All Delinquents To Be Dropped From List After Jan. 1

36,814 Bales Of Cotton Are Ginned Up To December 1

Compared With 91,527 On Same Date Last Year

Up until December 1, of this year there had been 36,814 bales of cotton ginned in Dawson county from the crop of 1938, according to R. S. Stanfield, special agent for the Department of Commerce, Bureau of Census.

It is estimated by ginners and cotton men that ninety per cent of the present crop has been ginned. If this estimate is true then there will be approximately 4,000 bales to be ginned after December 1, thus the crop for this year in Dawson county would exceed forty thousand bales. Many farmers of the county are entirely through gathering, while others like only a remnant. Guesses now place the crop at over forty thousand bales, while many contend that it will not reach that figure.

Clear, though cold, weather, has been had throughout this month. Although retarding the speed of getting the cotton out, nevertheless, there has been very few days during the entire fall that were unfit for picking.

Three New Blocks To Be Paved Here

Work was started this week on one of the largest projects, the city has enjoyed in several years, when a large crew of men started to moving dirt on South Dallas Street.

At present the street is only paved the width of the highway, paving which traverses Dallas across Lamesa.

Contract has been let for the widening of this paving to the full width of the street for two blocks, between South First and South Third. Also contracted is the paving of the east side of the street down to South Fourth, and efforts are being made to pave the west side.

It is reported also that South Fourth will be paved from Dallas Street, east to the Compress, although no contract has been let at this time. Caliche base has been completed on South Second and South Third and they will be topped at the same time the Dallas Street project is finished.

Tuesday morning saw forty-four men at work on this street. According to the contractor, all men will get in the time by this weekend and will receive their checks before Christmas, and work will be held up until after the holidays. It is a PWA project.

Although no definite contracts have been let for any additional paving, there are many rumors of other streets which are to receive treatment in the very near future.

Under the present arrangement with the Works Progress Administration, the city may pave any street within the city limits, so long as it connects with other paving and the property holders on either side will agree to pay their share of the cost, which it is understood runs about \$1.50 per running foot.

LAMESA STORES NOT TO BE OPEN MONDAY, DEC. 26

It is understood that practically all the stores and offices in Lamesa will be closed, Monday, December 26th, in observance of Christmas Day, which this year falls on Sunday.

Many employees, as well as employers will take advantage of the double holiday to visit friends and relatives in nearby towns, while others will have guests from other towns, but all will welcome the two days of recreation following the strenuous days before Christmas.

Three Buildings Are Included In School Program

Repairing Of Present Structures Also Planned

Bids were received by the Lamesa Independent School District Board of trustees for construction totaling \$121,740 last Thursday. A contract totaling \$8978.00 was awarded early in October for the construction of the stadium on McCollum field. A PWA grant of \$66,600.00 by the Federal Government was received to aid in this school improvement program.

The bids of last Thursday were for three forms of contracts. First, for the construction of three new school buildings and alterations and repairs to existing buildings; second, the heating and plumbing for the new construction and elementary building already on the campus and third, the electrical contract for wiring and electrical fixtures and electrically operated equipment called for in new and existing buildings. The new construction calls for (a) a twelve classroom building for primary pupils which will have the necessary rest room facilities, assembly room accommodating 150 pupils and storage room and office. (B) a physical education building with a main workout room, 90x87 feet and dressing and shower room accommodations for boys in one end and for girls in the other. (Continued on Back Page)

If conveyances are used for delivery of milk they shall bear the name of the producers permit number as well as the grade of the product sold shown in conspicuous letters, 1 1/2 by 3 inches. Caps may be purchased from your hardware store. All old style caps will be discarded. Violation of these provisions are punishable by a fine, not to exceed \$100.00. City Health Dept. 47-46c.

New Post Created By Chevrolet Co.

