PLAINS TOWNS CO-OPERATE IN BIG AD STUNT

FITTING PLAN IS FIXED FOR PUBLICITY AT W. T. C. MEET

Thirty-seven towns in the South Plains district of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce plan to co-operate in advertising both the section as a whole and their own individual towns at the annual West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention at Fort Worth June 18, 19 and 20.

The movement was first suggested at a meeting of the South Plains Commercial Executives association at Lamesa May 10 and details were worked out here Tuesday by the executive committee of the organization.

Mrs. Miller Chairman

Mrs. Paul T. Miller, secretary of the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce and president of the executives association is chairman of the executive committee and was here for the meeting yesterday. Other members of the committee are: John D. Bird, secretary of the Ralls Chamber of Commerce; Wm. A. Wilson, secretary of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce and Ed Bishop, secretary of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce.

Instead of having individual headquarters scattered all over the convention city, the South Plains towns will ask for one big headquarters for the entire section. The headquarters sign will read: "South Plains of Texas" and will have the names of all the towns joining in the movement arranged on this sign in alphabetical order.

Uniform Arm Bands

All towns co-operating in the movement will wear a uniform arm band carrying the lettering, "South Plains of Texas," in addition to any individual badges, arm bands and other identification advertising of their respective towns.

One mammoth float will be entered in the parade at the convention to carry the sign on each side reading, "South Plains of Texas," and seats will be arranged for each town's "Princess" on the float. The princess will carry a shield or placard with the name of her town thereon.

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MOODY FORCES WIN PLEA FOR PRO LAW STAND

METHOD OF SELECTION OF DELEGATES NOT YET DECIDED

(By Associated Press)
BEAUMONT, May 23.—Radical anti-Smith forces of Texas were defeated 511 to 203 at the state democratic convention Wednesday on a proposal to instruct the Texas national delegation against Governor Smith for president.

The proposal was in an amendment by former Gov. O. B. Colquitt, to the majority platform, which declared only for prohibition and presidential candidates in harmony with it.

Johnson loses motion. The convention defeated an amendment by C. Johnson, old democratic war horse, to instruct against all "wet" candidates.

The convention had not yet reached the dispute over the method of choosing the national delegates. Smith leaders are fighting to permit each congressional district to choose its own delegates for a "true test" of the popular will. A committee majority platform embodying the prohibition principles urged by Governor Moody's forces controlling the state convention was adopted by an overwhelming vote.

The prohibition plank called for strict enforcement of the state and national liquor laws and favored presidential candidates in sympathy with the plank.

Fencing Delays Meet

Fencing over the method of naming delegates to the national convention delayed the convention this morning. The resolution by Col. Tom Ball of Houston to put the naming of delegates in the hands of an appointed committee was withdrawn by the committee on permanent organization for further consideration. The resolution was rejected by the committee last night and a substitute by John Boyle of San Antonio recommended for passage. The Smith men are fighting the Ball resolution as they assert it would prevent Smith delegates being named in many delegations where a majority of the state delegates favor him.

After an executive session on the Ball resolution the committee on permanent organization returned a report recommending that the temporary convention organization headed by Chairman W. L. Dean be made permanent, but withheld a report on the Ball resolution on the method of selecting delegates.

The chairman of the committee, A. H. Menefee of Madisonville, said the report would be made when the convention had heard the report of the platform committee and was ready to select delegates.

Without a dissenting voice the convention then voted to make the temporary organization permanent.

Eight delegates at large. Richard Fleming, secretary of the state executive committee, read a communication from the national executive committee fixing the number of delegates at large so that Texas would have eight.

A motion to elect an equal number of men and women as delegates at large carried easily.

On motion of Myron Bialock, Judge R. E. Brooks of Houston, W. A. Tarver of Corsicana, Milton West, Wright Morrow of Houston and Mrs. Jane Y. McCollum, secretary of the state were named as a committee to select delegates at large.

When the platform committee reported, prolonged cheers greeted the plank on religious toleration as well as the paragraphs scoring "republican corruption."

Fee Provision Brings Farm Relief Bill Veto

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, May 23.—President Coolidge today vetoed the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill.

