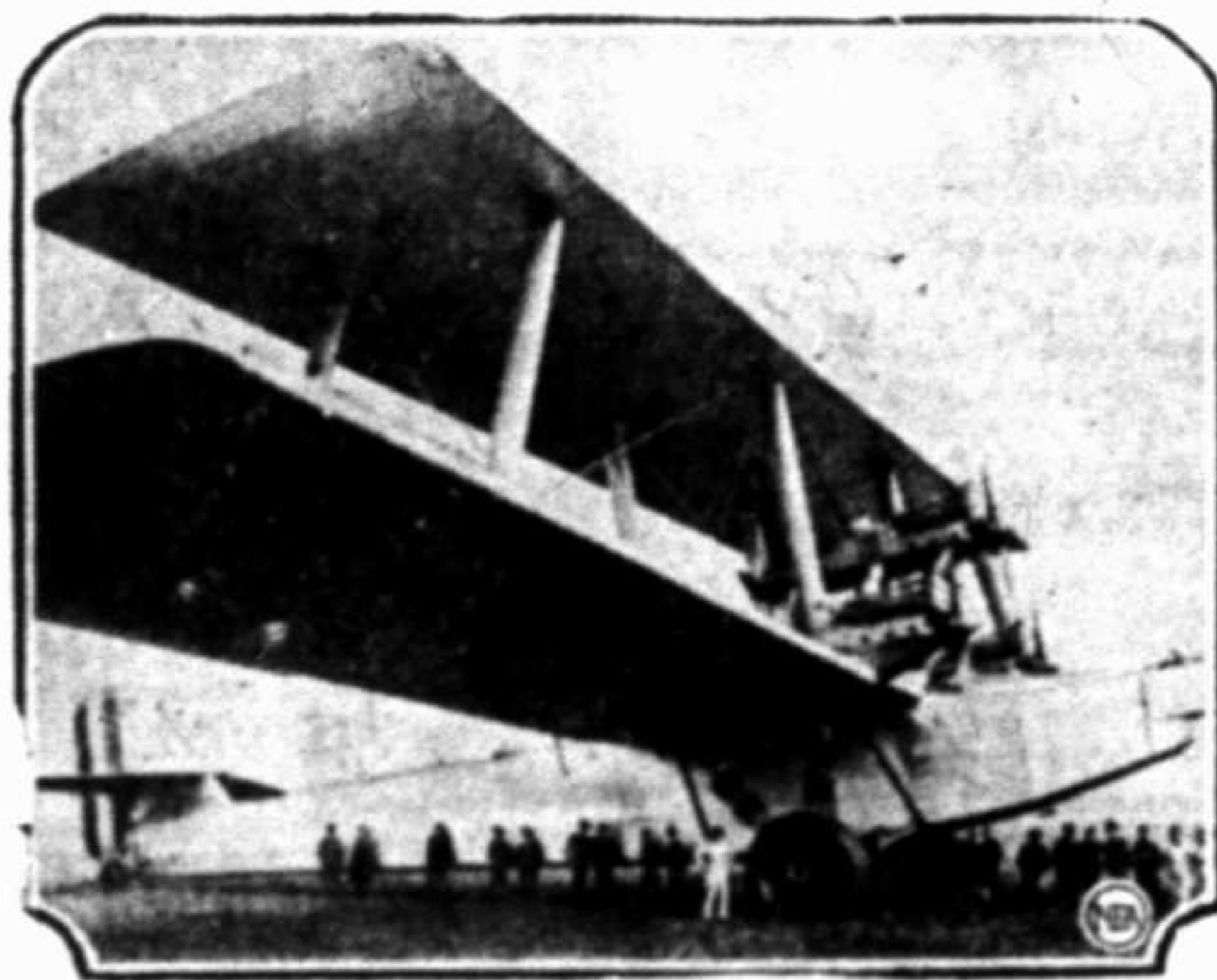

LARGEST LAND PLANE IN THE WORLD

Largest land plane in the world is this sky giant designed and built by Gianni Caproni, noted Italian inventor. The monster craft is pictured below, in Italy, where it soared to new records—a height of 1745 feet with a cargo of 22,000 pounds—and remained in the air for more than an hour and a half. This was claimed to be a new mark for height and duration for planes carrying a load of this weight.

MERCHANTS TO MEET TONIGHT IN BANQUET

ANNUAL BANQUET WILL BE FEATURED BY ADDRESSES

Between 225 and 250 merchants and professional men of Lubbock and the South Plains are to gather around the banquet table tonight in the annual meeting of the Lubbock Retail Merchants' association. The affair is to start at 7 o'clock in the Lubbock hotel.

