REDUCTION ELECTRIC RATES

Plan \$27,500 Project

At a called session of the Stanton school board, Monday night, the discussion was made to seek an outright grant of \$22,500 from the Federal Government, the money so sought, if secured, to be used to rehabilitate the old grade school building and provide for home economics and band facilities in addition to the high school building in connection with a gymnasium for physical education and health training for the school, such training being mandatory

by the state law. The architectural firm of Haynes & Strange, of Big Spring and Lubbock, have been retained by the school board to draw plans and specifications in seeking the PWA grant, and to do the building to follow. A bond election for \$27,500 is contemplated at an early date to provide the 55 percent of the funds which must be furnished by the local district to offset the 45 percent the Federal government proposes to give as an out-

right grant. A total expenditure of \$50,000 is figured to be the minimum necessary to modernize and properly expand the local school plant. Of this only \$27,500 will have to be raised by a bond issue; the other \$22,500 will be an outright grant from PWA. Application forms were made out and signed Tuesday for filing in Fort Worth office of the PWA. Reasonably quick action is contemplated under the new PWA setup.

COST TO AVERAGE COMMERCIAL OR DOMESTIC CUSTOMER LESS HALF 1928

A general reduction of electric rates to residential and commercial customers, effective July 1, was filed with the Mayor and City Council of Stanton by the Texas Electric Service Company this week. Mayor Moffett observed, after examination of the new schedule, that the cost to average commercial or domestic customer would be less than half of the 1928 cost for the same current.

R. L. Miller, district manager for Texas Electric Service Company, explained the application of the rates and called attention to the fact that this reduction was the third in nine years and was in line with the company's general policy of passing on any savings made through efficient

operation on increased use by the customers.

"At the time the Texas Electric Service Company took over operation of the electric service for Stanton, 40 kwh of electricity cost \$6.40", Mr. Miller said, "and in nine years this figure has been reduced to \$2.85."

The new rates, which are being installed throughout the western end of the system, are very simple, have no room count on the residential rate and no demand charge on the commercial loads up to 4 kw, and in addition, carry lower minimum bills.

A representative of the company will call on commercial customers and explain the application of the rates to each business.

Mrs. Louis Montgomery of Abilene, representing the National Red Cross, was in Stanton, Monday and Tuesday, investigating each case of storm damage to homes or furniture when the loss was not covered by insurance. She was very anxious that no one eligible for Red Cross assistance should be overlooked. Some property owners whose loss was not insured, graciously declined the proffered assistance but when Mrs. Montgomery finished her work she had given assistance to five families for a total amount of \$440.80. This money comes to Stanton in an hour of need and is deeply appreciated by our people.

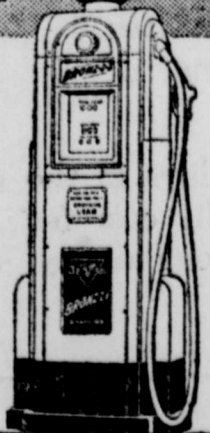

They can show that the purchasing power of the American people is greater than the purchasing power of all the millions in Europe or in Asia.

They can add that the American people top the list in facilities for education for all. Throughout the world our nation is acknowledged as the home of religious tolerance and widespread opportunity.

These things, they can show, were not the gifts of office-holders and politicians. They were created and developed by the initiative, the strength and the love of freedom of the people.

Recently there descended on Congress from the folks back home a flood of protests on the so-called Reorganization Bill.

Specifically, many of the messages opposed features of the measure which constituents feared would remove certain brakes on spending of the public funds; would grant to the Executive branch of government powers they felt should be limited to the Legislative branch, and would change the administration of our Civil Service.

But fundamentally, in the opinion of experienced observers, what the public most feared was the possibility of further surrender by Congress of the powers and authority entrusted to it by the Constitution and the people.

This apprehension was not groundless. In recent years, in response to pleas of emergency, the public has seen many Congressmen willing to relinquish to the Executive branch of government and its bureau responsibilities which they were elected to assume. Every surrender of such authority means, of course, a surrender of the power of the people those Congressmen represent.

If enough of that authority is bartered away, our boasted "balance of powers" between the Legislative, the Executive and the Judicial branches of government can become an empty phrase.

So long as that authority is retained by the people through their elected representatives, Democracy persists. If it is lost, Democracy falls. The Old World today offers eloquent evidence of what can happen to human freedom and human rights when representative government fails to assert itself.

That is something for Congressmen to remember when they read the mail which urges them to fulfill the responsibilities for which they were elected, and thus keep government close to their constituents, the people.

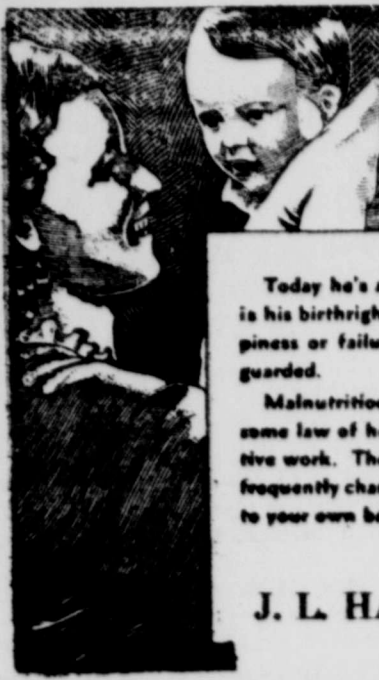