Thus for the second time in as many years Mr. Coolidge has disapproved a farm plan embodying the equalization fee machinery for surplus crop control.

Whether there will be any farm relief enacted this season now is up to congress. The house and senate have a choice of repealing the bill without the equalization fee, in the hope of winning presidential favor, or of attempting enactment of the measure as it stands by overriding Mr. Coolidge's veto.

Doubt Over-Riding Veto. There is much doubt that the latter course would prove successful.

The president vetoed the bill on the grounds of constitutionality and because the so-called equalization fee and other features of the old measure are still prejudicial in his opinion to sound public policy and to agriculture.

The veto draws the issue between the president and the farm group in congress more tightly than it has been and, unless some further action is taken at the capitol, will place the agricultural question before the coming presidential conventions as an outstanding controversy.

Dawes Favors Measure. Frank C. Lowden is one of the

bill's most outspoken champions. Vice President Dawes favors it and Senator Curtis of Kansas and Senator Watson of Indiana have voted for it.

Secretary Hoover has been regarded as standing with the president on farm relief.

The senate would have to muster a two-thirds vote to pass the bill over Mr. Coolidge's veto. This session the senate passed it by a vote of 33 to 23, or slightly more than the necessary two-thirds. In the house the measure was approved 294 to 121, or slightly less than two thirds.

Its consideration in both houses was enlivened by a discussion of its possible effect on the forthcoming presidential campaign, the names of Lowden and Vice President Dawes who favored it, frequently being injected into the debate.

Sees Some Improvement. Mr. Coolidge said in his veto message that this year's McNary-Haugen bill is in some respects an improvement over the one he vetoed last year but nevertheless contained "new and highly objectionable provisions."

The bill, he said, "essentially considered of stimulation of the price of agricultural commodities and products thereof by artificially controlling the surpluses so that there will be a high tariff policy."

Would Adopt Love Plan. Mr. Johnson's report recommended that the "constitutional" or Love Democrats stand on prohibition by adopted in preference to the Moody principles.

Mr. Colquitt's report contained a resolution seeking to instruct the Texas delegation to the national convention against Gov. Smith for president.

The majority platform report called for religious toleration and freedom and urged that no person be discriminated against because of his religion. The Republican party was scolded, especially for its high tariff policy. This report recommended remedial agricultural legislation.

Resolutions were offered in memorial to William J. Bryan, commending Jesse H. Jones of Houston, for his service in the national councils and offering him as "suitable in every way for the highest office within the gift of the people, without presenting him as an actual candidate."

Moody Is Endorsed. Governor Moody's administration was endorsed and he was declared "worthy of the highest honors of which the people of this state and this nation are capable of bestowing."

The platform and resolutions committee recommended by the majority of the platform committee follows in part:

"The Democratic party of Texas reaffirms its unbroken faith in the national Democracy to which its principles and traditions it is attached by indissoluble ties. Texas owes its admission to the union of states to the national Democratic party, and it welcomes to its soil the distinguished representatives of that great faith from every state in the union, and pledges to them its full support."

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Plane Is Saved By Bravery Of Pilot

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, May 23.—An unusual feat accomplished over the alligator-infested Lake Managua in Nicaragua, while flying 125 miles an hour with an amateur at the pilot's stick, has been reported to the naval bureau of aeronautics.

Major Ross E. Rowell of Boise Idaho, commanding the marine aviators in Nicaragua, discovered that the ammunition pan for the starboard wing machine gun, a recent innovation in aerial warfare, had slipped out of the wing and endangered the safety of the craft and the lives of the men aboard.

Turning the controls of the combat plane over to Sergeant Luther J. Norris of Shreveport, La., observer, Major Rowell walked out on the wing and replaced the 50-pound pan, filled with ammunition, into its long socket by fixing the clamps that had been shaken loose by vibration.

Nine witnesses were examined during the morning, closing the Denver's case with the exception of a few statements and explanations to be made regarding briefs exhibits and information submitted during the morning. The hearing will be brought to a close this afternoon with only a short rebuttal from the Santa Fe unless further points are brought out, Attorney Pipkin, of the Santa Fe said.

