PERRYTON RANKS 1ST ON SANTA FE AS POULTRY MARKET

INLAND RECEIVES BIG 360 HORSE POWER ENGINE TO BE INSTALLED IN PLANT

WILL REPLACE 150 HORSE MOTOR TO BE MOVED TO GUYMON PLANT

NEW ENGINE WILL SWELL TOTAL CENTRAL GENERATING PLANT IN PERRYTON TO 640 HORSE POWER; TO TAKE MONTH TO INSTALL

The Inland Utilities company received a big six-cylinder Fairbanks-Morse 360 horse power, full-Diesel engine on Tuesday of this week to replace the 150 horse engine now in use at the power plant. The older engine will be moved to Guymon.

This new engine brings the total capacity of the central power plant in Perryton to 640 horse. The 100 and the 180 horse motor will be in the Perryton plant for present.

It is estimated that it will take three weeks to a month to get the new motor installed and run. The smaller motor will have moved and the foundation out and a new foundation for the new engine can be laid in the power plant and operation.

Order to maintain service over transmission lines to Follett and man, the emergency plant man will be put in operation the change is being made.

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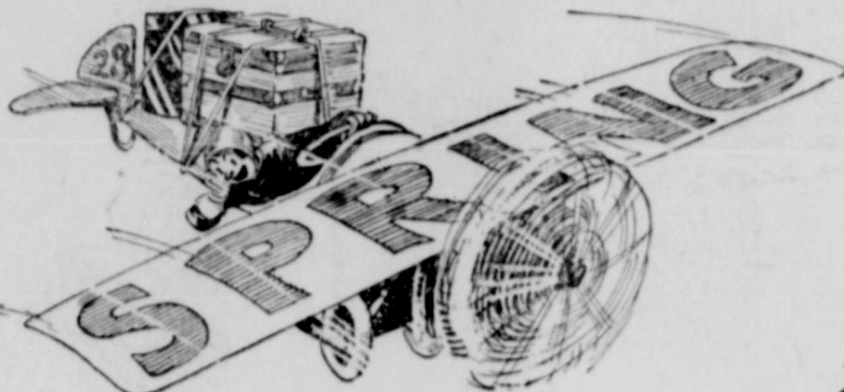
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A Good Will Flyer Arrives

TO START DAIRY SCHOOL MONDAY

POSTPONED FROM LAST MONDAY ON ACCOUNT OF WEATHER CONDITIONS; MANY INTERESTED

The first of the series of twelve dairy discussion meetings, which was to have been held at the school auditorium on last Monday evening, was postponed on account of the inclement weather and the muddy roads. It is now planned to start this series of meetings on next Monday evening March 26, at 8:00 o'clock.

Prof. R. J. Cook, head of the agricultural department of the Perryton High School, and an authority on farm problems, is sponsoring this course of meetings. He will handle the subject for the first night, which is "Getting Started in the Dairy Business."

Subjects to be taken up at subsequent meetings are: "Selecting the Breed to be Used"; "Selecting Milk Cows"; "Feeding for Milk Production"; "Handling Milk and Cream on the Farm"; "Housing Dairy Cows"; "Weaning and Feeding Calves"; "Developing Dairy Heifers"; "Providing Succulence for the Ration"; "Improving the Dairy Herd"; "Marketing Milk and Cream" and "Preventing and Controlling Parasites and Diseases."

It will be decided at the meeting on Monday night as to what evening of the week will be most suitable to all for the holding of the sessions. Other matters of importance to the success of the course will be discussed. All people who are interested are requested to attend this first meeting. MORE POULTRY SHIPPED IN 1927 THAN ANY OTHER POINT ON ROAD

APPROXIMATELY \$365,000.00 PAID OUT TO FARMERS IN 1927 FOR POULTRY CREAM AND EGGS; 29 CARS OF LIVE POULTRY SHIPPED

According to information which the Herald has obtained from various and reliable sources, Perryton has the distinction of ranking first as a poultry shipping point among the thousands of towns located on the great Santa Fe system. This record is even more remarkable when one takes into consideration the wonderful scope of rich, fertile and prosperous agricultural country which is traversed and served by this large railway.

During 1927, a total of 29 carloads of live poultry was shipped from Perryton. A car of live poultry brings an average of about \$3,500.00 to the producer. This means that approximately \$101,500.00 was paid during 1927, for this one item, to poultry raisers of the Perryton territory. In addition to the live poultry, three carloads of dressed turkeys were sent out of here to the markets of the east; also thousands of pounds of dressed turkeys were sent out in smaller shipments.

