RUMBLE OF RUN-OFF BATTLE STARTS

LEADERS BEGIN PLANS TO OPEN SECOND SCRAP

NO CHANGE IN STATUS OF CANDIDATES IS REVEALED TODAY

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, July 31.—As the tumult of last Saturday's democratic primary slowly subsided today, the rumble of another political conflict that will reach a climax in the run-off primary next month became audible.

As returns slowly filtered in and showed Senator Earl B. Mayfield, running for re-election, and Congressman Tom Connally far ahead of the other four candidates, including one woman, a re-alignment of forces pointing to a battle royal in this race gained headway. Congressman Thomas L. Blanton, who polled a heavy vote, announced he would support Mr. Connally and called upon his friends to follow his example, while Jeff McMenore, who was running last on late returns, declared he would throw his support to Senator Mayfield. Other candidates refrained from statements for the time being. They are: Alvin M. Overly, former national commander of the American Legion and Mrs. Maudie Fisher Cunningham.

Miller-Love Battle
A conflict of scarcely lesser proportions loomed as returns indicated that Lieutenant-Governor Barry Miller and State Senator Thomas A. Love would face each other in the final democratic test before the November elections. In his race for re-election, Miller had a large plurality, on the face of incomplete returns, but Love's vote was enough to make an interesting fight quite probable. In his campaign, Mr. Miller attacked Love for his stand on national politics. Love had declared he would not vote for Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York, and took an active part in plans of anti-Smyth demonstrators to carry the state for Herbert Hoover in November.

BRENNAN VERY ILL, IS REPORT

ILLINOIS DEMO LEADER IS SUFFERING FROM SEPTIC POISONING

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, July 31.—George E. Brennan, 63, Illinois democratic leader, was gravely ill from septic poisoning today in John D. Murphy hospital.

Late last night Mr. Brennan received the sacrament of extreme unction, the last rite of the Catholic church for the living.

Although Mr. Brennan's condition was pronounced slightly improved early today, a conference of five physicians issued the statement that "Mr. Brennan's condition is very grave." Mrs. Brennan, their daughter Mary, and state Representative Joseph L. Gill, brother-in-law to Mrs. Brennan, were at his bedside.

An emergency operation was performed last night by Dr. Karl Meyer in an attempt to prevent spread of infection caused by extraction of two teeth Thursday. A later infection had developed, and the spread through Mr. Brennan's entire system.

Seemingly Good Health

Until Thursday Mr. Brennan was seemingly in good health, though he had complained of his teeth. He was taken to the hospital yesterday when friends first learned of his illness.

Although his two years ago when he underwent an operation on his leg, during his unsuccessful campaign for the United States senate, Mr. Brennan has continued his activity in democratic political circles as national committeeman from Illinois and as a leading advocate of Gov. Al Smith's candidacy for the presidency.

COPY OF NAVAL AGREEMENT IS CABLED TO U. S.

FRANCO-BRITISH PACT SOUGHT AS MEANS OF REDUCING ARMS

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, July 31.—Details of a Franco-British naval compromise mentioned by Sir Austen Chamberlain, foreign secretary, in the house of commons yesterday are stated to have been cabled to the British ambassador at Washington where they are expected to be presented today or tomorrow.

In the event that the United States and other nations accept the compromise, another meeting of the preparatory commission on disarmament of the League of Nations will be called to consider the next step.

Modification Possible
In the event that the United States and other nations accept the compromise, a meeting will be called to consider modifications of it. The compromise will not become effective until the major powers accede to it.

The government spokesman carefully explained that the naval compromise in no sense is an agreement as to definite reductions. It is essentially a "formula of principles" on which reductions can be made.

Submarine Construction
The question of submarine construction is definitely involved in the compromise, the spokesman said.

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REED RETURNS HOME PLUNGING INTO POLITICAL CAMPAIGN, SAYING STATE MUST NOMINATE UNDER SMITH PLAN

KANSAS CITY, July 31.—Back in his home town Senator James A. Reed has plunged into the state political campaign with the declaration that democratic state nominees must be in harmony with the ideas of Governor Alfred E. Smith on prohibition.

Stating the nomination of Governor Smith committed the party to a policy of revision or repeal of the 18th amendment, the Missouri Senator last night said the state must nominate candidates who will adhere to the national platform "else the party will be engaged in a joint debate with itself."