Claim Insufficient Tonnage. As on the two previous days of the hearing, Judge Barwise's queries tended to show that there was not sufficient tonnage to warrant the two lines through the disputed territory, that the Denver's extension to Dimmitt, Pa. the heart of the Castro would sufficiently care for the tonnage and could be easily reached by trucks from as far as fifteen miles, and that the Santa Fe's present lines served the remainder of the territory. He also attempted to tear down the testimony of Santa Fe witnesses regarding the unlimited possibilities of the area by presenting testimony which stated that the development of the territory had been very slow in the past five years and that that which had occurred was brought about only by the original landowners breaking up ranches and large tracts for cultivation.

H. C. Pipkin, chief counsel for the Santa Fe, rested his cases slightly making only a few objections throughout the morning and answering comparatively few questions in cross examination with each witness.

Spens Back On Stand. C. E. Spens, of Chicago, vice-president of the Burlington lines, was again brought to the stand this morning for additional testimony. In presenting a statement Mr. Spens said that the proposed line would not reduce market hauls as previous Santa Fe witnesses had said but would only reduce the truck haul of the farmer, offering comparatively no change in the route to various markets of California, Kansas City and Ft. Worth.

"The introduction of motor transportation has greatly revolutionized rail transportation by bringing products in from the interior," Mr. Spens said in his testimony. He discounted the statements of previous witnesses.

"I am very much opposed to any movement for the development for the development of charm in women," says Inez Haynes Irwin, novelist.

first place, they have altogether too much charm—so much indeed that they fill our daily press with love troubles. In the second place, I consider charm, per se, a sort of verminous appendix to femininity. Like the appendix, charm is all right as long as it is quiescent. But the moment it becomes active, it must come out.

"Of course natural charm, which like radium, occasionally occurs, is a great asset to anybody. But acquired charm—la-la! It's a frightful test of friendship, for instance, to discover that a woman whom you have always loved and admired has suddenly elected to go charming. A friendship may survive it, but no social occasion can. It is as bad as going chemical or glamorous."

"No, I think it is too late for women to develop charm, or perhaps to redevelop it. They've passed through that period. Who wants to have the measles again? And then personally, I much prefer the knock-down and drag-out method of the young women of the present day. They are go-getters. Go-getters is as necessary a phase to femininity as charm, but a much later one."

"On the other hand I would welcome any movement to develop charm in men. Some men who are born with charm, but very few go in for a conscious development. We have no record of their experiences, probably most of them were murdered during the process."

ious witnesses that there was sufficient tonnage in the territory for two railroads stating that "it is absolutely absurd to say that an increase of 20 per cent in tonnage in the past three years warranted two lines in the territory."

Fully 35 per cent of the tonnage estimated to be routed on the new line would be diverted from the other present lines of the Santa Fe, Mr. Spens said. He estimated the tonnage figures of the Santa Fe as highly inflated.

Cultivation Maps Shown
M. B. Oates, of Wichita Falls, agricultural agent of the Ft. Worth and Denver, was the next witness of the morning, testifying to the general condition of the territory and presenting three map exhibits showing the territory of the railroads of the Panhandle, the cultivation map of the disputed area and the position and locations of railroads throughout the state.

Running Water draw, the barrier referred to by yesterday's witnesses to farmer's trucks in hauling to the Denver extension, was just an ordinary draw and could be easily crossed, Mr. Oates said.

J. E. Hall, real estate man of Plainview, was the next witness on the stand for the Denver, testifying also to the condition of Running Water Draw in that it offered no difficulties for trucks in crossing. Mr. Hall also mentioned the slow development of the country, stating that very few new comers had

moved to that section during the past several years.

Another witness to testify to the slow development of the section was W. R. Dowden, of Plainview, hardware man and farmer, who stated that most of the cultivation had been done by the original land owners of the section and that colonization had been very slow. One hundred per cent of the distribution of products from Plainview is done by trucks, Mr. Dowden said while at least 30 per cent of the products are brought in by truck, some times as far as 50 miles.

