## More Candidates Announce To Keep Political Pot Boiling Merrily Along

With the second week in the New Year, the Political Pot continues to simmer along in Dawson County with several new candidates added to the list this week. Practically every office in the county is now represented with at least one candidate.

This week sees nine new names added to the column for various offices, and the first City Candidate to throw his hat in the ring. W. W. Beeman, well known farmer and present County Commissioner announced for County Judge. M. Bennett is seeking re-election to a second term for Sheriff. Eunice Gaines is also asking to be re-elected as County Treasurer. C. E. Spitzer, present County Commissioner for Precinct One, is asking re-election to a second term. C. F. Middleton, well known Dawson County farmer has announced for Commissioner of Precinct Two. Floyd (Shorty) Spencer, young farmer who has resided in the county for many years, is seeking the office of County Commissioner of Precinct Four.

D. M. Campbell, present Justice of the Peace is seeking re-election. Mrs. Granville Wyatt, who is serving the unexpired term of her late husband is asking a return to the office of Public Weigher.

W. L. Marr, present Mayor of Lamesa, is seeking re-election to the post and is the first city candidate to toss his hat in the ring. The City Election will be held the first Tuesday in April, at which time a mayor and two city commissioners will be elected.

## Annual Survey Of County Agent Very Interesting

On January 8, 1940, the County Agent of Dawson County made a report on the 1939 work to the Board of Commissioners. A summary report is listed below:

15 office calls, 811 telephone calls, 8982 miles traveled, 8982 miles on official business.

At 38 different circular letters and 407 personal letters, contributed 117 news stories for publication, held 20 demonstrations attended by 111 farmers, held 42 training meetings attended by 518 farmers, held 105 meetings of other types attended by 3272 farmers and made 279 farm visits to 145 farms.

Assisted in setting up the Dawson County Land Use Planning Committee; assisted landowners in securing a "temporary designation" of the Dawson-Lynn Soil Conservation District; assisted farmers (in an educational capacity) on the R. E. A. Project; held two meetings on the "Landlord-Tenant Relationship" during the year.

Assisted in holding the 4-H Club Boys Fat Stock Show; assisted 4 Dawson Club Boys to show calves at Gall, Big Spring and Lubbock; assisted in holding Dawson County Fair; carried 28 Dawson County Club Boys to District 4-H Club.

Mr. Mullins came to Dawson County more than thirty years ago and settled on a place in the edge of the breaks, along the banks of Tobacco Creek. His home soon became one of the show places of this section, both young and old, have enjoyed many hours of pleasure as a guest on the Mullins place. He enjoyed friends and visitors and all were made to feel at home when they gathered there.

He served Dawson County as one of the early day Tax Assessors at the same time engaging in farming and stock raising.

Surviving Mr. Mullins are the following children: Mrs. Beulah Stone, Ralph and Charlie Mullins, Mrs. Annie Nevill and Mrs. Mary Cary, twenty-six grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

He was born October 23, 1862, and died January 5th, 1940. Funeral services were held at Higginbotham Funeral Home Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock with Rev. E. D. Landreth, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Lamesa, officiating. Interment was made in the Lamesa Cemetery.

## Lamesa Deposits Lead Most Western Towns

## C. W. Lusk, Pioneer Realtor Succumbs Following Attack Of Pneumonia At Home Here

C. W. Lusk, pioneer real estate dealer and landowner of Lamesa, died last Saturday, following a short illness with pneumonia. He had been in failing health for the past several years, but for the pneumonia, would probably have survived for many more years.

Mr. Lusk was born in Georgia, July 17, 1868, and came to Comanche as a lad.

On November 10, 1889, he was married to Miss Nancy E. Arrington, who survives him. Their Golden Wedding Anniversary was celebrated last fall. They lived in Comanche County for twenty-five years, and in 1915 moved to Lamesa where they have resided since.

As long as he was active, Mr. Lusk was engaged in the real estate business in Lamesa, besides owning several farms.

He had been a member of the Methodist Church for more fifty years and was very active in church work.