Speaking in behalf of his friend, James A. Collet, candidate for the nomination to succeed Reed, Mr. Reed launched an attack on Col-

LEADERS HOLD ADVANTAGE OF EARLY COUNTS

FINAL TABULATION IN COUNTY DISCLOSES NO CHANGES

Complete returns from all 32 of the county's voting boxes made no change in the final status of any of the county or state races and only minor changes in the leads of the various candidates, a complete check of the tabulation showed today. Without a single exception, candidates leading on Saturday night and Sunday morning continued to lead when all the returns were announced.

Victory was won in the 99th district judge's race by Clark M. Mullean, present incumbent. Laurels in the county superintendent's race were won by Miss Mae Murfitt; in the county attorney's contest by Vaughn E. Wilson, and in the county treasurer's race by Miss Anne Ford. Wilson, with two opponents, piled up a large majority and no run-off will be necessary.

Wester Leads to Routree
J. K. Wester, candidate for representative to the state legislature, carried Lubbock, Crosby and Cochran counties, but returns from Dawson, Hockley, Terry, Lynn, Gaines and Youkum gave his opponent, Carl Routree, of Lamesa, a majority and the final election to the post.

Rollie Burns, pioneer citizen, paced the field in the race for tax assessor but will be matched in the run-off next month by A. E. Ellis. Robert H. Bean will likewise be opposed by George W. Foster while Sheriff H. L. Johnston will be opposed by Wade Hardy, police officer, for the office of sheriff.

The only other run-off in the county offices will be staged by W. L. Bruchman, present incumbent, and W. F. Pruitt, runner-up for the place on the county commission from precinct three. B. N. Wheeler of Idaho, former commissioner, was third in the close contest.

TUNNEY QUILTS RING LEAVING TITLE VACANT

ANNOUNCEMENT MADE AT FAREWELL PARTY TO COMMISSIONER

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, July 31.—Gene Tunney, heavyweight champion boxer, announced his retirement from the ring today at a luncheon given in honor of William Muldoon, 32-year-old member of the New York state athletic commission.

"I have fought my last bout as a professional boxer," his statement said.

Reports Confirmed
Staging a "farewell party" to the commissioner and more than 30 newspapermen guests, Tunney declared definitely that the time had come to step out of the game that made him a millionaire. Reports that Tunney was to retire had been circulating since he crushed Tom Heeney in an eleven round technical knockout at the Yankee Stadium last Thursday night.

"Feeling still young enough to make another start in new fields," Tunney declared himself grateful for the benefits conferred and anxious to leave the game better than he found it.

"There is no contender at the present time who appears capable of attracting real public interest," he said. "If there were I might delay my retirement long enough to face him in the ring, but it looks as if it might be two or three years before a dangerous opponent is developed. That is too long to stand and wait."

Rickard's Ability Laundered
Tunney gave high credit to Tex Rickard's ability as a promoter and as the man who could find his successor. He declared it his desire to place in Rickard's hands a belt or other suitable emblem of supremacy, to be awarded by him to that boxer who through a series of elimination bouts or victories over the most formidable opponents that can be obtained shall prove himself deserving of it.

Gene made no definite mention of his future plans and paid no attention in his statement to rumors that he was about to enter matrimony.

In ending his statement, he said: "I have no thought of trying to nominate my successor. To the victor belongs the spoils. I merely step aside and say 'may the best man win'."

STREET IS GIVEN "MONEY SCARE"

NEW YORK, July 31.—(P)—Wall Street experienced a "money scare" today when banks called between \$50,000,000 and \$60,000,000 in brokers' loans within the space of two hours, sending the call money rate from 6 to 8 percent, and forcing a sharp reaction in stock prices. The credit stringency was created by the heavy withdrawal of funds from the call loan market in connection with month-end settlements, including dividend and interest payments. Many of the country's large corporations have been loaning millions in surplus cash in the call loan market, where the interest rate has averaged 5 percent or better in the last two months, in preference to leaving the money on deposit in the banks or invested in short term securities.

Watkins, former promotion manager of the General Motors Corporation, is educational director of the American City Bureau of Chicago. He is here in the company of Jim Penland, of Waco.

Visited Texas Year Ago

Watkins visited Texas over a year ago, speaking at Dallas where Penland first met him. Penland secured the services of Watkins just prior to the campaign in Waco for the raising of funds of the Baylor University. Watkins spoke to the luncheon clubs, chamber of commerce meetings, merchant's gatherings, wholesalers club, women's clubs and other organizations and Penland believes the success of the Baylor fund campaign, was in part due to the addresses delivered by Watkins.