Chevrolet's facilities for growth in the important Southwest region to which this territory belongs have been increased by the creation of a new post, that of assistant regional manager in charge of new car operations, it was announced this week. E. S. Graham formerly manager of the Houston zone has been named by W. E. Holler, general sales manager, to the new position. Graham will assume duties connected with the supervision of new car and truck operations throughout this territory, acting as aide to R. W. Hill, manager of the Southwest region. His appointment rounds out the region's executive personnel, which was augmented two years ago by creation of a national used car department, with specially-trained personnel in each of the company's regions and zones. Nearly 10 years' experience in the automotive industry qualify Graham for the post to which he has been advanced. He joined Chevrolet as a warehouse foreman at Dallas, March 4, 1929, going into training for service promotion representative the following month. For about five months after completion of this course he served as service promotion manager at El Paso, after which he was assistant parts and service manager at San Antonio until April 1, 1930. Between that time and May 6, 1933, Graham served as parts and service manager at El Paso, Oklahoma City and Houston. He became assistant zone manager at Houston and one year later city sales manager, serving in the latter capacity until March 16, 1935 when he was promoted to similar work in the Chicago zone. His first zone managership came in March 1937, when he assumed that post at New Orleans. Since April 1, 1938, he has been manager of the Houston zone.

Re-Opening Plants Is Noted In Texas

Expansions and reorganizations of industries already established, and the re-opening of plants which have been temporarily closed for seasonal or other reasons, constitute the bulk of new manufacturing activities in Texas during recent weeks. Mrs. Clara H. Lewis, editorial assistant in the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research, pointed out. In this group is included a large number of canning plants located in the Lower Rio Grande

Borden County Farm Notes



Chas. E. Friley, regional game manager of the State Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, conducted a meeting of the Borden County Wildlife Board at Gail on November 30th for the purpose of planning a constructive and effective game conservation program for the county. The Borden Planning Board is composed of a small group of individuals representing all classes of people in the county who are interested in wildlife conservation. Mr. Friley outlined possible ways in which a county planning board might contribute to a long time conservation program and an explanation was given covering necessary regulatory game laws needed in this area, together with an effective and broader license system for Texas. The Borden County Wildlife Planning Board represents the membership of the Game Management Association, consisting of 110 land operators and owners who control over one-half million acres of land in the county association. Nine persons were present in an instructional meeting held in the Sheriff's office at Gail on December 2, when Mr. T. A. Harris, area game warden, presented a summary of game laws and enforcement plans to be carried out by the newly appointed deputies in Borden county. These deputies have been appointed by Mrs. Covey, sheriff of Borden county, for the specific purpose of enforcing game laws in the county. This plan for game law enforcement has been approved by the Borden County Game Management Association through petitions circulated in each Commissioners' Precinct, as the best method of having immediate protection for the current supply of game birds, fish, etc. Deputies who have been appointed in Borden county include the following: Fred M. Miller, Precinct No. 3. R. B. Wills, Precinct No. 4. Carl Lockhart, Precinct No. 2. In addition to the above named deputies, the Borden county Game Management Association is cooperating as individuals in reporting violations to T. A. Harris, Game Warden and A. M. Clayton, Deputy Game Warden. Highways are being closely checked by the ranch employees in various parts of the county. Several fines have been assessed in recent weeks for game law violations, and Borden county farmers and ranchers plan to carry out an effective controlled hunting and fishing program.

Present indications are that the canning of citrus products will show an increase over the past season, because of the large crop this year, and also because of the increased national distribution of canned citrus products from Texas which has taken place within the last two years." Mrs. Lewis said.

MR. AND MRS. J. H. ADKINS IMPROVES THEIR KITCHEN

"I was plowing in the field when I figured out a way to make space for and to build a ventilated pantry," said Mr. J. H. Adkins, as he talked at the Achievement Day event Friday, Dec. 9, featuring the improvements that he and Mrs. Adkins and family had made in their kitchen. It just makes a family a lot happier when they have a pretty house in which to live and it brings the members of the family closer together, when they work together, he continued to say. Mrs. Adkins said, "I have always wanted a pretty kitchen but have never had one until now."

As the statements indicated this job of improving the kitchen was a family affair at the beginning of the work. The kitchen was a small 10x12 with four doors and two windows. The sink was built in a base cabinet, made of beaded lumber and painted a dark green. There was another small cabinet and the stove which was all the equipment in the kitchen.

