta, and for you to ignore it, sir, is extraordinary."

"I just don't understand how you can ignore it."

Lauterbach broke in to ask Hurley if he had read the late Secretary of State Edward Stettinius' book on Yalta.

"All the books written now are alike," declared the general.

The argument was still going full blast when Mrs. Roosevelt had to call time. Hurley was predicting that "national imperialism" would

lose the U. S. the rest of Asia.

Vatican Denies Signing Pact With Poland

VATICAN CITY, April 17. (AP)—The Vatican press office denied today that the Roman Catholic hierarchy of Poland has signed an agreement with the Polish Communist government Warsaw announced to the news.

Vatican sources pointed out that the accord was announced after Poland's leading Catholic prelate, Adam Stefan Cardinal Sapieha, had left the country. The cardinal, now in Rome, declined comment on reports of a Polish church-state accord.

A high Vatican source said if such a pact had been promulgated, it would indicate that the Polish government had laid down a "way of death" for the church there.

This source questioned whether Catholic bishops would sign such a pact.

The Polish Government announcement said three bishops had signed an accord in which religious freedom in Poland was promised in return for a church pledge to fight enemies of the Warsaw regime.

The controlled Polish news agency said the agreement was signed by the suffragan bishop of Warsaw, Zygmunt Chodkowski, as secretary of the council of bishops, and two other bishops.

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Air, Ground Attacks Hit Red Invaders

Toehold Gained After 6 Earlier Ill-Fated Tries

TAIPEI, Formosa, April 17.

—A Communist invasion force gained a precarious toehold on the north coast at Hainan Island today after suffering heavy losses at sea, official Chinese Nationalist dispatches reported tonight.

Most of the invaders were killed, but up to a late hour tonight fighting was in progress west of the island capital of Hoihow, the dispatches stated.

The Reds were said to be under heavy attack by Nationalist warplanes and ground forces.

The Reds attempted the 10-mile overwater crossing from the mainland last night in more than 200 junks, the accounts said.

More than half of these were declared to have been sunk during the night by Nationalist warships, but some succeeded in landing on the land this morning.

The Communists have made a half-dozen previous small attempts to invade Hainan, but have failed each time. They have vowed to take the Nationalist stronghold this year, and all reports have depicted them as preparing for a major effort.

Mention of 200 junks suggests that the current attempt might be the start of the big push, but details were lacking.

The Red staging area is the Luchow Peninsula, which juts out from the south coast.

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Georgia Unit System Upheld By High Court

WASHINGTON, April 17. (AP)—Georgia's hotly disputed county unit election system weathered a Supreme Court test today.

The tribunal affirmed a lower court decision which had the effect of upholding the legality of the Georgia system.

The Supreme Court's action was announced in an unsigned opinion. The vote was 7-2.

Justice Douglas wrote a dissenting opinion with Justice Black concurring.

That meant the majority was composed of Chief Justice Vinson and Associate Justices Reed, Frankfurter, Jackson, Burton, Clark and Minton.

Critics of the system call it a unique protector of rural political power in Georgia and an important factor in the entrenched forces of Gov. Herman Talmadge.

Cardin succeeds C. E. Kiser, who resigned recently to enter the race for sheriff.

T-B Patch Tests Start In Local Schools Today

Patch tests for tuberculosis infections are to be started in local schools today under sponsorship of the Howard county Tuberculosis association.

Tests will be given in all public schools. Lorenz Brooks, executive secretary of the organization, announced and appealed for cooperation of all parents in permitting children to take the test.

"It is painless and harmless, but is an accurate indication of tuberculosis infection," Miss Brooks said. The tuberculosis association voted to sponsor the patch tests at its annual meeting last Wednesday.

LOOK TO FOREIGN MARKETS

Domestic Iron Ore Is Near Depletion

WASHINGTON, April 17. (AP)—Secretary of Interior Chapman said today the steel industry must look to foreign raw material sources because domestic iron ore supplies are approaching depletion.

He raised the possibility of restricted steel production within the "foreseeable future" as result of dwindling ore sources.

That is the foremost problem facing the steel industry right now, the secretary said.

Chapman was lead-off witness in an investigation of the steel industry by a judiciary subcommittee inquiring into monopoly in business.

Chapman said an increase of at least three per cent a year in steel production is necessary to keep up with the nation's rate of economic growth.

Chapman said ore production in the Upper Great Lakes region will be reduced more than half within the next 15 years at the present rate of steel production.

He told the committee five companies control the bulk of the Lake Superior iron ore reserves, and three-fifths of the nation's steel producing capacities.

