FIRST GOOD RAIN IN SEVEN MONTHS

The depression and uneasiness was somewhat relieved Sunday night when heavy rain fell over most every section of Kimble county. This is the first rainfall of any consequence since the 27th of September last year, several showers have totaled about 4 inches. On that date 2 1/2 inches fell at Junction which is the same as fell Sunday night. Since that time there have been a few showers, the total of which was about 1 1/2 inches.

The precipitation was heaviest in the Roosevelt section of the county. At this place about three inches were reported, with a slight decrease further west, but as far west as Ozona, more than an inch is reported.

East and northeast the rain was lighter, with very little at Mason and only showers in Kerr County. From Junction along the Kerrville road, for about fifteen miles, there was a very good rain. More than an inch fell at the Allen ranch and towards the south it grew lighter with only a shower at 700 Springs, but a fair rain at Rock Springs.

More than an inch fell at Menard Sunday night and another rain of one and one half inches fell Monday night, accompanied by considerable hail.

While the rain could not be considered general, it covered most of the county and has made prospects a great deal brighter and as this is written Tuesday, it looks like more rain is coming.

PECAN GROWERS TO MEET JUNE 16 TO 18

H. G. Lucas, of the Capps Pecan Farm, president of the Texas Pecan Growers Association, announced this morning that June 16, 17 and 18 had been set as the dates for the annual convention of the association which is to be held in Mason.

Mr. Lucas stated that he had received scores of letters inquiring as to the dates of the convention and after writing several of the directors of the association, he decided that June 16, 17 and 18 would be an appropriate time for the meeting.

The committee in charge of the arrangements at Mason are making plans to take care of 500 or more visitors and it is expected that one of the most interesting meetings of the association will be held the third week of June in Mason.

The officers of the association are making out a program for the meeting while a committee of pecan growers in Mason are taking pains to prepare a very interesting series of entertainments for the pecan men from the different sections of the state. The officers are preparing a program for the three-day meet which will be of interest to business men and citizens as well as to the Pecan growers.

RANCHMEN'S RE-UNION AT SONORA EXPERIMENT STATION

According to daily newspaper reports there will be an event of much interest to the ranchmen of this section of the state, held at the Sonora Experiment Station, between Sonora and Rock Springs, on August 10 and 11.

B. Youngblood of College Station, director of the Texas Experiment Stations is arranging this event which he has named the Ranchmen's Re-Union. Lectures on all kinds of ranch problems will be given by state and national government specialists. As we understand, it is open to the general public.

PROBABLY YOU BIT AT THIS ONE TOO

Some weeks ago the animal mentioned below was exhibited here. Many people gladly gave up their hard earned cash to see it. At the time it was here a number of persons stated that they had seen numerous animals of this kind in the Big Bend Country, but they had not learned its name.

Uncle Bill Kellis of the Sterling City News-Record mentions it as follows in a recent issue of his paper.

A strange animal was exhibited here a few weeks ago. It was advertised as a "What Is It." To those who saw it, it appeared to be a freak of nature. Some said it was a cross between a bull dog and a javelin hog; and in the absence of the knowledge of the fact that a hog and a dog won't cross, this opinion had a base, for the head of the animal was not unlike a bull dog, while the body did resemble that of a javalina. But its feet were those of a dog. The black stripes, coarse hair, and general contour of the body would lead one to conclude that it was a hyena.

The animal is a species of hyena, which is almost extinct, but is occasionally found in the mountains of the Big Bend country along the Rio Grande, where this animal was trapped. The theory that the creature is a cross between two distinct species of mammals is regarded by scientists as impossible.

Hyenas are supposed to exist only in Asia and Africa. They are of the dog species. This particular animal in our opinion, is a member of a vanishing family of hyenas that once were numerous in the mountains of Southwest Texas and Northern Mexico. The stripes on the body of the creature, the canine feet, head and general contour of the body, together with the laughing cry which it gives when provoked, leads one to conclude that it is not a freak, but an individual of a separate species.

As it is advertised as a "What Is It," we take the liberty of calling it an American hyena.

PREVENT FLY MENACE BY BURNING CARCASSES

Mr. E. M. Peters, connected with Sub-Station No. 14, between here and Sonoar, was in Rock Springs Monday. Mr. Peters says never before has he seen blow flies so numerous this early in the season as they are right now. These we have now are young flies that are not doing so much damage, but Mr. Peters says the indications are that flies are going to be worse this summer than has been known before in this country. The mild winter, and summer weather that has prevailed where we usually have spring has been conducive to the propagation of blow flies. If something is not done there is going to be considerable loss of stock from screw worms.

The experiment station has been doing splendid work every year in educating ranchmen along lines of ridding the ranches of blow flies. It would be possible to practically exterminate blow flies if concerted war was carried on against them.

Mr. Peters has at least two effective remedies. First—every dead animal of any kind on the ranch should be promptly burned. This will do away with the breeding places for flies. Second—every ranchman should provide several of those fly traps that have been found so effective in catching flies, put them about over the ranch and bait the regularly.

There will not be the best results from neither of these remedies if some of the ranchmen put them into practice and others do not—there needs to be concerted action.—Edwards County Leader.

JUNCTION'S FIRST HEARSE ARRIVED SATURDAY
combination hearse and ambulance, which had been built to order by a Dallas concern for Schreiner-Hodges Co., was driven here last Saturday by Pierce Hoggett who had made the trip to Dallas for it.