Besides the widow he is survived by two sons, Carl, of Loop, and Jewel of Abilene; two daughters, Mrs. C. L. Evans of Regina, New Mexico, and Mrs. E. B. Thompson of Booke, Texas.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Methodist Church in Lamesa, in charge of Rev. E. D. Landreth and Rev. E. F. Cole. His son-in-law Rev. Jack Thompson, gave a special tribute as a part of the services. Interment was in the Lamesa Cemetery.

## Lamesa Country Club Adopts New Rules At Meeting

### Plan Grass Greens On Club Golf Course

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Lamesa Country Club Wednesday night, several important changes in the operation of the club were announced.

They agreed to allow non-members to use the golf course, upon payment of \$24.00 each year, \$12 to be paid in now and the remaining \$12.00 to be paid July 1.

It was further agreed that members who reserve the Club House must pay \$1.00 for its use and 10c each for each non-member who attends. The tennis court will be open to non-members upon payment of 25c per hour.

The money taken in from these projects will be spent in needed improvements of the house and grounds, it was stated.

Present plans call for some changes in the golf course, with the hope that grass greens may be installed in the near future.

The directors present also called attention to the by-laws which prohibit the drinking of intoxicants on the grounds, by either members or non-members.

## Increase Shown By Lamesa Post Office In 1939

### Local Office Shows Phenomenal Growth

Postmaster Owen C. Taylor has announced that at the close of business for 1939 Lamesa postal receipts totaled \$29,441 or \$1,222 above the figures at the close of 1938 business.

According to figures tabulated during past seasons receipts have been gaining at the rate of approximately \$1,000 a year, beginning with the year 1937. Receipts jumped from approximately \$22,000 in 1936 to approximately \$27,000 in 1937, a gain of \$5,000 in a year's time.

"As a conservative estimate," said Postmaster Taylor, "we believe our receipts are \$10,000 above those of any other second class office in our district."

## 2-Day Training School Planned On Terracing

Thirty-six farmers of Dawson County attended a two day school of instruction in the use of the Farm Level in the office of the County Agent, Thursday and Friday, January 4 and 5.

Instruction in (1) "Setting-up" a Farm Level, (2) Testing a Farm Level, (3) Making Adjustments of Bubble Tube and Telescope, (4) Determining the fall in a field, (5) Spacing of terraces according to A. A. A. specifications and (6) solution of "Run-off" and erosion problems were given in detail by the county agent.

Instructions in A. A. A. Specifications were given in detail by Mr. Fred A. Reese, Administrative Assistant.

The County Agent was assisted by E. R. Steen, Major F. A. Vestal, E. D. Keathley, R. D. Parker, L. H. Donnell and C. W. Freestone of the Soil Conservation Service in holding both the office meetings and the field work. The school was closed Monday afternoon, January 8, with another field trip with actual field training in establishing terrace lines.

## Farm Home Burns After Explosion

## Deposits Here Top All But Seven Towns In Section

### More Than 2 Million In Lamesa Banks

With most banks over West Texas reporting gains in deposits at the close of 1939 over 1938, an interesting comparison with Lamesa and other West Texas cities, reveals that deposits here are ahead of most West Texas towns. In fact, only seven towns in this area show larger deposits than the Lamesa banks and they are all larger towns.

Amarillo, Lubbock, Abilene, San Angelo, Midland and Big Spring show considerably larger deposits, while Brownwood barely noses Lamesa out for seventh place among West Texas cities.

Lamesa is ahead of such cities as Sweetwater, Odessa, Snyder, Coleman, Colorado City and Stamford. Below is given a few of the well known cities in this area:

## Oil Activity Is At A Standstill

Activity at the new Cedar Lake Oil Pool was practically at a standstill this week, with the exception of the Riley Wildcat, where it is planned to give another acid treatment of 3000 gallons after the well will be shown as expected after shot. 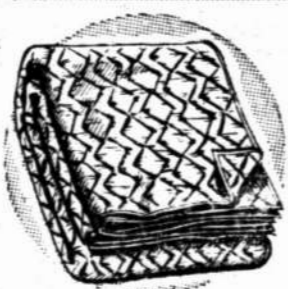