"The decisions of these leading firms have significant impact on output and price of steel," he said. "There is little opportunity at the present time for offsetting influence by smaller or new firms."

This Hardly Time To Rock Board Of Our International Policies

There is a shadow over America, and that shadow is Russia. Never before has any potential enemy possessed the military means to deal, in a single, swift surprise attack a possible devastating blow. The price of survival is a strong America. We must arm as strongly as possible within the limits of our national economy.

This is the gist of a talk by W. Stuart Symington at Macon, Ga., this week. He is retiring as secretary of Air soon to become chairman of the National Security Resources Board.

Against this threat to our existence the nation must present a solid front. That thoughtful, patriotic Americans are willing to lay party politics aside when it comes to meeting the menace was proved when two leading Republicans spoke out at the same time Symington was sounding his warning.

One of these was Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York. At Princeton University the two-time GOP nominee for president called on President Truman to

give the Republican Party a real chance to guide the current cold war, and then chided his fellow Republicans for trying to rock the boat, in the exact phrasing of an AP dispatch.

The other was Senator Ives (R-NY), who asked the GOP Policy Committee to take steps to restore the bipartisan foreign policy to its former effectiveness. Senator Taft, the chairman, said his group was now discussing the issuance of a new statement on this, which probably would be ready next week.

These are encouraging developments, following as they do the naming of two Republicans (Dulles and Cooper) as State Department advisers.

Recent savage and intemperate attacks on the State Department, have shocked a great many Americans because they indicated a determination on the part of isolationists to wreck the bipartisan policy at all costs. This is no time, as Governor Dewey says, to rock the boat. The threat mentioned by Secretary Symington is real, and it is just beyond the horizon.

Bradley Sees Teamwork As More Vital Than Individual Balance

For an old Army man, the admission must have been painful; but General Omar Bradley is a brave and honest man.

The chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff asserted in a speech at Chicago Saturday that the United States may have to abandon its concept of a balanced defense to meet the defense needs of the North Atlantic area.

In this prospective shift of emphasis among the three services, the Army, the Navy and Air Force, the man who commanded the biggest field army in American history admitted.

General Bradley's thinking along this line, he said, stemmed from a suggestion made by the spokesmen of a small nation, which he did not identify, at the recent meeting of Atlantic Pact defense chiefs in The Hague. This suggestion involved the possible need of a central body within the framework of the Atlantic Treaty, to decide the "rate and extent" by which the armed forces of member nations must be expanded.

This, he went on, could lead to "specialization," by which each member nation would be called on to supply air-ground-sea forces in proportions that would conflict with America's concept of a balanced defense. If adopted, this new scheme "might require from us a greater Air Force, or a greater Navy, than we ourselves might be willing to provide."

Does this prospect disturb General Bradley? Not at all. It would mean the giving up of a small bit of sovereignty, of course.

"But when I think that national pride and sovereignty are often paid for with the life and blood of soldiers, I feel that we must accept the more difficult alternative which comes with this joining of hands in collective defense."

Spoken like the wise, patriotic and good man he is.

But just wait until some of his old Army buddies hear about this!

National Doughnut Week Back And Its History Is Reviewed

NEW YORK, (U)—NATIONAL DOUGHNUT WEEK started Saturday.

And, naturally, millions of thoughtful Americans are going around saying to one another:

"Good old National Doughnut Week has rolled around again, my, isn't it good to have it back?"

But only a handful of these grateful citizens are aware of the deep historical significance behind National Doughnut Week—or just how it came about.

WELL, IT WAS BORN 13 YEARS AGO in the agile brain of Bert Nevins, a balding, middle-aged publicity man.

"It was the first of the food weeks," Bert recalled modestly. "Before that there were just things like Mother's Day, Arbor Day, the Fourth of July and National Baby Week."

Now, of course, there are weeks for all sorts of goodies—such as National Hot Tea Week and National Cold Tea Week, Na-

tional Kraut and Frankfurter Week, National Pickle Week, National Honey Week and also National Honey for Breakfast Week.

THE PIONEERING IDEA OF SETTING a week apart for the nation to pause and ponder the blessings of the doughnut grew out of a stern reality in the industry—sales hit a peak at Halloween, slumped in the spring.

"Picking the right time was very important," said Nevins. "You don't want to have a food week during a period when there are holidays, as people have other things on their mind."

"We couldn't take the week before Easter because bakers are pushing hot cross buns then. So we settled for a week in April after Easter."

And in the baker's dozen years since the doughnut muscled itself a place in the national calendar, sales have quadrupled. The \$200 million a year industry expects to sell 12 billion doughnuts in 1950.

