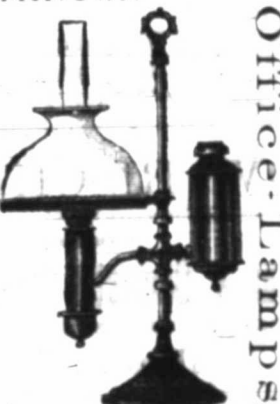

A SHOT IN THE DARK.

ATTEMPTED ASSASSINATION OF GEN. SHELBY.

LEXINGTON, Mo., Aug. 22.

Yesterday rumors were prevalent that Gen. J. O. Shelby had been shot at in the neighborhood of his home, and was seriously wounded. The report created considerable excitement here, but was not generally credited. The only direct word from the general was expected, but has not as yet been received. In information from perfectly reliable sources is to the following effect:

On Wednesday evening, about dark, Gen. Shelby, his little boy and one of his farm hands left Higginville, a station on the L. & St. L. Railway, to drive to the general's residence, a distance of about five miles. When in the neighborhood of the Republican church, a pistol was fired close to the carriage, but in what direction from it could not be definitely determined. The general immediately announced to his companions that he was shot, and called a halt. The night was dark and they were in the woods, and any attempt to pursue the assassin being useless, the party drove on to the general's house, when medical aid was summoned. The wound is a flesh one, and pretty severe. The ball entered on the outside of the leg, a little above the knee, and passed upward through the fleshy part of the thigh to the neighborhood of the hip. The general was sitting in the carriage seat at the time, and the course of the ball would indicate that the shot came directly from the front. Suspicion attaches to no one in particular. While there are some desperate men in the part of the country, it is hard to believe any of them would shoot such a generous-hearted, gallant man as Gen. Shelby. That he has been waylaid and shot is beyond controversy, and the perpetrator, if caught, would be roughly handled by the friends of the general.

Death of the Hon. Jas. G. Scott

This gentleman, died at the Raymond House last night at 10 o'clock after a brief illness, with dyspepsia. He was Judge of the 10th Judicial District and resided at Palestine. His family had no notice of his danger until a late hour yesterday evening.

He arrived in our city last Monday for the purpose of attending to business pending in the Supreme Court.

He was unfortunate in being a victim to the malice of his political opponents. At the last session of the Legislature his enemies proposed articles of impeachment before the Senate, to which he fled his demurrer. Seeing that he was likely to whip them in his defense, the opposition, by an illegal and revolutionary measure, postponed the hearing of his case until the 4th of February, 1874.

This was done, notwithstanding some \$15,000 costs had been incurred by the State in the procuring the attendance of witnesses, and both parties were present asking for a trial.

Finding that he could get no trial, and provision having been made by the Legislature for the publication of the charges against him, without his answer to them, he prepared his answer and had it published at his own expense, in which he triumphantly defended his character from the aspersions of the enemies. He wielded a trenchant pen, and with a just cause, it was an easy matter for him to make a perfect defense.

Naturally a kind and generous man, always the friend of the poor, and a lover of law and order, he was led by his generous impulses to do some acts, that laid him subject to attacks from his enemies. Such acts were the cause of the troubles which brought him to this city.

Let his enemies rejoice; the hand and mind they dreaded are stilled in death. But he died with the harness on, and has left enough with which to justify his record before the world. He was a brave Confederate soldier through the entire war; after the war he accepted the situation and did good service in what he believed to be right, and his differing with many of his fellow-soldiers made the latter years of his life stormy, for he never temporized with what he believed to be error. His true record is one of which his bereaved family may well be proud. May he rest in peace.

Kind friends did all they could to stay the progress of his dread disease and compensate for the absence of his loved ones from home.

Some men are so constituted that they cannot take even a friendly joke in good part, and instead of repaying it in the same light coin, will requite it with contumely and insult. Never banter one of this class, for he will brood over your banter long after you have forgotten it, and it is not prudent to incur any one's enmity for the sake of uttering a smart double entendre or a last repartee. Ridicule, at best, is a perilous weapon. Sarcasm, however, when leveled at social foibles and political evils, is not only legitimate, but commendable. It has shamed down more abuses than were ever abolished by force of logic.

Yankewhewer: "Mr. President, I move that the chair appoint a committee of three, to draw resolutions expressive of the sense of the meeting, and to select delegates to attend the County Convention at San Antonio." Carried unanimously. Col. Simon Pure looking on Mexican severely, who had gone to sleep.

The chair appoints, (from a piece of paper handed him by the Secretary,) Maj. Yankewhewer, Mr. Ploppsy and Dr. Frank as the Committee.

During the absence of the Committee, who had a bottle of their own, the Chair man addresses the meeting:

Concordia Meisones, Conquistadora del Mundo.

When I look on you and think what you might have been and what you are, I weep. Where is Juan Pando, Jose Siu-yuenza, and others from your midst? They are in Huntville. Who sent them there? Los Radicales.

(Cries of "death to the Radicals.") Who are your friends? Sanor Don Colonel Yankewhewer and his friends. They are the men, you are to vote for. (Cheers and enthusiasm.)

Here the Committee returned and reported as follows:

Resolved, That, whereas, the placing of the ballot in the hands of ignorant negroes is calculated to undermine all civil and religious liberty, we hereby declare that our delegates are instructed to vote for Maj. Yankewhewer, for sheriff.

Resolved, That, whereas, the Democracy has always favored free schools and protection to life and property, we instruct our delegates to vote for Dr. Frank for District Clerk.

Resolved, That, whereas, efficient and capable men only should be selected for office, we instruct our delegates to vote for Capt. Cottonsmack for Justice of the Peace of this precinct, &c., &c.

Resolved, That our delegates in the County Convention shall be Maj. Yankewhewer, Col. Simon Pure, Don Jose Maria Malariosa, and four other Mexicans, (who are under the impression there is going to be a fraudage.)

Dr. Frank moved that the resolutions and amendments be carried by acclamation, and that the San Antonio Herald and the Houston Mercury be requested to publish the proceedings.

Adjourned sine die.