The walls and woodwork were very dark. There was no place for the separator and the churn, except in the unequipped bathroom. But at the achievement even, 70 people saw a kitchen which is a beautiful and efficient work shop. A partition was removed, some space was taken off the bath room and a little hall was taken into the kitchen and it was this space

that was devoted to a ventilated pantry and storage for the separator, the cooker, the churn and brooms and mops and the daily worn work clothes. There is ample space in this pantry for the storage of an adequate food supply, fresh vegetables, and fruit for the milk butter in the cooler months. In the other part of the kitchen, Mr. Adkins built a lovely cabinet for the storage of dishes, utensils and staples. This is the real working surface of the kitchen.

The sink cabinet was reworked and refinished a door was relocated to give plenty of space for the large cabinet. The cabinet is finished in a soft cream. The tile board wainscoting finished in cream also with a darker tone of the same for the trim, and the woodwork and doors. The upper part of the walls were papered over sheet rock which was added in this job of improving. Venetian blinds were installed over the sink. A lovely pattern of inlaid linoleum with a cream background and squares of blue and rust black and cream with rust stripes.

Mr. Adkins also made a table large enough for the four to eat on and built in two drawers for his own use in keeping farm records and one for Mrs. Adkins use. And to make the work easier, and to enable one to place or to get equipment or food from the upper part of the cabinets a ladder stool was provided. It is so constructed that it will not slip when one climbs up on it.

The living room to Mr. Adkins home also won second place in the living room contest for 1931.

The Central Home Demonstration club women and non-club women were honored to have five hundred to register with the forty-two women for luncheon. The men were Messrs. W.

M. Yates, Justice Walls, E. A. Tweak and the host, Mr. J. H. Adkins.

Dr. Cox Says:

"Babies and young children need as careful protection at this time of the year against 'winter complaints' as they do during the warm weather against 'summer complaints,'" states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer in discussing seasonal disease hazards for young children.

"Winter Complaints" includes influenza, tonsillitis, pneumonia, bronchitis and other diseases of the respiratory or "breathing" system as distinguished from "summer complaint" which attacks the digestive system. Diseases like pneumonia may develop from a neglected cold, they may follow as an after affect of measles or whooping cough or one of the other so-called children's diseases; or they may occur suddenly and with very little warning. They are more prevalent in winter than in summer and they are even more difficult to combat than digestive ailments. Nearly all the diseases are spread through the secretions from the nose and mouth.

These respiratory diseases are particularly dangerous to babies and young children. Those not invigorated health are more susceptible to these infections. The first line of defense is to strengthen their powers of resistance against ill health; the second is to keep them under medical supervision; the third is to keep them away from others— young or old—who have coughs, colds or fevers.

The importance of keeping young children away from persons who have

colds, or any other infectious disease cannot be emphasized too strongly. The utmost care should be exercised by those with colds, and who are unavoidably brought in contact with young children, not to cough or sneeze so that they spray of saliva reach the children.

(C) A heating plant to house two boilers one as a supplementary unit for heating the new buildings and the present elementary building from which the present boiler will be removed for the

Union Gymnasium Be Complete Soon Structure To Seat 400; Heating And Lighting Plants Planned

Construction work on the new gymnasium-auditorium unit for the school got under way last week a favorable weather allowed workmen to begin pouring concrete, and several bricklayers are now at work erecting the walls.

Contract for the structure was let to Sampson Brothers of Lubbock for \$18,503 on November 18, with forty-five per cent of the cost to be furnished by the Works Progress Administration. Included in the contract is 403 feet of walk to be placed along the front of the combined units, four hundred folding chairs to seat the auditorium floor, extension of the heating and lighting systems to the structure, and another tank and tower to supply it with water.

The gymnasium-auditorium will be complete with stage, 14 1-2 by 52 feet on the east side to include two eight by eight feet dressing rooms on either side; bleacher type seats on the west side built over dressing rooms, showers and lockers; and an overhead heat distributing system. The gymnasium proper will include a playing floor 48 by 80 feet built of maple over a sub-floor.

According to Mr. Sampson, who is supervising the work, construction will be completed by February 10, if the weather will permit the required number of working days to complete it.