Politicos Are Wonderful Folks, Always Say What You Expect

WASHINGTON. — THERE'S SOMETHING wonderful about politicians. They always say what you'd expect them to say.

You can't imagine President Truman, who's been quite a politician for years, saying about his own Democratic party: "Folks, we've made a mess of things. It's about time you run us out. Elect Republicans. They can do better."

And you can't imagine Guy G. Gabrielson, chairman of the Republican National Committee, confiding to the public:

"As a party, folks, we Republicans are all washed up. We're behind the times. The Democrats can do more and think better. Elect them."

That won't happen, of course. But something else is going to happen. The voters will elect a new Congress this fall.

SOME MEMBERS OF CONGRESS, in fact, have been campaigning for re-election for months. Election time is getting closer.

And Mr. Truman is going to get in there and pitch for his boys. Next month he starts a cross-country trip.

This week Mr. Truman, who already has taken some sharp digs at Republicans, said in effect: "Those Republicans, ugh."

On his trip, he said, he expects to take credit for the nation's present prosperity. That seemed to be his way of saying he'd brush off the Republicans' part in the government and give them credit for nothing, except maybe a certain nuisance value.

In passing, he took a swipe at Senator Taft, Ohio Republican, who has been campaigning for re-election for months.

MR. TRUMAN TOLD A NEWS CON-

ference that some recent Taft statements, critical of Mr. Truman, can be attributed to the fact that Taft is fusing again.

If Mr. Truman meant all this to be a needle to make the Republicans jump, he got results.

Up popped Gabrielson with a statement from the Republican side. What Gabrielson had to say wasn't distinguished by its newness since other Republicans have said the same things at other times.

But Gabrielson at least stuffed the Republicans views into one sock which he flung at Mr. Truman with great indignation.

He accused the Truman Democrats of cold war in Asia. Republicans have been shouting that for weeks.

He accused the Truman Democrats of fostering socialism, and imposing the biggest national debt and highest taxes in peacetime history on the country.

"THE AMERICAN PEOPLE," Gabrielson said, "will not again be beguiled by extravagant promises which are never kept, and which were never meant to be kept."

"Despite the President's amnesia, but one conclusion remains: During his five years in office, . . . Mr. Truman has failed miserably."

Legislative Log Jam Threatening President's "Fair Deal" Program

WASHINGTON. — With Congress facing an early, election-year adjournment, one of the worst legislative log jams in history is piling up in the Senate and threatening to stall the Truman Fair Deal program.

Despite this mountain of unfinished work, however, Democratic leaders have found time to take up two bills completely contrary to the fair deal program—the Kerr Natural Gas Bill and the basic point bill, driving loopholes in the antitrust laws.

As a result, some Republicans are thinking of reversing the tables on Truman and making a whistle-stop campaign of their own. They would use Truman's own speeches against the 80th Congress to attack the 81st Congress.

Disregarding the politics, however, here is the legislative outlook:

Congress has less than four months to go before adjourning for the election campaign. Even now, senators and congressmen are slipping away to make campaign speeches.

Nevertheless, the Senate hasn't even called up the civil rights bills, the appropriation bills, or tackled the complicated task of liberalizing the federal security laws to include 12 million new workers and increase the unemployment benefits.

The Brannan Farm Plan to support farm income and get rid of unmarketable food stocks, is bogged down in the Senate Agriculture Committee, while Herbert Hoover's 21 plans to streamline the federal government are getting nowhere fast.

EASTERN VACATION

This still leaves the President's controversial health insurance program, the military aid program, and federal aid to education. The President also promised statehood to Hawaii and Alaska, but the hearings haven't even started in the Senate.

Congress must also decide whether to continue rent controls and renew the draft, to say nothing of revising the tax structure and abolishing excise taxes. Another tough one is the President's point 4 program to give technical assistance to backward areas.

The blunt truth is Congress has a great deal to do, and little time to do it in. Meanwhile, the House, taking a leaf from the President's Key West book, took a leisurely Easter vacation, while both houses took time to push two bills, aiding the natural gas companies and the big monopolies.

FORGOT HIS FRIEND

There was only one sour note when freshman Sen. Herbert Lehman of New York took the floor to eulogize the late Franklin D. Roosevelt on the fifth anniversary of his death. Ironically, the sour note was struck by a Democrat who rode FDR's coattails to keep his seat in the Senate.

Republicans who were in the chamber—including Langer of North Dakota, Hendrickson of New Jersey, Cordon of Oregon, Schoepfel and Darby of Kansas—remained in their seats as Lehman began his memorial speech.

