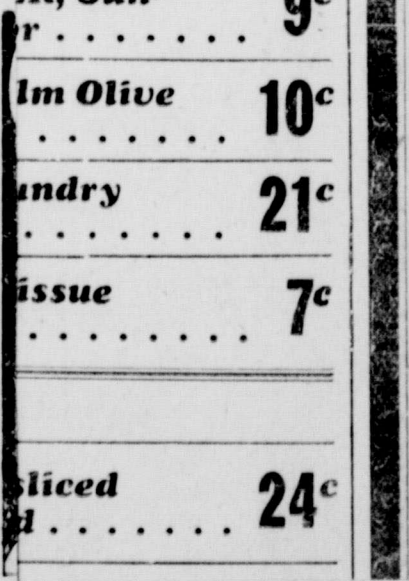

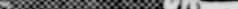

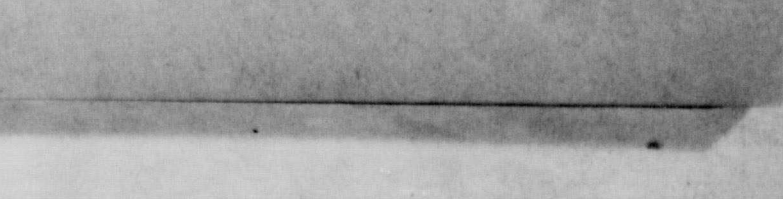

Mavs Upset Jinx To Defeat Loboes

FIRST VICTORY OVER CISCO IN GAME RECORDS

There was a hot time in Eastland Friday night. Band and pep squad, school and town, all were happy as they paraded through the streets. For the first time in the history of the two schools, their Mavericks had risen to great heights and downed the Big Dan Loboes from Cisco by a decisive 28 to 7 score.

the Mavericks launched an almost dizzy-looking aerial attack that put them into the lead and then resorted to an even better pass defense that added scores when the Loboes took to the air.

In the first quarter the Mavs took the ball on the Cisco 41 yard line after an exchange of kicks and on third down Tully passed to Brawnner in the left flat and he ran to the Cisco 18 before Collum brought him down. Caffrey stopped Brawnner after a yard gain and Garrison went in for Hart.

Eastland Scores

Garrison cut through left tackle for two yards and on the next play he stepped back and shot a pass high into the end zone, and Tully jumped to snatch it for the first score of the game. Tully booted one between the uprights to give the Mavs a 7 to 0 lead.

Then Cisco staged a rally that took the ball down to the Eastland 13 yard line. Collum brought the kickoff to Cisco's 33 and a drive and two penalties gave the Loboes a first down on their own 49. Caffrey went around end for an 18-yard gain but the Mavs drew a penalty that gave Cisco a first down on the Eastland 18. Three plays gained only six yards and Garrison batted down Caffrey's pass to Burnham in the end zone.

Taking the ball on the 20 yard line, the Mavs staged a drive that took them to the Cisco 42. Then Tully passed to Garrison who ran on over for a touchdown, but the play was called back because both teams were offside. Garrison dropped back to pass, but slipped on the Eastland 44 and on fourth down his kick was blocked by Burnham and recovered by Burnham.

Second Touchdown

Caffrey picked up three before being nailed by Mackall. Then Tully intercepted Caffrey's pass and galloped 65 yards for a touchdown. His kick was low and the score remained at 13 to 0 for Eastland.

This time the Loboes lost no time in driving down the field. Stansbury, who replaced Collum, took the kickoff and returned 66 yards to the Eastland 31 before being brought down from behind by Butler.

As the second quarter opened Caffrey went around right end for nine yards and Rylee hit left guard for three more and a first down. Then Bawley went around left end for another first down on the Eastland 11.

Loboes Tally

Rylee went through the middle for two and Caffrey made seven at right tackle. Rylee failed to gain. Then Caffrey faked a pass and slanted off right tackle for a touchdown. Bawley caught the boys flat-footed and ran through right tackle for the extra point.