Roome Is Called
W. S. Roome, division engineer of the Denver, was the next witness on the stand. He gave his opinion of Running Draw as that it was just an ordinary creek and could easily be crossed with graded roads with comparatively no expense. He pointed out that loading points are being made every six or seven miles on the Dimmitt extension, allowing sufficient facilities for the farmers of the section.

John P. Slaton, of Hereford, was another witness placed on the stand by the Denver counsel. He told of the slow development of the country and verified previous statements regarding the mild slopes in Running Water draw.

T. M. Nowlin, of Lubbock, told of the great trucking lines in and out of the various towns on the South Plains, especially Lubbock, mentioning numerous lines which run, for as far as 75 miles every day. Mr. Nowlin's testimony also tended to show that the inland community with the good roads is developed as rapidly now as the communities which have the branch line railroads.

More Denver Men Called
L. M. Hogsett, general freight and passenger agent of the Denver, was

a witness on the stand to be followed by John A. Hulen, of Houston, traffic manager of the Denver, who pointed out that the South Plains territory in general had not shown more than from 5 to 7 per cent increase in tonnage during the past four years while the territory including the proposed line had not shown more than a 10 per cent increase. General Hulen did say, however, that he thought the section into which the Denver had built its branch line, was of excellent quality and would develop as good as any of the other sections of the South Plains.