John E. Phillips, of Fort Worth, will deliver the principal address of the evening, speaking on "The Growing Business." Mr. Phillips is chief manager of The Fair, one of Fort Worth's largest stores. A new 10-story building is now under construction in Fort Worth, being constructed by Jesse H. Jones, of Houston, the first four floors and basement of which will serve as the new home for the store with which Mr. Phillips is connected. He has served as president of the Associated Retail Credit Men of Texas and has been on the program at state conventions of the Retail Merchants' association of Texas a number of times.

Talks Scheduled. Short talks likewise will be made by J. E. R. Chilton, of Dallas, manager of the association there and E. O. Graves, manager of the collection department of the Fort Worth association, and Joe Bailey, of Wichita Falls, credit manager of the association there.

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DEATH SUMMONS J. S. JOHNSON

HEART STROKE ENDS LIFE OF EX-CATTLEMAN

FUNERAL SERVICES TO BE HELD WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON HERE

John Sidney Johnson, 68, retired cattleman and a resident of Lubbock for the past 18 years, died at his home, 2002 Broadway shortly after six o'clock this morning. Mr. Johnson had been in ill health for the past several months, suffering with heart complications to which death was attributed.

Funeral services will be held at the First Presbyterian church on Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock and interment will follow in the Lubbock cemetery. Dr. Jack M. Lewis, pastor of the First Presbyterian church who returned from a meeting in El Paso to officiate, will have charge of the funeral rites. He will be assisted by Rev. H. L. Munger, pastor of the First Methodist church.

Leaves Widow, 3 Children. Mr. Johnson is survived by his widow and five children, in the immediate family. The latter are Mrs. James M. Pryor, the former Miss Julia Johnson, of Amarillo; Mrs. Frank Jones, the former Miss Mary Alice Johnson, of John R. Williams and Bowden Johnson, all of Lubbock. Other surviving relatives are a brother, S. D. Johnson, of Huntville, and two sisters, Mrs. W. P. Irvine, of Mahanok and Mrs. Ada Moorehouse, of Benjamin.

Puneral arrangements, in charge of Rix-Sanders morticians, were not completed early this afternoon but Knight Templar, of which Mr. Johnson was a member, will likely form a guard of honor at interment.

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OAKWOOD MAN TO GO FREE

MOORE EXONERATED OF CHARGES; YOUTH IS BEING HELD

FAIRFIELD, March 25 (AP)—Exonerated by Miss Wilma Jones of any connection in an alleged attempt on her life in a hotel room here last Wednesday, G. S. Moore, Oakwood business man, will be freed of a charge of arson and a charge of attempt to murder. W. V. Ceper, county attorney, announced today.

The charges were filed shortly after Miss Jones was found bound with a lace curtain in a room of Fairfield's only hotel beside a burning bed. After his arrest, Moore added \$100 to a \$250 reward offered by Gov. Dan Moody for the arrest of the woman's assailant.

It became known today that Tommie Dodd, charged jointly with his mother and Miss Jones in connection with the signing of Moore's name to a check, was held in jail at Mexia, Dodd, at whose home in Buffalo Miss Jones lived, was transferred from jail here to the Mexia prison after Miss Jones had made a second statement to officers in which she exonerated Moore.

Sam McCordie, district attorney questioned Dodd last night and indicated Dodd maintained his innocence. Officers said he probably would be returned here today.

Rangers sent here by Gov. Moody left for Buffalo this morning to seek further confirmation of Miss Jones' latest statement.

Road Bill Approved

WASHINGTON, March 25 (AP)—The senate amendment to the \$300,000,000 Dole road bill, increasing from \$15,000 to \$25,000 per mile the amount of Federal aid to states for highway construction, was accepted today by the house. The measure now goes to the president.

LEGGE SCORED IN STATEMENT ON DEBENTURE

SENATOR BORAH TAKES FARM BOARD HEAD TO TASK TODAY

WASHINGTON, March 25. —Chairman Legge, of the farm board was taken to task in the senate today by Senator Borah of Idaho for his statement yesterday contending the export debenture plan was unworkable, the Idahoan remarking that Legge would do better to deal with the farm situation before undertaking to advise congress regarding legislation.

Borah, who has advocated the export debenture principle of farm relief, which is opposed by President Hoover, placed the Legge statement in the congressional record. Alongside it he placed a statement by Alexander Hamilton on the protective tariff, "with apologies to Mr. Hamilton."

Should Do His Work. "I notice Chairman Legge has taken a little time off from his arduous labors," Borah told senate, "to make a statement on the export debenture. I think it would be more satisfactory to the country if Mr. Legge would demonstrate his fitness to deal with the farm situation before he undertakes to advise congress regarding legislation."