The Mavs missed a chance to score again in the first half when a series of passes and off-tackle shoots took them to a first down on the Loboe five yard marker before the Cisco forward wall held and the Loboes took the ball on downs.

The third frame went scoreless, although the Mavericks brought the ball to the Cisco seven yard marker before the Cisco forward wall held and the Loboes took the ball on downs.

In the early minutes of the final period the Mavs took the ball on their own 39. Hart made five and Tully passed to Taylor for a first down on Cisco's 43. In three plays the Mavs made 16 yards and a first down. On third down Tully jumped to take Garrison's pass for a first down on the Cisco 18.

Eastland Scores Again

Garrison went off right tackle for seven. Merrett and Wendt stopped Tully at center and Garrison slipped through right tackle for a first down on the Loboes five-yard stripe. A drive at the line made one and Tully failed at center. Then Brawn took a pass from Garrison for a touchdown. Garrison ran through right tackle to make it Eastland 21, Cisco 7.

Cisco started a passing attack after Collum had intercepted an Eastland heave to give the Loboes the ball on their own 28. On second down Collum took a pass from Caffrey for 40 yards and the Mavs drew a penalty for roughing to give the Loboes a first down on Eastland's 24.

A pass was incomplete and Caffrey went off right tackle for two.

Then Sikes came out of nowhere and grabbed Caffrey's pass for an 85-yard run for another Eastland score.

Cisco Safety

Trying desperately to score again in the closing minutes, the Loboes, backed against their goal, resorted to another aerial attack, and on second down the Eastland line broke through and smothered Caffrey behind his goal line for a safety to make the final score Eastland 28, Cisco 7.

Caffrey was the outstanding man of the game, but the entire Eastland team was watching for a false move from him and kept him covered. The Graves twins and Littlepage showed up well in the line. Burns and Rylee turned in their best games of the season.

For Eastland it was Tully and Garrison, both triple threat backs. Taylor looked good at end.

The lineup: Cisco—Ends, Burnham and Thomas Graves; tackles, Theron Graves and Burns; guards, Merrett and Wendt; center, Littlepage; quarter, Collum; halves, Caffrey (c) and eBawley, full, Rylee.

Eastland—Ends, Horton and Taylor; tackles, Bagley and Garrett; guards, Shoopman and Frost; center, Butler; quarter, Tully; halves, Hart and Brawnner; full, Mackall.

LETTERS FROM READERS

To the Editor:

The following is a statement of the historic New Testament belief of the Fundamental Baptist church of Cisco. On the great fundamental doctrines of the Bible, Space does not permit us to give our "Articles of Faith" word for word, but this is a digest of it:

1.—We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men supernaturally inspired. By the "Holy Bible" we mean that collection of sixty-six books from Genesis to Revelation, which as originally written does not only contain and convey the word of God, but is the very word of God.

By "inspiration" we mean that the books of the Bible were written by holy men of old, as they were moved by the Holy Spirit. They said exactly what God told them to say in the very words He told them to use.

2.—We believe there is only one living and true God who is infinite, Omnipotent, omniscient, holy and glorious, and who is worthy of all possible honor, and confidence, love and worship. We believe that in the God head there are three persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, who are co-equal, co-eternal, and co-divine. He is of an eternal justice in hell.

3.—That the Holy Spirit is a divine person, equal with God the Father and God the Son and of the same nature. He was active in the creation. That He convicts of sin, of righteousness and the Judgment. That He bears witness to the Truth of the Gospel in preaching and testimony; that He is the agent in the New Birth; that He seals, baptizes, endues, guides, teaches, witnesses, sanctifies, and helps the believer.

4.—We believe there is a personal Devil, Satan who because of pride and ambition fell from his first state and is now the malignant prince of the power of the air, the unholy God of this world. He is man's great tempter, the enemy of God and Christ, the accuser of the Saints and the author of all false religions. He is destined to final defeat at the hands of God's Son, and to the judgment of an eternal justice in hell.

5.—We believe in the Genesis account of creation, and it is to be accepted literally and not allegorically, or figuratively, that man was created directly in God's own image and after His own likeness; that man's creation was not a matter of evolution.