The mid-afternoon market was quiet within 3 or 4 points of the lowest.

Downward Trend At New Orleans

NEW ORLEANS, July 31.—Cotton prices again developed a downward trend today under persistent liquidation and selling induced by the favorable weather over the belt and a bearish private crop condition and yield report.

The market at the lowest showed losses of 32 points compared with the previous close but towards mid-session shorts covered and prices rallied 10 points but after mid-session the market quieted and the price trend remained unchanged.

BRITISH ACE BEATS HAHN IN 800 METER FINAL

LOWE RETAINS TITLE WON IN LAST OLYMPICS

U. S. STAR LEADS UNTIL NEAR END AND WILTS ON SPEEDY GRIND

(By Associated Press)
OLYMPIC STADIUM, Amsterdam, July 31.—Douglas Lowe of Great Britain today won the 800 meters final in the Olympic games, retaining his championship won in 1924. Among others he defeated the American star, Lloyd Hahn.

Lowe won by ten yards from Evelyn of Sweden. Hahn led until the final turn when he wilted and was badly beaten.

New Record Is Set
Lowe's time was 1 minute 51.4 seconds, breaking the Olympic record of 1:49 second, Herman Engelhard of Germany was third, Phil Edwards of Canada fourth, Hahn fifth and Seraphin Martin of France sixth.

Nine started, Hahn, jumping to the front and making the pace, was closely pursued by Lowe and Edwards. They kept in that order with the other Americans, Earl Fuller and Ray Watson, bringing up the rear until the turn into the home stretch where Lowe ran away from his rivals.

Hahn had not the least sort of a sprint left and faded badly. Behind Martin, the world's record holder, who was sixth, came his countryman, Keller, with the two Americans last.

The record broken by Lowe's great run had stood since the Olympic games at Stockholm in 1912 when it was set at 1:51.9-10 by Ted Meredith.

Elizabeth Robinson of the United States won the 100 meter final for women.

Mass Robinson, a Chicago girl representing the Illinois Women's A. C., ran a beautiful race. She was up with the leaders all the way and had enough reserve for a finishing spurt to beat out Panny Rosenfeld and Ethel Smith, two Canadians, who were second and third. Miss Robinson's time was 1:11.4 seconds.

A German girl, E. Steinberg, finished fourth and last in the exciting race. Myrtle Cook of Canada and Pauline Schmidt of Germany were disqualified for false starting.

The women's discus throwing final was won by Helen Konopacka of Poland with Lillian Copeland, of the United States, second.

The picture of Tilden and Cochet, after their bitter battle, shaking hands and congratulating each other, seemed like the signing of a Franco-American peace pact.

James W. Good, western campaign manager for Mr. Hoover, said in making the announcement that the real problem now is in meeting the Iowa farmers.

The republican nominee, Mr. Good stated, would make no public address in Cedar Rapids, but would devote his time to conferences with farm leaders who have sought to discuss the agricultural situation with him.

Mass Meeting Arranged
A public mass meeting has been arranged for the evening of August 22, to be addressed by other speakers.

Dates for the conference were fixed to coincide with Mr. Hoover's return to the village of his birth, West Branch, Iowa, where he is to speak August 21.

Leaders in the fight for farm relief during recent years will be asked to attend the Cedar Rapids conference. Mr. Good said, so that the republican nominee may have the benefit of their views in the shaping of a farm program that will prove acceptable.

It was indicated that representatives of the corn belt committee, which has for its aim the improvement of agriculture conditions, would be invited to take part in the conference.

Fascist Greetings Are Sent To Nobile
BOLZANO, Italy, July 31 (AP).—Premier Mussolini has directed the prefect at Bolzano to go to the Brenner frontier to convey the greetings of Fascist Italy to General Umberto Nobile and his companions.

The Nobile party, learning of the message, expressed keen delight and said that this repaid them for all the sufferings they had undergone.

REDUCTION IN OIL OUTPUT IS SEEN PAST WEEK

(By Associated Press)
TULSA, Okla., July 31.—Decreases in the Seminole and West Texas oil fields during the week ending July 28, reduced the daily average production of crude oil in the United States 7,198 barrels during the period, the Oil and Gas Journal will say in its current issue.

Although Seminole production dropped off about 4,000 barrels, total production in Oklahoma increased nearly 1,000 barrels. That was due to added production in the St. Louis-Pierson and Allen areas.