The new vehicle was built on a Ford High Speed Truck Chassis, purchased from the local Ford Dealer, Junction Hardware Co., and is not only attractive in appearance but is sturdily constructed according to the latest and most practical designs. The body is finished in grey with spanish leather upholstery.

It is so constructed that the auxiliary bottom of the bed can be removed, as well as the floral box and used for an ambulance. When thus used it is fitted with removable seats for two or more attendants in addition to the one for the patient.

This is the first hearse or ambulance to be brought to Junction and will enable Schreiner-Hodges Co. to better care for their undertaking business as well as handle emergency cases where ambulance service is important.

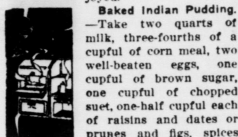

WINTER DESSERTS

This is the season of the year when rich puddings of various kinds are enjoyed.



Baked Indian Pudding.—Take two quarts of milk, three-fourths of a cupful of corn meal, two well-beaten eggs, one cupful of brown sugar, one cupful of chopped suet, one-half cupful each of raisins and dates or prunes and figs, spices to taste and one cupful of sour cream. Scald one quart of the milk with the corn meal, cook ten minutes, then add the rest of the milk, the beaten eggs, sugar and suet and spice, with the raisins and dates or prunes over the top, after adding the sour cream, and stir during the first hour of baking, then let the flour form a crust over the top with the suet. Bake for four hours in a moderate oven.

Steamed Delight.—Take two cupfuls of bread crumbs, one cupful of molasses, one cupful of milk, one-half teaspoonful each of cloves and cinnamon, one teaspoonful of mace, one cupful each of raisins and currants. Steam three hours; serve with canned fruit juice for sauce, or with:

Orange Sauce.—Cream five tablespoonfuls of butter with one-half cupful of sugar. Put into a saucepan over hot water and add one-half cupful of boiling water. Beat in the stiffly beaten whites of three eggs, add the juice of two oranges and one and one-half tablespoonfuls of lemon juice. Continue beating until light and foamy.

Raisin Pie.—Line a pie plate with pastry and fill with the following: To one cupful of raisins add the grated rind and juice of one lemon; beat two egg yolks and mix with one-half cupful of sugar and one cupful of any canned fruit juice, a pinch of salt and two tablespoonfuls of butter. Cover with a crust and bake in a moderate oven forty minutes.

Cheese Salad.—Take two cupfuls of cottage cheese, add one teaspoonful of salt, one-half cupful of raisins, chopped, four tablespoonfuls of cream, make into small flat cakes by molding in a tablespoon. On each cake put a thin slice or cube of jelly and garnish with citron cut into fancy shapes.

WE MIGHT LEARN A LESSON FROM JAPAN

Japan found the opium habit strongly entrenched in Formosa. Japan approached the problem with open mind. Her medical authorities decided that the effort to try and cure the addicts would not be justified by the results. Therefore they determined to let the victims have the drug they craved but to supply it at a reasonable price and under the strictest government supervision. They licensed certain numbers of dealers in opium. Then they licensed the addicts. By holding out the bait of a regular supply at reasonable prices, they induced the addicts to present themselves for a medical examination to determine how much opium their poisoned bodies needed. Having established this fact, the addict received a book entitling him to buy three day's supply at a time, the purchase to be entered both in his and the dealer's book. Sale of opium to non-addicts or to non-licensed addicts was punished with severe sentences. Of course no licenses were issued to new smokers and the excessive profit was taken out of the business.

In 1900, when the system was started, Formosa had 169,064 addicts; today the number has decreased to 38,966. The opium consumed annually has dropped from 440,000 pounds to 60,000 pounds. Seventy per cent of the addicts in 1923 were from fifty to seventy years old; only twelve were between twenty and thirty. The Harrison Narcotics Act is a failure. Why not try the sensible and successful Japanese system of regulation, control and slow eradication?—May Sunset.

We might add that it seems to us that some system similar to this is going to have to be adopted in this country as a means of handling the liquor question. Prohibition is becoming more and more a problem and as time goes on, instead of enforcement conditions growing better they are getting worse. The Courts are being clogged with "boot leg" cases, the government is spending millions and

the different states are adding millions in appropriations for the enforcement of prohibition laws. Atticus Webb is still making long winded speeches and calling in big collections to keep his job in a lucrative class. Billy Mayfield has been sent to the Penitentiary and Rev. Anderson one of the heads of the National Anti-Saloon Organization was sent to the penitentiary for appropriating funds to his own use, and yet boot-leggers are growing more numerous and more and more poson whiskey is being sold every day, much of it by men who in pre-prohibition days never either drank or sold liquor. They are drawn into the game by the presumably large profits and the ease of avoiding punishment when apprehended.

And of course it is not surprising that these men are strong for prohibition. Personally, we are for prohibition and we are wondering how long it will require before prohibition laws can be enforced. The experience of the past few years is discouraging and it seems to the candid observer that we are taking two steps forward and slipping three steps backward at each renewed effort.

We do not claim to be wise enough to state a remedy, but we do believe that good whiskey, made under government supervision, would in a large measure supplant the present condition and that the poisonous concoctions now flowing freely in every nook and corner of the country would not find a very ready sale.

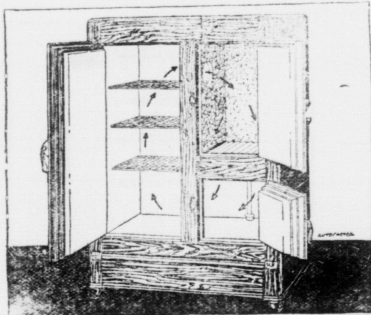