So did the Democrats, even crochety Kenneth McKellar of Tennessee, who fought FDR furiously on most issues.

The only man who walked out, rather than listen to a few kind words spoken for the man who once saved him from defeat, was

Elmer Thomas of Oklahoma.

In 1933 when Thomas faced a desperate election battle in the Democratic primary, Franklin Roosevelt detoured his train through Oklahoma in answer to frantic pleas from Thomas, let the worried senator stand beside him on the back platform, and even made a statement about the fine work of "my friend" Elmer.

But when this same President's death was memorialized in the Senate last week, his "friend" Elmer walked out.

IF CHILDREN COULD LEAD

While the nation's capital is busy giving Europe the impression that we are torn by dissension and harboring spies behind every door, the American Legion has been showing Europe the best side of the U.S.A.

Cain Irked When Douglas Is Called Impressive Freshman

WASHINGTON. — In his distaste against a Time reporter, Senator Cain of Washington let out a revealing glimpse of what was eating him. This was Time's reference to an even newer freshman than Cain, Sen. Paul Douglas of Illinois, as "the most impressive freshman in years."

By a coincidence, Senator Cain was interrupting, for the purposes of his speech, a Douglas fight of the precise kind that has earned him universal esteem.

Sensor Douglas, an avowed, practicing liberal, takes exception to the so-called economic Congress rolling out the usual pork-barrel bill for rivers and harbors. One wit has described the omnibus legislation as a beauty for a visiting citizen to watch his money being spent in a hurry.

It contains something for everybody. The House, loudest screamers about spending, got it up to \$1,100,000,000. The Senate, which recently tried to pass a resolution compelling President Truman to cut the budget, added about 500 million. Another 450-million for the Columbia Valley basin has been added from the floor. This brings the total to a mere two billion.

Sensor Douglas expects to drive home from the floor the instructive political lesson imbedded in the 80 assorted little projects thrown into the pot by the Senate. These are scattered along the Atlantic Coast and upper Mississippi. Even the noncollege graduate whom Senator Cain objects to have covering the deliberations of the mighty Senate can easily see that it makes the proposition more attractive to more Senators, especially in an election year.

What distinguishes Senator Douglas in these matters is that he does not content himself with the easy road of a hollow-thought speech. As usual, he has made a painstaking study of the bill so that he can really debate it on its merits. Again as usual, he has a constructive

alternative to offer. This time it is one-half the cost of the levees in the bill should be borne by real property owners who benefit from it.

This good-tempered but firm insistence upon the Senate holding a mirror up to itself is largely what leads Capitol veterans to compare Douglas to the old giants, Senator Norris of Nebraska especially. Douglas possesses the same sense of national interest which marked the old sons of the wild jackass and won them a press which was the despair of the Republican majority.

Sensor Cain, a veteran himself, has solemnly declared that the working Illinoisan "suffers physically and perhaps continuously as a result of his war service."

He treated the Senate, however, to a review of Douglas's socialist past, recalling to them that he wrote a book, "The Coming of a New Party," which was dedicated to Norman Thomas. Punditism seems a rather curious notion that Time is similarly suspect, he suggested that book might be the reason for its elevation of Senator Douglas as compared to its expendable reference to himself.

Sensors are invariably sensitive to comparison with one another. Years ago a rollicking press-gallery poll about their relative standing created an uproar and the senator voted worst was sure it injured his campaign for re-election. By common consent this seemed rather unsporting and such polls have not since been taken.

Sensor Douglas is accustomed to having his books tossed in his teeth. If it is any comfort to Senator Cain, "The Coming of a New Party" and his fighting liberalism for years got him a critical press far worse than Cain's. Senator Douglas is in fact a little worried lest he be seduced by praise though admittedly it falls sweetly on his ears, having been so long deferred.

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Drillstem Test Produces 2,000 Barrels Of Oil

Amerada No. 1 Cora Weathers, south offset to the operator's south-east Borden discovery, No. 1 Von Roeder, flowed at the rate of about 2,000 barrels per day on a drillstem test Sunday.

The test was in the top of the Canyon from 6,520-50 through five-eighths inch bottomhole choke. The first hour the flow was gauged at 98.61 of 40.3 gravity oil, and the second hour 88 barrels. The average for the two hours was 93 barrels. Gas-oil ratio was 633-1 and there was no formation water.

Operators were to run casing to top of the Canyon at 6,820 (a datum minus of 4,455 feet but 12 feet high to the No. 1 Von Roeder which is producing from the lower Canyon), and will complete. This venture, located 1,958 feet from the west and 666 from the north lines of section 94-25, H&TC, is eight miles southwest of the Sharon Ridge Canyon pool of Scurry county.