Production in both the Yates and Hendrick fields of West Texas was off, but increases in other fields offset a part of the loss.

The majority of other producing areas in the United States either remained practically unchanged or showed slight losses.

SMITH ENJOYING VACATION WITH POLITICS BEHIND

(By Associated Press)
HAMPTON BAYS, N. Y., July 31 (AP).—Golf and swimming, getting the best of politics, held the inside track with Governor Smith today as he made the most of the closing hours of a vacation at the shore, perhaps the last before he plunges actively into his campaign for the presidency.

The democratic nominee will end his stay here amid familiar surroundings tomorrow, and motor to New York for a three day visit before returning to Albany.

In New York, he will confer with his chief political lieutenants. When he gets back to the executive mansion he will face the necessity of turning out without much delay the final draft of his acceptance speech to be delivered three weeks from tomorrow night.

Refreshed by rest and relaxation the Governor held today to his vacation policy of keeping political cares in the background. He said he was out of touch with his campaign managers, and that he would have nothing of importance to say on any phase of the political situation while down here.

For a moment yesterday the nominee let down the bars, in response to appeals of newspaper men to declare emphatically that he was not worried about the situation in the South.

KANSAN FLAYS AL SMITH BUT RECALLS PART

PROSTITUTION, GAMBLING CHARGE WITHDRAWN IN PLEA

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, July 31.—William Allen White, Kansas editor, today withdrew his charges against Governor Smith's legislative record so far as bills governing gambling and prostitution were concerned because, he said, he did not wish to question the motive of the democratic presidential nominee.

While abating his contention that Governor Smith had consistently voted for the saloon to stand, Mr. White said of his other charges: "I could not in good conscience press this issue, realizing that Governor Smith, whom I greatly admire for his many high qualities, feels that my charges question the purity of his motives, which always should be granted in any political controversy."

Statement is Given
Mr. White said in his statement: "Yesterday, talking to Walter Lippmann of the World, a friend of

Governor Smith, and of mine for many years, I learned that Governor was deeply aggrieved that I should charge him with protecting gambling and prostitution in his assembly record. I can understand, after considering what Mr. Lippmann said, that the governor in casting those votes against those reform bills might honestly have felt that the bills were unconstitutional or were not enforceable, or infringed upon personal liberty or encouraged police blackmail.

"But Governor Smith certainly is entitled to fair treatment. I always have tried to fight fair. I have never consciously questioned any man's motives and so this morning before the morning papers have come and before I know what if any reply Governor Smith has made to my statement of yesterday, I desire to withdraw the charges formally insofar as they affect his votes on gambling and prostitution but not his position as to the saloon."

"On the question of the menace of Tammany and of Governor Smith's Tammany record for the open saloon, the whole issue of the campaign is coming."

"Organized, protected prostitution is quickly passing out of American life and that issue is not vital, but if not, I could not in good conscience press this issue, realizing that Governor Smith, whom I greatly admire for his many high qualities, feels that my charges question the purity of his motives, which always should be granted in any political controversy."

"So the ten or a dozen votes on

gambling and prostitution come out of the record. I hope now American newspapers, and particularly republican newspapers, will give the same consideration to this statement that they gave to my statement of yesterday."

Mexico's Congress Has Special Meet

MEXICO CITY, July 31 (AP).—Congress convened yesterday in the shortest extraordinary session in its history in order to declare the constitution amended in accordance with the wishes of the assassinated president-elect. The task was accomplished in two hours.

The amendments, which had been ratified by the majority of state legislatures, give Mexico City and other towns in the federal district a government by federal commissioners rather than by elected mayors and strengthen the size of the chamber of deputies by one half.

The amendments also give the president the power to appoint and remove judges in the hands of the president.

TOM CONNALLY SAYS FIGHT TO BE CONTINUED

BATTLE LINES DRAWN AND MUCH AT STAKE, HE ASSERTS

DALLAS, July 31.—Congressman Tom Connally, who will enter the runoff August 25 for the democratic nomination for United States senator from Texas against Senator Earle B. Mayfield as a result of the balloting in Saturday's primary, today made the following statement:

"To my friends throughout Texas I want to express my deep gratitude for their unselfish and untiring efforts in my behalf. The results of Saturday's primaries prove their loyalty and activity. They have achieved a great triumph. However, the real fight lies before us. The lines of battle have not changed.

Battle of Whole People

Smith cost him the nomination but "not for all deposits in all Texas banks would I exchange positions today with the apparent victor in my race."
