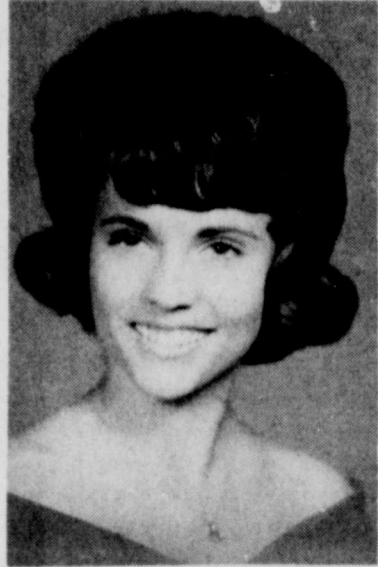




Absentee Balloting Underway

Barton, a member of the Abernathy High School FFA chapter, garnered the grand champion lamb trophy with his 81-pound Hampshire lamb. Donna Huffaker also took the reserve grand champion honors of this division; this time with her 82-pound South Down lamb.

TRACK MEET RESULTS GIVEN

Out of the 18 participating schools, Abernathy and Idalou proved to be the champions of the classes in the annual Abernathy Invitational Track and Field Meet held here Saturday, March 11. The meet, which brought to town eight class AA schools, besides Abernathy, and nine Class A schools, was held at the AHS cinders.

Seven Abernathy speedsters plus the sprint-relay and mile relay teams took honors for themselves. Taking first places in the meet were: Dana Moore with a timing of 2 min. 10 seconds in the 880-yard run; Darrell Selke with a time of 41.5 seconds in the 330-yard intermediate low hurdles;

Harry Mathis with a leap of 20 feet, 7 1/2 inches in the broad jump; Tommy Hunley with a flouncing jump of 5 feet, 6 inches in the high jump; and Hunley and Burl Fuller each with a springy vault of 11 feet, 6 inches in the pole vault. The latter two boys tied for first place in the pole vault event.

Other individual honors won by Abernathy cindermen were: Doyle Fuller, fifth place in the 100-yard dash, fifth place in the 220-yard dash, and third place in the high jump; Harry Mathis, fourth place in the 440-yard dash; Larry Vannoy, third place in the 120-yard high hurdles; Tommy Hunley, fifth place in the 120-yard high hurdles; and Darrell Selke second place in the 100-yard dash.

The sprint-relay team, composed of Burl Fuller, Doyle Fuller, Harry Mathis and Darrell Selke took second place while the mile relay team took sixth place in that event. The mile-relay team is made up of sophomores Jerry Fuller, Mike Williams, Tim Barton and Benny Pope.

Abernathy High, the only AA school to score over 100 points, won the class AA division of the meet with its 103 points; Idalou, the class A champion, had 106 1/2 points for its victory. Second places went to Hale Center, with 93 points, and Spur, with 94 1/2 points, in class AA and Class A respectively.

Helicopter Crash

Abernathy Soldier Injured In Vietnam

Mrs. John Freeman of Abernathy Saturday received a letter from her son, SP4 David Fargier, 23, U.S. Army, telling her that he had been injured in a crash of his helicopter. He is with the 174th Aviation Group in Vietnam, Monday, Mrs. Freeman was notified by the Red Cross that her son had been injured. Although the extent of his injuries is not known here, the letter and Red Cross report both indicated "not critical."

The helicopter crashed and burned, and it is believed that the copter and men were in combat action at the time.

Mrs. Freeman said her son has been moved to a U.S. Army Hospital in Zama, Japan.

Fargier entered the Army in October, 1965, and left the States for Vietnam May 3, 1966.