From all indications, the record of 1927 will be excelled this year. During the first two months of 1928, nine carloads of live poultry was shipped from this point. The people have learned the money making possibilities of the hen. A short drive from Perryton in any direction will bring you to well improved farms, with modern, sanitary chicken houses. Our people have gone into the chicken business in the right manner. It is not a hit and miss proposition but everything is done on a business basis. Flocks are culled; the star boarder is weeded out; the proper rations are fed and larger and better blooded birds are being raised.

Butter fat is no small source of revenue to the farmers of this community. Thousands of dollars are paid out monthly by the produce buyers of Perryton for cream. A careful survey made among the produce men of Perryton shows that a very conservative estimate of the amount paid out by them in 1927 would be the staggering amount of \$365,000.00. This does not take into consideration the thousands of dollars worth of milk, butter and eggs and poultry that is sold to local consumers and shipped by the producers themselves.

TWO INCHES OF RAIN AND SNOW

Ochiltree and the surrounding counties have received over two inches of moisture during the past two weeks. On Wednesday night, March 8, the rain gauge in Perryton measured .18 of an inch with a much heavier precipitation to the north and west.

On Wednesday night of last week the rainfall was .57 of an inch here in Perryton according to the government gauge kept

by Attorney Jack Allen. On the following day, Thursday, a heavy blanket of snow fell, measuring over eight inches. The snow was extremely heavy and the amount of moisture derived from it is estimated at one and one-half inches. The snow laid on the fields and did not blow and drift to any great extent. It was lighter in the south part of this county, but was heavier to the north.

This puts an ideal season in the ground for wheat and other small grain crops. Wheat prospects never were better in this section and the acreage is larger than it ever was before. The moisture in the ground at the present time should carry the wheat until late in April, after the spring wind period is over. Every one is enthused over the present agricultural outlook for the Panhandle.

FARMER'S WIFE MAKES CAKE. ALL MEAT, BAD DIET. CRIME AS A BUSINESS. WIRELESS FLIGHT, PERHAPS.

This will interest farmers' wives. Mrs. James Hamilton, of Pawhuska, Okla., not satisfied with thirty cents a dozen for fresh eggs, developed this idea. She knew how to make good angel cake. Eleven eggs make a cake that sells for a dollar. Cost of other ingredients amount to little. Mrs. Hamilton put her eggs in angel cake and got nearly one dollar a dozen.

Many farm wives, however, far from any angel cake market, can sympathize with an Irish farmer asked by an efficiency man, "Do you know what the ducks swimming in that mudhole would be worth in London?" "I do," replied the farmer, "and have you any idea what the puddle of water would be worth in hell if I had it there?" The market is the problem.

Stefansson, Arctic explorer, tests in a hospital, under medical supervision, a diet consisting exclusively of fresh meat and water. Thousands within the Arctic Circle live on such a diet for months at a time, some of them eating as much as twenty pounds of fresh meat in a day. But it is not a good diet. Men were put on the earth to cultivate it and should eat all of its products, the spices and the orange of the South, and the red meat from the West. But if compelled to choose between all meat and all vegetables, choose the meat.

You probably will not live as long, but you will think more. A vegetable diet is not good for thinking.

As regards crime, the city of Cleveland excels in police efficiency. The percentage is 83, against 63 in Baltimore, 36 in Kansas City, 16 in St. Louis. The National Crime Commission publishes Dr. Louis N. Robinson's statement that police inefficiency and leniency in courts have made crime almost the safest business in the United States. The percentage of failure is lower than in the retail grocery business for instance.

In Chicago insurance companies notify the citizens that they will insure against bombing of buildings by various branches of crime, bootleggers, competing labor organizations, etc. If you can't discourage crime, the next best is to insure against it—although it doesn't help much if you happen to be at home for the bombing.

A new flying machine idea based on "free energy" or "magnetic power" interests Lindbergh and others. It burns no fuel, is expected to fly for 2,000 hours, and Lester J. Henderson, the inventor, is full of hope. It is only hope as yet, although the working model performs well. Eventually, no doubt, as Tesla and others believe, flying machines will pick up "wireless power" from the earth, borrowing from Niagara, the Colorado River and other sources as they fly around the world. That will solve power problems, and 1,000 miles an hour speed will annihilate distance.

A French flier surpasses the American "loop record" by turning eleven hundred and eleven aerial somersaults with a monoplane in four hours and fifty-six minutes. That is exactly as unimportant as the number of back somersaults turned by a circus actor. It is thinking and inventing that count not "stunts."

Moscow statistics for 1927 show four divorces for every five marriages. Divorces may equal marriages. Some young Russians, according to report, are divorced five and six times in one year. Russian authorities say this is a proof of good morals, proving that young people insist on retaining the marriage status, even if they change every month, and that they will not sink to promiscuity.