Three-quarters of a mile north-east of the discovery in the Rebecke (North Vincent) pool, C. H. Sweet No. 1 McNeill drilled below 6,620 feet in shale. Top of the Canyon is in prospect within

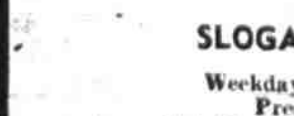


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Baltic Hunt For Aircraft Is Abandoned

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, April 17. (AP) — The big aerial search for the U. S. Navy patrol bomber which disappeared mysteriously over the Baltic sea with 10 men aboard was abandoned today.

The only possible clue to the fate of the plane, last heard from a week ago, last Saturday at the same time the Russians said their fighters exchanged shots with an American bomber over Latvia, was a yellow life raft found yesterday floating in the sea.

The life raft, its food containers empty, was found by the little British freighter Beechland about 45 miles east of Stockholm, Sweden. The spot is 200 miles north of the Latvian City of Lepaya (Biblu) where the Soviets say their fighters chased off a U. S. bomber.

The Beechland continued on its scheduled course to the Finnish port of Kotka where it is expected to arrive this afternoon. The derelict raft will be flown back to Copenhagen, where U. S. Air Force officials will examine it to determine whether it belonged to the missing Navy "Privateer" PB4Y. Although the Beechland radioed that no note was found on the raft, officials hope it may give up some clue as to what became of the bomber and its men.

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Slaughter Trial Under Lobby Act Gets Underway

WASHINGTON, April 17. (AP) — The trial of former Rep. Roger C. Slaughter on charges of violating the lobbying registration act gets underway today in federal district court.

Frank H. Patton and Nugent Dodge, special assistant attorneys general, told a reporter they have lined up 15 to 18 witnesses in their case against the Kansas City, Mo., Democrat.

Slaughter contends the charges were politically inspired and grew out of a feud between him and President Truman.

After serving in the House since 1942, Slaughter failed to win re-nomination in 1946 after the resident endorsed Enos Artell, his primary opponent. Artell was defeated in the general election by Albert L. Reeves, Jr., Republican.

A grand jury indicted Slaughter on the lobbying charge in November, 1948. The former congressman pleaded innocent, saying he was an employed attorney and therefore not required to register as a lobbyist.

Bricklayers Get First Pension In New Agreement

NEW YORK, April 17. (AP) — The first pension plan ever established by contractors for bricklayers in the U. S. is included in a two-year agreement signed here. It calls for no increase in hourly pay.

The agreement becomes effective next June 1 and will expire May 31, 1952.

A building trades spokesman said yesterday the new pact will maintain the existing wage stabilization pattern.

The spokesman said main provisions of the contract included an unchanged \$3.20 hourly wage for a seven hour day.

The contract also provides for a pension fund to start next Jan. 1. Employers will contribute 10 cents an hour for each bricklayer employed.

King Paul Pledges Greek Government Reform Measures

ATHENS, April 17. (AP) — King Paul pledged today that Greece's new coalition government would carry out broad financial and administrative reforms recommended by American advisors administering U. S. aid here.

In a speech opening the newly-elected parliament, the king repeated the American recommendations for Greek recovery which had served as a guide in forming the new cabinet of Premier Gen. Nicholas Plastiras. The prepared address had been drafted by the new coalition cabinet last night.

Christian Welfare Group To Take Part In Red China Talks

HONG KONG, April 17. (AP) — Chinese Communist officials in Peking today invited representatives of some Christian welfare groups in Red China to take part in famine talks opening Thursday.

There was no indication who was invited, or how many.

The Rev. R. Hall, Anglican bishop of Hong Kong, said this was the first indication that the Communists were considering appeals to the outside world for aid to Red China's famine-stricken millions.

Vice Premier Chen Yun said last week in a broadcast from Peking that 40 million Chinese were hit by the famine. But he said, without explaining how, that the Reds were able to cope with it.

Brownwood Man Is State Wildlife Head

FORT WORTH, April 17. (AP) — Leroy Brown of Brownwood is the new president of the Texas Wildlife Federation.

Brown, and other officers, were named at the conclusion of a two-day session here yesterday.

Other new officers are Dr. red-erick Weston of San Antonio, outgoing president, vice-president; and W. G. Strecker of Brownwood, secretary-treasurer.

The group decided to hold its Texas wildlife rodeo at Brownwood, May 26-28.

They also adopted a revised constitution and by-laws and voted to ask the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission not to end the duck season earlier than Jan. 15, and to discontinue the split season plan used last year.