RON PRESTON WITH YOUTH REVIVALISTS

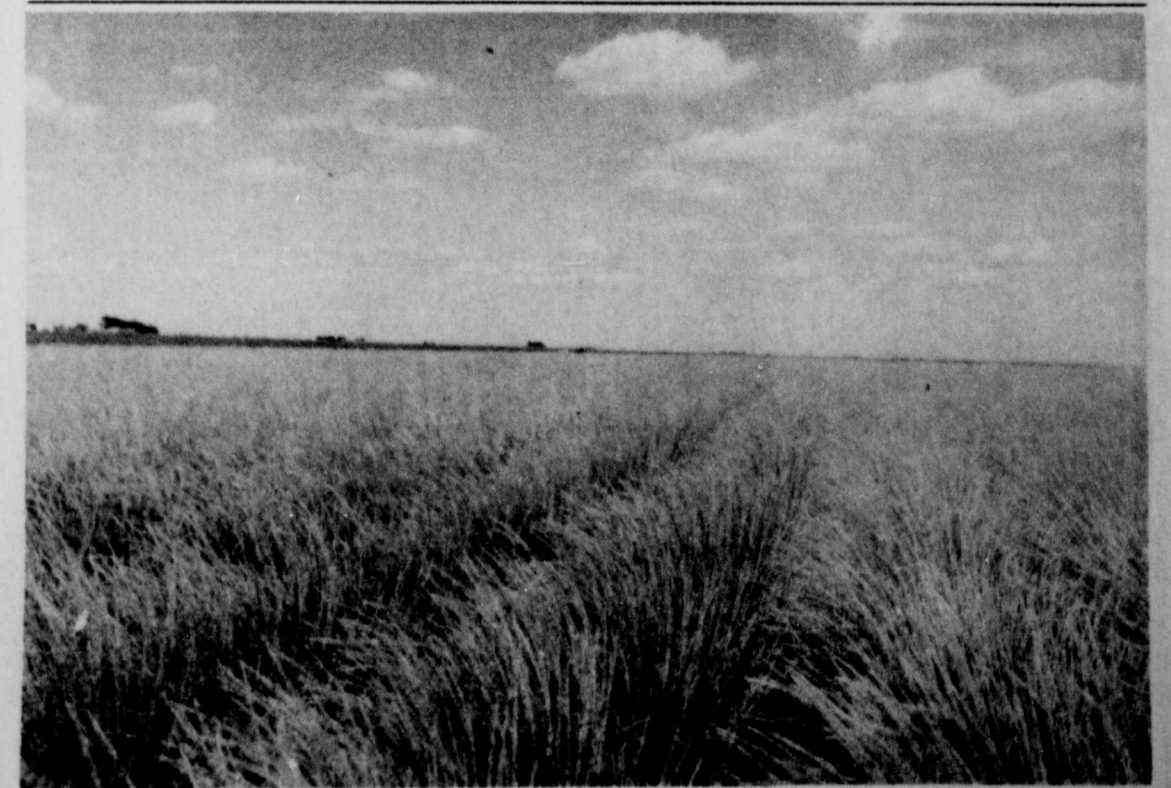

Too dry to plant? Charles Owens and Clyde Benn who farm west of Abernathy don't think so. They are preparing to plant sideoats grama grass now. They feel that it is time to plant regardless of moisture.

Under dryland conditions, grass should be planted on a flat seedbed not over one-half inch deep. A dead litter cover is recommended to aid in the prevention of crusting, which is a major problem in establishing grass.

When the grass seedlings are emerging they are very hard to see. In contrast, the weeds are growing at an alarming rate. Weeds should be controlled by mowing, shredding, or with chemicals. When the grass has been established, weeds will no longer be a problem.


You can obtain assistance and information through your local Soil Conservation District by contacting technicians of the Soil Conservation Service. They will be glad to discuss seeding and management of grasses with anyone who is interested.

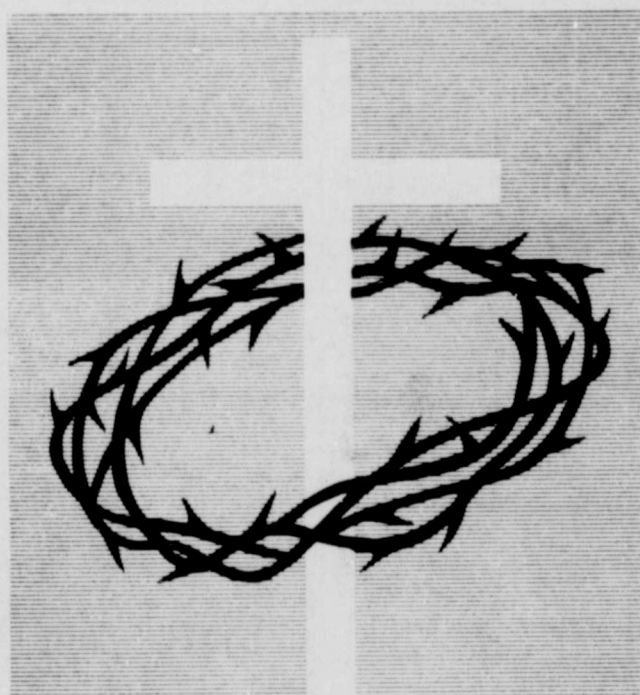