MOVE MAY BE MADE TO HALT PRESENT ROW

LEADERS MAY NOT MEET UNTIL SIX MONTHS LATER

(By Associated Press)

LONDON, Mar. 25.—Adjournment of the naval conference for six months as a means of escaping the present impasse was definitely considered at the conference today.

The suggestion for such an adjournment was attributed to foreign Minister Grandi of Italy and was made to Prime Minister MacDonald.

To Iron Out Problem. The idea was that this suspension would give France and Italy a further opportunity of composing their difficulties without prolonging the present virtual suspension of the conference.

The adjournment would contemplate resumption of the conference on October 1, giving an opportunity for a possible agreement before Christmas.

Under Adjudication

This suggestion is now under adjudication, but it was said in authoritative conference circles it would not be made effective until all hope vanished for a five-power agreement at this time.

Whether some sort of a pact would be signed prior to an adjournment was a matter of speculation. The heads of the five delegations planned to meet this afternoon to consider the whole situation including the adjournment suggestion.

During the day assurance that the French delegation was ready to proceed with a view to achieving a five-power pact was given the Americans by the French at a conference at American headquarters.

NEW YORK, March 25.—Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the dirigible Graf Zeppelin, announced today that, with the backing of a group of large industrial and banking concerns, organization of the International Zeppelin Transport company for trans-Atlantic airmail service had been effected.

WESTBROOK IS NEW HEAD OF TEXAS CO-OP

WACO MAN IS SELECTED FOR WORK; WILL START PLANS

(By Associated Press) DALLAS, March 25.—Lawrence Westbrook of Waco will guide the destinies of the Texas Cotton Cooperative Association, formed to assist Federal farm aid to the cotton farmer of Texas.

Announcement of Westbrook's appointment was made yesterday by C. O. Moser, vice-president of the American Cooperative, through which the Texas association will work with the Federal Farm Board.

Moser said all members of Governor Moody's special cotton committee, named to draw up plans for the Texas association, representatives of the Federal Farm Board and American Cotton Cooperative and directors of the Texas Farm Board Cotton Federation had approved the choice.

Westbrook outlined plans for work of the association. District headquarters will soon be set up throughout the state, with temporary state headquarters maintained here and solicitation of members will follow. Every cotton farmer in the state will be eligible for membership.

The opening game of the 1930 baseball season for Lubbock is a little more than a month away, according to the office calendar. On May 3, the curtain will rise on the Lubbock campaign, with the long-haired, bewhiskered clan of ball hawks from the House of David camp in Benton Harbor, Michigan, furnishing the opposition.

Dee Puckett, who is responsible for bringing the famous whistledown aggregation here, has designated Windy Watkins as his chief aid in getting together a strong diamond unit to meet the Lamesa. Watkins plans to scour the immediate South Plains for baseball talent during the next week. The club will likely start working some time next week.

Before another week has passed, something definite will be known concerning the fate of Lubbock's twilight league. Thus far no action has been taken, either by old members of the city league or by prospective new members. A four-club amateur loop for local teams is practically certain and the time for definite action is not far off.

PAYNE GIVES UP COACHING

TECH CAGE AND TRACK MENTOR DECIDES TO ENTER BUSINESS

Resignation of Victor Payne, basketball and track coach of Texas Tech for the past three years, was announced yesterday by Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of the college, bringing to a close a comparatively short but brilliant career on the coaching lines. The Matador mentor last night made known his definite retirement from the coaching game, stating that he had plans to enter business in Abilene.

Payne's resignation is effective July 15. He will remain here until the close of the current school year completing the track season.

No immediate reason was given for Payne's action. President Horn said it was entirely voluntary on the part of the coach. It was further announced that Payne will remain here through the current school year, finishing the track season.

Coming to Tech at the beginning of the 1927 school year in the capacity of basketball and track coach, Payne served his first football season here as a scout. The following two years he took active part in coaching the Matador eleven. His three basketball teams have won the majority of their games, meeting some of the strongest college quintets in the state. During the past season, the Payne-coached Matadors won 12 straight court titles before taking a defeat. In two seasons his track teams have lost but one dual meet. In 1928 the Matador thinclads went through their first undefeated season.

Payne began his coaching career at Abilene Christian in 1922. The Wildcats were admitted to the T. I. A. A. the following year. From A. C. C. he went to Simmons University where he remained through the years 1924, 25 and 26. In his last year at Simmons the Cowboys won both the football and track championship of the Texas conference.

The retiring Matador mentor's college days were spent at Abilene Christian college, Simmons University and Bethany College of West Virginia. One year was spent as a professional football player in Pennsylvania.