6.—We believe that man was created in innocence under the law of his maker, but by voluntary transgression fell from his sinless and happy state, in consequence, of which all mankind are now sinners, by choice.

7.—We believe that Jesus Christ was begotten of the Holy Ghost in a miraculous manner; born of Mary, a Virgin as no other man was born or can be born of woman, and that He is both the Son of God and the Son of Man.

8.—We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, through the mediatorial offices of the Son of God; that Christ has fully paid the price of redemption as an all sufficient savior.

9.—We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be born again; that this new birth is a new creation in Christ, and is instantaneous and not a process. Of course it is a continuous process, but it is brought about, not by anything man in his power is able to do but solely by the power of the Holy Spirit.

10.—We believe that salvation is made free to all by the gospel; that there is nothing that can prevent the salvation of the greatest as well as the least, sinner except his rejection of the gospel.

11.—We believe that through faith in the Redeemer's blood the sinner is justified in the sight of God, this includes the pardon of his sins, and the gift of eternal life on principles of imputed righteousness.

12.—We believe that Repentance and Faith are solemn, obligations, and also inseparable graces wrought in our souls by the quickening spirit of God; thereby being deeply convicted of sin and our guilt, and danger and helplessness and of the salvation by Christ. We turn to God with unfeigned contrition and confession and supplication for mercy, at the same time receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour.

13.—We believe that a church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers associated by a covenant of faith and fellowship of the gospel, observing the ordinances of Christ: (Baptism and the Lord's Supper) Governed by His laws and exercising the gifts, rights and privileges invested in them by His word that His officers of ordination are pastors, elders and deacons, whose qualifications, claims and duties are clearly defined in the Scriptures; We believe that the true mission of the church is found in the Great Commission Matt 28:19-20: First to make individual disciples; Second to build up the church; Third to teach and instruct as He has commanded; we hold that the local church has the absolute right of self government, free from the interference of any outside power or influence; and that the one and only superintendent is Christ the Holy Spirit, that it is scriptural for new Testament churches to cooperate with each other in contending for the faith and the spread of the gospel, that every church is the sole judge of its method and measure of co-operation.

14.—We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, to show forth in a beautiful emblem our faith in the crucified, buried and risen Saviour. It is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's supper.

The bread and wine in the Lord's supper commemorate the dying love of Christ.

15.—We believe that such only are real believers, who hold out, or endure unto the end, that Providence watches over every real child of God and they are kept by the power of God through faith to eternal salvation.

16.—We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked the saved and lost; that such only as through faith are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus and sanctified by the Spirit are truly righteous in God's sight; while all that continue in impenitence and unbelief are wicked in God's sight; this distinction holds among men both in and after death in the everlasting joy of the saved and the everlasting conscious suffering of the lost in a literal burning hell.

17.—We believe that civil government is of divine appointment for the interest and good of human society; that officers and rulers ought to be prayed for and obeyed except only in things opposed to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ.

18.—We believe that Christ rose bodily the third day according to the Scriptures; that He ascended to the right hand of God that He alone is our "merciful and faithful high priest in things pertaining to God"; that this same Jesus shall so come, as He went away, back to this earth bodily, personally and visibly; that the dead in Christ shall rise first, that the living saints "shall be

changed in a moment at the last trumpet; that God shall give His son the throne of David; and that Christ shall reign a thousand years on earth in righteousness, literally until He hath put all enemies under His feet."—JOHN W. REYNOLDS, Fazio.

Gasser Blows In When Water Sought

CANADIAN, Nov. 3.—Gas experts today were puzzled by the tremendous pressure of an intended water well being drilled at the department of commerce airport here.

The gas "pocket" was struck at 270 feet. Pressure blew tools away from the well and pushed the casing up several feet. Nobody was hurt when the well ran wild.

Gas escaped at the rate of 2,000,000 cubic feet daily, and sprayed nearby land with a fine mist mixed with sand. The roar of the well be heard several hundred feet away. Experts said the gas was inflammable and therefore had to be used as a fuel.