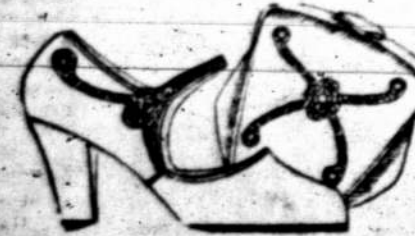

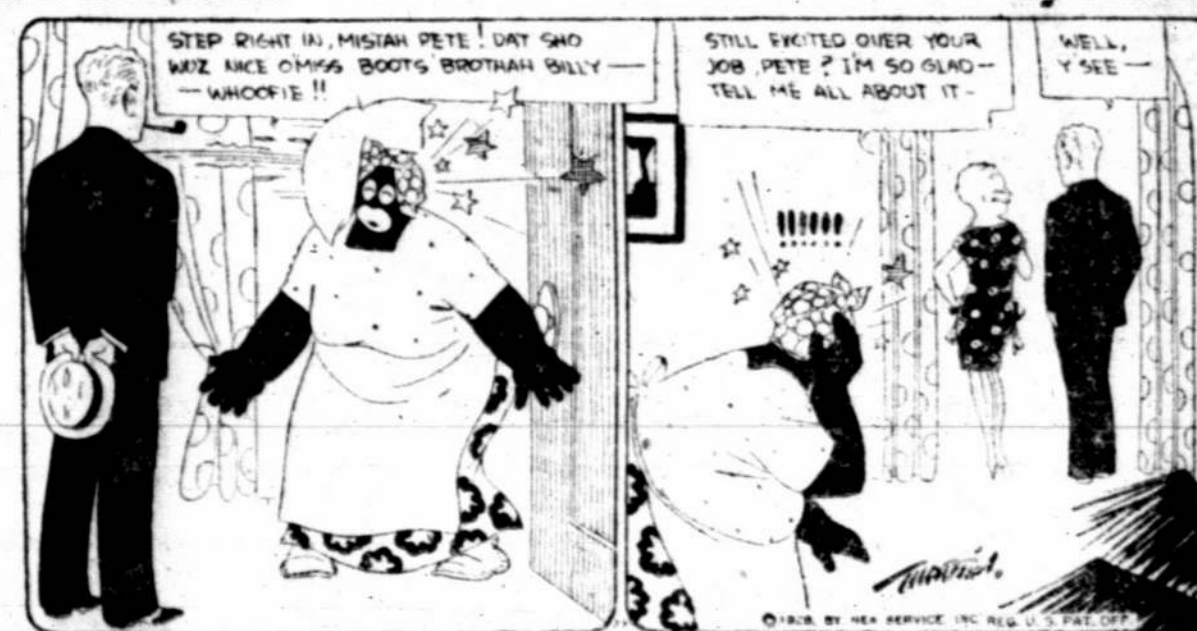

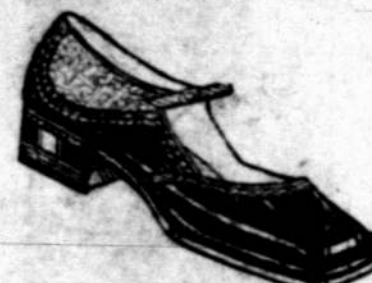

STATE STARTS DRIVE TO HALT TOLL OF AUTO

PROCLAMATION ISSUED FOR "SAVE-A-LIFE" PERIOD IN TEXAS

In view of the big toll of life taken by the automobile in accidents throughout the nation, Texas state officials have decided to try to "do something about it," and Governor Moody has issued a proclamation setting the time between May 19 and June 9 as "Save-a-Life Period," according to information received here.

Various garages and service stations throughout the state, in cooperation with the state highway department, have agreed to aid in the movement to the extent of free inspection of brakes, horns, lights, steering mechanism and other car features during the period. The Super-Service Station here has been named as Lubbock's representative in the drive, and is offering this inspection to the public after installation of special equipment for the purpose.

The proclamation of Governor Moody follows:

Whereas, experience has demonstrated that a considerable portion of the accidents involving motor vehicles is directly chargeable to defective mechanism or equipment;

Whereas, these accidents leave in their wake untold suffering and loss of human life and limb, entirely aside from wanton waste of and damage to property; and

Whereas, a feasible plan has been worked out to aid Highway Departments and State Officials and ably aided by the automobile industry and the garages and service stations, has arranged for such inspection, free of charge to include examination of brakes, horns, lights, steering mechanism and mirrors during the period May 19 to June 9, 1928:

Now, therefore, I, Dan Moody, Governor of the State of Texas, do proclaim the period May 19th to and including June 9th next, as a "SAVE-A-LIFE PERIOD."

And I earnestly urge that all

owners of motor vehicles avail themselves of this opportunity of free inspection of such vehicles and the elimination of all defects.

Respectfully, command, to the Mayor of each city town and village that they make similar proclamation to their townspeople, that presidents of chambers of commerce, luncheon and motor clubs and civic organizations, stress the significance of this safety movement, and I further recommend the subject of public safety as an appropriate theme for clergymen and public speakers during the public safety period, to the end that greater success will attend the effort to reduce car accident hazard.

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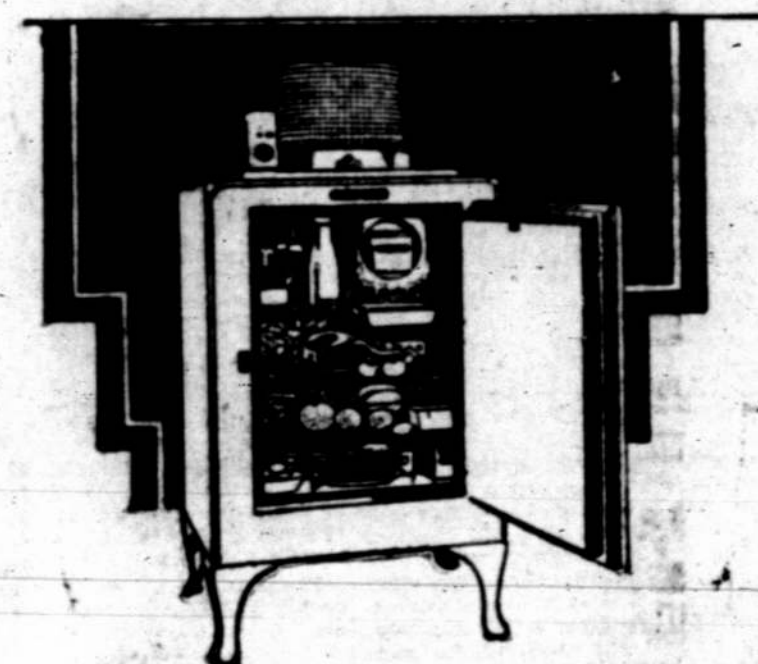
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