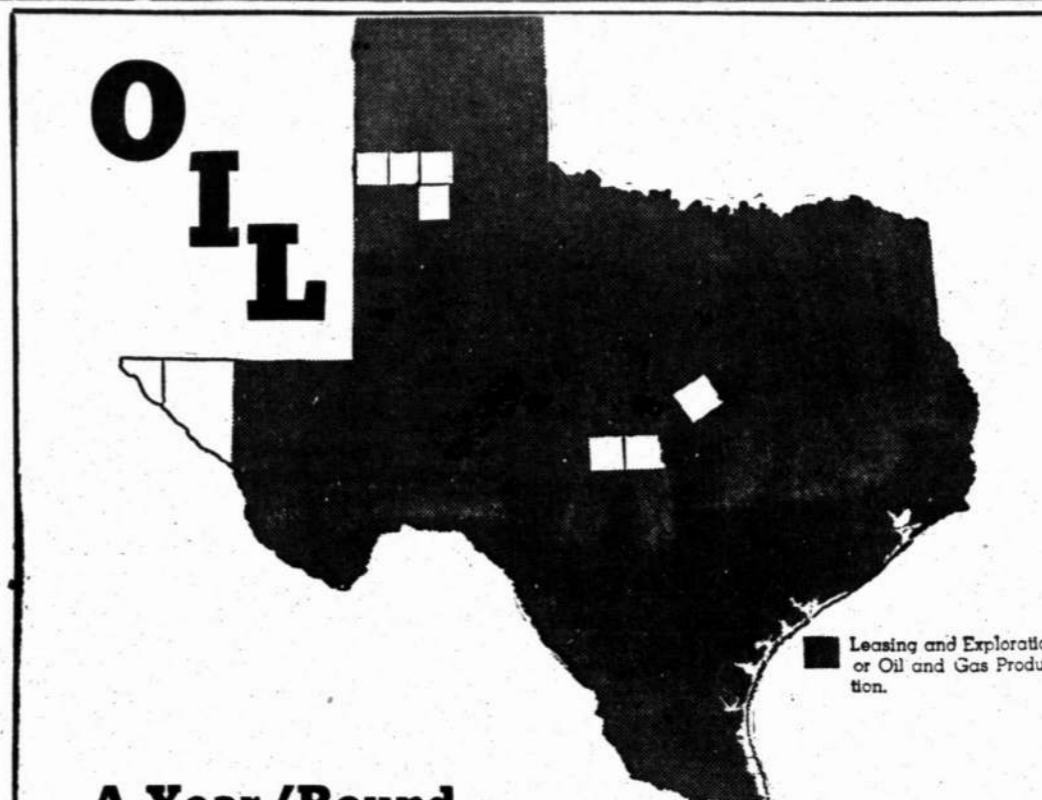

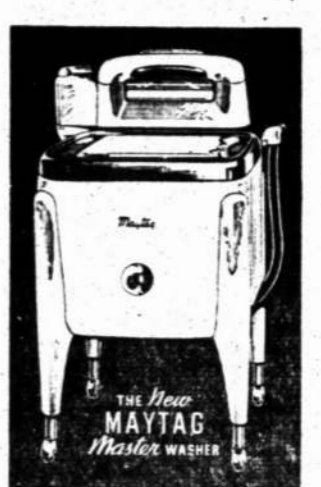

### Dawson Dairymen Join With Midland

At a meeting held in the office of the County Agent, Wednesday afternoon, January 3rd, two Dawson County dairymen, J. M. Peterson and G. E. Peterson, joined the Midland Dairy Herd Improvement Association. The Midland Association was represented by L. A. Brunson, dairyman, and S. A. Debnam, County Agent.

Under the Dairy Herd Improvement, the Petersons will have their herd tested once per month for: (1) Production of whole milk by weight twice per day; (2) production of butterfat by weight and percentage twice per day; (3) total concentrates fed (by weight) twice per day, and (4) receive suggestions in changes of ration and management methods. Through such information these dairymen will be enabled to cut costs of production and eliminate "boarders" from their herds.
